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WESTMINSTER HOSPITAL AND THE ABBEY CHURCH. In the distance can be seen the church of St. Margaret, Westminster, founded by Edward the Confessor, rebuilt in the reign of Edward I and since heavily restored. On the left stands the Westminster Hospital, built by Inwood in 1832. The hospital removed to Page Street in the present century and the building has now been demolished. On the right is the abbey church of St. Peter at Westminster, founded by the Confessor and dedicated in 1065. The present building dates from the thirteenth century, with the exception of Henry VII's Chapel, finished in 1519.

PRESENTATION

Tablets: 2 mg, 4 mg or 8 mg perphenazine BP in containers of 50 and 500.

Syrup: 3 mg perphenazine BP per 5 ml dose in bottles of 150 ml and 2 litres.

Injection: 5 mg perphenazine BP in each ampoule of 1 ml. Boxes of 5 and 100 ampoules.
