Ethereal Tincture of Iodine, Carbolic Acid, Thymol.

"Spiromol" No. 3
Carbolic Acid, Creosote, Iodine, Ether, Chloroform (Dr. Lees' formula).

"Spiromol" No. 4
Formaldehyde, Chloroform, Menthol, Oil of Pine
(Dr. Muthu's formula).

"Spiromol" No. 5
Formaldehyde, Ether, Oil of Pine (Dr. Wilkinson's formula).

"Spiromol" No. 6
Iodine, Creosote, Eucalyptus, Terebene, Chloroform,
Menthol, Ether (Dr. Macdonald's formula).

Instructions for Use:

Place in the inhaler sufficient of the Solution to cover the end of the elongated tube, then adjust the stopper so that the air enters freely, and the inhaler is ready for use, the black dots being in line. Place in nostril and draw long breaths causing air to bubble through bottle. Opposite nostril can be closed with finger if wished. Breathe out through mouth. Put in some drops of fresh inhalant frequently.

The "Macdonald" Inhaler may be sterilised by boiling, and by a quarter turn of the stopper it is securely sealed, and may be carried in pocket or hand bag without risk of leakage.

This is a new pattern inhaler so constructed that by nasal or oral inspiration air is drawn into the main body of the bottle-like apparatus through a small opening in the neck. It then passes down the central tube, through the inhalant, thus becoming saturated with the medicaments. The medicated air then enters the nozzle and is inhaled by the patient through the nose or mouth as required. The inhaler gives a highly saturated vapour with drugs of a volatile nature. It has been found beneficial in cases of Phthisis, Laryngeal Tuberculosis, Nasal Catarrh, Rhinitis, Suppuration of accessory sinuses, antrum or frontal, Naso-Pharyngeal Catarrh, Asthma and Bronchial affections, and as a preventive of Influenza.
