Triptafen-DA Suspension contains 37.5 mg amitriptyline embonate (equivalent to 25 mg amitriptyline hydrochloride BP) and 2 mg perphenazine BP in one 10 ml dose and is supplied in bottles of 150ml and 500 ml. Basic NHS cost for a bottle of 150 ml is 7/9d.
