## SELECTED BIRDS OF BRITAIN

## LONG-EARED OWL

#### Asio otus otus

Found throughout Britain, but lives and breeds mainly in northern areas. Favours coniferous woods. Like most owls, it hunts by night and roosts by day, standing close against a tree trunk, in order to avoid small birds that will try to harass it. Hunts over open country as well as in woods, preying on mice and other small mammals, birds, occasionally insects. In flight appears greyer, less tawny, than the short-eared owl, flying with a characteristic silent, wavering motion. The call is eerie, a long 'oo-oo' hoot, and sometimes a yelping sound in flight. During courtship, the male claps its wings frequently and flies in a zigzag course between trees. Uses the deserted nest of a crow, a magpie, or a squirrel's drey, where it lays a clutch of 3-5 white roundish eggs. Male and female are similar in appearance and size, adults measuring 14 in (35 cm).
