## Prescribing information

**Dosage:** Adults 250 mg three times a day.  
Children - up to 10 years: 125 mg three times a day. In the case of severe infections the dosage should be doubled.  
**Presentation:** Amoxil capsules 250 mg.  
Amoxil syrup 250 mg/5 ml, 100 ml bottle.  
Amoxil syrup 125 mg/5 ml, 100 ml bottle.  
Amoxil Paediatric Suspension 125 mg/1.25 ml, 20 ml bottle with pipette.

Amoxil presentations contain amoxycillin as the trihydrate.  
**Contra-indication:** Amoxil is a penicillin and should not be given to penicillin-hypersensitive patients.  
**Side effects:** No serious side effects have been reported in extensive clinical trials. Those side effects which were encountered were mild and of a transitory nature.



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
