The Baccara Rose (1955)

Before the war, Edmond Kapp became noted for his drawings and lithographs of celebrated legal and musical personalities.

His interest in flower paintings did not develop until after the war, when he moved to the South of France.

Writing of the paintings in Kapp's 1956 London exhibition, from which our own plates have been selected, Bryan Robertson says: "They are remarkable. It is often difficult for a man who has made a reputation in one medium to find understanding for what he has been doing in another medium. Contemporary Treatment
