## ENGINEER'S REPORT.

#### GENERAL.

Although the year 1945 saw the end of hostilities there was no return to normal activities in the building and civil engineering industries. The very large amount of work to be done awaits the return of tradesmen and an increase in the number of apprentices, together with an ample supply of the necessary materials.

#### BUILDING BYE-LAWS.

Numerous improvements to houses were approved during the year. Owing to restrictions, high costs and shortages of labour and materials these were, in most cases, of a minor character.

#### HOUSING.

A housing survey of the County was completed recently. From this survey it is estimated that 422 new houses will be required in the landward area of the County. Owing to the lack of proper water supplies the number of houses to be built will require to be severely restricted until it is known whether the proposed regional water schemes are to be proceeded with.

A programme for the erection of houses by the Council has been prepared and is being proceeded with as fast as possible. Sites for the erection of 98 houses have been approved by the Department of Health and lay-out plans have been approved for the erection of 18 houses at Greenlaw, 30 at Earlston and 14 at Cockburnspath.

Tenders for the completion of the 6 houses at Reston on which work was suspended in 1939 have been submitted to the Department of Health for approval.

## CONTROL OF CIVIL BUILDING (DEFENCE REGULATION 56A).

The control of civil building under Defence Regulation 56A is carried out by the Local Authority on behalf of the Ministry of Works. Under the scheme the Local Authority is responsible for issuing licences and certificates to purchase certain controlled materials for all works, repairs or improvements costing between £10 and £100, and also for the erection of new houses and the carrying out of works to increase the accommodation of existing houses in excess of £100. Applications for licences to carry out work in excess of £100 other than to increase housing accommodation are normally sent direct to the Regional Licensing Officer of the Ministry of Works, but are forwarded by him to the Local Authority for their observations.

As these applications come from all corners of the County and in most cases must be investigated personally I feel that far too much of my time is being spent on this scheme with consequent neglect of the care and maintenance of the Council's water and drainage schemes and properties.

# HOUSING SCHEME MAINTENANCE.

The satisfactory maintenance of houses owned by the County Council continued to be difficult. Owing to the shortage of tradesmen, particularly plumbers, repairs could not always be carried out as promptly as one would wish.

The houses are, however, all in good repair.

# SCHOOLS AND SCHOOLHOUSES.

The maintenance of the schools and schoolhouses has been carried out as well as circumstances permitted but many require much more than ordinary repairs. The heating of most Schools is most unsatisfactory and the sanitary arrangements of those without water supplies is to be deplored.

## WATER SUPPLIES.

Considerable difficulty was experienced in maintaining most of the supplies. Fortunately, a large proportion of the rainfall, which amounted to 33.58 inches in the year fell in the months of May, June, September and October. The heavy rainfall in September and October was particularly welcome as it is at this time of the year that supplies are normally at their lowest.

# SPECIAL WATER DISTRICTS.

The Special Water Districts are:—East District—Ayton, Burnmouth, Chirnside, Cockburnspath, Coldingham, Grantshouse, Reston and St. Abbs; Middle District—Greenlaw, Langton, Leitholm, Lennel and Longformacus; West District—Earlston, Gordon, Oxton, Redpath and Westruther.

### CHIRNSIDE.

The installation of two new electrical driven pump sets at an estimated cost of £570 was completed early in the year. They

are functioning satisfactorily. There is still leakage of water from the pumping main but every endeavour is being made to trace the leakage and have it stopped.

#### GRANTSHOUSE.

Owing to the corrosion of the main its carrying capacity has been so reduced as to cause frequent shortages in the village. The main is being "rodded" on completion of which an improvement is anticipated.

#### GREENLAW.

The quantity of water available is ample but numerous complaints were received in the late summer when the water from the reservoir was put into use. These complaints refer to the taste, smell and foreign matter in the water.

I am of opinion that the complaints are justified and that they will continue until filters are installed on the existing supply or an alternative satisfactory supply is brought into use.

## LEITHOLM AND LENNEL.

The schemes to supply these villages are still in abeyance.

#### DRAINAGE.

The Special Drainage Districts in the County are:—East District—Ayton, Burnmouth, Chirnside, Cockburnspath and Cove, Coldingham, St. Abbs and Reston; Middle District—Langton, Leitholm, Longformacus and Swinton; West District—Earlston, Gordon, Oxton and Westruther.

The schemes for Reston, Leitholm and Swinton have not been proceeded with.

Ordinary maintenance work was carried out in the other Districts.

In the 50 non-designated Herds and exempted premises 3.893 animals were clinically examined during the year. Two were found to come within the scope of the Tuberculosis Order and were slaughtered.

# MEDICAL INSPECTION, SUPERVISION AND TREATMENT.

During the school year ending 31st July, 1945, the Health Visitors paid 321 visits to schools, examined 1,707 children for clean-liness, infectious or contagious diseases, paid 256 home visits in connection with these (practically all verminous, dirty or neglected children), while they paid 310 visits for other reasons, i.e., in following up cases of reported defect or in connection with the escorting of children to hospital. These were in addition to their other duties in connection with Public Health, Tuberculosis and Child Welfare.

# SPECIAL SCHOOLS AND CLASSES, INCLUDING OPEN-AIR SCHOOLS.

In 1945 four children were receiving education in the school attached to the Royal Blind Asylum, Edinburgh; two in St. Charles, Lanarkshire, one in Waverley Park, Kirkintilloch, and two in Larbert Institution.

# ARRANGEMENTS FOR MEDICAL TREATMENT. DEFECTIVE VISION.

In 1945 123 children were examined by Dr. Flint, the Council's Ophthalmic Surgeon, and spectacles or drug treatment prescribed as required. Of these, 27 were examined at Berwick-on-Tweed, and 2 at Galashiels.

## EAR, THROAT AND NOSE.

In 1945 92 children were taken to the Royal Infirmary, Edinburgh, by the Health Visitors on behalf of their parents, for removal of adenoids with or without removal of tonsils.

## MENTALLY DEFECTIVE CHILDREN.

Our records showed that at the end of the year there were two mongolian defectives, 8 feeble-minded persons, and one mental defective resident in the County.

#### MINOR AILMENTS.

Berwickshire has no school clinics, and, consequently, cases which ordinarily would be treated at a school clinic have here to be admitted to the County Hospital.

## TUBERCULOSIS.

Of the 40 cases of tuberculosis which were notified during the year, in 22 patients tuberculous disease was localised in the lungs and in 18 patients elsewhere.

38 patients received institutional treatment during the year of whom 20 were already in institutions when the year began, 15 for pulmonary conditions and 5 for non-pulmonary conditions. Of the 18 admitted during the year, 15 were on account of pulmonary and 3 on account of non-pulmonary conditions. One patient died in hospital from pulmonary disease. The year ended with 16 patients under treatment, 12 being pulmonary and 4 non-pulmonary.

135 patients were X-rayed.

The number of persons with pulmonary tuberculosis known to be resident in the County at the end of the year was 77.

# VENEREAL DISEASES—PREVENTION AND TREATMENT.

29 patients were treated under this scheme during the year.

# DIABETES PROVISION FOR MEDICINE AND TREATMENT.

During the year 12 persons received supplies of insulin free of cost.

# MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES.

The only mental services provided by the County at the end of 1945 was the provision of mental hospital accommodation at Melrose for certified patients.

# BLIND PERSONS ACT, 1938.
