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
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Help for people with HIV and AIDS has been slashed

HIV/AIDS has not gone away in the UK.

Yet the state has slashed support in the belief that new combination treatments mean most people can go back to a 'normal' life. That is so far from the truth.

Treatments are stabilising people, yes. But the five to eight pills you have to take each day in fact bring side effects that can make life very difficult to cope with. Feeling sick. Appearing 'drunk'. Sweats. Feeling too weak to get up. Not things that go down well in the workplace. So, many people are losing jobs and when they do, life is spiralling out of control. Quickly.

The implications are terrifying. Combination treatments only keep working if you maintain a very strict regime for taking medication, keep warm, and eat fresh, healthy food. But on £57 a week*, staying in control of your life and the extra heating and food bills is impossible.
