LIVING WITH DIFFERENCES

The advent of AIDS has lent urgency to the task of promoting a conception of sex education which emphasises responsibility whilst not denying the need for individual self-fulfilment in the area of sexuality.

The Course is intended to help those concerned with religious and moral education to formulate an approach to issues of sex and personal relationships, and also to help teachers responsible for sex and health education to provide a context which includes such moral values as responsibility, care and concern for others.

The course is designed, then, to cater for the needs of teachers and others with responsibility for personal and social development courses, particularly those concerned to provide an appropriate response in the context of the threat of AIDS, as well as for those more directly concerned with health education. An important element of this course will be to take into account the different needs, approaches and attitudes of people from various religious or ethnic groupings.
