Indications

The symptomatic treatment of migraine.

1 to 2 tablets at the first warning of an attack, followed by $\frac{1}{2}$ to 1 tablet at hourly or half-hourly intervals if required. The smallest effective dose should be chosen. Not more than 4 tablets should be taken during an attack, or more than 12 tablets in any one week. Children should be given proportionately less.

Contra-indications and side-effects

MIGRIL is contra-indicated in peripheral vascular disease, angina pectoris, kidney and liver diseases, pregnancy and febrile conditions. Rarely there may be undue sensitivity to ergotamine; if, therefore, a patient under treatment feels a sensation of coldness or aching in his extremities, he should take no more of the tablets. Side-effects include abdominal pain or fatigue in the limbs.
