

OPINIONS OF THE PRESS.

Mr. G. FLEMING, 128, Strand, has a very interesting exhibit of air-tight and lock corks, which are so perfectly close-fitting to any bottle for which they are used that champagne or aerated waters having been once opened can be so effectually re-closed as to keep for weeks, if necessary, without their strength or purity being in the least degree impaired Moreover, the liquor cannot be extracted without the key, so that the dishonestly-inclined person is completely frustrated in his designs. He must break the bottle to taste its contents. We quite agree with a contemporary who describes it as "one of the best inventions ever brought before the public.—*The Licensed Victuallers' Guardian*.

Everybody, not even excepting the confirmed teetotaler, probably at times feels the want of a really serviceable bottle stopper, which should have the advantages of the ordinary cork without its drawbacks, and the elegance of the decanter stopper without causing inconvenience by occasionally becoming a fixture. Mr. G. Fleming, of 128, Strand, London, has invented an article which appears to meet the case The corks or stoppers he manufactures are made of wood and india-rubber, and by turning a screw in the head of the stopper the indiarubber collar is pressed outward against the bottle neck, and forms a perfectly air-tight and irremovable stopper. Some of the corks are also made in such a manner that they can be tightened with a small key, and the safety of the contents of a bottle is thus insured. The heads of the stoppers are made in various forms, and some are labelled with the names of the beverages to which, in a double sense, they a ford protection.—*Railway Supplies Journal*.
