THE BUILDING COMMITTEE of this Charity beg to state, that His Majesty's Commissioners of Woods and Forests having assigned them a very eligible BUILDING SITE near St. Martin's Church, Charing Cross, the New Edifice under the superintendence of MR. DECIMUS BURTON, will be speedily commenced. They request leave to remark that it is not the formation of a new institution, but the extension of an established and highly meritorious one, which has been in operation more than twelve years, as a Dispensary in Villiers-street, and has been found of incalculable service to the western parts of the metropolis; nearly 30,000 sick, lame, and needy persons have par-ticipated in its benefits; among the applicants were many in a very extreme state of destitution and bodily suffering, requiring that personal superintendence and cleanly accommodation which an hospital affords, and which the Governors lament it was not in their power to supply.

Anxious to provide relief for this class of sufferers, and to render the Charity more efficient by the erection of a commodious edifice, the Governors earnestly solicit the assistance of the affluent; and they beg to state, that as a very large establishment is not contemplated, upwards of one-half of the expected cost of the building, (exclusive of a munificent subscription of 500/. from Lord Henley) has been already contributed.

In the construction of the building, all costly ornament and superfluous expenditure will be avoided, and whilst its moderate size will obviate any objection which might arise from the supposed difficulty of supporting it, the internal arrangements will be so regulated, that its accommodations will admit of extension commensurately with the increase of its resources, and the increased wants of the District. A considerable proportion of the income necessary for its maintenance, is at this time contributed, and the Governors venture to hope from their prudential arrangements, that no reasonable apprehension needs be entertained of its permanent welfare and prosperity.

In requesting the co-operation of the affluent, they think it unnecessary to state more, than, that the size and population of the metropolis and environs, have been doubled since the last casualty hospital was established, to prove the necessity of extending the means of assistance in proportion to the increase of objects requiring relief: and they deem it equally superfluous to expatiate upon the utility of these institutions, which afford to the sick and suffering the most substantial comfort, at a time when they most require it; and in a way less liable to misapplication than almost any other form of eleemosynary aid : experience amply proves that their benefits are not confined to their immediate locality, and that the needy classes of the most distant parts of the country partake more or less of their ameliorating influence; and hence an accession to these asylums cannot but be deemed an interesting object to the community at large.

In a neighbourhood so remote from all the present hospitals, as to render them little available to its poor residents when overtaken by sudden accidents, an institution of this kind has long been wanted, and to those who contemplate its proximity to the River, to Wharfs and Manufactories, and sundry Market-places, where the most dangerous employments are exercised, and to great traffic of every kind, the good which must result from the Charity will be obvious.

This Institution is meant to combine the two-fold object of an Hospital and a Dispensary: to afford immediate assistance in cases of accident, and gratuitous attendance and medicines to all needy afflicted persons, domestic servants, soldiers, sailors, and distressed foreigners ; (who, far from their native homes, and the solace of their friends, and possessing no parochial aid, have the strongest claims to commiseration); to supply Trusses to those who require them, and suitable Instruments to cases of Lameness or Deformity ;--to provide the attendance of experienced Midwives, and the use of Child-Bed Linen to poor Lying-in Women, at their own abodes-and to receive some of the more distressed as In-patients ;- to relieve, by small pecuniary donations, the most destitute objects ;- to conjoin moral and religious consolation with the remedial means employed, by the appointment of a Chaplain, to perform Divine Service at the Charity, and to afford spiritual comfort to those whose situation requires it at their own bedsides, and eventually to establish a School of Medical Instruction.

AT A MEETING OF THE GOVERNORS of this Charity, at the British Coffee House, Saturday, February 2d, 1828, at which were present several of the Nobility, Clergy, and Gentry, and Inhabitants of the neighbourhood,-

### THE HON. GEORGE AGAR ELLIS, M.P. IN THE CHAIR,-

The REV. DR. RICHARDS, Vicar of St. Martin's, called the attention of the Meeting to the immense increase within the last few years, in the extent and population of the Metropolis, which had not been attended by a corresponding increase in the number of its Hospitals, though from the proportionate and unavoidable augmentation in the number of sick and helpless objects, additional sources of relief were greatly required. He briefly stated to the Mceting the benefits which had resulted from this Charity, during its exertions as a Dispensary; and detailed the number of poor, lame, and destitute persons, sick children, and distressed foreigners, who had been admitted for relief."

He explained the still further advantages which would result from the erection of a suitable place of reception, as an Hospital for some of the more distressing and dangerous cases, in pursuance of the original Plan of the Institution, and the long announced intention of its Governors ;---and it was unanimously resolved, that Subscriptions should be forthwith raised for augmenting the Building Fund, which had been reserved for that necessary purpose.

UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED, That from the vast increase in the population of the metropolis, and in consequence of several extensive parishes, near Charing-cross, being totally unprovided with an Hospital,-it is expedient to erect one in the neighbourhood; and that this meeting do adopt the most effective means for its accomplishment.
