



PREFACE.

The Transactions of the Royal Society of London have now been for more than a century and a half the Repository of Medical Papers, many of which possess considerable interest, whether considered with respect to the extraordinary facts or discoveries related in them, or with relation to the state of Medicine at the time in which they were written. The multiplicity of these papers, and the extent of the work, which has now exceeded one hundred volumes, render the facts, insulated as they are, almost useless, and the examination of such papers a task of no small difficulty.

The General Index, printed in 1780, however valuable in other respects, has become defective from the increased bulk of the Transactions; and besides containing no connected view of this subject, is, perhaps, too general in the distribution of the articles. A Selection of these Papers has, indeed, been published by Dr. Mihles, under the title of Medical Essays; but as this collection does not extend beyond the forty-second volume, it necessarily includes but a very inconsiderable part of them.

The following sheets originally drawn up for the editor's private use, not so much with the design of forming an index to these papers, as of collecting and arranging all the material facts contained in them, will be found, it is believed, in a great degree to supply this deficiency; not only as they present a compendious abstract of the medical matter of the Transactions, but exhibit at the same time something like an historical sketch of the state and progress of Medicine in this country, during a period of its greatest advancement.

The First Part of the Index contains a list of the titles of all the papers, arranged in the order in which they appear in the Transactions, accompanied with short remarks, *printed in italics*, explanatory of such matters as are either entirely omitted in the title, or are expressed only in general terms.

In the Alphabetical Part of the Index the references have been made as concise, but as copious, as possible, and include some facts not enumerated in the preceding list.
