THE ECLIPSES OF THE SUN AND MOON IN THE YEAR 1848.

In the present year six eclipses will take place. The first is a partial eclipse of the Sun, on the 5th of March, invisible at Greenwich. The ecliptical conjunction takes place at 17 minutes past 1 o'clock in the afternoon. The second is a total and visible eclipse of the Moon, on the 19th of March, in the evening; the annexed representation of which, for Greenwich, will serve, without sensible error, for the whole kingdom. At the first contact of the Moon with the conical shadow of the Earth, she will be vertical in latitude north 0° 26', and longitude east from Greenwich 72° 6'. At the Moon's last contact with the shadow, she will be in the zenith in latitude south 0° 10', and longitude east 15° 45'.

The third is a partial eclipse of the Sun on the 3rd of April, in the night, invisible to Great Britain. The ecliptical conjunction takes place at 1 min. past 11 o'clock.

The fourth is another partial eclipse of the Sun, on the 28th of August, also invisible in these parts of the world. The ecliptical conjunction happens at 1 minute past 7 in the evening.

The fifth is a total eclipse of the Moon, on the morning of Wednesday the 13th of September, and partly visible at Greenwich, &c., where the eclipse begins at 31 minutes past 4; total immersion in the shadow at 30 minutes past 5; the Moon sets at 32 minutes after 4; middle of the eclipse 19 minutes past 6; Moon emerges from totality at 8 minutes past 7; and the eclipse ends at 7 minutes after 8. The annexed type is a representation of the Moon as she appears in the eclipse at London and neighbourhood at 5 o'clock.



The sixth and last is a partial eclipse of the Sun on the 27th of September, in the morning, but invisible to us. The ecliptical conjunction occurs at 35 minutes past 9.

TRANSIT OF MERCURY OVER THE SUN.

On the 9th of November a transit of the planet Mercury takes place, visible throughout Great Britain, &c. At Greenwich the transit begins at 2 minutes past 11 in the forenoon, and ends at 27 minutes after 4 in the afternoon, which is about 9 minutes after the setting of the Sun.

A near approach. Ox New AND VARIABLE STARS,—Many of the Stars appear to be affected with variations arising from some peculiarities in heir physical construction, or from some great changes going on upon their surface. Several stars have appeared in the heavens for while, and then vanished. Several, whose positions are given in the ancient catalogues, can no longer be discovered, even by the powerful instruments of modern astronomers; while others are distinctly visible which do not appear to have been observed by the inclents. A few stars have gradually increased in brilliancy; some that have been formerly variable, now shine with steady light; others have been constantly diminishing in brightness; and a considerable number sustain a periodical variation in their lastre. The new star of 1572, which Tycho observed in the constellation Cassiopeia, exhibited very singular changes. Its brightness suddenly became so great, that it exceeded that of Venus and Mercury, and was visible on the meridian during the day. The intensity of its which was seen in 1603, exhibited phenomena nearly similar, and vanished after tharing been visible for some months. Astronomers have attempted to explain the remarkable changes, by supposing that portions of the surface of the stars are covered with large black its brilliancy. These spots have been regarded as permanent, while others are of opinion that the luminous surface of the stars are reduced to find then deames, like mill, tones; and that the inclination of their axes may be varied by the attraction of their stars subject incluar planes, like mill, tones; and that the inclination of their axes may be varied by the attraction of their surrounding planet. 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The Eclipses of Jupiter's Satellites are invisible to every part of the world, from the 27th day of June to the 20th day of August this year, in consequence of Jupiter being so near the Sun.

The time at which the Immersion or Emersion of any of the Satellites of Jupiter will take place at any other meridian than Greenwich, may be found by adding the difference of the Longitude (in time) to the time of the Eclipse at Greenwich, if the meridian be East of that place, or to subtract it, if it be West, and the difference will give the time required.

The Eclipses are visible, through moderately good telescopes, when the Sun is eight degrees below the horizon, and the planet not less than eight degrees above it.

The times of these Eclipses being adapted to the meridian of Greenwich, afford a good method to discover the longitude between that and any other place, which the following example will illustrate. Suppose on the 31st of January of this year, the time of the Emersion of Jupiter's first Satellite be observed by a telescope in an unknown meridian to happen at 8h. 34m. 40s., I find by the table that the time of this Emersion will happen at 6h. 46m. 20s.—the difference is 1h. 48m. 20s., which being converted into degrees and minutes of the Equator, will make 27 degrees 5 minutes the Longitude of the place of observation to the East, because the time is more than that at Greenwich. If the time of the observation of any Immersion or Emersion of Jupiter's Satellites turns out to be earlier than at Greenwich, the amount of the time earlier, converted into degrees and minutes, is the amount of Longitude West of Greenwich, as may easily be known from the preceding remarks.

N.B.—Those Eclipses marked with an asterisk (*) in the table, are visible in the meridian of Greenwich. IM implies Immersion, or when the Satellite enters into Jupiter's shadow; and EM Emersion, or when the Satellite leaves the shadow of the planet, and of course becomes visible.

To convert Astronomical Mean Time into Mean, Civil, or Solar

To find the Sidereal Time at Mean Noon.

Time. If the given hours exceed 12, add 1 to the number of days given for the day of the month, and the excess of the hours above 12, call A.M. (i.e., ante meridian), will be the civil mean time. If the hours do not exceed 12, reserve the number expressing the days for the day of the month, and call the given hours F.M. (i.e., post meridian). Thus January 1d. 14h. 40m. astronomical time, means January 2nd, at 2h. 40m. A.M. civil time, or 14h. 40m. after the noon of January 1. Again: thus January 15d. 22h. 15m. astronomical time, implies January 16th, at 10h. 15m. A.M. civil time, or 22h. 15m. after the noon of January 15. On the 1st of January the reader will find the southing of Venus stated to be at 20h. 50m. 24s., which, according to the above remark, implies 8h. 50m. 24s. in the morning of the 2nd day, according to civil time. On the 21st, Pallas is stated to south at 15h. 0m, which according to civil time is exactly at 3 o'clock in the morning of the 22nd day. Any further example is unnecessary, the whole being easy to be understood.

If to the Right Ascension of the Sun at Mean Noon, you apply the Equation of Time as follows, the result will be the Sidereal Time at Mean Noon: namely, from the 1st of January to the 14th of April, subtract the Equation from the Sun's Right Ascension at Mean Noon; from the 15th of April to the 14th of June, add the Equation; from the 15th of June to the 31st of Angust, subtract the Equation; from the 1st of September to the 23rd of December, add the Equation; and subtract it from December 24th to the end of the year. Example, March 1— Sun's Right Ascension at Mean Noon, according h.m. s.

THE HOUSE OF PEERS.

The list of the House of Peers is this year given alphabetically, with the date of their creation, and their town and country residences. In the Almanack for 1844, the Peers were given in the order of precedence in which they rank in the House, together with the Christian and surnames, and title by courtesy of the eldest son. The mottos of the Peers, as emplayoned on their armorial bearings were given in this Almanack for the year 1840, and English translations of the mottos in the Almanack for 1841.

According to the usage of Parliament, when the House appoints a Select Committee, the Lords chosen to serve upon it are named in the order of their rank, beginning with the House appoints a scheet Committee, the Lords chosen to serve upon it are named in the order of their rank, beginning with the highest; and so when the House sends a Committee to a conference with the Commons, the Lord highest in rank is called first, and the rest go forth in like order; but when the whole House is called over for any purpose within the House, or to proceed to Westminster Hall, or upon any public solemnity, the call begins invariably with the Junior Baron. The sixteen Representative Peers for Scotland are elected every Parliament; the twenty-eight Representative Peers for Ireland are elected for life. The date preceding the title of the Peer is the period of the creation of the title.


