INTRODUCTION.

THE poor constitute an important part of every large community, and justly merit the attention and assistance of the rich; especially in sickness, when they are rendered incapable of supporting themselves and their families. Hard labour, unwholesome food, want of proper clothing, and exposure to the vicissitudes of air and weather, subject them to many disorders unknown to the affluent, who can procure the conveniencies of life.

In order to obviate and remedy these evils, many charitable institutions have been founded; and no city or country has been so highly distinguished for this truly laudable disposition, as this great metropolis. Noble hospitals have been erected in all quarters of it; but, upon examination, it was found, that these were only proper for the reception of a certain class of patients, and not even sufficient to accommodate one third part of those who stood in need of relief. Many, from a decent pride, did not choose to be found in those publick places of charity; whilst the affairs of others might be ruined by quitting their habitations: some, in acute diseases, were received too late, from the length of time necessary to gain admittance; and others, from the nature of their disorders, became worse, by being pent up in close wards and impure air; without mentioning the contagion incident to hospitals, which frequently infected those who were confined therein. The inconvenience, danger, and indecency of a lying-in woman leaving her husband and family, at a time when their aid and consolation

consolation were most necessary, was apparent: and, above all, young children were seldom sent to hospitals, although so very subject to disorders, that in London near one half of them die before the age of two years.

The opulent and charitable therefore sought means to supply these deficiencies, and, happily for mankind, conceived the plan of instituting publick Dispensaries for the relief of the poor at their own habitations.

Many advantages accrue from hence: the immense sums expended on building and supporting great houses, are now usefully employed in relieving a number of objects from the distresses of sickness. The various disorders are treated apart, free from the noise, impurities, contagion, or confinement of a publick ward. A very great number of patients are accommodated at a small expence, and those of the most useful part of the poor; for relief is administered not to the profligate and lazy only, but

more especially to the industrious artisan, who, without the danger of acquiring vicious habits, by being maintained in idleness, may still live with, and give that assistance to, his family, which the nature of his complaint may allow ; whilst their necessary attention to him during his illness, serves to rivet more firmly the bonds of affection.

The General Dispensary instituted in Aldersgate-Street, in the year 1770, has in seven years afforded relief to 20,000 poor persons ; and that of Westminster, founded in the year 1774, received upwards of 3000 patients within the first two years ; both which charities daily increase in governors and patients : strong proofs of their utility.

The North, East, and West quarters being supplied, the South, or that great and populous part, the Borough, and places adjacent, still required the advantages of a Dispensary, as none of those already instituted extended so far. The great number of
labouring

labouring poor, who live in this part, made it obvious how very useful such a Charity must be; and from the former proofs of benevolence that the inhabitants of this metropolis have given, it is not doubted but this useful Establishment will meet with their general approbation and encouragement.

The subscription is fixed low, in order to make the Charity more extensive; and consequently, to render it easier for the poor to obtain letters of recommendation from the Governors.

R E G U L A T I O N S.

I. **T**HIS Charity consists of a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, and Governors, who shall appoint such officers and servants as may, from time to time, be deemed necessary.

II. Every person subscribing one guinea per annum, shall be a Governor, and entitled to have one patient on the medical or chirurgical list at a time, and one lying-in patient in the year; and every person subscribing two guineas per annum, shall be entitled to have two patients upon the medical or chirurgical list at a time, and two lying-in patients in the year; and in case of a greater subscription, a proportionable number.

III. All persons subscribing ten guineas, or making up their contribution within the year to that sum, shall be Governors for life, and entitled to all the advantages of an annual subscriber of two guineas.

IV. Upon the payment of a legacy, or donation, of fifty pounds or upwards, to this Charity, the person appointed to pay the same shall be a Governor for life.

V. Any

V. Any Governor, by sending notice in writing to the Dispensary, may appoint another Governor to sign his letters of recommendation.

VI. A General Meeting shall be held on the first Wednesday in January, April, July, and October, at which meetings seven Governors shall constitute a Board.

VII. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, or either of them, the Committee, or any three of the Committee, have power to call a General Meeting at any time, giving at least one week's notice, expressing the occasion of the meeting, by an advertisement in some of the daily papers.

VIII. Twenty-one Governors shall be chosen at the first General Meeting every year, who shall form a Committee, to meet at the Dispensary on the third Wednesday in every month, for conducting the affairs of this Charity. This Committee to be open to the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors for life of this Charity, who shall be entitled to vote: three of them shall form a quorum, one of whom to be of the chosen Committee. No person interested in any matter under debate shall be entitled to vote at any Meeting or Committee of the Governors of this Charity.

IX. At

IX. The last Committee in December shall nominate proper persons as a Committee for the year ensuing, in which not more than fourteen of the former Committee shall remain ; nor any one to be continued in longer than three years successively : this nomination to be subject to the approbation or alteration of the next General Meeting.

X. Five Auditors shall be appointed annually, to examine the bills and accompts, and no interested person shall be upon the audit.

XI. A Medical Committee shall also be appointed, consisting of such Governors as practise physick, surgery, or pharmacy, or (except those already excepted in the eighth rule) who shall have power to inspect the drugs and medicines, audit bills for the same, and report, as they shall see occasion, to the Monthly Committee.

XII. Nobility, Members of Parliament, Ladies, and all Governors of this Charity, residing out of the bounds for visiting patients at their own houses, may, by letter, appoint other Governors to vote for them at any election by ballot ; at which no Governor shall vote, who has not paid his subscription, on or before the day preceding the election.

XIII. No

XIII. No resolution proposed at a General Meeting, unless recommended by the Committee, shall be entered as a rule, until it is confirmed at a succeeding General Meeting.

XIV. That the Committee do appoint twelve Governors (two or more to attend each day) to be House-Visitors, to examine, and see, that the regulations of the Charity are carried properly into execution, and report the state of the House to the Monthly Meeting. They shall also be empowered to appoint a person to do the business of any of the officers, in case of sickness or death, until the meeting of the next Committee.

XV. No servant of the Charity is to presume, at any time, to take of any tradesman, patient, servant, or others, any fee, reward, or gratuity of any kind, directly or indirectly, for any service done, or to be done, on account of the Dispensary, on pain of being immediately discharged.

XVI. That if any patient shall be discharged for irregularity, the Governor, who recommended that patients be informed of it immediately by letter from the apothecary.

XVII. That

XVII. That for the future, no election of officers, except the President, Vice-Presidents, or Treasurer, be had until at least twenty days after the publick declaration of a vacancy; and that if more than one candidate appear, the election shall be by ballot.

XVIII. Every patient, who brings a letter of recommendation from a Governor, shall receive advice and medicines at the Dispensary, without regard to place of abode.

MONTHLY COMMITTEE.

They shall take into consideration all matters respecting the well conducting this Charity; and if it should hereafter appear necessary to alter the present regulations, or substitute, or add new ones, they shall report the same to the next General Meeting.

They shall examine the several tradesmens accounts, and order payment for those which have passed a due inspection.

They shall appoint twelve Governors, as House-Visitors, to superintend the due observance

fervance of all the foregoing laws for the good management of this Dispensary, and who shall report their proceedings from time to time to the Monthly Committee.

They shall do as directed in the eighth resolution of general rules and orders.

HOUSE VISITORS.

To attend every day in the hours of business, at the Dispensary, to inspect the conduct of the officers and servants; to see that the patients behave with propriety, and in conformity to the rules and orders; and that the apartments are always in order, for the reception of the Medical Officers and Committee.

PHYSICIANS.

Attendance shall be given at the Dispensary, by one of the Physicians every day at nine o'clock, punctually (Sundays excepted) to write for the Out-patients: they shall visit the Home-patients, at their respective places of abode when necessary. By Out-patients are to be understood, such whose disorders do not confine them; by Home-Patients, such as are absolutely unable to attend, but who reside within the following limits, viz. in the Borough of Southwark, or buildings adjacent, from Westminster-

minster-Bridge round by Lambeth, Vauxhall, Kennington-Lane, and Walworth-Turnpikes, to Rotherhithe church.

Should indisposition, or any other reasonable cause, prevent the Physician in course from attending, the said Physician shall give notice thereof to the Apothecary, who shall immediately apply to and request the attendance of either of the other Physicians.

They shall hold a consultation on every case that may require it: their pupils shall have the privilege of attending the patients with them, but are in no case to prescribe.

SURGEON and ACCOUCHEUR.

He shall attend every morning at nine o'clock (Sunday excepted) to examine all those patients who shall come under his care; he shall visit such patients at their own houses, within the district of this Dispensary, whose cases render them unable to attend.

His pupils shall have liberty to attend him at this Charity, but they shall not prescribe, nor perform any operation, but by his immediate direction, and in his presence.

No

No capital operation shall be performed, without the consent of one of the Physicians of this Charity.

He shall instruct the women employed by the Charity, and attend all difficult labours.

A P O T H E C A R Y.

He shall reside in the house, to receive letters of recommendation; to compound and dispense the medicines prescribed; and shall not undertake, or attend, any business whatsoever, but that of this Charity. He shall be careful of every thing appertaining to the Dispensary, and see that nothing is wasted, spoiled, or embezzled; that the apartments and committee-room are always in order, fit for the reception of the officers, and for the use of the Committee.

He shall on no account absent himself from the house, without leaving a note where he is to be met with on any emergency; he shall not absent himself one whole day or night, without leave first obtained from the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Monthly Committee, or one of the House-Visitors; in which case, he shall provide another Apothecary to do the business for him, and that with the approbation

bation of the person or persons, who granted such leave of absence.

He shall examine the rights of the letters of recommendation, and keep regular books, with a register of the patients under cure, their time of admission, by whom recommended, and when discharged.

S E C R E T A R Y.

He shall personally attend all Meetings and Committees, at the appointed hours, unless prevented by any unforeseen accident, in which case he shall send a deputy.

The proceedings of this Charity he shall keep accurately and methodically, and do all the incidental business requisite, which the Secretaries of other Charities or Hospitals are accustomed to do.

C O L L E C T O R.

He shall produce two or more securities, for the approbation of the Monthly Committee, who shall be bound with him in a bond of £ 500 for the faithful performance of his official duty.

He

He shall collect the subscriptions to this Charity regularly, as they become due, under the Treasurer's direction, to whom, or to the Bankers, he shall pay them in as often as required; he shall not retain to the amount of £ 100 in his possession, more than seven days, under pain of being discharged.

He shall summon Committees, and deliver recommendatory letters, when he receives any subscriptions.

P A T I E N T S.

Out-patients shall carry their letters of recommendation to the Dispensary, any day of the week (Sunday excepted) from nine to ten o'clock, to be admitted, and receive advice.

Out-patients shall attend the Physician, or Surgeon, at the Dispensary, who first received them under his care, on the days of his attendance.

Home-patients shall send their letters of recommendation to the Dispensary, any day of the week (Sundays excepted) by nine o'clock, to be presented to the Physician.

Home-patients shall send their letters of
recommendation to the Dispensary, on the
B days

days of attendance of the Physician, or Surgeon, under whose care they have been received.

If any patient shall neglect to attend the Physician, or Surgeon, at the Dispensary, for ten days, such patient shall be discharged.

They shall keep their letters of recommendation under cover, in order to preserve them clean.

They shall furnish themselves with phials, &c. necessary to contain their medicines.

They shall behave themselves soberly and decently, and strictly conform to such rules as shall be given them, or be immediately dismissed.

When cured, they shall deliver up their letters of recommendation to the Dispensary, and return thanks to the Governor who recommended them: on neglect of which, they shall not receive any further favour from this Charity.

Patients, whose disorders require only a repetition of their medicines, must send for them between the hours of four and six in the afternoon.

If complaint be made by any Patient of ill treatment, the Governor who recommended

mended him, or her, by applying to the House-Visitors, will be fully satisfied of the affair, or the cause removed.

To such as are inclined to become benefactors by Will, the following form of a Will is recommended.

Item, *I give and bequeath unto A. B. and C. D. the Sum of*
to be raised and paid by, and out of, my personal estate and effects, which, by law, I may, or can, charge with the payment thereof, upon trust, and to the intent that they, or either of them, do pay the same to the treasurer (for the time being) of a Charity, called, or known, by the name of, THE SURREY DISPENSARY FOR RELIEF OF THE POOR, instituted in the Borough of Southwark, in the Year 1777, which said sum, I desire may be applied towards carrying on the benevolent designs of the said Charity.

N. B. Giving Land, or Money, or Stock, by Will, to be laid out in the Purchase of any estate for charitable uses, will be void by the Statute of Mortmain; but Money, or Stock, may be given by Will, without being directed to be laid out.
