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
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
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

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### ORDERS

### The PRESIDENT'S CHARGE.

HEREAS the President of every several Hospital is chief Ruler and Governor of the House whereunto he is chosen; the President's Authority of this Hospital shall be from Time to Time, at his Pleasure, and as to him shall seem good, to cause the Governors to be called together to a full Court. But in Case of Indisposition of Body, or Absence of the said President, it shall be lawful for the Treasurer, by the Direction of a Committee of Almoners, or any five of them, to cause a full Court to be called, of all the Governors, to determine all Matters for the Hospital.

### THE PRESIDENTS CHARGE

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# The CHARGE of a GOVERNOR to be taken in a Full Court.

Worshipful Sir,

AGREEABLE to very ancient and laudable Custom, you will be pleased to take Notice, in the Presence of this Right Worship ful Court, that, at several Meetings of the Governors, you have been nominated, approved, and appointed a Governor of Christ's-Hospital: And

You are earnestly required and considentially expected faithfully and diligently to act in that Station, which is of the highest Importance, and of great Trust; inasmuch as you are called to be one of the Distributors of the Goods of Almighty God to a very numerous Body of help-less Children, and to many other necessitous Persons: In which Office, if you shall be found negligent, you will not only declare yourself a most unworthy Servant of Almighty God, but also a very great Enemy to that Work, which doth most highly advance and adorn the Commonwealth, and chiefly the City of London.

And you are therefore solemnly required to promise before this Assembly, faithfully to labour in your Office of a Governor; that this Work may have its Persection, and that the Number of helples Infants committed to your

Care may be carefully kept, diligently attended and instructed, and wholesomely provided for; and, promising to do this, you are now admitted a Member of this Court.

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THE ASURERY CHARGE

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#### The TREASURER'S CHARGE,

YOUR Office and Charge is to receive and pay all such Sums of Money as by any Means shall appertain or belong to the relieving and comforting of the poor Children in this House; and you shall cause a fair Account to be kept thereof in one or more Book or Books, which shall be inspected by the Auditors at their Pleasure, and shall produce the Money, appearing thereby to be in Cash, to them as they shall require the same; and you shall cause a true and just Account to be made of what shall be received and paid every Year, and the Year's Account shall determine about the End of December yearly; and on or before the tenth Day of February in every Year, you shall cause the faid Account to be made up in Writing, and deliver the same, figned by you, to the Auditors appointed for that Purpose, to be audited; who, upon Approbation thereof, shall sign the same; and the Money due upon the Foot of the said Account, which shall be found in your Hands, you shall produce unto the Auditors of the same Account. And whereas the Receiver of this Hospital, to the Intent you shall be less troubled, is appointed to receive and pay Money by your Order, you shall for your better Security therein once every Week, that is to fay, every Saturday, cause him to make up his Account;

count; which you shall then examine and sign; and what Money shall appear to be in the faid Receiver's Hands, upon the Audit of his Agcount, you shall take into your Custody, excepting the Sum of £ 100, or any other Sum not exceeding £ 1000, which you shall leave in his Hands to defray necessary Expences by your Appointment; and although it is intended and directed that this Account shall be made up once a Week, it shall be lawful for you at any Time, when you shall think proper, to cause the faid Account to be stated. And further as you shall receive the Overplus of Money from him, so shall you, if apparent Need require, deliver fuch competent Sum or Sums of Money to the Receiver, as you shall think meet, and the Exigencies of the House shall require. You shall, at your first Entrance into your Office, or within one Month after at the farthest, receive into your Hands from the Clerk of this Hofpital, an Inventory of all, and all Manner of Goods belonging to this House, as well in the Hands of the Clerk of the Wardrobe, as of any other Officers charged in this House, and the same shall be indented, the one Part thereof to remain in your Custody, and the other in the Custody of the Person charged; and at the Year's End you shall peruse the Inventory of the said Goods, and if it shall happen any Officer charged shall depart from his said Office in your Time, you shall see the Goods which were committed to him or her, by Inventory, de-A 4 livered

livered into the Custody of the new Officer; and if it shall happen that any Part or Parcel thereof shall be wanting, which in Conscience ought to be answered, you shall cause the Party fo going away to pay for the fame if he cannot give you an Account to your Satisfaction, otherwife to lay the same before a Court, that Order may be taken therein. You have also Authority to call before you all fuch Persons or Officers as have the Collection or gathering of any Sum or Sums of Money due to this House, and to demand an Account of their Doings: And all the Officers in this House, as well Men as Women, whatfoever, not behaving themselves faithfully and diligently in their Offices, if any fuch Thing Thall happen, you shall call before you, and admonish them for the first or second Time at the most; but if the Offence be very grievous, and tend to the Hindrance of the House, then the Matter shall be brought before the Court, and the Parties thereunto answer and abide fuch Order as shall be made in that Behalf. You shall not make Payment of any Sum or Sums of Money for any Manner of Provisions, Work done, or Goods delivered for the Hospital, before the Bills be examined, condescended to, and figned by three Governors, Members of the Committee; except it be for Nursing of Children, ordinary Pensions, Wages, and Fees, Coals, and fuch Goods as are bought by wholefale by your Direction, and on Payment of which a Discount is allowed. Further, you, with two

of the Almoners, shall give Order for, or provide all Necessaries for the Children of this Hofpital; that is to fay, all Linen and Woollen, Shoes, Stockings, Caps, Girdles, Books, Bread, Meat, Beer, Butter, Cheese, Milk, Coals, &c. and you shall see that the said Provisions shall be bought in due Time, and at reasonable Prices; and you shall use your utmost Endeavour that the feveral Orders of the Court now in force, and which shall be hereafter made, be put in due Execution; and in particular you shall take Care for the Summoning of the several Committees; wherein you are to prefide in the Abfence of the President. And lastly, if any withdrawing of the Sums granted to the Maintenance of this House shall at any Time appear unto you, by Reason whereof any Damage or Prejudice may arise to this House, you shall give Knowledge thereof in due Time to the Court.

This is your Charge which you are defired to obferve, and your Labour and Pains berein Shall be rewarded at the Hands of Almighty God, whom you, chiefly serve in this Office: For, as the Apostle saith, Godliness shall have its perfect Reward, not only

in this World, but in the World to come.

# The CHARGE of a COMMITTEE GOVERNOR. \*

the great Body of Governors, and appointed, by the General Court, to be a Member of the Committee for the better directing and carrying on the numerous, various, and important Concerns of Christ's-Hospital: and have kindly taken the said Office upon you, of your own free Will, and from a pure Desire to serve and promote the Welfare of so excellent an Institution: It is earnestly hoped, and consider this Charge as containing Duties, which it is incumbent on you,

at all convenient Times, to perform.

To attend in the Hospital at all Committees, when you shall be summoned by the Direction of the President, the Treasurer, or any five Members of the Committee; and especially at those which are appointed to be held in every Month, usual Holidays excepted, and those which are to be held within six Weeks after every Lady-Day and Michaelmas-Day; and to take Notice at such Meetings whether the Clerk has entered the Proceedings and Resolutions of the somer Committees, agreeable to the Sense and Intention of the Governors; and, if not, to see that every Omission be inserted; and every Mistake rectified, in due Time.

## As an Auditor.

TO make suitable Enquiry respecting the Fitness of every Gentleman nominated to be a Governor of this House, whose Qualifications shall be referred to your Consideration by the General Court, and give your Suffrage with Im-

partiality accordingly.

And to inspect the Accounts of the Hospital occasionally; and, more particularly, the annual General-Account; and see that the whole be openly, fairly, and fully stated, as usual, by one of the Clerks; and that a true Report be made, from Time to Time, to the Court, of the State and Condition of the Hospital.

#### As a RENTOR.

TO give Attendance upon all Views, when fummoned; to affift the Treasurer and other Governors present with your best Judgment as to the Value of any Houses or Estates belonging to the Hospital; and in making a true Report to the Committee at their next Meeting, of the State and Condition of such Houses and Estates.

To assist, with your utmost Discretion, in letting any of the same Houses and Estates at Will, or in granting Leases thereof; having Regard

gard to the Responsibility of Persons who offer to become Tenants; and taking Care that such as make Contracts to do the necessary substantial Repairs, perform the same in due Time; and, if at any Time it shall be found expedient that the Repairs of any House or Estate, should be done at the Charge of the Hospital, to give such Directions as that the same Repairs may be done according to Order of Court: for which Purposes a Book shall be laid before every Committee, containing an Account of all Repairs to be done under Contract or Agreement, from Time to Time, at any of the Hospital's Buildings or Estates; the Money to be expended therein; and the Time in which fuch Repairs are to be completed.

To be careful that none of the Hospital's Leases are assigned to Paupers, or other improper Persons; and that no Encroachment be made

on any Part of the Hospital's Estates.

### As an ALMONER.

TO examine strictly into the Qualifications of all such Children as are presented for Admission, and are referred to the Almoners for that Purpose by the General Court; and to take especial Care that none be admitted contrary to the Regulations from Time to Time in sorce respecting the Admission of Children; and, moreover, that no Child be received into the Hospital

pital on any Account, or under any Presentation whatsoever, who was not born in lawful Wed-lock; nor any who are improper Objects of a charitable Institution, from the Condition or

good Circumstances of their Parents.

To examine from Time to Time into the State of the House, in Town and Country; and particularly as to the Number of Children; and use your Endeavours that only so many may be admitted as can be comfortably supported by the certain Revenues of the Hospital; and no more than may be commodiously lodged, at the Rate of two in a Bed, either in Town or Country.

To attend the Visitations of the several Schools at the usual stated Periods, to be satisfied from your own Observation, and from the Reports of the Gentlemen who kindly assist in the Examination of the Children, that the several Masters perform the Duties prescribed in their several Charges; and to observe the general Behaviour of the Children at all convenient Times, that you may be enabled to judge whether the Officers, who are entrusted with the Care of them out of School-Hours, perform the Duties in like Manner prescribed to them.

To attend the Visitations of the Schools in the Country, to the same Intent, when summoned by the Treasurer for that Purpose; and to visit them at any other Time when you shall

think fit.

To affift the Treasurer, when called upon, in contracting for Meat, or any other Provisions;

in buying Materials for Apparel, Bedding, &c. and in giving Directions for any material Repairs to be done within the Hospital, in Town or Country, or to any Part of the Hospital Estates which are not to be repaired under a

Contract or an Order of Court.

To attend the half-yearly Committee beforementioned for the Inspection of the Bills and Vouchers delivered for Provisions, Apparel, and other Goods, Repairs, and Disbursements; and to fign fuch of them as shall fall under your immediate Inspection, with two other Members of the Committee, if you shall approve the same; as a Warrant to the Treasurer for Payment thereof: as no Bills are to be paid without fuch Warrant, except they be for Nursing of Children, Bread, Meat, Coals, Linen, Shoes, and fuch other Provisions and Goods as are contracted for by the Committee at stated Prices, or are bought by wholesale by the Direction of the Treasurer; concerning which Bills every Governor may be fully fatisfied at any Time upon Enquiry.

To visit the Great Hall in the Hospital, occasionally, at any of the Hours of Refreshment, and see that the Provisions are good and wholesome, and cleanly and properly dressed; agreeable to the good Prices paid, and the ample Allowances made by the Governors for those Purposes.—With Regard to the Provisions, the Dressing, and the Quantity for each Child in the Country, much Dependence must be had upon the Fidelity of some resident Officer; and

there-

therefore, the Reading and Writing Master at Hertford is enjoined this Duty, especially, in his

Charge.

In like Manner to vifit any of the Wards in the House, at your Pleasure; to see the Bedding and all other Necessaries in the Department of the Wardrobe-keeper, are timely and properly supplied by him; and that the Nurses and all other Persons concerned, do their Duty as to the decent and cleanly keeping of the same, and the Childrens' Wearing Apparel. In this Duty, also, much Considence must be reposed in the Master at Hertford, to the Personnance of which, he is also bound by his Charge.

To affift, with Benevolence and Impartiality, in the Distribution of such Pensions and other Gifts as are, or shall be, in the Disposal of the Almoners: always preferring, with your best Discernment, the most sit and deserving Objects

of fuch Bounties.

And to propose, to a full Committee, any Regulation by which the Comfort and Welfare of the Children may be promoted; and to advance the Credit and general Good of this Royal, extensive, and most useful Institution by every Means in your Power.

And doing these Things your Example will be worthily admired and imitated; and you will assuredly receive the full Reward of your Labours at the Hand of Almighty God.

YOUR Charge is from Time to Time to give your best Judgment, and to administer good and wholesome Counsel for the Preservation of the Children and Officers resident in this House; and when any of the said Children or Officers are sick, you shall not fail, upon Notice given you thereof, to visit them, and to order sit Medicines and Remedies as the Nature of any of their Diseases shall require.

And this you shall faithfully do without any other

YOUR Charge is to visit the poor Children in this Hospital, and as often as there shall be any Occasion of Cure for you to do, you shall perform the same faithfully, and with all Expedition; and because sudden Accidents do many Times befal the poor Children, the which require your speedy Help, you shall not fail in your own Person to come at least once a

Day.

You shall, upon Notice being given or left for you, constantly attend upon all Courts and Committees, and at other Times when Children are to be admitted, to examine them, and to take Care that none be admitted who have any infectious Distemper; or Disease or Infirmity which may be judged incurable; contrary to an Article in the Regulations for the Admission of Children; and if any Child so distempered shall, after Admission, come under your Notice, or within your Knowledge, you shall forthwith represent the Case of such Child to a Committee of Almoners.

#### The APOTHECARY'S CHARGE. \*

YOU are required constantly to reside in the Apartment which is at present, or which shall hereaster be, assigned to you within this Hospital; and not to be absent from the Hospital a whole Day, or one Night, without special Cause; and then not without Permission by the

Treasurer, or a Committee of Almoners.

You shall provide, at the Charge of this House, all such Drugs and Medicines as the Physician shall think proper and expedient; and you shall take Care that no Part of the same Drugs or Medicines be wasted, or otherwise applied than for the Use and Benefit of the Children of this House, and of the resident Officers,

their Families and Servants.

You shall attend regularly upon the Physician of this House at all such Times as he shall think proper to visit the Children at the Sick-ward, or any of the resident Officers of this Hospital, their Families, or Servants; and shall prepare, compound, and administer, or deliver such Medicines and Remedies as the Physician shall preferibe for their Relief as soon as possible. And whereas the Governors have Considence in your Judgment in prescribing, as well as Skill in compounding of Medicines, you shall, in the Absence of the Physician, dispense such Remedies

dies and Help as your best Judgment and Discretion shall approve; always submitting all your Measures to the Inspection of the Physician at

the first Opportunity.

You shall take special Care that all the Drugs, Medicines, and other Articles delivered for the Use of this House, in your Department, are of the best Kind; and that a moderate Charge only

is made by those who supply the same.

And whereas Retirement is necessary to Perfons afflicted with Disease, with respect to themfelves, and proper, with regard to others; and Confinement to certain Bounds is for many Reasons conducive to the Preservation of good Order amongst the Children of this House, you shall take special Care that the Gate leading from the Sick-ward Yard to Grey-Friars be kept, as heretofore, constantly shut; that sick, lame, or otherwise diseased Children may not get into the Streets, to their own Harm, and the Reproach of this House, by a Way seldom visited by the other resident Officers; and if you, or any of your Family or Servants have Occasion to pass that Way, you shall take Care that the Gate be not left open.

And lastly, as the Children of this House, and the Officers, their Families, and Servants are very numerous, requiring your constant Attention, you are not to visit any other Person, or transact any other Business as an Apothecary; but shall employ your whole Time and Judgment in the Preservation of the Children

and refident Officers, their Families and Ser-vants.

This Charge points out some of the principal Duties of your Office, which you are hereby enjoined to perform: And it is also earnestly recommended to you to promote the Welfare of the Children of Christ's Hospital by every other Means in your Power.

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The CHARGE of the NURSE of the SICK-WARD.\*

THE Governors have reposed greater Confidence in you than in any of their other Nurses, inasmuch as they have committed to your Care the weak, sick, lame, and otherwise diseased Children of this House; and you are, therefore, hereby admonished that much Vigilance and Discretion, and an equal Degree of Tenderness, must necessarily be exerted in the Discharge of the Duties of your Office.

You shall receive all such Children of this House as shall be brought to you by any of the Nurses on Account of Sickness, Lameness, or any other Insirmity; and shall give them your best Assistance until you can receive the Direction of the Physician, Surgeon, or Apothecary,

concerning them.

You shall constantly employ two Persons to assist you in the Care of the Children, and in Houshold Business, for which Purpose you receive an Allowance weekly; and you shall not engage any further Assistance at the Charge of this House but upon very special Occasions; and then not without the express Direction of the Physician.

You shall not procure or make any Provision for the Children under your Care, different from that which is regularly provided by the House, unless

unless you shall be specially directed so to do by the Physician; and in such Cases you shall produce Vouchers for what you shall disburse in that

way, if required.

You shall carefully administer to the Children all the Medicines prescribed by the Physician and Surgeon, or which shall be delivered to you by the Apothecary of this House for that Purpose; and, when called upon, you shall be ready to acquaint the Physician, the Surgeon, or the Apothecary of the Effects of such Medicines during their Absence, as far as such Effects can fall within a confidence.

fall within your Observation.

You shall pay a due Regard to all such Directions as shall at any Time be given to you by the Matron of this Hospital as to the cleanly keeping and Comfort of the Children; or by the Steward, as to the better Government of them; and you shall, Morning and Evening, when it can be done without disturbing the Sick, or fatiguing the Weak, cause one of the Children to read a Chapter in the Bible, and that Part of the excellent Form of Prayer used in this House, which is suited to the Time of the Day.

You shall not permit the Children to play at Cards, Dice, or any unlawful or hurtful Games; nor to wander about the Hospital or neighbouring Streets on any Account or Pretence; but shall keep them calm and quiet in your Ward, or in the Square adjoining; that the Amusements which are fit for them may be taken under your frequent Observation; and to that End you shall

Yard into Grey Fryars, to be kept constantly

locked.

You are strictly enjoined to summon before you the Children under your Care, and those who take Physic, three Times every Day at the most uncertain Hours. You are then yourself in Person to call over their Names, and to deliver in Writing to the Steward, twice in the Week at least, the Names of the Boys absent at each call. Every Omission will be considered as a Breach of a very material Part of your Duty.

You shall not be absent from this House, Day or Night, without the Permission of the Trea-furer, and the Approbation of the Physician.

You shall keep a Book, in which you shall enter the Names of such Children as come under your Care, and the Times of their coming to, and leaving the Sick-ward; and also what their Disorders are, as far as they come to your Know-ledge; and, when any Child dies, you shall give immediate Notice thereof in Writing at the Counting-House.

You shall take Care that none of the Hofpital's Property, in your Custody, be wasted, lost, or embezzled, but safely and cleanly kept and accounted for to the Wardrobe-keeper of

this Hospital.

You shall as often as the Nature of your Office, which implies Confinement, will permit you, attend Divine Service at Christ-Church; and when-

## The CLERK'S CHARGE.

YOUR Charge is to attend in this Hospital upon the Affairs thereof, and whatsoever the Governors at their Meetings shall agree upon, you shall take Care that the same shall be entered in the Books of this Hospital incident to the Matter.

Further, whatfoever at any Court shall be agreed on, being requisite to be kept secret, you shall not in any wife open or disclose to any Perfon or Persons whomsoever; and to the Intent that all Things in your Office may be readily answered, you shall keep, or cause to be kept, the following Books, and any others which the Court or Committee shall think convenient:

A Book in which shall be fairly entered all the Proceedings of the General Courts; which, being so entered, shall be read at the next Court for Consirmation before any other Business be

done.

A Book into which you shall enter all Things

agreed upon at Committees.

A Register, which shall contain the Names and Ages of all the Children admitted into this Hospital; the Name of each Child's Father, the Parish to which the Child belongs, and the Day and Year upon which he or she was admitted; as also the Name of the presenting Governor, and the Day and Year in which, and the Name

and Residence of the Parent or Friend by whom, any Child shall be discharged; that it may appear how many are living in the House, or in the Country, and how many are deceased or discharged: And you are to take Care that no Child be admitted but by virtue of an Order of Court.

An Apprentice Book; in which shall be registered the Name, Profession, or Trade, and Residence of every Master or Mistress taking an Apprentice from this House, as also the Fee or

other Allowance given with each Child.

A Book to enter the Will, or the Branch of the Will, of every Person who shall make any

A Book into which the Surveyor shall enter all the Schedules which he shall from Time to Time take of the Fixtures upon any Part of the

And also separate Books for the following Uses and Purposes: To enter the general Heads of all Leases; and of Insurances of Estates from Fire. The Time for, and Amount of, Repairs to be done by Tenants. Notices to quit Houses or Estates. Copies of all Letters of Importance. Numerical Account of Carrooms, their Proprietors and Workers. Alphabetical Account of the same. Account of Mathematical Boys placed out, and to whom. Account of Governors' Presentations at one View, that every Gentle-

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man may know the particular Right annexed to each of his Turns. Fair Account of Governors Names and Residences. Names of Governors present at all Courts. Names of Children admitted from Day to Day, and of the Disposal of such Children in Town or Country. Account of Gifts distributed to young Men and Maidens having served their Apprenticeship.

That neither of the Masters shall absent himfelf at any Time, unless urgent Business constrain him; and when any such Business shall happen, he shall request the Attention of the

other Master to his Scholars.

That either Master shall, in the Absence of the other, teach the whole School with all Diligence and Discretion; not using any other Manner ner or Form of teaching than the absent Master

hath used when present.

That no Child in the Grammar School shall be taught Latin until he can read English well, and write indifferently; and every Boy shall be taught English grammatically, before, or at the same Time, that he is exercised in the Rudiments of Latin.

That the Holidays to be kept by the Masters of this School shall be for the Spaces, and at the

Seafons following:

At Easter, Eleven Days, including Sundays

At Whitfuntide, One Week.

At Bartholomew tide, Three Weeks.

At Christmas, Fifteen Days, including Sundays: Besides such other Saints Days and Holidays as

have been customarily kept:

That neither of the Masters shall license any of the Scholars to play upon any other working Days in the Year, except the Thursday after Three of the Clock, and Saturday in the Afternoon.

That neither of the Masters shall correct the Scholars of the other, except in his Absence.

That the Upper Master shall, twice every Year, make Examination of the Under Master's highest Form, and shall thence take under his Instruction such as he shall find ready; leaving a suitable Number as a Furtherance to such as shall come into that Form out of the next or other Forms.

That a Catalogue of the Childrens' Names, according to their Forms in this School, shall be hung up, and, both Morning and Afternoon, called over in Presence of the Masters; and a Copy thereof delivered at the Counting-House immediately before every Visitation of the Schools hereafter to be made by the Committee.

That the Boys be always placed in Classes or Forms, and advanced according to their Pro-

gress.

That no Scholar go forth of the School for Relief of Nature, but with the Approbation of

one of the Masters.

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#### READING MASTER in London. \*

VOU shall take all the Children belonging to any two of the Wards in this Hospital into the Grammar School from Eleven to Twelve o'Clock; and, having arranged them in Classes, you shall exercise them, or cause them to be exercifed in your Presence, in English Reading and Spelling, according to their various Abilities; and this shall be done three Times in every Week, except in Holiday-time; fo that every Child in the twelve Wards may be under your Observation once in fourteen Days. Boys who want Capacity will require an extraordinary Degree of your Attention; but if any Boys shall be found wilfully negligent, you shall take Care that such Boys do attend every reading Day, or three Times a Week, until they have gained the Ground they had loft, and have made Atonement for their Idleness.

You shall be at liberty to employ some of the Boys who are intended for the University in the Performance of this Duty, under your own Eye; and they shall be such as have most Credit with you for Attention and grave Deportment.

You shall appoint Boys of the best Skill in English Reading, and of the most decent Behaviour, to be Markers in the several Wards; whose Duty it shall be to attend carefully to the

mary Duty in the Ward, and to take Care that fuch Boy does not commit any Error, without being informed of his Mistake. They shall also, once a Week at least, read the Duty in their respective Wards, to give the Boys in general an Example of good English Reading; and if such Markers perform their various Duties to your entire Satisfaction, you are requested to present each of them with a Silver Medal of the Royal Founder, at the Charge of this House; to wear during his Continuance in the Hospital, and to take out with him if you still approve his Conduct.

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# ORDERS for the WRITING SCHOOL in London.

by an Order of a General Court holden therein the 21st of January, 1791, have resolved, that in Future the Boys in the Writing School shall be committed to the Care of two Masters, the Number constantly therein rendering it extremely laborious for one Master to qualify all those Boys in this most necessary Part of their Education, so as to enter into Life with sull Benefit to themselves; and have appointed an additional Master in Pursuance of such Resolution, the said Masters are hereby respectively enjoined to observe and ensorce the sollowing

Orders for the Government of the WRITING SCHOOL.

That immediately from and after the 25th of March, 1791, the Children belonging to this Hospital in the said School be committed, one Half of each Class to the Care of the present Master, and the remaining Half of each Class to the Care of the other Master.

That the two Masters shall enter into the Writing School immediately after Seven of the Clock in the Morning from the First Day of March to the First Day of November, and Eight o'Clock

o'Clock from the First of November to the First of March, and there shall attend with all Diligence teaching and instructing their respective Scholars until Eleven; and from One in the Afternoon until five of the Clock during the first mentioned Period, and till Four o'Clock

during the latter.

That each Master shall have the Services of one Usher; and that each Usher shall enter every Morning into the School at or before the same Hours, and shall continue there during all the School-time, instructing the Children committed to their Care to the best of their power in Writing and Arithmetic, and affifting them in their feveral Performances.

That no Child or Children shall be admitted or taken into the Writing School, unless he or they can read very well; and then not without an Order from the Committee or Treasurer,

figned by the chief Clerk.

That neither of the Masters shall absent himfelf at any Time unless urgent Business constrain him; and when any fuch Business shall happen, he shall request the Attention of the other Master to his Scholars; the absent Master being careful to leave his Usher to assist the other Master in fuch his Attention.

That either Master shall in the Absence of the other teach the whole School with all Diligence

and Discretion.

That neither of the Masters shall correct the Scholars of the other, except in his Absence;

and if any of the Children offend, Correction shall be given rather by Shame than Smart; except in Cases where greater Severity may be ne-

ceffary.

And whereas the Children in the faid School have been hitherto limited in their Allowance of Pens and other Necessaries, it is ordered, that each Master shall take such Measures as in his Discretion he may see proper, that each Boy shall be supplied daily, if necessary, with Pens, and each Form with Copies, Rulers, and Plummets; for which Purpose he shall keep an Account of the Quantity of each which he may have received from the Counting-House, and fubmit the same to the Inspection of the Treafurer and Committee at the half-yearly Visitation of the Schools, and shall use every Means in his Power to prevent any Waste of such Neceffaries, and to punish any Child he may detect in fuch Practices.

That the Performance of each Boy shall be submitted to the Inspection of his Master or Usher daily; and that it be made the Duty of the Ushers to hear all the Children their Tables

as frequently as shall be found convenient.

That the said Children shall present their Books and other Performances to a Committee of Almoners in this Hospital whenever required, hat the Governors may perceive what Improvement the Children make in the said Writing School, and their Qualifications upon quitting the Hospital.

And

And whereas partial Attention to any particular Child or Children is expressly contrary to the Spirit of this Institution, the Masters are expressly directed not only to prevent by every Means in their Power any Boy being placed under the Care of either of the Ushers at an Expence for extraordinary Instruction; but they are required to report to the Treasurer any Child, whose Parents may attempt to procure such Indulgence; that the Pleasure of the Governors may be known whether the House should not be cleared of those Boys, whose Parents may not be satisfied with the general Care taken of their Children.

That the Masters report to the Treasurer either of the Ushers who may be detected in receiving a Gratuity for extraordinary Attention to any Child or Children, that such Usher may be immediately dismissed the Service and suture Protection of this House.

That a Catalogue of the Childrens' Names according to their Forms in this School under each Master be hung up, and some proper Means employed both Morning and Asternoon, to ascertain to the Satisfaction of the said Masters, that the Children are all present; and if any shall be absent they shall receive due Correction; and immediately before every Visitation of the Schools hereafter to be made by the Committee a Copy of the same Catalogues shall be delivered at the Counting-House.

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That the Boys be always placed in Forms of Classes, and advanced according to their Progress, and no Distinction allowed but such as arises from their Merit; for which Purpose it is directed, that the Custom which has long subsisted of a Selection of one Form for the Master's special Care shall be discontinued.

That the Masters and Ushers take Care that no Child be absent from the School upon any Call of Nature more than a reasonable Time.

That the Holidays to be kept by the Masters of this School shall be for the Spaces and at the Seasons following:

At Easter Eleven Days including Sundays;

At Whitsuntide, a Week;

At Bartholomew-tide Three Weeks;

At Christmas Fifteen Days including Sundays: besides such other Saints' Days and Holidays as

have been customarily kept.

That neither of the Masters or Ushers shall license any of the said Scholars to play upon any School-day in the Year, except the Thursday after Three of the Clock, and Saturday in the Afternoon.

That the Scholars shall not be dismissed until Notice be given by the Bell; and that each Form shall move forth quietly and in an orderly Man-

ner to prevent Mischief.

# ORDERS for the MASTER of the MA-THEMATICAL SCHOOL.

WOU shall constantly and diligently attend upon the Children of the Royal, Mr. Henry Stone's, and Mr. John Stock's Foundations in the said School, from Seven o'Clock in the Morning from the First of March to the First of November, and Eight o'Clock from the First of November to the First of March, teaching and instructing the said Scholars until it be Eleven; and in the Asternoon on Tuesdays from One of the Clock until Five during the first mentioned Period, and until Four o'Clock during the latter; and on Thursday Asternoons thoughout the Year until Three o'Clock; or at such other Times as the Governors shall think sit to direct and appoint.

And the Children on the faid several Foundations shall be by you instructed in the various Branches contained in the following Synopsis, and in any other Rule or Branch of the Sciences of Arithmetic, Navigation, or Mathematics, which the Governors by any future Order shall think proper to direct you to instruct

lar and oblique angular Triangles.

V. The Use of the terrestrial Globe in sinding the Latitudes and Longitudes of Places, their Angle of Position, and the Distance between them.

Also the Use of the celestial Globe in finding the Latitudes, Longitudes, right Ascensions, Declinations, Amplitudes, Azimuths, and Altitudes of the Sun, Moon, or fixed Stars; together with the Times of their rising, setting, and culminating.

VI. Plane failing; namely, the working of Traverses, the Resolution of all plane-failing Questions; with their Application to sailing in

Currents and turning to windward.

# The STEWARD'S CHARGE.

YOU shall diligently and constantly attend the Children of this Hospital at Breakfast, Dinner, and Supper; and you may not direct them to eat their Meals in their Wards without express Permission of the Treasurer. You shall cause the Bell to be rung at the several Hours, and for the several Purposes herein after particularly mentioned and set forth; and see that the Boys come into the Hall to Breakfast, washed, thoroughly cleaned, and with their Hair combed out, to go thence to their several Schools.

You shall take special Care that none of the Children wear any Clothes, but such as are provided for and given to them by the Hospital; except those which they are furnished with by the Custom of the House at their first coming, at the Charge of their Parents or Friends, viz. one Pair of Shoes, one Pair of Stockings, one Shirt,

and a Pair of Breeches.

You shall, upon every Sunday, Forenoon and Afternoon, and on every Saint's Day and Public Day, go with the Children to Christ-Church, to preserve Order among them in going and coming from thence, and to see that they behave there decently and reverently; and you shall take Care that the said Children, at all other Times, behave with good Manners, and

carry themselves respectfully to all Persons whomsoever.

You shall employ every Means in your Power to prevent the Boys going beyond the Boundaries of this Hospital without Leave; and to the End that any who shall presume to do so may be detected, you shall frequently, agreeable to former good Practice, cause all the Children to be called together into the Hall, not only on Holidays, but in the Hours after school, at your discretion; especially on Saturdays and Thursdays in the Afternoon, and in the Evening after Supper in the Summer Season, and then with the greatest Uncertainty of the Time, and even twice in the same Day, if you shall see Occasion. You shall then count the Children according to their feveral Wards; and if any Boy shall be absent, without proper Leave, you shall invariably give him due Correction.

Any Boy eloping from the Hospital a whole Day, or a considerable Part of a Day, shall receive your public Correction in the Hall, as a Warning to the Rest: and further, for every such Elopement he shall be confined closely within his Ward on the next Holiday, on which you may chuse to give a general Leave to the Children to visit their Friends.

The same Rule shall you observe with the Boys who shall be reported to you by the Nurse of the Sick Ward as having eloped from thence, when they shall be returned to you in Health. You shall take frequent Notice whether she calls over

her

her Children, as is prescribed in her Charge; and upon every Neglect of this Part of her Duty you shall give Information of the same to the Treasurer.

Any Boy, who has Leave of Absence, coming home too late in the Evening, his Nurse is enjoined to deliver his Name to you: in failure hereof you shall report her to the Treasurer.

And whereas the Nurses, by their ancient and present Charges, were and are enjoined to acquaint you when any Child shall absent himself one whole Day or Night from this Hospital, to the End that the House may be cleared of Children who give fuch ill Examples; you are hereby strictly enjoined, when any Child shall commit such Offence more than once, to leave an Account of his Misbehavour, in Writing, at the Counting-House; that the same may be laid before a Committee of Almoners: And when any Child shall fo absent himself, and it shall come to your Knowledge that he has loft, destroyed, altered, or put off the Hospital's Clothes, you shall not receive him into the Care of this House, nor shall he be received without the express Direction of a Committee of Almoners.

And for the due Observance of the Rules respecting the Boundaries, which are of very great
Importance to the Welfare of the Children, and
the Credit of the Hospital, it is hereby required
of the chief Clerk, to report every Omission of
them on the Part of the Steward to the Treasurer; but himself to proceed no further.

You

You shall countenance and support the several Nurses, the Porter, and the four Beadles, to the utmost of your Power, in the Discharge of their several Duties.

You shall, in your own Person, duly attend to receive all the Bread, Meat, Beer, Butter, Cheefe, Milk, Salt, Soap, Candles, Oatmeal, Coals, Fuel, and all other Provisions and Necessaries which shall be brought in and delivered for the Use of this Hospital, and carefully examine and fign the feveral Tradesmens' and other Bills for the same; and take special Care that the House be not imposed on therein, either in Quality, Measure, or Weight: And shall daily enter, in a Book to be kept for that Purpose, the coming in of all Provisions and Necessaries, and the delivering forth thereof; and shall weekly make up an Account thereof, and of what is remaining at the Week's End for the Use of the Children; that it may appear, to the Auditors of the yearly Account, what Provisions and Neceffaries have been received and delivered forth by you for the whole Year.

You shall diligently, and to the utmost of your Power, consider and foresee what Provisions are necessary for the Children of this Hospital; and in due Time give the Treasurer and Almoners Notice thereof, that the same may be bought at the proper Season; and you shall see that all the same Provisions be properly dressed and prepared, and equally distributed to the Children, when

they come to Table in the Hall.

You shall, on the first Day of every Month, bring in a Bill of all such Provisions and Neces-faries as you shall yourself occasionally provide for the Use of the House, to be examined and signed by three of the Committee of Almoners; and which shall not be paid until so examined and signed.

### The MATRON'S CHARGE.

YOUR Office is an Office of great Trust, for to you is committed the Government and Oversight of all the Nurses and Children in this Hospital; and also to you is given Authority to command, reprove, and rebuke them, or any of them; and if any shall disobey you, you shall from Time to Time make such Persons known unto the Almoners and Governors of this House, that they may take Order with them, as they in their Wisdom shall think sit.

Your Charge is also to see that the Washing Women do their Duties in clean and sweet washing of the Sheets, Shirts, and all other Clothes belonging to the Children; and you shall from Time to Time give such Direction to the Person who employs them, that the Linen and Clothes sent by one Nurse may not be delivered to ano-

ther, or carelessly torn or wasted.

You shall see that the Nurses go clean and handsomely in their Apparel; that they be always well employed; and that they keep the Children, committed to their Charge, sweet and clean in their Persons, and neat and decent in their Apparel; and that they have a constant careful Eye upon their Behaviour when in the Wards or Hall; and you shall not be absent from the Hall when the Children are at Dinner

or Supper, without Leave of the Committee, or

of the Treasurer for special Cause.

You shall see that the Nurses bring their Children every Day, at the Times appointed, to Prayers in the Hall; at all which Times you shall see that they wear no other Apparel than what is provided for them by the Hospital; except such as they are surnished with by their Parents or Friends on their Admission, viz. One Pair of Shoes, one Pair of Stockings, one Shirt, and a Pair of Breeches.

You shall also, once in every Month, examine the Childrens' Beds, with all Things to them belonging, and all other Things expressed and set down in an Inventory which shall be delivered unto you; and if any Goods whatsoever shall be purloined, embezzled, spoiled, or otherwise consumed, you shall forthwith make it known to the Committee of Almoners of this Hospital for the Time being, that they may take Order therein.

You shall also see that none of the Nurses take any Children into their Wards, but such as shall be admitted by the Court or Committee.

Further, you shall see that the Nurses keep

the Hall and Wards sweet and clean.

You shall at least once in a Week, between Nine and Ten o'Clock, go into every Ward to see that the Children are covered in their Beds, to prevent their taking Cold.

Further, you shall see the Beef, Mutton, Veal, and Pork, which shall be from Time to Time

bought for the Use of this Hospital, weighed; and also that they, as well as the Bread and Beer, be sweet, good, and wholesome: And at the Ringing of the Bell for Dinner, daily, you shall be present in the Kitchen to see that the Meat be properly and sufficiently dressed; that the other Articles of the Childrens' Diet are well and cleanly prepared; and to prevent or suppress any Consusion or Disorder which might otherwise arise in the Delivery thereof to the Nurses: And, this being done, you shall go into the Hall and see, to the utmost of your Power, that the Childrens' Diet be suitably portioned; and shall employ your Authority in preserving good Order among them.

You shall every Lord's-Day, Forenoon and Afternoon, repair to Christ-Church, except in Case of Sickness, and see that the Nurses come with their Children thither; and you shall be present in the Gallery to see that the Children are orderly during Divine Service; and you shall use your utmost Endeavours that the said Children, at all other Times, behave with good Manners, and carry themselves respectfully to all Persons

whomfoever.

You shall take Care that the Court Room be made clean.

And you shall constantly assist the Wardrobekeeper on every Quarter-Day to help to deliver the Apparel to the poor Children in the House, Town, or Country; as also in cutting out all Manner of Linen whatsoever. This Charge points out some of the principal Duties of your Office, which you are hereby strictly enjoined to perform; and to be at all Times so circumspect in your general Conduct that it may be a fair and profitable Example to the Children committed to your Care.

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# The NURSES CHARGE.

YOUR Charge is, that you faithfully serve this Hospital as one of the Nurses therein, and obey such Orders as shall from Time to Time be given you by the Steward or Matron of this House.

That you avoid all Railing, Scolding, and Immorality; and behave kindly towards the poor

Children committed to your Care.

That you take Care that there be no playing at Cards, Dice, or any unlawful Games or Plays whatsoever, by the Children in your Ward; that all the Children in your Ward be cleaned and washed before they go to Bed; and that they do not go out of their Ward after Eight of the Clock in the Evening from the First of March to the First of November, nor after Seven from the First of November to the First of March. In your Ward, in the Absence of the Steward and Matron, you are to have the fole Direction and Management of your Children: You shall, therefore, for their Good, and your own Credit and Quiet, take Care that they behave with good Manners, and carry themselves respectfully towards you and all other Persons.

That

That every Night two Chapters in the Bible be read, and a Pfalm fung, in your Ward; and, after faying their Prayers, that the Children go to Bed by Seven o'Clock from the First of No-vember to the First of March, and by Eight o'Clock from the First of March to the First of November.

That you comb the Head of every Boy in your Ward thoroughly, at least three Times in every Week in Summer, and twice in every Week in Winter-time; and that you see that all the Childrens' Feet be washed once in every Month, at the least, and their Necks once in seven Days; at which Times you shall carefully inspect if any of them have the Itch; and, if you have a Doubt about the Clearness of any Boy, you shall immediately present him to the Apothecary of this House for his Direction.

That the Childrens' Diet be by you equally distributed among them; and if the Provisions be not sweet and wholesome, that you acquaint the Steward thereof; and you shall not provide Rolls, Butter, or any other Kind of Diet for any of the Children; but shall deliver to them such only as shall be from Time to Time supplied by the Munisicence of this House.

That the Children in your Ward go into the Hall to Prayers at the Ringing of the Hall Bell to Breakfast, Dinner, and Supper; and if any Child of your Ward be absent from the Hall, that you give immediate Notice thereof to the

Steward.

That if any Child be absent one whole Day, or lie out of his Ward one Night, you shall forthwith acquaint the Steward thereof; that the Child may be otherwise provided for by his Parents, and the House cleared of the Children who give such ill Examples.

If any Boy, who has Leave to visit his Friends, shall come home too late in the Evening, you are enjoined to deliver his Name to the Steward. In failure hereof he is directed to re-

port you to the Treasurer.

You are ordered to receive and keep closely within your Ward, at the Time of a general Leave, such Boys as the Steward shall deliver to you to be confined, as a punishment for having eloped. The Steward has in Charge to report to the Treasurer every Omission in this Respect: and every such Omission will be considered as a Breach of a material Part of your Duty.

That you clean and keep fweet the Great Hall

and your Ward.

That you are not absent from the Hall without Leave of the Steward, nor from the House without Leave of the Treasurer; and that you do not harbour any Manner of Person whomsoever in your Ward.

That before you go to Bed you see that the Children in your Ward be covered to prevent their taking Cold; and that the Candles be put

out, and the Fire extinguished.

That

That you employ no more than four Boys at one Time to wash your Ward, and give Notice to the Master under whose immediate Care they are, of the Boys you so employ; and see that they do the Work with their Shoes and Stockings on, to prevent their taking Cold.

That you cause one of the Children in the Grammar or Writing School to keep a Ward Book of all the Childrens' Names, and of the Time of any Child's being admitted, discharged,

or dead.

That all the Beds, with all the Furniture belonging to them, and the Childrens' Wearing-Apparel, both for Holidays and Working-Days, with other Necessaries to them belonging, be not wasted, lost, or embezzled; but kept safe and clean, to the utmost of your Power, and accounted for to the Wardrobe-keeper of this Hospital.

And you shall observe all such Orders relating to your Office as are in force, or shall hereafter be devised, for the Good of this City and

Hofpital.

This Charge points out some of the principal Duties of your Office, which you are hereby strictly enjoined to perform; being at all Times vigilant for the Safety and Well-doing of the Children of Christ's-Hospital.

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#### CHARGES AND ORDERS

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FOR

## HERTFORD.

The CHARGE of the SURGEON and APOTHECARY.\*

Preservation of the Children belonging to Christ's-Hospital, and to administer such good and proper Medicines in Case of Sickness or Lameness, and such immediate Help in Case of Accident as their various Necessities shall require; and in order that the Knowledge of the Children from time to time wanting your Assistance, may not be withheld from you, you shall be regularly informed by the Nurse of the Insirmary; to which Place Notice is to be constantly sent by the se-

veral Masters and Mistresses, of the Children absent from School on Account of Sickness or Lameness.

You shall have full Power to order any of the Children to or from the Infirmary, as you shall

think proper.

You shall likewise give your best Advice to any of the Masters or Mistresses, and their immediate Families and Servants; and to the several Nurses, and one Child or Servant constantly residing with each; and shall furnish all or any or either of them with good and proper Medicines and Help, when any of their Cases or Situations shall require the same.

You shall not make or cause to be made any Bill or Charge to the Hospital for any Drugs or Medicines, or for any other Article in the way of your Profession, unless it be for Trusses for ruptured Children, or such like special Assistance, for the perpetual Help of any unfortunate

Child under your Care.

And whereas by an Article in the Regulations for the Admission of Children into the Hospital, such as are afflicted with Distempers, Diseases, or Infirmities, which shall be judged infectious or incurable, are deemed improper Objects of the Care of this House; if any such Child, after Admission, shall come under your Care, or within your Knowledge, you shall forthwith represent the Case of such Child to a Committee of Almoners.

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You shall see that all the Apartments in the Infirmary be kept clean and well aired, and that the Beds be neat and comfortable; and shall direct the Nurse to provide proper Sustenance and Necessaries for the Children committed to her Care; for which Purpose she has the usual weekly Allowance for each Child, exclusive of her Salary.

And if at any Time further Assistance shall be wanting at the said Infirmary, on Account of the great Number of sick Children, or the particular Case of any sick or diseased Child, you shall immediately represent the Necessity of such further Assistance to the Treasurer, in Writing, who is empowered to give such Relief at his Disease.

cretion.

And lastly, if from the Appearance of the Children of any particular Nurse you have Reafon to believe that their Diet in general is not proper and wholesome, or, being wholesome, that they have not a sufficient Quantity thereof, you shall admonish such Nurse, and give her your best Advice and Direction for her better Government in suture.

This Charge points out some of the principal Duties of your Office, which you are hereby enjoined to perform; and it is also earnestly recommended to you to promote the Welfare of the Children of Christ's-Hospital by every other Means in your Power.

#### NURSE of the INFIRMARY.\*

THE Governors have reposed greater Confidence in you than in any of their other Nurses at Hertford; inasmuch as they have committed to your Care their sick and otherwise helpless Children; and you are, therefore, hereby admonished, that much Vigilance and Discretion, and an equal Degree of Tenderness, must necessarily be exerted in the Discharge of the

Duties of your Office.

And whereas the feveral School-Masters and Mistresses are desired by their Charges to send Notice to the Infirmary of any Child absent from School on Account of Sickness or Lameness; when any such Notice shall be left, you shall immediately carry the same, or cause it to be carried by a safe Hand, to the Surgeon and Apothecary appointed by the Governors; unless there shall be any Child under his Care in the Infirmary; in which Case you may wait his coming to give the said Notice.

You shall receive all such Children of this Hospital as shall be sent to the Insirmary from time to time by the Surgeon and Apothecary, and also such as shall be sent from London by Order of the Treasurer; and give them your best Assistance; regularly administering all such Medicines and Help as shall be ordered or delivered

for their Benefit.

You shall provide for them such mild and proper Diet as shall be recommended or directed by the Surgeon and Apothecary; having the usual weekly Allowance with each Child for that Purpose; and you shall chearfully submit to all such other Directions as you shall from time to time receive from him, concerning the Children under your Care.

You shall comb the Heads of such of the Children as can sit up and bear it, at least three Times in a Week; and be very careful to keep them all perfectly clean and comfortable; to which End you shall be particularly attentive to the Beds and Bed-Furniture, that every Part thereof may be frequently aired, and kept continually

fweet and clean.

You shall not lodge or entertain any Person except the Children of the Hospital, and occa-fionally one Servant to assist you in the Care of them.

And as often as the Nature of your Office, which implies Confinement, will permit, you shall attend Divine Service at the Parish Church, being at all Times regular in your Behaviour and decent in your Appearance; to the good Example of the other Nurses and the Children, and the Credit of the Hospital.

You shall not be absent from the Infirmary, which is to be your constant Dwelling, a single Day or Night, without Permission of the Treafurer, and the Concurrence of the Surgeon and

Apothecary.

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This Charge points out some of the principal Duties of your Office, which you are strictly enjoined to perform; and to be at all Times so circumspect in your general Conduct that it may be a fair and profitable Example to the Children committed to your Care.

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# ORDERS for the MASTER of the READ. ING and WRITING SCHOOL.\*

YOU shall enter into the School immediately after Seven o'Clock in the Morning in Summer, and Eight o'Clock in Winter, and attend there until Eleven; and from One in the Afternoon until Five o'Clock in Summer, and Four in Winter; and your Assistants or Ushers shall attend during all the same Hours, and at such other Times as you shall think proper to direct.

And whereas an excellent Form of Prayer was anciently appointed by the Right Reverend Father in God, Henry Compton, then Lord Bishop of London, for the Use of the Children of this Hospital, you shall cause that Part of the same Form of Prayer which is suited to the Time of Day and the Place, to be read in your School

Morning and Evening.

Of the Children committed to your Care, such as are or shall be under Nine Years of Age, shall be instructed in spelling and reading English; those between Nine and Eleven Years shall be frequently exercised in English Reading, and brought forward in Writing; and those above Eleven Years of Age, who can read English well, shall be chiefly instructed in Writing and Arithmetick; being occasionally exercised in English Reading.

You

You shall receive such Boys from the Grammar School, as shall be recommended to you by the Master of that School, two Hours every Day, Saturdays excepted; and shall instruct them until they shall be able to write Exercises; and on or near every Quarter-Day, you shall give Notice to the Grammar Master to withdraw such Children as can write a legible Hand, that their Places may be supplied by others who cannot write.

You shall take Care that none of the Children be absent from School, Forenoon or Afternoon, except on Thursdays, after Three o'Clock, Saturdays in the Afternoon, and the usual general Holidays; and when any Child is permitted to go from School of Necessity, you shall employ some Means, such as you may think best, to

know that he returns in due Time.

You shall permit the Children to keep Holidays at the Seasons, and for the Spaces following:

At Easter, Eleven Days, including Sundays;

At Whitsuntide, a Week;

At Bartholomero-tide, Three Weeks;

At Christmas, Fifteen Days, including Sundays: Besides such other Saints' Days and Holidays as

have been customarily kept.

You shall not permit your Ushers or Assistants to correct any of the Children, otherwise than by Shame; but if any of them misbehave in your Absence, you shall give such Correction as you think proper at your Return.

The

The Boys under your Care shall be arranged in Forms or Classes, and advanced according to their Progress; and out of the most forward Boys, you may choose some to assist in the Instruction of the younger and more backward Children.

You shall daily observe the Appearance and Apparel of the Children, and take Care that the Nurses send them to School neat and clean in all respects; and they shall not be sent, or go out of the Boundaries of the Hospital on any Account, without your Knowledge and Permission.

If any of the Boys under your Care shall attain to the Age of Fourteen Years, and shall be suitably forward in their Learning, you shall assign them some Employment for a Portion of the customary Holidays and Leisure-Days, to wean them, by Degrees, from a childish Fondness for Play, and to prepare them the better for

entering into Business.

You shall go with the Children to hear Divine Service at the Parish Church every Sunday Morning and Asternoon; giving them frequent Caution to behave there orderly and reverently; and you shall take all possible Care that they behave with good Manners at all other Times, and carry themselves respectfully to all Persons whomfoever: And if any shall not conform in all respects to your Instruction, they shall receive due Correction at your Hand.

You shall keep a Book, in which you shall enter Memorandums of all the Repairs done at the various Buildings belonging to the Hospital's several Nurseries, and an Account of the Number of Persons actually employed in doing such Repairs; and you shall occasionally see that the Workmen so employed do not waste their Time; that you may be the better enabled to sign the Tradesmen's and Workmen's Bills when any such Works have been done.

You shall also frequently visit the several Nurses Houses, and inspect the Bread, Meat, Beer, and other Sustenance provided for the Children; and take Care that each Child has a sufficient Allowance; and these Visits are not to be made in Rotation, and to a certain Number of Houses, but indiscriminately, and to various Numbers at different Times; that none of the

Nurses may know when to expect you.

And whereas it is against the long established Custom, and express Rule of the Hospital, to permit three Children to sleep in one Bed, you shall divide the Children equally amongst the several Nurses, as far as every two of them can be accommodated with a clean, comfortable Bed; and if any of the Nurses shall have a greater Number of such Beds than others, such Nurses shall have the Advantage of an extra Number of Children until those who are found deficient shall be better provided.

And when any Child is absent from School on Account of Illness or Lameness, you shall

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cause one of your Ushers to leave Notice thereof at the Infirmary, for the Surgeon and Apothecary, that he may give Direction concerning, and

take proper Care of, fuch Child.

You shall keep an exact Account of the Names and Ages of all the Boys fent to the Buildings at Hertford; the Times of their coming and removal; and how many are with each Nurse; and also the Names of the Girls in the Care of their feveral Nurses: And once in fix or feven Weeks, or oftener, if it shall be found necessary, you shall make, or cause to be made, a fair Account of what shall be due to each Nurse for the Board and Care of her several Children, agreeable to the stated weekly Allowance for each Child; and you shall regularly transmit the same to the Counting-House in London, that it may be speedily discharged.

You shall cause the Play Grounds to be kept clean and free from Damp and Litter; and give Direction for all necessary Repairs to be done to the Tyling and Windows of all the Buildings; and if any material Repair, or any Alteration shall be wanting, you shall acquaint the Trea-

furer by Writing.

And you shall not farm any Land, or engage in any other Business which may lessen your Attention to the Instruction of the Children, or interfere with your Care of them in any

Respect.

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This Charge points out some of the principal Duties of your Office, which you are hereby enjoined to perform; and it is also earnestly recommended to you to promote the Welfare of the Children committed to your Care by every other Means in your Power.

#### ORDERS for the MASTER of the GRAM-MAR SCHOOL.\*

YOU shall enter into your School immediately after Seven o'Clock every Morning in the Summer, and Eight o'Clock in the Winter, and attend there until Eleven; and from One in the Afternoon until Five o'Clock in Summer, and Four in Winter; except Thursdays from Three o'Clock, Saturdays in the Afternoon, and the usual general Holidays.

And whereas an excellent Form of Prayer was antiently appointed by the Right Reverend Father in God Henry Compton, then Lord Bishop of London, for the Use of the Children of this Hospital, you shall cause that Part of the same Form of Prayer which is suited to the Time of Day and the Place, to be read in your School

Morning and Evening.

You shall receive into your School all such of the Hospital Children as shall be appointed thereto by the Committee of Almoners, the Governors present upon any of the Visitations, or by the Treasurer; so as that your whole Number does not exceed three-eighth Parts of the Number of Boys at Hertford; and shall instruct and complete the same Children in the spelling and reading of English, and in the Knowledge of English grammatically. And, when any of them shall be so completed in English, you shall instruct them in the Rudiments of the Latin Tongue, and ad-

vance them in the Knowledge of that Language, and of the Greek, to the utmost of your Power

during their Continuance under your Care.

You shall, from time to time, select about thirty Boys of your School, and send them two Hours in every Day, Saturdays excepted, to the Writing-School, to be instructed until they shall be capable to write Exercises; and you shall, on or near every Quarter-Day, withdraw such as can write a legible Hand, and send others, who cannot write, in their Places.

You shall take Care that none of the Boys abfent themselves from School without special Cause; and when any are permitted to go out of Necessity, you shall employ such Means as you shall think best to know that they return in due Time.

You shall permit the Children to keep Holidays at the Seasons and for the Spaces following:

At Easter, Eleven Days, including Sundays;

At Whitsuntide, a Week;

At Bartholomew-tide, Three Weeks;

At Christmas, Fifteen Days, including Sundays: Besides such other Saints' Days and Holidays as

have been customarily kept.

The Boys under your Care shall be arranged in Forms or Classes, and advanced according to their Progress; and out of the most forward Boys you may, if you think proper, appoint some to assist the younger and more backward.

You shall daily observe the Appearance and Apparel of the Children, and see that the Nurses send them to School neat and clean in all respects;

and

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and as often as any of the Boys at Hertford shall fall under your Observation out of School-Hours, you shall see that they behave with good Manners, and carry themselves respectfully to all Perfons whomsoever.

And when any Child is absent from School on account of Illness or Lameness, you shall send his Name to the Infirmary for the Surgeon and Apothecary, that he may give Directions concerning, and take proper Care of, such Child.

And you shall not farm any Land, or enter into any other Engagement which may lessen your Attention to the Instruction of the Children, or interfere with your Care of them in any

Respect.

This Charge points out some of the principal Duties of your Office, which you are hereby enjoined to perform; and it is also earnestly recommended to you to promote the Welfare of the Children committed to your Gare by every other Means in your Power.

#### The CATECHISER'S CHARGE.\*

YOUR Charge is, three Times in a Week, except the Holidays, carefully to instruct and teach the poor Children of this Hospital at Hertford, in the fundamental Points of the Christian Religion, according to the Catechism of the Church of England; that is to say, on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, from Eleven to Twelve o'Clock.

You shall take Care so to instruct all the said Children, that they may be ready at all Times to give an Account of the said sundamental Points of the Christian Religion without Book, to any

who shall demand the same.

And you shall, at all convenient Times, visit the Children in their several Houses, and see that they behave there in a decent and orderly Manner; and as often as they fall under your Observation at other Times, you shall take Care that they behave with good Manners, and carry themselves respectfully to all Persons whomsoever.

And you are not only hereby enjoined to perform these several Duties; but it is also earnestly recommended to you to promote the Good of the Children of Christ's-Hospital by every other Means in your

Power.

### NURSES of the BOYS.

WHEREAS you are permitted to refide in one of the Houses in the Buildings belonging to Christ's-Hospital, at Hertford, for the express Purpose of receiving into the said House as many of the Boys of the said Hospital as the Governors thereof shall think sit to commit to your Care; you are to employ your whole Time in a motherly and kind Attention to the Comfort and Welsare of the said Children: carefully avoiding all Railing, Scolding, and every Kind of Immorality; and not permitting the Children to play at Cards, or any other improper or hurtful Games.

And if at any Time hereafter the Governors shall disapprove of your Conduct as a Nurse, and shall give you Notice to quit the said House, you shall do so, peaceably and quietly, within three Months after you have received such Notice; that so excellent a Work as Christ's-Hospital may not receive any Interruption by your Means.

You shall submit to all such Orders as have been, or shall from time to time be devised by the Governors, and to such Directions as shall at any Time be given by the Master of the Writing School, for the good Management of the Children committed to your Care.

You shall see that the Children go to Bed clean washed; and that they be not out of their Rooms after Eight at Night from Lady-Day to Michael-

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mas, or after Seven at Night from Michaelmas to

Lady-Day.

You shall comb and cleanse all your Children's Heads three Times every Week in Winter, and oftener in Summer; wash their Necks once in seven Days; and see that their Feet be washed once in every Month; and at such Times you shall carefully inspect if any of them have the Itch; and, if you have any Doubt about the Clearness of any Child, you shall present him as soon as possible to the Surgeon and Apothecary for his Direction: And you shall keep every Part of the Childrens' Apparel and Bedding whole and clean, that they may go to their respective Schools perfectly decent every Day; without any Trouble to their Masters to remind you of your Duty in that respect.

You shall provide sufficient sweet and wholefome Diet for the Children, to the Satisfaction of the Writing Master and the Surgeon and

Apothecary.

You shall take Care that all the Children be sent to School by Seven o'Clock in the Morning in the Summer, and by Eight in the Winter Season; and that no Boy absent himself without Leave of his Master; and if you detain any Child on account of Sickness, Lameness, or Accident, you shall give Notice thereof to the proper Master of such Child; and shall be vigilant that he may be seen by the Surgeon and Apothecary as soon as possible.

You shall see that the Children are covered in their Beds before you go to Rest, to prevent their

taking Cold.

You shall, after the Children are gone to Bed, employ yourself in mending their Wearing Apparel, or in other necessary Employments for their Benefit.

You shall constantly attend Divine Service with the Boys every Sunday at the Parish Church, Morning and Afternoon, unless prevented by Illness, or assigning to the Writing Master good Cause for your Absence.

You shall not lodge or entertain any Child except the said Boys, or any other Person, save such as may be necessary to assist you in the Care

of them.

You shall not be absent from your House a fingle Day or Night without Permission from the

Writing Master.

This Charge points out some of the principal Duties of your Office, which you are hereby strictly enjoined to perform; and to be at all Times so circumspect in your general Conduct that it may be a fair and prositable Example to the Children committed to your Care; and you are not to concern yourself with any other Person's Office; but seeing any Thing amiss, you shall acquaint the Writing Master therewith, and take no further Concern therein.

# The CHARGE of the UPPER GIRLS' SCHOOL-MISTRESS.

YOU shall be constantly in the School from Seven to Eleven in the Morning, and from One to Five in the Afternoon in Summer; and from Eight to Eleven in the Morning, and from One to Four in the Afternoon in the Winter Season; Thursdays from Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, Saturdays in the Afternoon, and the

usual Holidays, only excepted.

And whereas an excellent Form of Prayer was antiently appointed by the Right Reverend Father in God, Henry Compton, then Lord Bishop of London, for the Use of the Children of this Hospital, you shall cause that Part of the same Form of Prayer which is suited to the Time of Day, and to the Place, to be read in the School every Morning and Evening; and you shall attend Divine Service with the Girls on Sundays at the Parish Church every Morning and Afternoon, unless prevented by Illness, or having other just Cause of Absence.

You shall, three Times in every Week, except the Holidays, carefully instruct all the Girls in the sundamental Points of the Christian Religion, according to the Catechism of the Church of England; that is to say, on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, at the Hour which will least interfere with the other Branches of their Learning;

and

and you shall make it your earnest Endeavour that the Children may be ready, at all Times, to give an Account of the said fundamental Points without Book.

You shall, to the best of your Power, teach the Girls who shall from time to time be under your Care, to read English well; and to work so as that they may be able to make up all the Linen worn or used by the Children of this Hospital in Town and Country; and, with the Assistance of the Under-Mistress, you shall take Care that the same Needle-work be continued

to be done under the usual Direction.

You shall superintend the whole of the Girls' School, and be accountable for the Conduct of it, as well as for the good Management and Behaviour of the Nurses; and you shall see that the Children are properly attended and suitably employed at all times; and that the said Nurses keep them clean, and provide wholesome Bedding and Provision for them; reporting to the Treasurer of the Hospital any Person you may deem negligent, or who may have disregarded your Authority.

And whereas you have an ample Allowance from the Hospital for the express Purpose of keeping a Servant; you shall take special Care that no Girl be sent, or on any Pretence permitted to go, out of the Buildings into the Town, or elsewhere, unless when they go to Church, or walk for the Air, with yourself, the Under Mistress, or their respective Nurses; and you

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shall also take Care, to the utmost of your Power, that the Children behave with good Manners at all Times, and carry themselves respectfully to all Persons whomsoever.

And when any Child shall be absent from School on account of Sickness or Lameness, you shall send Notice thereof, with the Child's Name, to the Infirmary for the Surgeon and Apothecary, that he may give Directions concerning, and take proper Care of, the said Child.

You shall permit all the Girls to keep Holi-days at the Seasons and for the Spaces follow-

ing:

At Easter, Eleven Days, including Sundays;

At Whitfuntide, a Week;

At Bartholomew-tide, Three Weeks;

At Christmas, Fifteen Days, including Sundays? Besides such other Saints' Days and Holidays as

have been customarily kept.

This Charge points out some of the principal Duties of your Office, which you are hereby enjoined to perform; and it is also earnestly recommended to you to promote the Welfare of the Children committed to your Care by every other Means in your Power.

# The CHARGE of the UNDER GIRLS' SCHOOL-MISTRESS.

YOU shall be constantly in the School from Seven to Eleven in the Morning, and from One to Five in the Afternoon in Summer; and from Eight to Eleven in the Morning, and from One to Four in the Afternoon, in the Winter Season; Thursdays from Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, Saturdays in the Afternoon, and the usual general Holidays, only excepted.

You shall be present at Prayers in the School every Morning and Evening, and attend Divine Service with the Girls on Sundays at the Parish Church every Morning and Asternoon, unless prevented by Illness, or having other just Cause of Absence, to be assigned to the Upper Mis-

tress.

You shall, to the best of your Power, assist the Upper-Mistress, in teaching such of the Girls as she shall appoint to be under your Care, to read; and to work Plain-work, so as to qualify them to make up the Linen for the Children of

this Hospital in Town and Country.

You shall not send any of the Children on Errands into the Town; and if you know of any being sent, or permitted to go, out of the said Buildings, on any Pretence whatsoever, you shall immediately acquaint the Upper Mistress thereof; taking Care to the utmost of your Power, that the Children behave at all Times with good Man-

ners, and carry themselves respectfully to all Per-

And when any Child shall be absent from School on account of Sickness or Lameness, you shall send Notice thereof, with the Child's Name, to the Infirmary, for the Surgeon and Apothecary, that he may give Directions concerning, and take proper Care of, the said Child.

This Charge points out some of the principal Duties of your Office, which you are hereby enjoined to perform; and it is also earnestly recommended to you to promote the Welfare of the Children committed to your Care by every other Means in your Power.

#### The WRITING MASTER to the GIRLS.\*

YOU shall attend daily in the Girls' School belonging to this Hospital from Eleven to Twelve o'Clock, Saturday excepted, instructing all the Girls who are above Eleven Years of Age in Writing and Arithmetick.

You shall, as the Children advance in Arithmetick, furnish them with the necessary Tables, and see that they learn them in reasonable Time.

And if any of the Children shall be so idle or careless, as that you cannot reform them by Admonition or Shame, you shall give their Names and an Account of their Negligence, or other Misbehaviour, to the Upper School-Mistress.

### NURSES of the GIRLS.+

Where AS you are permitted to reside in one of the Houses in the Buildings belonging to Christ's-Hospital, at Hertford, for the express Purpose of receiving into the said House as many of the Girls of the said Hospital as the Governors thereof shall think sit to commit to your Care; you are to employ your whole Time in a motherly and kind Attention to the Comfort and Welfare of the said Children; carefully avoiding all Railing, Scolding, and every Kind of Immorality; and not permitting the Children to play at Cards, or any other improper or hurtful Games.

And if at any Time hereafter the Governors shall disapprove of your Conduct as a Nurse, and shall give you Notice to quit the said House, you shall do so, peaceably and quietly, within three Months after you have received such Notice; that so excellent a Work as Christ's-Hospital may not receive any Interruption by your Means.

You shall submit to all such Orders as have been, or shall from time to time be devised by the Governors, and to such Directions as shall at any Time be given you by the Upper Mistress for the good Management of the Children committed to your Care.

You shall see that the Children go to Bed clean washed; and that they be not out of their Rooms after Eight at Night from Lady-Day to Michael-

mas, or after Seven at Night from Michaelma to

Lady-Day.

You shall comb and cleanse all your Childrens' Heads three Times every Week in Winter, and oftener in Summer; wash their Necks once in seven Days; and see that their Feet be washed once in every Month; and at such Times you shall carefully inspect if any of them have the Itch; and, if you have any Doubt about the Clearness of any Child, you shall present her as soon as possible to the Surgeon and Apothecary for his Direction: And you shall keep every Part of the Childrens' Apparel and Bedding whole and clean, that they may go to their School perfectly decent every Day; without any Trouble to the Upper Mistress to remind you of your Duty in that respect.

You shall provide sufficient sweet and wholefome Diet for the Children, to the Satisfaction of the Upper Mistress and the Surgeon and

Apothecary.

You shall take Care that all the Children be sent to School by Seven o'Clock in the Morning in the Summer, and by Eight in the Winter Season; and that no Girl absent herself without Leave of the Upper Mistress; and if you detain any Child on account of Sickness, Lameness, or Accident, you shall give Notice thereof to the Mistress of such Child; and shall be vigilant that she may be seen by the Surgeon and Apothecary as soon as possible.

You shall see that the Children are covered in their Beds before you go to Rest, to prevent their

taking Cold.

You shall, after the Children are gone to Bed, employ yourself in mending their Wearing Apparel, or in other necessary Employments for their Benefit.

You shall constantly attend Divine Service with the Girls every Sunday at the Parish Church, Morning and Afternoon, unless prevented by Illness, or assigning to the Upper Mistress good Cause for your Absence.

You shall not lodge or entertain any Child except the said Girls, or any other Person, save such as may be necessary to assist you in the Care

of them.

You shall not be absent from your House a fingle Day or Night without Permission from the

Upper Mistress.

This Charge points out some of the principal Duties of your Office, which you are hereby strictly enjoined to perform; and to be at all Times so circumspect in your general Conduct that it may be a fair and profitable Example to the Children committed to your Care: and you are not to concern yourself with any other Person's Office; but seeing any Thing amiss, you shall acquaint the Upper Mistress therewith, and take no further Concern therein.
