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



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

An univerfal cold fweat, accompanied by faintnefs, was followed by a benumbing cold, that feized my hands and feet, (although in a warm parlour) and was approaching to my knees, when they trembled under me, and I was no longer fupportable by those who held me, but defired to return to my bed. All politions were alike intolerable, and I began to think of a diffolution. In this extremity, my fon (late your happy patient in London) came to the bedfide, and afked me what I thought of the Fever Drops; now I had no feverifh fymptoms that I knew of, and in my confternation had forgot the madness of yesterday, and therefore answered that I could not look upon my cafe as coming within the prescription of that medicine; but he replied, that if a cold was the caufe, the Drops might be a cure. A poor industrious woman, the unhappy wife of a wretch who is gone a privateering, caught the fpotted fever, by adventuring to affift a house full of fick, which every one else had abandoned. She was herfelf an invalid at the time, never having been her own woman, as fhe faid, fince (two years ago) the underwent a courfe of mercurials for a bad diftemper received from her hufband, which had left her fubject to pains in the bowels and limbs, with a complication of diforders; in this flate the received the infection, the putrefcent fymptoms were accordingly very rapid; but what increased the danger and mifery of this poor woman, cathartic medicines had been given her, which had brought on a black flux ; and now the Doctor was fo certain of her death, that he cautioned those about her, not to let the body remain long unburied, &c. And thus the patient lay in a close-ground apartment, very ill attended, and under every difadvantageous circumstance; when a well-disposed person, who had already fent her two small bottles of your Fever Drops, withed me to call and fee her, as a perfon lying ill fimply of a fever, which I did; but when those about her had told me the particulars above-mentioned, I despaired of her recovery. Newburn, North Carolina.

HY favour, with a box of Fever Drops, I received by means of our Friend Eye, about 16 last 12mo. A child of mine, about fix years of age, from being warm at play, and afterwards remaining inactive in the cold, with his bofom open, was feized with a dreadful malady which feems to want a name in this country, though very common to children, and which in Scotland is called the Croup. We were called up in the middle of the night with an account that the child was very bad in his throat. Being in the next room, I could hear but too plainly the fame noife, in his breathing and attempting to cough, that attended another child of mine, who died about 16 years ago of a fimilar complaint, long before I had the happines of knowing any thing of your Drops, but which I am confident, had they been present, would have faved him also. 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
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
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
