Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for the year 1970 containing information required by the Department of Health and Social Security.

Since the report relates to the year prior to my appointment, it is based mainly on statistics and the reports of the Public Health Inspectors. I should like to thank them and my predecessor, Dr. Parfit, for their information and co-operation.

The estimated mid-year population of the Combined Districts was 72,780, or 1,240 more than in 1969, the greatest increase being in Abingdon Borough where the figure rose by 750.

There were 1,152 births in the Combined Districts or 40 more than in 1969. The birth rate rose slightly from last year's figure of 14.9 to 15.2 per thousand population, a figure below that of England and Wales which was 16.0.

565 deaths were recorded, an increase of 18 on the previous year. The death rate fell to 9.4 per thousand population and this figure is well below the national average of 11.7. There were 21 infant deaths; the infant mortality rate was 18 per thousand, the same as the national figure.

52% of the total deaths were attributed to diseases of the heart and circulation (including strokes), 27% to ischaemic heart disease (coronary thrombosis) alone, and 22% to cancer (malignant neoplasms).

Deaths from cancer of the lung rose from 19 in 1969 to 31 in 1970. Perhaps it would be appropriate here to remind people that cigarette smoking accounts for nearly all the lung cancer deaths, now 30,000 a year in England and Wales, as well as many of the deaths due to bronchitis and coronary thrombosis. Some 80,000 premature deaths a year from these three causes are believed to be due to cigarette smoking.

In general the statistical rates for the three Districts compare favourably with those of England and Wales. It must be remembered, however, that these rates are based on small numbers, vary considerably from year to year, and only indicate trends. The national rates are based on a population of nearly fifty million and are much more statistically significant, showing less variation from year to year.

HOUSING CONSTRUCTION

The number of new houses completed during the year was 338 consisting of 105 Council properties and 233 by private persons.

The above additional Council houses brought the number erected since the war to 1998 and with the 583 pre-war houses makes a total of 2581 (including those purchased) leaving 2563 dwellings for lettings.

The rent of pre-war, including rates ranged from £2. 17s. 4d. (£2.87) to £3. 19s. 0d. (£3.95) for a 48 week year. Rents for post-war houses ranged from £2. 17s. 4d. (£2.87) for a bed sitter to £5. 0s. 6d. (£5.03) for a four bedroom house.

The number of applicants for Council houses at 31st December, 1970, was 282. This was 156 less than at the end of 1969.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The standard of effluent has not been entirely maintained within the Royal Commission Standards. At the higher winter river flows the plant is unable to cope with the load placed on it.

MAIN PUMP STATION

The flow metering devices are not satisfactory; the venturii chamber has still to be enclosed.

WATER

Water is supplied by the Oxfordshire and District Water Board. Regular sampling is carried out by the Board and by Officers of the Borough.

During the year water was adequate in quantity and generally satisfactory in quality.

MORTUARY

The new Mortuary was opened in April 1970. It has improved P.M. examination facilities and a larger capacity.

There were 167 admissions to the Mortuary in 1970, 144 involving Post Mortem examinations. The figures for 1969 were 175 and 172 respectively.

TEMPORARY DWELLINGS

The 16 bungalows at Tubney are still in use and continue to serve a useful purpose.

IMPROVEMENTS

A survey under the Housing Act, 1969 of all the dwellings in the District was commenced in 1969 and completed during the year under review. Approximately 10,500 houses were checked and a little more than 350 were found to require follow-up action. Obviously a survey of so many houses undertaken in a relatively short time resulted in access being denied to some and the final number requiring further action may prove to be a little higher than the 350 quoted above. In many cases, however, only wash hand basins and hot water systems are required. Applications for grants showed a 50% increase over 1969.

The wells samples were all of the shallow type and must always be regarded with suspicion. In the event of unsatisfactory results being obtained, occupiers are advised to boil all water intended for domestic purposes and, where appropriate, owners are encouraged to connect to the main supply or carry out suitable treatment.

The Oxfordshire and District Water Board report that bacteriological samples were taken regularly and in almost every case proved satisfactory. The Thames Valley Water Board report that routine samples collected from the area during 1970 indicate that the supply is of a high standard of purity. The natural fluoride content being recorded as less than 0.1 mgms/litre.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

(a) Refuse Collection

The "kerbside" system of refuse collection has continued throughout the year. The fleet of vehicles has been increased and now consists of 3 - 50 cu. yd. Pakamatic vehicles and 2 - 35 cu. yd. vehicles. One of the latter is normally held as a reserve vehicle. In addition a four ton lorry is used for special collections. The total labour force consists of 9 loaders, 5 drivers and a foreman.

(b) Refuse Disposal

Controlled tipping took place at Frilford Heath during the early part of the year and $3\frac{1}{2}$ acres were reclaimed and handed back to the owners. During the remainder of the year tipping reverted to privately owned gravel pits at Radley but due to Planning restrictions and the risk of river pollution, an alternative tipping site is being sought.

(c) Litter

Approximately 150 litter bins continue to be sited throughout the District at bus stops, outside shops, etc. These are in addition to a few large capacity precast concrete bins.

(d) Civic Amenities Act, 1967

242 special collections were made during the year. These are free of charge and follow requests from householders. This number, however, must be related to the fact that 11 large containers of 6 cu. yd. capacity were in use throughout the year and were emptied on 1,111 occasions at a cost to the Council of £3,333.

Although fulfilling a need these containers have created their own problems. Some of the sites around the containers become dumping grounds for litter and rubbish of all descriptions, and these abuses have proved to be very difficult to control. It may become necessary to give serious consideration to withdrawing the bins from the more isolated sites.

During the year 54 abandoned or unwanted cars were disposed of under the provisions of the Civic Amenities Act. The arrangement whereby a local car breaker removes them free of charge at the Council's request continues satisfactorily.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

Fyfield and Tubney Main Drainage

The first two phases of the Fyfield and Tubney main drainage scheme i.e. the laying of sewers in the village of Frilford, Fyfield and Tubney and extensions to the Appleton Sewage Disposal Works, were completed by the end of the year. Tenders amounting to £170,000 for a fourth phase comprising sludge pressing plant at Appleton were accepted in November. It is intended that, on completion of this, sludge will be conveyed from other works for treatment at Appleton. This will eliminate the nuisance of smell from drying sludge and the difficulty of dealing with sludge in wet weather.

Sugworth Lane, Radley.

The constructional work on the pumping station and sewer serving 33 properties in Sugworth Lane, Radley was completed during the year.

Dropshort, Sutton Courtenay.

A tender in the sum of £17,000 for the construction of sewers, pumping station and rising main to serve the 29 properties in the Dropshort area of Sutton Courtenay was accepted in October and work commenced in December.

Main Drainage of Other Areas.

Schemes in draft form for main drainage to serve : -

- (a) Cothill - 24 dwellings and Boys Preparatory School.
- (b) Boars Hill - 120 dwellings and two halls of residence.

Each of these will be discharged into disposal works which are already overloaded and the Council's Consultant Engineers are negotiating with the Department of the Environment with regard to alternative proposals for relieving these works.

DRAINAGE

Of the total of 313 visits made during the year, 227 concerned septic tanks. Most of these were for a survey of the Boars Hill/Hinksey Hill areas in connection with the proposed main drainage scheme. For many years houses in this locality have experienced drainage problems and the survey revealed that 67 systems (56%) were unsatisfactory. Many of the remainder have systems which disappear into thickley wooded land and probably terminate at watercourses and ditches (which are known to be polluted) at lower levels. The area has a mainly clay subsoil and the results of the survey were not entirely unexpected. A report was submitted to the Council with a recommendation that the proposed main drainage scheme be given priority.

ATMOSPHERIC POLLUTION & SMOKE CONTROL

Two notifications were received under section 3 of the Clean Air Act, 1956, for the installation of new furnaces.

There were no serious difficulties during the year concerning this aspect of work and the total number of visits was 32.

DISINFESTATIONS

It was necessary for only 9 visits to be made by Public Health Inspectors to premises concerning complaints of vermin.

RODENT CONTROL

This work continues to be carried out by a rodent officer and an operator engaged jointly by the R.D.C. and Abingdon Borough.

During the year 5,040 visits to premises in the District were made of which 140 were agricultural. 540 premises were found to be infested.

SCRAP METAL DEALERS

There were 10 scrap metal dealers registered at the end of the year.

ANIMAL BOARDING ESTABLISHMENTS

Arrangements whereby a local veterinary surgeon carries out inspections on behalf of the Council of premises used for boarding dogs and cats continues and at the end of the year 3 licences were in force.

AGRICULTURE (SAFETY, HEALTH & WELFARE PROVISIONS) ACT, 1956

No serious difficulties were encountered concerning sanitary conveniences on farms.

6 visits were made and it was not necessary to serve any notices.

DISEASES OF ANIMALS (WASTE FOOD) ORDER 1957

Two premises continue to be licenced under the provisions of the above Order and during the year 11 visits were made and satisfactory conditions were maintained.

NOISE ABATEMENT ACT, 1960

14 complaints of noise were received during the year resulting in 22 visits.

Sources of nuisance included use of unmuffled pneumatic drills, pile driving and the use of a scaffolding store at weekends. This latter complaint was resolved when the firm concerned moved to alternative premises.

PETROLEUM (REGULATION) ACTS, 1928 & 1936

A total of 65 premises were licenced for the storage of petroleum all of which were visited at least once during the year.

138 inspections were made to enforce various provisions of the above Acts and no serious difficulties occurred.

HAIRDRESSERS

14 premises were registered under Section 129 of the Berkshire County Council Act, 1953 as barbers and hairdressers. In enforcing Byelaws made under the Act, 6 visits were made.

MILK AND DAIRIES

The Berkshire County Council is the licencing Authority for retailers of milk and 14 premises were licenced at the end of the year. However, regard is paid to hygiene requirements of the Milk and Dairies Regulations when shops are visited for other purposes.

Bacteriological sampling is carried out by the Department and during the year 38 samples were procured, 19 from schools and 17 from dealers and 2 from other sources. All but 5 were satisfactory.

ICE CREAM

130 samples of ice cream were procured during the year from 65 different premises including at least one from every premises registered under the Food and Drugs Act.

RENTS

Maximum rents, which are based on the gross value for rating purposes, are now calculated on a 50 week basis.

They range in the case of pre-war houses from £1.15.0d. to £2. 3. 3d. and for post war houses from £1. 17. 10d. to £3. 18. 4d. Tenants however receive rebates which may amount to 10/10d. for pre-war and 11/6d. for post-war houses.

These rebates may reduce rents to minimum figures between £1. 4. 11d. and £1. 12. 5d. for pre-war houses and between £1. 8. 5d. and £3. 1. 3d. for post-war houses.

Rents for the 22 flats in the Council's aged amenity block is £3. 12. 10d. inclusive of central heating, hot water and rates. There is a resident Warden and residents have the use of certain communal facilities.

CARAVAN SITES AND CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT ACT, 1969.

One caravan site for 40 caravans and four individual caravans were licensed during the year. The table below shows the distribution. Four exempted sites were notified under paragraph (5) of the first schedule of the act: one in Charney Bassett, one in Faringdon, one in Uffington, one in Littleworth.

REFUSE COLLECTION

The refuse collection, which is weekly and from the kerb-side, was maintained throughout the year. Bins are carried for the aged and infirm.

Two compression type vehicles and one Fore and Aft tipping machine are used for this service.

A special trade waste collection is carried out for which a charge is made. Bulky items of household refuse are collected free of charge.

Disposal is by tipping in a sand pit at Stanford which is also used by Wantage R.D.C. for part of their refuse. One man is employed on the refuse pit and a tracked bulldozer is in constant use.

WATER SUPPLY

The Oxfordshire and District Water Board supply water throughout the area excepting the parish of Kingston Lisle which is supplied by the Thames Valley Water Board. The quantity and quality was satisfactory during the year and routine sampling is carried out by the Water Authority.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

Progress was made for providing main drainage to the villages of Shellingford and Littleworth and the schemes were approved by the Department of the Environment. A scheme was prepared for the extension of the sewerage system at Faringdon to drain a large development area to the north of the town.

In addition extensive field work was carried out at Shrivenham for the replacement of the existing sewerage system by new foul and surface water sewers.

RODENT CONTROL

Rodent control is carried out by the Council's Chargehand who devotes roughly a quarter of his time to this service.

Generally premises are treated with Warfarin mixed in a maize meal base.

Sewer testing was carried out in Faringdon, Stanford-in-the-Vale, Shrivenham and Watchfield.

MEAT

The only slaughterhouse in the district is in Faringdon and this has continued to operate during the year. It supplies local retail trade.
