To the Chairman and Members of the Adwick-le-Street
Urban District Council,

Lady and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting my Annual Report on the Health of the District for the year 1939. The Report has been compiled on the lines indicated in the Ministry of Health Circular No 1961, and at the request of the Ministry as a means of economy, it has been typewritten.

The delay in submitting the Report is due to the non arrival of the vital statistics for the Area until October 1940. Circular 1961 requested that these statistics be available before the Annual Report was completed.

The health of the inhabitants of the District continues to be satisfactory as shown by the vital statistics. The Birth Rate has risen from 18.99 to 19.52 and the corrected Death Rate is 13.46 as compared with 14.7 in 1938.

I commenced duties as your Medical Officer of Health in June 1939, three months before the outbreak of War. As instructed by the Ministry of Health, my duties as Casualty Officer (Air Raid Precautions Casualty Service) had to be given first consideration and the outbreak of War meant that most of my time had to be given to these duties.

I would take the opportunity of thanking the Chairman of the Council, the Councillors and Officials for the welcome I received and for the help and support I have received since taking over duties here. My thanks are due to the Officials of this Council for some of the information contained in this Report and particularly to the Sanitary Inspector and the Health Department Staff for their help and co-operation during the year.

To obviate delay in receiving results of Diphtheria swabs the service was extended and arrangements made with the laboratory at the Doncaster Royal Infirmary to examine Diphtheria swabs from Medical Practitioners in the area and these swabs are examined at a cost of 1/6d. each.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

I. WATER SUPPLY.

The area is supplied with water obtained in bulk from the Doncaster and Tickhill Joint Water Board. The supply continues to be satisfactory being of good quality, constant and sufficient and there are 4493 houses on the public water supply.

During the year a new 4" cast-iron water supply main was laid in Paxton Avenue, Carcroft.

All employees at the Reservoir have had their blood examined and all showed a negative Widal reaction.

The examination shows that this water is satisfactory according to the standard recommended by the Ministry of Health.

II. RIVERS AND STREAMS.

The Mill Stream and the Ea Beck both flow through the district and the final effluent of the Adwick-le-Street U.D.C. Sewage Works is deposited into the Mill Stream.

III. DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

I am indebted to the Surveyor for the following notes on drainage and sewerage:-

Work in connection with the new surface water drain from Mill Lane to the Great North Road was completed during the year. A new surface water drain is required on Classified Road B.1220 to obviate the discharge of surface water from Doncaster Lane on to the adjoining Small-holdings. A scheme has been approved and will be completed early in 1940.

A 9" sewer was extended from Hobcroft Terrace to Poplar Road, Skellow and new property erected connected thereto. The sewer in Windmill Balk Lane, Woodlands, will be extended so that the foul drain from the Percy Jackson Grammar School can be connected to it and so prevent flooding of the cellars in the school. It will be advisable in the near future to relay the sewer from Church Lane under the railway to the bottom of Mill Lane, Adwick-le-Street, as this sewer is not functioning properly. Settlement has given the sewer a backfall.

The final effluent from the Sewage Works is satisfactory.

There are 10 Living Vans on a site situated in Askern Road.

An inspection of all houses in the area was made and a report submitted to the Health and Housing Committee asking that steps should be taken to deal with a number of houses in the district as unfit for human habitation.

An estimate of the number of houses required to re-house possibly displaced persons and overcrowded families was made and a deputation visited the Ministry of Health regarding the Housing programme. Unfortunately under the present emergency no steps can be taken to deal with these unfit houses.

The Clearance Areas at East View, South View and Church Lane had all the tenants re-housed - 15 houses in all - the majority of them going into Council Houses. Precautions were taken against vermin.

No statutory action was required under the Milk and Dairies Order, 1926.

MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

There are five licensed slaughter-houses in the district and during the year 778 inspections were made and 2,823 carcasses were inspected. Meat condemned during the year amounted to 6,625 lbs. or 2 tons 19 cwts. 1 stone 3 lbs. In addition to this 305 tins of food, 1 box of kippers and 10 rabbits were found to be unsound and were destroyed.

There are six bakehouses in the district and all are kept in good condition.

To the Chairman and Members of the Urban District
Council of Adwick-le-Street.

Lady and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting to you my
Annual Report for the year 1939.

The year under review has been characterised
by changes both with regard to the duties and the personnel of the
Department and this of course has reflected upon the year's work.

During the earlier part of the year the
County Council asked you to make certain appointments with regard
to Air Raid Precautions. As a result of this request I was
appointed Ambulance Officer and Assistant Casualty Officer.
Further representations were made by the Home Office and by the
County Council requesting you so to arrange business that for a
period of three months priority be given to Civil Defence matters
over other business and to ensure that all responsible officers
of the authority were instructed accordingly. These
representations were also agreed to and as a result Civil Defence
matters received primary consideration for a period of three
months.

Later in the year war was declared and for
a time Civil Defence matters received the sole consideration of
the department.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, Sanitary
matters have not been neglected - every effort has been made to
deal with urgent matters. The results of these efforts are
tabulated in the following report.

There have been a number of changes in the
personnel of the department during the year.

Dr. Dunne left the service of the Council
on 31st March, 1939, after a long and honoured career as your
Medical Officer of Health. He was succeeded by Dr. J. Ferguson.
My relations with both these gentlemen have been of the
happiest nature.

Miss M. Anderson left the department
during June and her place was taken by Miss M. Wheeldon.

The Public Health Department as a separate
department is something new so far as this district is concerned.
Some progress has been made during the past two years,
notwithstanding the amount of time being devoted to Air Raid
Precautions, Billeting and other similar matters. However, so far
as my side of the department is concerned, further improvements
are necessary so that the work can be even more fully developed.

I do not propose to go into this question in detail or to pursue it any further at this juncture; the time is not opportune, but I do consider it advisable that the question should be noted and raised later at a more favourable opportunity.

Finally, I would like to pay tribute to the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee and the Council for their active co-operation during a particularly troubled time.

EXAMINATION OF MILK FOR PRESENCE OF TUBERCULOSIS.

During the year 132 samples of milk have been taken and examined for tuberculosis. Nine samples were found to be tuberculous, this represents 6.818%.

When a sample of milk is found to be tuberculous the Veterinary Staff of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries make investigation at the farm from which the milk was obtained.

BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATION OF MILK.

(a) PASTEURISED MILK.

The Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936 prescribes that pasteurised milk must not contain more than 100,000 bacteria per millilitre before delivery to the consumer.

During the year 14 samples of pasteurised milk were taken before delivery to the consumer and submitted for bacteriological examination. I have set out below the result of each examination:-

In addition to being examined bacteriologically all the foregoing samples of Pasteurised Milk were also submitted to the 'Phosphatase Test'. This test is supplementary to the test for bacterial content as prescribed by the Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936, and indicates whether or not pasteurisation of the milk has been efficiently performed. It is not a condition of the licence that pasteurised milk must pass the 'Phosphatase Test'.

In two cases only the milk failed to pass the 'Phosphatase Test'. In each case the persons concerned were made aware of the result of the test, the pasteurisation plants were inspected, further milk samples were taken and found to be in order.

(b) TUBERCULIN TESTED MILK.

Four samples of Tuberculin Tested milk have been taken and tested. All four were satisfactory.

Two samples of ordinary milk were taken and submitted to the Methylene blue test. Both these samples did not satisfy the test for Accredited Milk.

MARKETS.

73 visits to Markets have been made during the year. During these visits 799 meat stalls and 772 stalls from which food other than meat is sold have been inspected.

The use of the markets has been considerably diminished since the war commenced but will probably be revived during the Spring and Summer seasons.

I would again like to call attention to the unpaved condition of the site of Carcroft Market and also the lack of suitable and sufficient sanitary conveniences for the use of the people attending the Market.

SMOKE ABATEMENT.

Three smoke observations were taken during 1939. On one occasion black smoke was found to be emitted in excess of the bye-law limit. The matter was taken up with the firm concerned and a considerable improvement effected.

BAKEHOUSES.

There are six bakehouses in the District and during the year 13 inspections have been made.

BED BUGS.

Two Council houses were treated with Hydrogen Cyanide by a specialist firm of contractors, for bed bugs.

In addition to the above, houses in clearance areas have been treated with an insecticidal fluid (Zaldecide) before re-housing the tenants in Council houses. In connection with re-housing tenants of houses in clearance areas, it was found necessary on one occasion to treat the household effects with Hydrogen Cyanide and this was also carried out by a firm of specialist contractors.

Where privately owned houses have been found infested with vermin the owner and occupier have been informed and subsequent treatment on orthodox lines has been applied in each case, e.g. stripping of wallpaper, releasing skirting boards, picture rails and architrave and spraying with an insecticidal fluid and fumigation.
