LADIES AND GENTLEMEN.

I have the honour to present to you my report of the work done and conditions in the three sanitary districts for the year ending December 31st, 1957.

The Report is, as always, drawn up on the lines recommended by the Minister of Health on whose instructions and to whom these reports are made. The Report is again a joint one, as this has been found to be most valuable, but too much stress should not be laid upon individual figures.

There was no Maternal Death in any of the districts during 1957. The Infant Mortality in Alderley Edge was nil as last year, and this offsets the rather high Mortalities during the previous years.

The statistics of all three districts are comparable with those of similar residential districts in other parts of the country. In 1956 attention was drawn to the number of deaths from cancer. In 1957 there is a reduction in the number of deaths in both Cheadle and Gatley and Wilmslow in spite of the increase in population.

The reports of the Public Health Inspectors are given after my Report and continue to show satisfactory conditions. Special attention has been given during the year to work on the preparation and handling of food stuffs.

I thank all the Public Health staff and also the Clerks, Treasurers and Surveyors of the various Councils for their cooperation. I much appreciate the help of the members of the various Health Committees.

SECTION B. GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

(a) Staff.

A list of staff is given at the beginning of the Report.

Duties :-

The Medical Officer of Health is restricted from private practice and is Medical Officer of Health for the three districts, which also form the area covered by the Cheadle and Wilmslow Divisional Health Committee and by the Executive Committee for Education of the Cheshire County Council; the Medical Officer of Health being Divisional Medical Officer to both these Committees.

Public Health Inspectors.

In Alderley Edge the Public Health Inspector who is also Rodent Officer is part-time, but employed solely by the Authority. This arrangement has been found to work satisfactorily.

In Cheadle and Gatley the Senior Public Health Inspector is also Rodent Officer, Hackney Carriage Inspector and Inspector under the Petroleum Acts. There are two additional Public Health Inspectors.

In Wilmslow, the Senior Public Health Inspector is also Rodent Officer, is responsible for the removal and disposal of house refuse, and is Inspector under the Petroleum Acts. There is also an additional Public Health Inspector.

(b) Laboratory Facilities.

The Regional Public Health Laboratory at Monsall carries out the greater part of the work for this area. A collection service is available at Sharston Ambulance Station from Monday to Friday. A small amount of work is still dealt with by the Pathological Department of the Stockport and Buxton Hospital Management Committee.

The examinations done at the Public Health Laboratories are for the ascertainment and control of infectious diseases and the examination of foods bacteriologically.

(c) Hospitals.

There are in the district three Hospitals, one is Barnes Hospital, which is a subsidiary to the Manchester Royal Infirmary; Cheadle Royal Hospital which is for the reception of mental cases and is an excepted Hospital, although there are a number of National Health service beds; and Alderley Edge Cottage Hospital which comes under the Macclesfield & District Hospital Management Committee.

SECTION C.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

(a) Water Supply.

I am indebted to Mr. T. Dearden, the Water Engineer at Stockport for the following information:

- (1) The water supply of the area and of its several parts has been satisfactory (a) in quality (b) in quantity.
- (2) Bacteriological examinations were made monthly of the raw water and weekly of the treated water going into supply, the results being satisfactory. Chemical analyses were made monthly of the raw and treated water going into supply, the results being satisfactory.
- (3) The water is chemically treated to prevent plumbo-solvent action, with satisfactory results. The chemical analyses are dealt with in (2) above.
- (4) The water is stored in impounding reservoirs, treated by mechanical filtration plant and subsequently chlorinated.

With reference to the water supply in Wilmslow, when it is necessary to use boreholes the water is mixed with water from the upland surfaces supplies and this will continue to be done until a softening plant is available at these works.

(b) Drainage and Sewerage.

Alderley Edge—With reference to the Joint Sewage Disposal Works between Alderley Edge and Wilmslow, approval in principle has been obtained from the Minister but the necessary authority to commence the work has not yet been obtained.

Cheadle and Gatley—The Cheadle Hulme outfall sewer completed in 1957 has relieved the surcharging of the sewers and made provision for the considerable development in the area. Work has also been carried out on the Councillor Lane area surface water drainage.

Detials of Samples Reported against.

No samples were reported against in either Alderley Edge or Wilmslow.

In Cheadle, two samples of milk were found to be genuine but abnormal. One sample of Jersey milk was found to be 2.5% deficient in milk fat and the Producer was cautioned. Two samples of Pork sausage were found to contain undeclared sulphur-dioxide perservative. The samples were informal and formal from the same seller who was prosecuted and fined £2.0.0 and £2.10.0 costs.

Other samples reported against were Quinine Compound Tablets. The Tablets themselves were found to correspond to the declaration on the label, but the statement on the label, i.e., "Rapid Quinine Compound Tablets kill 'flu' and cold germs" was misleading and not in accordance with scientific knowledge. This was old stock and the Manufacturers, when cautioned, replied that the matter had already received attention and they enclosed a new (and satisfactory) label which they were now using.

There is one registered factory in the area to which the Act applies and this factory has been inspected.

RODENT CONTROL.

One trained part-time operative is employed and he uses methods approved by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries. The infestations were, with one exception, chiefly of a minor character.

The Council receive a 50% grant of approved expenditure from the Ministry.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

During the year considerable work has been carried out by the Council's Rodent Operative. A free service is available to the occupiers of all dwelling houses, and the occupiers of business premises are always anxious to co-operate in giving the Operative free access to examine and treat the premises—if found necessary. All business premises pay for these treatments, and large works are dealt with under annual agreements.

The sewerage system in the district has remained particularly free from infestation. Whenever extensions to the sewers have been made on new housing estates tests have been carried out with a view to checking as to whether infestation of the sewers could take place from the surface, or, alternatively, if surface infestation was taking place from the sewers. In all cases the results have been negative.

There were no serious cases of major infestation of either rats or mice in any part of the district.

Disinfestation:

Several properties have been treated for the elimination of minor pests such as fleas and cockroaches. In each case commercial preparations were used and were found to be effective.

In addition to the above there have been numerous cases reported of wasps nests in the vicinity of houses, and these have been neutralised and removed successfully by the Council's Pests Officers.

As regards the last item in the above table, food hawkers have been registered under the Cheshire County Council Act 1953. There are various types, ranging from greengrocery to fishmongers and butchers. Food hawkers who have shops in the area do not come within the provisions of this Act.

Frequent inspections are made at the food premises listed above including hawkers vehicles. There have been no difficulties up to the present in asking the proprietors to comply with the Food Hygiene Regulations.

There are no Clean Food Guilds in the area, but from time to time if informative circulars etc., have been received from the Ministry, information of use to the retailers has been extracted from these circulars and distributed to the shop managers.

Ice Cream (Heat Treatment) Regulations:

It will be noted that there are forty registered ice cream dealers in the area. There are, of course, others who come into the district. Of the forty, two are manufacturers, the remaining thirty-eight purchasing their commodities from well-known national manufacturers. Six samples of ice cream were taken during the year, all of which came within Group I.

Milk & Dairies Orders:

Attached hereto is a table setting out the number of samples of milk procured during the year, and the results obtained. As this area is now within a specified area only pasteurised, sterilised, tuberculin tested, and certified milk may be sold in this district. There are three pasteurising establishments, and they are all well kept.

To the Chairman and Members of the Wilmslow Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I present herewith my Annual Report on the work carried out by your Public Health Inspectors for the year 1957.

The statistical information required by the Minister of Health is contained in the body of the report and there is no need for me to enlarge on the observations I have already made under the various headings.

In recent years there has been a steady increase in the amount of new and amending legislation which has added to the duties of the Public Health Department. With the coming into force of the Clean Air Act 1956, on the 31st December, 1956, and the Rent Act 1957 in July last, the year 1957 was no exception. Under the Clean Air Act, 1956 local authorities have been given greater powers to combat the smoke menace both in industrial and residential areas. A feature of the new Act is the power to make smoke control areas in residential districts, and preliminary steps have already been taken by the Council to obtain the approval of the Minister to the establishment of smoke control areas at two new estates which are to be erected at Handforth. The provisions of the Act which enable Councils to take action against the emission of dark smoke from any premises, including dwelling houses, do not come into operation until June 1958.

The Rent Act 1957 deals mainly with the revision of rents of controlled houses and the release from control of certain properties. These matters are not the direct concern of my department, but the revision of rents has caused a sudden increase in the number of applications for Certificates of Disrepair which have had to be investigated. In the last three months of 1957, 15 applications were received and notices issued, after the applications had been checked and the properties inspected.

There has been no change in the staff during the year and once again I should like to express my appreciation of the co-operation given by my staff and other officers during this period.

HOUSING.

Progress in connection with the Council's Slum Clearance Programme almost came to a stand still because of the pressure of other duties. One Demolition Order and two Closing Orders were made in respect of the following individual unfit houses, namely:—

"Brix", Morley Green, Morley, Wilmslow. No. 61 Manchester Road, Wilmslow. No. 2 Mill Brow, Wilmslow.

During the year two houses, (Nos. 34 and 36 Church Road, Handforth) were demolished as the result of Demolition Orders made the previous year.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS.

The Oversley Ford camping site was re-licensed in December 1957 for a further period of 5 years and the number of caravans which may be stationed on this site at any one time was increased from 35 to 45.

With regard to a number of individual caravans sited in various parts of the district for residential purposes, steps are being taken under Town Planning legislation to reduce their numbers. Under the Public Health Act, 1936, nine licences were issued permitting individual vans on isolated sites to be used for residential purposes for short periods. No complaints were received in respect of any of these dwellings during the year.

INSPECTION OF MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

Meat Inspection:

There is one licensed private slaughterhouse in the district which is situated at Morley Green, Wilmslow.

In order to maintain 100% inspection of all carcases slaughtered at these premises, one Inspector has to devote a considerable part of his time to this important branch of the work.

The number of cattle, sheep and pigs slaughtered at Morley totalled 4,961 compared with 2,505 in 1956. The increase is largely accounted for by the slaughter of 2,364 sheep compared with only 15 the previous year but the number of cattle killed also increased over the previous year by 148.

The Ministry of Health ask for a tabular statement of meat inspected, to be given in the form set out in Circular 17/55, and this is re-produced herewith giving the required details:—

Five of the 9 unsatisfactory samples were taken from the same farm which is situated outside the Urban District. The matter was reported to the County Milk Production Officer who investigated the cause and made certain recommendations, particularly with regard to the sterilisation of bottles. Subsequent samples proved to be satisfactory.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Collection

The average number of collections of refuse made from each house in 1957 was 47. An additional "Paxit" Refuse Collection Vehicle was put into service in May 1957. Apart from a driver, no extra men were employed as the refuse collectors to man this

vehicle were obtained by reducing the size of the gangs on the other vehicles. Better results were obtained by the use of the extra vehicle and smaller gangs while a full establishment could be maintained, but with the size of the gangs at the minimum, collections soon fell behind during periods of holidays, sickness and the shortage of staff for other reasons.

During December a 22-year old side-loading refuse freighter was taken off the road and scrapped. It will be replaced by a new vehicle early in 1958.

Disposal

A Bulldozer was put into use in July 1957 to deal with all house and trade refuse which is disposed of by tipping on land owned by the Council at Newgate. By the use of this equipment it was possible to save labour and the condition and appearance of the refuse tip were considerably improved.

The reclamation of salvage from the house refuse was continued and the amounts of the various materials separated and sold were as follows:—
