

To the Chairmen and Members of the Alderley Edge, Cheadle and Gatley, and Wilmslow Urban District Councils.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my annual report for the year 1960, and in doing so have ventured to express a personal opinion on some aspects of community health.

Coronary thrombosis, by far the commonest single cause of death, and lung cancer continued to take a relentless toll of life and it is sad to reflect that accidental deaths were more numerous than in previous years. These tendencies are likely to continue unless the habits of sedentary living, over eating and tobacco smoking are eschewed by the individual, and a sense of personal responsibility replaces complacency with regard to hazards in the home and on the roads.

There were no reported complications in the notified cases of measles, scarlet fever and whooping cough, and although a trouble-some outbreak of dysentery occurred during the summer the usual measures of control proved effective. The few sporadic cases of food poisoning and paratyphoid fever were fortunately mild and it was not possible to trace courses of infection in these cases.

Food premises were found to be generally of a satisfactory standard and proprietors and managers have been anxious to cooperate with the Health Department in effecting improvements and eliminating potential sources of food contamination. There is however still room for improvement in the personal habits of some individual food handlers—a matter more for the conscience and enlightenment of the individual than the enforcement of regulations.

The work of inspection and control regarding the various aspects of environmental hygiene continued unabated under the diligent supervision of the Senior Public Health Inspectors, due emphasis being placed on the value of informal advice and discussion rather than arbitrary enforcement of regulations.

I readily acknowledge the assistance of all members of the staff, the Clerks of the three authorities and other chief officials.

It is also a pleasure to record my appreciation of the support of the Public Health Committees at all times.

The above table shows a striking preponderence of deaths from cardio-vascular disease and cancer which perhaps is understandable having regard to the large proportion of people reaching advancing years when the incidence of these diseases is highest. Coronary thrombosis however has again shown a disturbingly high incidence among those in the prime of life, the youngest victim being in the late thirties. The growing incidence of this disease is a matter of considerable concern and there is much evidence to show that the chief predisposing factors in its genesis are overindulgence in food, lack of exercise and tobacco smoking—habits which have become only too prevalent in an affluent society.

Lung cancer has also claimed several individuals in the forties and fifties and is not by any means essentially a disease of old age. The evidence in support of cigarette smoking being a factor in the cause of this disease is overwhelming.

Fatal accidents in this area have contributed to the grim national picture. The local record over the past seven years is as follows:-

In contrast to the foregoing sombre picture, Tuberculosis, which claimed no fewer than 20 deaths in 1920 when the local population was but a fraction of what it is today, barely earns a place in the mortality table for 1960.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES (cont.)

The notified cases of dysentery were all of the "Sonne" type, a usually mild if troublesome disease. The comparatively large number in Alderley Edge represents an explosive outbreak which occurred during the summer term amongst pupils attending the local primary school. Investigations at the school and school canteen failed to reveal a source of infection, and it was presumed that the infection was introduced from outside by one of the pupils. Actions was undertaken to exclude those affected and to investigate their home contacts. Other cases in Cheadle and Gatley and Wilmslow were sporadic, and responded to the usual methods of treatment and control. Sonne Dysentery is generally such a mild disease that no doubt substantial numbers of cases in the community do not reach the notice of a doctor. These patients are an important factor in the spread of the disease.

There was a further decline in the incidence of TUBERCU-LOSIS and one looks forward to the time when this disease will be completely eradicated. Nowadays all cases of tuberculosis can be regarded as being of human origin, milk borne infection with the bovine bacillus having been virtually eliminated by modern conditions of milk production and the widespread practice of pasteurisation. It is essential however to continue to fight against tuberculosis by pursuing the various methods of contact tracing and case finding together with B.C.G. Vaccination. Modern chemotherapy is effective in all but the most advanced forms of the disease.

The isolated cases of Food Poisoning and Paratyphoid Fever which occurred in the Cheadle and Gatley Urban District again underline the need for a high standard of personal hygiene amongst those engaged in the preparation and sale of food to be maintained at all times. It is not sufficient that food premises alone conform to the required standards.

There were no cases of Diphtheria or of paralytic Poliomyelitis. Prophylaxis against these diseases is freely available and indeed must be continued so as to maintain the highest possible level of immunity throughout the population.

HOUSING

During the year five houses were condemned as unfit and occupants were being rehoused into existing Council Houses.

Negotiations for planning consent and for the acquistion of a site were started with a view to the provision of housing accommodation for further action under the Housing Acts.

During the year all food premises were routinely inspected under the Provisions of the Food Hygiene Regulations. All actions taken under the Regulations were of an informal nature.

(2) Food Surrendered and Condemned

During the year two articles of food were condemned as unfit giving a total of 4 lbs. in weight.

(3) There are ten registered dealers in Ice Cream, one manufactures his own for sale at his premises, the remainder sell well-known products made by various national firms.

Twelve samples were taken and submitted to the Laboratory for examination and their bacteriological examination indicated that ten were Grade 1 and two were in Grade II, this being very satisfactory.

MILK AND DAIRIES

During the year, The Milk Special Designations Regulations, 1960 came into force on the 18th October, 1960.

These Regulations gave the Food and Drugs Authority of the area the powers of granting licences to dealers. The Food and Drugs Authority in this area is the Cheshire County Council.

During the year 24 samples were taken for Laboratory Examination and were submitted for Phosphatase Test, Turbidity Test and Methylene Blue Reduction Test, all the samples were satisfactory under test.

Four Raw (T.T.) Milks were submitted for animal innoculation test and no evidence of Tuberculin infection was found in any of the samples.

RAG FLOCK

There is one Registered factory in the area to which the Act applies and this factory has been inspected.

RODENT CONTROL

One trained part-time operative is employed and he uses methods approved by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries. Domestic dwellings are treated free of charge, but a charge is made for treatment of business premises.

There is now no special grant by the Ministry towards the expenditure created by the work of inspection and disinfestation.

All houses in the Area are supplied from the Stockport Corporation mains, except a small-holding which has water hand-pumped from a well.

REFUSE COLLECTION

The Refuse Disposal is by controlled tipping on a site at "Tanyard Farm", Chelford Road. A weekly collection is maintained.

SALVAGE

60 tons 8\frac{1}{4} cwts. of salvage were sold during the year giving an income to the Authority of £392.13.1.

PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR'S REPORT FOR 1960

I have the honour to present my annual report on the work of the Public Health Inspectors for the year 1960.

This report is drawn up on the basis of the recommendations of Circular 1160, issued by the Ministry of Health, as to the information to be supplied in the annual reports.

Of the four Clearance Areas submitted to the Ministry during 1959 thirty of the houses were purchased by the Council by agreement Three others belonging to one owner were demolished. The remaining four were made the subject of a Clearance Order and, at the subsequent enquiry the Council were successful in having the Order confirmed. During the year under review four further Orders have been submitted to the Ministry, embracing twenty-two houses, but no further decision has been arrived at up to the present.

Considerable progress has been made in surveys under the Clean Air Act. One area covering 807 acres in the South west part of Heald Green Ward and part of Cheadle Hulme South Ward has been made the subject of an order, and submitted to the Ministry for confirmation. Preliminary approval has been given to two further areas covering an acreage of 3,164.

I desire to express my thanks to Mr. Riley and Mr. Hill, and other members of the Council's staff for the help and co-operation received from them during the year.

Clean Air Act 1956

For the pupose of carrying out the detailed surveys required before a Smoke Control Order can be made the Council employed two technical Assistants to help in this work. The number of visits and re-visits made by these two Officers, and the regular staff, amounted to more than 8,000. This was mainly due to the fact that a large proportion of the residents in this district are out at work all day, and this resulted in appointments having to be made during the evenings and on Saturday mornings. However, generally speaking the staff have been well received, and the majority of the house-holders are welcoming the scheme wholeheartedly.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act 1949

During the year considerable work has been carried out by the Council's Rodent Control Operative. A free service is available to the occupiers of all dwelling houses, and the occupiers of business premises are always anxious to co-operate in giving the Operative free access to examine and treat the premises—if found necessary. All business premises pay for these treatments, and large works are dealt with under annual agreements.

The sewerage system in the district has remained particularly free from infestation. Whenever extensions to the sewers have been made on new housing estates tests have been carried out with a view to checking as to whether infestation of the sewers could take place from the surface, or, alternatively, if surface infestation was taking place from the sewers. In all cases the results have been negative.

There were no serious cases of major infestation of either rats or mice in any part of the district.

Disinfestation

During the year several properties were treated for the elimination of minor pests such as fleas, cockroaches, wasps and hornets nests. The normal insecticidal sprays were successful in getting rid of these pests. There was one serious case of infestation by bugs, and the house was treated with hydrocyanic gas.

As regards the last item in the above table, food hawkers have been registered under the Cheshire County Council Act 1953. There are various types, ranging from greengrocery to fishmongers and butchers. Food hawkers who have shops in the area do not come within the provisions of this act.

Frequent inspections are made at the food premises listed above including hawkers' vehicles. There have been no difficulties up to the present in asking the proprietors to comply with the Food

Hygiene Regulations.

There are no Clean Food Guilds in the area, but from time to time if informative circulars etc, have been received from the Ministry, information of use to the retailers has been extracted from these circulars and distributed to the shop managers.

Milk and Dairies Orders:

Attached hereto is a table setting out the number of samples of milk procured during the year, and the results obtained. As this area is now within a specified area only pasteurised, sterilised and tuberculin tested milk may be sold in this district. There are two pasteurising establishments, and they are both well kept.

There have been no special cases requiring the examination of particular stocks or bulk consignments.

Slaughterhouse Work:

The following statistics are a record of the numbers of animals slaughtered and inspected in the area, with the items condemned. The slaughterhouses in the area have been well maintained and kept in a clean condition. Generally speaking the quality of the animals slaughtered in the district is very high.

Slaughterhouses Act:

During the year the Council submitted a report on the present slaughtering facilities, with a review of future requirements, as laid down in Section III Sub-Section (1) of the Act of 1958. This report was duly published and submitted to the Ministry for approval.

The report set out provisionally that two of the slaughterhouses in use could be made to comply with the Act and that two others could not. The final decision on the matter had not been received by the end of the year.

Water Supply:

During the year there was a considerable improvement in the water supply from the statutory authority, but complaints were still being received regarding the discolouration of the water in several parts of the district. This was found to be caused mainly by manganese of iron, due to the fluctuation in the flow of water and pressures in the mains. Flushing of the mains by the statutory authority appeared to relieve the trouble.

Hairdressers and Barbers:

Under the Cheshire County Council Act the business, or profession of a hairdresser or barber is subject to registration, and, during the year, the Council adopted byelaws which were approved by the ministry, controlling this particular type of business. The number actually on the register for this district is 43.

HOUSING

One house only (The Cottage, Morley Green) was made the subject of an individual Demolition Order during 1960.

Nine families, however, were rehoused—eight by the Council and one privately—from unfit houses which have been made the subjects of Demolition Orders, prior to 1960.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS

The Oversley Ford camping ground is the only licensed site in the district and the maximum number of caravans permitted at any one time is 45.

Under the Public Health Act, 1936, two licenses were issued during 1960 permitting individual vans on isolated sites to be used for residential purposes for short periods.

In future, caravans will be controlled by the Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960, which came into operation on the 29th of August, 1960, and no further licences for this type of dwelling will be issued under the Public Health Act, 1936.

INSPECTION OF MEAT AND OTHER FOODS

Slaughterhouses:

The report on slaughtering facilities as required by Section 3 of the Slaughterhouses Act, 1958, was submitted to the Minsistry in April, 1960, and the appointed day has been fixed as the 1st July, 1961, when all slaughterhouses in the area must comply with the Construction Regulations. There is no public slaughterhouse in the area and only one private slaughterhouse.

WATER SUPPLY

The quality of Wilmslow's main water which is supplied by Stockport Corporation gave rise to many complaints during the year. Unlike the previous year, there was no shortage of water during 1960, but more complaints of discolouration and the presence of sediment were received than in the previous year.

Three samples of mains water taken from different premises were submitted for both chemical and bacteriological examination, and the Analyst's report showed that the water was not unfit for drinking purposes. It was obvious, however, from samples provided by complainants that from time to time the quality of the water was not suitable for all domestic purposes, particularly laundering. The Council are fully aware of these complaints, and very active measures are being taken by them, which it is hoped will result in a satisfactory supply being provided at all times and for all purposes.

Premises not provided with main supply

The number of houses not connected to a main supply was reduced by 3 during 1960, but there are still 14 premises where the only source of supply is a well. These premises are situated in the following areas:-


