2. **Quality** - All water is treated by chloramine process, although raw water is of high standard of purity.

4. All dwelling houses with the solitary exception of one cottage are supplied with the water.
5. Plumbo-solvency - Water supplied has no action on lead.

Of the 67 samples of Pasteurised Milk taken, 66 proved satisfactory, one failed to satisfy the count test only.

During the year, 25 samples of ordinary milk were obtained and submitted for bacteriological examination with the following results:-

- 12 samples equal to "Accredited" Standard
- 9 samples with less than 200,000 organisms per ml.
- 4 samples with more than 500,000 organisms per ml.

Of four of the above samples, B. Coli was present in 1/100th ml. but absent in 1/1,000th ml. and 8 samples contained B. Coli in 1/1,000th ml.
