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INTERIM ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1940.

Whilst the area of the Alnwick Urban District remains the same, the population is fluctuating oving to the addition of evacuees, and at times non-civiliand, whilst many of the normal inhabitants have been removed from the district for various reasons. There has, however, been no illness in the district attributable to deficiencies in the sevage or water systems, whilst the general health of the district has been very good. Nine persons were admitted to the Fever Hospital during the year, five of these being from the Rural District and four from the Urban District. Of the cases from the Urban District three were Scarlet Fever and one was Diphtheria. Apart from Measles there were no epidenics during the year, and no exceptional administrative neasures were taken or recommended. Live Births totalled 96 (49 males and 47 females). Still Births n 6 (5 males and 1 fenale). There were seven deaths in infants under one year of age (all legitimate).

Deaths from all causes numbered 106.

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Medical Officer's Interim Report for 1939.

The Area of the District remains the same as in 1938. The population has been fluctuating since the outbreak of war, owing to the addition to the population of a considerable number of evacuees, and for a time, some non-civilians. Despite these additions to the population, the general health of the District has been good, and there has been no illness attributable either to the Water Supply or Sewage. No exceptional administrative measures were taken or recommended by the M.O.H.during the year. A certain number of cases of Scables and Impetigo were imported into the District with the influx of evacuees, but these cases were dealt with at the Smallpox Hospital.

From November 1st. Measles and Whooping Cough became notifyable diseases.
