General Statistics.

The area of the District remains the same at 4,778 acres. The number of inhabited houses is 2,337.

Of the new houses completed during the year, 62 were with state assistance and nine by private enterprise.

The rateable value is £44,025.

The sum represented by a penny rate is £174.

The population is estimated at 7,302 and this figure is taken as a basis in calculating the birth, and death rates.

Vital Statistics.

Births:
The number of births-corrected for inward and outward transferswas 131 of which 61 were males and 70 females. Four of these were
still-births and two were illegitimate.

The number of deaths corrected for inward and outward transfers - was 87, of which 41 were males and 46 females.

Tuberculosis:

Three cases of Pulmonary and one case of other Tubercular Diseases were notified during the year.

Local Health Service.

The Ambulance, nursing and Domestic Health Services are under the control of the County Council and are quite satisfactory. A child welfare centre and Dental Clinic is established in the Urban District.

Sanitary Circumstances.

Water Supply:
Despite the year being one of the driest on record an adequate supply was maintained although it was necessary to impose minor restrictions on the use of water by the public for certain purposes. A piped supply is available to the great majority of the houses in the district. The proposed new water scheme at the Senna Wells is progressing satisfactorily, trial boreholes have been sunk to ascertain the geological formation of the area. An artesian supply was obtained from one of these boreholes to augment the present yield of the wells.

Drainage and Sewarage:
The scheme for the new Sewage Disposal Works is still in course of preparation. It has been found necessary to amend the original scheme to treat the discharge from a creamery proposed to be erected on the area.

Meat and Food Inspection:
All meat is inspected by the Meat Inspector at the Slaughter houses.
All shops and ice cream dealers were regularly inspected and any food found unfit was condemned and disposed of.

Disinfestation:

The Sewers and Refuse Tip were regularly treated for Rodent Control by trained personnel of the Council. All surface infestations were quickly dealt with.
