To the Chairman and Members of the Alnwick Urban District Council

The report for the year 1967 includes the period covered by my predecessor who left to take up a position in general practice and subsequently by myself when I took up my appointment on 1st. July. The initial period has been one of getting to know first people and places and secondly detail. This latter is inevitably a slow and continuing process particularly in an extensive area with a scattered population.

The report is presented in its accustomed form and contains information on the vital statistics for the District and also on the sanitary circumstances which are included in the report of the Public Health Inspector.

Vital Statistics

There were 90 births compared with 113 in 1966 and the reduction was almost entirely accounted for by fewer female births. The crude birth rate was 12.0 live births per thousand population and the adjusted rate was 13.4 per thousand, the area comparability factor for births being 1.12. These rates compare with ones of 14.9 and 16.7 respectively in the District in 1966 and of 17.2 in England and Wales in 1967.

Total deaths numbered 89 compared with 86 in 1966. The crude death rate was 11.9 per thousand population and the adjusted 13.2 per thousand, the area comparability factor for deaths being 1.11. These rates compare with ones of 11.4 and 12.4 respectively in the District in 1966 and of 11.2 in England and Wales in 1967. Causes of death showed no abnormal distribution, the predominant factors being heart and vascular disease and malignant conditions. There was one infant death compared with three in the previous year. The infant mortality rate was 11.1 infant deaths per thousand live births as opposed to 26.5 per thousand in 1966 and a national rate in 1967 of 18.3 per thousand. There were no maternal deaths. Infectious Diseases

The measles epidemic which affected the District late in 1966 continued into the early months of 1967 and 156 cases were notified.

No new cases of tuberculosis occurred but there was one death in an elderly man who had not previously been notified as suffering from this disease.

Immunisation

The statistics for the area are shown in a modified table - by disease instead of by form of injection. The number of immunisations carried out in young children have been related to the number of births ... in 1967. The percentages shown are a reasonable index of the acceptance rates and can be considered to be very satisfactory.

Sanitary Circumstances

These are detailed by Mr. Moralee in his report. He has commented on the disappointing number of applications for improvement grants, three standard and two discretionary, which record the lowest yearly total since the inception of the scheme. There are still eleven houses that have only a stand-pipe water supply. The survey of housing on Alnwick Moor show that there are, in that area alone, 27 houses which are lacking in some basic amenities or which have only a limited life unless remedial action is taken.

GENERAL STATISTICS

The area of the district was 4,778 acres.

The number of inhabited houses was 2,450 and the number of new houses completed during the year was 13.

The rateable value was£252,300 and the sum represented by a penny rate was £952.

(b) GENERAL

Excellent progress was made by Messrs. R. Bowey & Son, Ltd., on the clayport South West Area where 37 housing units are being constructed to the Parker Morris standards. These units comprise:-

5 two bedroom maisonettes
3 three bedroom maisonettes
25 one bedroom flats
4 bed sitting rooms
32 garages are also being constructed.

At the end of the year site works were 80% complete, drainage 90% complete and the garages completed.

Work progressed on the Shepherds Rest Housing Site, now known as Chapel Lands, and at the end of the year 1? private houses were completed and occupied. These comprise three bedroom type houses, and in addition fourteen three bedroom houses and six two bedroom bungalows were under construction. A total of 60 private houses are to be constructed on this estate by Messrs. R. Carse & Sons, Ltd.

Tenders were invited for the erection of 6 bungalows, wardens house and offices together with the improvement of 10 existing flats at Augur Flats. The tender of Messrs. R. Carse & Sons, Ltd., was accepted.

Inspections were made of houses on Alnwick Moor, and a report submitted of conditions found. Houses were classified into four categories as follows:-

Class 1 Houses fit in all respects and which includes houses improved by grant aid. Total No. 24

Class 11 Fit houses, but lacking some of the standard amenities Total No. 13 Class111 Houses with estimated life of 5/10 years unless action taken to improve Total No. 14

Class 1V Houses considered unfit and not repairable at reasonable cost Total No. 17

A meeting was arranged with members of the Freemen's Council to discuss the report and the future housing policy of the Moor. It was decided that 'Notice of Time and Place' be served on all owners of Class 1V property with a view to obtaining demolition of these houses.

The number of applications for Improvement Grants was again disappointing and was the lowest on record, other than for the year 1961, since Standard Grants came into operation.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES

There are two private slaughterhouses in the district. 19 slaughtering licences were issued to slaughtermen. Refuse from the slaughterhouses is removed by the Council twice weekly. The fixed charge of 30/- per week was increased to £2 2s. -1. per week as from 1st July, to cover increased costs.

Under the Meat Inspections Regulations a total sum of £105 15s. -d. was paid by the butchers for meat inspection, as against a total of £98 9s. 3d. for the previous year. 100% inspection of all carcases was again achieved which necessitated 234 visits to slaughterhouses.

No cysticereosis was found, and localised tuberculosis was found only in one pigs head.

RODENT CONTROL

The Prevention of Damage by Pests Act 1949, imposes on a Local Authority the duty of keeping its district free from rats and mice, and for this purpose a part time rodent operator is employed for approximately 20/22 hours per week.

All treatments are given free of charge.

There was a small increase in the number of notifications, but all notifications were minor infestations, the big majority where an odd rat had been seen.

All building sites were inspected and two treatments were carried out

for rat infestation. In both cases uneaten sandwiches and food had been discarded by workmen.

One sewer treatment was carried out and two manholes were found to be infested.
