#### 1969

#### To the Chairman and Members of the Alnwick Urban District Council

<u>Vital Statistics</u> There were 106 births in the District in 1969 compared with 97 in 1968 and although this shows an increase the adjusted birth rate remains below that for England and Wales. In the past ten years the national birth rate rose to a peak in 1964 and progressively declined thereafter. Similar changes occurred in the rates in Alnwick but prior to 1964 the yearly rates were higher than the national ones whilst since 1964 the rates have been lower. This presents a comparable pattern but with greater swings.

The sex ratio (the number of boys born compared to the number of girls) was 108/100 in 1969 and this is marginally above the national ratio. In Alnwick in the preceding ten years there had been 613 male births and 549 female births - a ratio of 112/100. Nationally there are now more males than females in all age groups up to 40 years of age. Until recent years the reverse was the case and there had always been an excess of females as a result of male infant mortality and war. It is interesting to speculate what bearing this reversal may have in the causation of increased violence and crime.

The estimate of the mid-year population showed an increase of 10 persons to 7,900.

Total deaths numbered 81 in 1969, one fewer than in 1968. There were no unusual causes and the commoner causes such as ischaemic heart disease and malignancies were in the expected proportions. There was one infant and no maternal deaths.

Immunisation The acceptance rates for primary immunisation of infants were slightly lower than in 1968 and cannot be considered altogether satisfactory. These rates are below the national ones. It is surprising that there should be a big drop in the proportion of infants vaccinated against poliomyelitis - 72% in 1968 but only 47% in 1969. This vaccine is easily given by mouth, causes no bodily disturbance, and offers almost certain protection. It is usually given at the same time as inoculation against diphtheria etc. Infectious Diseases The outbreak of infective hepatitis was discussed in detail in the report for 1968 which gave the position up to mid 1969. There were altogether 104 cases of the disease during the year. The first case in Alnwick was notified in August 1968 and the last in March 1970 so that the duration was eighteen months and the total number of cases notified was 121. The first case was in a woman aged 71 years and the last in a boy of 9 years. A case occurred in a residential centre for subnormal children and presented some risk of an outbreak because infective hepatitis is a particular hazard to closed communities. All other children and members of staff were given protective injections of gamma globulin and no further cases occurred.

There were no new cases of tuberculosis reported and no food poisoning. There was only one case of measles in what had been expected to be an epidemic year and the introduction of active vaccination in 1968 must have had a considerable bearing on this.

One case of meningitis occurred in an infant but the organism responsible was not one which produces epidemic disease.

Housing Listed in the report are the housing improvements made during the year and the prospective clearance of unfit housing over the next few years.

Mention must be made of the opening of the old people's housing scheme at Augur Place, with its community centre, and atribute paid to the resident warden. This has been of great benefit to the old people involved and has enabled some of them to remain in the community when it might not otherwise have been possible. As reported during the year there would appear to be a need for a further similar scheme as there are more old people in the town living alone who could benefit and, additionally, it could release larger houses for young families.

The views of old people themselves are often not heard in this matter and those expressed at a recent meeting of representatives of Over-60 Clubs in North Northumberland are of interest. These indicated that they would prefer old people's housing schemes where they could have "peace and quiet"; they would like two bedrooms (one for visitors) in early retirement and single bedroomed housing in the later seventies and eighties; they would accept that it involved two removals and would be prepared to undergo this; they would like central heating but were worried about possible increased cost; and they would prefer showers as opposed to baths.

### (b) GENERAL

#### Chapel Lands

23 private houses, comprising 16 - three bedroom houses and 7 two bedroom bungalows were completed by Messrs. R. Carse & Sons Ltd. 3 Houses were under construction at the end of the year and 57 of the 60 houses in the scheme are now occupied.

#### Augur Flats

This scheme was renamed Augur Place. The erection of 6 bungalows, wardens house and offices was completed by Messrs. R. Carse & Sons Ltd., and a warden appointed. Work on the improvement of the 10 existing houses commenced after the erection of the bungalows etc. This work entailed the provision of gas fired central heating, new kitchenette, sink unit and food store, and the provision of shower and internal W.C. Seven of these houses were completed and tenants rehoused by the end of the year.

#### Slum Clearance

Circular 92/69 (Ministry of Housing and Local Government) is concerned with the clearance of unfit houses, and the Ministry accordingly ask all local housing authorities what can and might be done to clear remaining slums, and to inform them by 31st January 1970 what their programmes for the next four years are to be.

This information was supplied and figures are shown in the statistics on previous page. Included in the number of houses to be cleared is the 50 prefabricated dwellings owned by the local authority, 25 of which are to be dealt with in 1971 and the

remainder in 1972. Also scheduled for clearance is the Dodds Lane area. It is considered that the remainder of the unfit properties can be dealth with as "individual unfit houses", other than a few houses in the Hotspur Street/ Hotspur Place area which may, after detailed inspections, be included in a clearance area.

#### WATER SUPPLY

The area is served by the Newcastle and Gateshead Water Company, who maintained a plentiful and wholesome supply throughout the year.

The service is adequate and satisfactory.

Water is obtained from the Coquet Water Board, and the Half Moon

Springs. Both supplies are filtered and chlorinated.

A new chlorine plant has been installed at the Staigs Garth pumping station

The Company readily investigate any complaints, and effect a remedy. Cottages on Alnwick Moor are supplied by the Freemens Council and this water, whilst untreated, has remained wholesome over the year.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES			

There are two private slaughterhouses in the district. 18 slaughtering licences were issued to slaughtermen. Refuse from the slaughterhouses is removed by the Council twice weekly for a sum of £2.2.0. per week.

Under the Meat Inspection Regulations a total sum of £112.14.3. was paid by the butchers for meat inspection, as against a total sum of £115.2.0. for the previous year. 100% inspection of all carcases was made and I am indebted to Mr. J.A. Rodgett, Surveyor and Public Health Inspector, Amble U.D.C., and Mr. J.A. Staig, Public Health Inspector, Alnwick R.D.C., for meat inspection duties carried out during my absence.

No cysticercosis or tuberculosis was found.

### RODENT CONTROL

The Prevention of Damage by Pests Act 1949, imposes on a Local Authority the duty of keeping its district free from rats and mice, and for this purpose a part time rodent operator is employed for approximately 20/22 hours per week.

All treatments are given free of charge.

There was a 15% reduction in the number of premises found to be infested and treated in comparison with the previous year, when a 20% reduction was reported. There were no major infestations found, practically all notifications being those of a light infestation, encouraged, no doubt, by putting out food for birds. No difficulties were encountered, other than complete clearance at the East Cawledge Park refuse tip.

One sewer treatment was carried out and 45 manholes baited. Only 2 part takes were recorded, and further baiting at both these manholes revealed no take.

#### PIGEONS

During the year 1136 feral pigeons were destroyed, 524 by trapping and 612 by shooting.

4 traps were in operation throughout the year, whilst the shooting period was confined to fourteen days. Obviously better results were obtained by shooting, but this can only be carried out in certain parts of the town with safety.

Despite the fact that 1869 pigeons have been destroyed in the last three years, there are still small flocks of pigeons roosting in some of the old delapidated buildings, such buildings are providing ideal roosting places for feral pigeons.

#### OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

#### REGISTRATION AND INSPECTION

Four new premises were registered during the year, but the total number of registered premises at the end of the year remained the same as in the previous year, due to closure of premises and persons ceasing to become employed.

New occupiers of premises made no effort to register the premises until visits were made and forms left for completion.

The increase in the number of persons employed is due to the transfer of the Post Office to the local authority for enforcement of the Act.

General Inspections have now been made to all offices, other than the Post Office, and to all retail shops, other than newly registered premises. All other premises have received General Inspections except for a few public houses where inspections have been made under the Food Hygiene (General) Regulations and no contraventions were found.

#### OPERATION OF THE GENERAL PROVISIONS OF THE ACT

The nature of the contraventions were similar to those of previous years, the most common being the absence of thermometers, abstracts of the Act, and First Aid equipment. A common defect of previous years, lack of Lighting to external water closets has been remedied by the provision of electric lighting. Additional supply of drinking water was provided in two cases where the existing supply was found in too close proximity to water closets. A general inspection carried out at a small shop comprising sales room only, revealed the lack of sanitary accommodation, and washing facilites. The room, not a food room, was clean and well lighted and ventilated, but the sole means of heating was by an offensive smelling paraffin stove. I female was employed, but this person has now been placed on part time work comprising 18 hours per week, so that registration of premises is no longer applicable. The paraffin stove has now been superceeded by an electric fire. I propose to keep a separate register of premises where persons are employed for less than 21 hours per week, as the number of such premises is increasing.

Contraventions of the Act are brought to the notice of the employers, either by interview or written notice, after which follow up visits are made.

#### ACCIDENTS

One accident was reported, and this concerned a youth, age 19 years, who whilst burning refuse in the yard of a retail multiple grocers shop, stood on a nail and injured his right foot. No further action was taken.

#### EXEMPTIONS

There were no applications received and no exemptions granted in relation to (1) space (2) temperature (3) sanitary conveniences (4) running water.

#### PROSECUTIONS

There were no prosecutions instituted.
