Deaths over 70 years of age numbered 130, of these 58 were over 80 and 6 were over 90 years of age.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.Water.

The Herriard & Lasham Water Company have have further extended their supplies into the Parish of Medstead, otherwise no alteration worthy of note has taken place during the year regarding water supplies.

Co-operation with adjoining districts and Water Companies has resulted in the formation of Mutual Support Schemes to ensure maintenance of supplies following damage to water supplies by enemy action, and arrangements have been made, regarding supplies in the event of invasion.

Drainage and Sewage.

No change has taken place during the year regarding existing or contemplated schemes.

A scheme of Mutual Support has been arranged in co-operation with adjoining authorities.

Rivers and Streams.

Routine inspections are being carried out to prevent pollution.

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Closet Accommodation.

There has been no change affecting closet accommodation throughout the district during the year.

Scavenging and Salvage.

All Scavenging Contracts, except those for the collection of night soil and a fortnightly collection of wet refuse from defined areas in one Parish, were terminated on the introduction of a system of salvage collection covering the whole district. A house to house collection of salvage is carried out once monthly throughout the whole area and fortnightly in two parishes. The Collections are carried out by the Council's own employees and vehicles.

Hop-picker's Accommodation.

Necessary routine inspections have been maintained. No special action was found to be necessary during the year.

Sanitary Inspection of the Area.

As far as circumstances have permitted routine inspections have been maintained throughout the district. Complaints have been dealt with, and abatement enforced.

Special attention has been given to drainage difficulties which naturally arose as a result of military occupation of properties and the occupation of dwellinghouses to full capacity by civilian evacuees, which led to overloading of drainage systems originally designed for a normal number of occupants.

Camping Sites.

Occupation of sites has been considerably reduced.

Government Evacuation Scheme.

The district is being used extensively for billeting of civilian evacuees both under the private arrangement scheme and for the reception of organised groups from bombed areas; London, Portsmouth, and Southampton.

Housing Acts.

Reconditioning of cottages under the Housing Rural Workers Act is proceeding.

Necessary action is being taken to record particulars of properties considered unfit for human occupation but no demolitions have been carried out during the year.

Overcrowding occasionally occurs, principally as a result of billeting under the private arrangement scheme, but abatement has been brought about, without undue delay.

Milk Supply.

Dairies and Cowsheds.

Very little change has taken place during the year regarding the number of cowkeepers and retail purveyors of milk. Routine inspections were re-introduced towards the end of the year and are continuing.

Meat and Other Roods.

Under permits, issued by the Food Officer, the release of parts of carcasses of home reared pigs for sale has led to the re-introduction of slaughtering. Necessary inspections are carried out as required for this purpose.

General Accommodation.

There has been no change affecting general accommodation throughout the district during the year.

Sanitary and Salvage.

All Sanitary Contrasts, except those for the collection of night soil and a fortnightly collection of wet refuse from defined areas in one parish, were terminated on the introduction of a system of refuse collection covering the whole district. A house to house collection of refuse is carried out once monthly throughout the whole area and fortnightly in two parishes. The collections are carried out by the Council's own employees and vehicles.

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General Notes.

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Overcrowding occasionally occurs, principally as a result of billeting under the private arrangement scheme, but abatement has been brought about, without undue delay.

Milk Supply.

Butter and Cheese.

Very little change has taken place during the year regarding the number of cowkeepers and retail purveyors of milk. Inspections were re-instituted towards the end of the year and are continuing.

Meat and Other Food.

Under permits, issued by the Food Officer, the release of parts of carcasses of hares reared with a view to the re-institution of the hunting. Necessary inspections are carried out as required for this purpose.

In connection with condemned foodstuffs co-operation with the Ministry of Food Salvage Officers has led to salvage and use of the foodstuffs for animal feeding or other purposes.

Treatment and Disposal of Foodstuffs Contaminated by Gas.

The necessary squad for this purpose has been recruited and trained and a Decontamination Station set up at Alton for the joint use by the Alton Urban and Rural Districts.

Military Billeting.

Every opportunity has been taken to co-operate with the Military Authorities regarding the suitability of sanitary arrangements in connection with the billeting of troops throughout the area.

Prevalence of and Control over Infectious and other Diseases.

No outbreak of infectious disease occurred during the year.

There were scattered cases of scarlet fever throughout the District. Prompt isolation checked any chance of an outbreak.

There were only two cases of diphtheria among children in the district and these had not been inoculated.

Between 1st July and 31st December, 1942, 951 children were innunized against diphtheria.

In some schools 100% are immunized. In the others 99% have been done.

Scabies.

189 cases were treated during the year. The patients were sent to the Isolation Hospital where treatment was kindly undertaken by members of the Red Cross Society. Patients go home on the same day and come in for a second treatment a few days later. All the bedding is stored at the Isolation Hospital, free transport being provided by the Council. These arrangements have worked satisfactorily and great credit is due to the members of the Red Cross who have assisted in this task.

Conclusion.

In conclusion I should like to add that your Chief Sanitary Inspector, Mr. A.E. Bennett, and his staff have rendered very valuable services during the year.
