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
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

Deaths over 70 years of age numbered 126—of these 61 were over 80 and 8 were over 90 years of age.

# General Provisions of Health Services for the Area:

The Public Officers are :-

- (1) Medical Officer of Health-Part time Officer.
- (2) Chief Sanitary Inspector and Building Surveyor—Wholetime Officer. He holds the Certificate of the Royal Sanitary Institute and is an Associate Member of the Institute of British Engineers.
- (3) Additional Sanitary Inspector & Assistant Building Surveyor —Whole-time Officer.

(4) Additional Sanitary Inspector — Whole-time Officer. Engaged part-time on Housing Survey.

# Sanitary Circumstances of the Area:

Water. The Wey Valley Water Company provides main supplies in the Parishes of Bentley, Binsted, Chawton, Farringdon, Froyle, Grayshott, Headley, Kingsley, Selborne and Whitehill.

Extension of main supplies by the above Company have been agreed for the Parishes of Four Marks, Newton Valence, Ropley and Worldham; also for further supplies in Parishes already served. Work on the laying of mains in the Parishes of Four Marks and Ropley commenced during the year.

The Herriard and Lasham Water Company provide main supplies in the Parishes of Bentworth, Lasham, Medstead, Shalden and Wield.

Extension of main supplies by this Company in Parishes already served have been agreed.

The Mid-Wessex Water Company provide a supply to part of the Parish of Shalden and further extensions have been agreed.

Water supplies in the Parishes of East Tisted and West Tisted are mainly from private Estate sources.

## Drainage and Sewerage.

Sewerage. The Parish of Bentley is sewered, the effluent being treated by broad-land irrigation. An extension has been constructed to serve the Council's new Housing Site.

The Temporary Housing Site at Lindford, in the Parish of Whitehill, is served by a sewer laid to discharge into the Military Treatment Works at Bordon.

Schemes have been prepared for sewering areas of the Parishes of Binsted (Rowledge), Whitehill (Greatham), Bentworth, Lasham, Selborne (village), Newton Valence, Farringdon, Ropley, Medstead, Wield, East Tisted, Shalden, Binsted (village), Binsted (Bucks Horn Oak), Chawton, also for a further extension in the Parish of Bentley. In addition, schemes are ready for the Parishes of Whitehill, Headley and Grayshot.

Drainage. There have been only minor changes affecting closet accommodation throughout the District during the year, due to the installation of individual septic tank systems.

Scavenging and Salvage. Salvage collections are made fortnightly in two Parishes, Grayshott and Whitehill, and monthly in the remainder.

Full refuse collections are undertaken in defined areas of the Parish of Whitehill. Night soil collections are made in the Parish of Grayshott, by contract, and nightsoil removal and cesspool emptying in defined areas of the Parish of Whitehill.

All collections, with the exception of the one contract mentioned above, are carried out by the Council's own vehicles and staff.

A general scheme for full refuse collection throughout the whole of the District has been approved by the Council and will be put into operation as soon as the necessary vehicles are acquired.

During the year, a purpose made "Dennis" combined cesspool and night soil vehicle was purchased and put into service in the Whitehill areas and arrangements have been made for the Grayshott night soil contract to be terminated and for that area also to be serviced by the Council's own vehicle and staff.

Hop-Pickers' Accommodation. Necessary routine inspections were carried out during the year, no outstanding matters arising.

New hutments for 68 families were erected in the Parish of Bentley and 24 in the Parish of Worldham, mainly to replace existing accommodation which, owing to bad design and defective conditions, were not worthy of reconstruction.

### Sanitary Inspection of the Area.

Nuisances. Routine inspections have been carried out throughout the District and nuisances arising have been abated.

Housing. House-to-house inspections under the Rural Housing Survey have continued throughout the year.

Milk Supply. Inspections of Dairies and Cowsheds have been made; new producers have been added to the Register and the premises, where necessary, have been brought up to the required standard.

Overcrowding. Cases of overcrowding have been dealt with to bring about improvements, consideration of such cases being taken in the allocation of new dwellings erected by the Council.

Moveable Dwellings. Visits and inspections have been made of such dwellings and sites.

Meat and other Foods. Visits and inspections of shops and stores have been made and quantities of foodstuffs have been condemned as unfit for human consumption. Co-operation with Ministry of Food Salvage Officers has led to the salvage and use of condemned foodstuffs for animal feeding and other purposes.

Factories. Inspections under the Factories Act, 1937, have been made as follows:—

### Prevalence of and Control over Infectious and Other Diseases.

Beyond cases of measles and whooping cough, the year has been a healthy one.

There were 40 cases of measles and 52 cases of whooping cough.

There were eight mild cases of scarlet fever scattered over the District.

The majority of schoolchildren have been inoculated against diphtheria.
