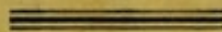

The district is situated in the extreme east of Hampshire and comprises 21 civil parishes.

On the east, it marches with the County boundary between Hampshire and Surrey and then, circling in round Bramshott, just touches the Sussex border in the south-east.

The River Wey rises from a considerable number of sources within the district and the River Rother begins its course below the hills in the extreme south.

Agriculture and the rural undertakings with which it is normally associated continue as the principal industries of the district.

The Parish of Whitehill includes the important military establishments of Bordon and Longmoor whilst the Parishes of Headley and Grayshott have become popular residential areas.

The Ministry of Health recommend that all children be immunised against diphtheria before their first birthday, preferably at the age of seven or eight months. Also that they should be given a reinforcing injection just after entering school.

Lists of children who have attained the age of 12 months and who have not been immunised are regularly forwarded to the County Medical Officer of Health who arranges for a Health Visitor to call. This arrangement has proved very successful.

Prevention of Blindness.

During the year, 2 cases of Ophthalmia Neonatorum were notified and removed to hospital.

Scabies.

There were fewer cases of scabies during the year, only 4 families and 5 other individuals being treated at the Alton Isolation Hospital. All other verminous cases were treated at the General Hospital, Alton.

Paratyphoid Fever.

There were two cases of paratyphoid fever during the year, one being notified on 30th April and the other on 11th October, there being no connection between the two.

The first case was a girl of 18 years of age and enquiries gave no indication of the source of infection. Infection was very mild and the patient was isolated at home.

The second case was a girl of 16 years of age who went into Winchester Hospital on 15th September and discharged on the 30th September, the diagnosis being made at the Hospital. All contacts were examined and found to be negative. The patient had evidently been a carrier for a long time but had not been ill. She was isolated and kept under observation for some time until three consecutive negative swabs were obtained.

Extensions of the main supplies were completed during the year in the Parishes of Four Marks and Ropley whilst work on the extension of mains to supply the parishes of East Tisted, Newton Valence and Medstead were commenced.

The mains supplies in the area have been satisfactory, both in quality and quantity throughout the year. Samples are regularly taken for analysis by the Water Undertakers themselves.

Other domestic supplies in the district are from wells, springs and underground rain water storage tanks.

Ten samples from the above domestic sources were taken during the year and following unsatisfactory analysis results, six properties were connected to main supplies.

Sewerage.

Part of the Parish of Bentley is sewered, the effluent being treated by broad land irrigation.

A scheme of main drainage for the greater part of the Parish of Whitehill is proceeding under contract. The discharge is to be into existing treatment works at Lindford in the Parish, constructed by the War Department but shortly to be transferred to the District Council.

The temporary housing site of 50 prefabricated bungalows at Lindford is served by a sewer laid to discharge into the above-mentioned works.

Schemes for the sewerage of the Parishes of Headley and Grayshott have been approved whilst schemes have been prepared for sewerage areas of the following parishes :—Bentworth, Binsted (Rowledge, Bucks Horn Oak and Village), Chawton, East Tisted, Farringdon, Lasham, Medstead, Newton Valence, Ropley, Selborne (Village), Shalden, Whitehill (Greatham), and Wield ; also for further extensions in Bentley.

The larger Council Housing Estates, where sewers are not available, are being provided with estate treatment works, that for Binsted Estate having been in operation for some time whilst works are being constructed to serve the estates at Froyle and Medstead.

Drainage.

There has been an increased tendency to instal domestic drainage systems, ie., cesspools and septic tanks, to serve individual houses and it is regretted that Building Licensing restrictions have checked this desirable form of improvement.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

Refuse Collection.

In September, a general scheme for full refuse collection throughout the district was put into operation, absorbing the existing scheme for the collection of salvage only.

Weekly collections of refuse and salvage are made in the Parishes of Grayshott and Whitehill, the remainder of the district being served with a fortnightly collection.

Disposal is by means of controlled tipping.

Salvage.

Collection of waste paper has been maintained and the quantity sold during the year amounted to 52 tons 10cwts. 0 qtrs. 14 lbs.

Nightsoil Collection.

Nightsoil collections are made twice weekly in defined areas of the Parishes of Grayshott and Whitehill.

A scheme to extend this service, to be operated as soon as an appropriate vehicle could be acquired, was approved to serve the Parishes of Chawton, Farringdon, Selborne, Binsted, Headley and a further area of Whitehill (Lindford).

Street Cleaning.

Weekly litter collections are undertaken in the main shopping areas of Whitehill and Grayshott.

Note : All Public Cleansing work is carried out by the Council's own vehicles and staff.

The Rural Housing Survey was completed during the year. This inspection was confined to houses of not exceeding £20 rateable value and the classification of the 4057 houses inspected is as follows :

The Housing Act, 1949, which received the Royal Assent on the 30th July, 1949, makes provision, inter alia, for Local Authorities to make grants to private owners for the improvement of private dwellings, provided that the dwellings after improvement comply with specified conditions and standard.

No applications under the Act were made by private owners during the year.

Milk and Dairies.

Under the Food and Drugs (Milk and Dairies) Act, 1944, which came into operation on the 1st October, 1949, regulations were made by the Ministries of Health, Agriculture and Fisheries and Food whereby the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries became responsible for the registration of dairy farms and dairy farmers and for the execution and enforcement of the regulations on same, whilst local authorities retained responsibility for the provisions applicable outside of dairy farms, for the provisions relating to diseases communicable to man and for the registration of dairies other than dairy farms and of dairymen other than dairy farmers.

Regulations were also made regarding designated milk. The County Council is the responsible authority as regards producers but have delegated to the District Council their powers as regards pasteurising and sterilising establishments of which however there are at present none in the district. Local authorities under these regulations are responsible for the provisions covering premises other than those at which milk is produced.

Ice Cream.

There is one wholesale manufacturer in the district and 36 samples were taken for analysis during the year with the following results :

The provisional grades are based on the time taken to reduce the colour of a standard methylene blue solution. The results of examination of many samples suggest that the methylene blue reduction test is a good indicator of general bacterial contamination and a fairly good indicator of excretal contamination. The use of this test and the definition of the grades should be regarded as provisional only, subject to a trial.

It is suggested that it would be unwise to pay too much attention to the result of any one sample, but that throughout the year samples should be expected to fall into provisional grades as follows : Grade I, 50%; Grades I or II, 80%; Grade III, not more than 20%; Grade IV, nil.

It will be seen that samples within Grades I—III are well above the standard suggested. With regard to the 2 samples Graded IV, both taken on the same day, i.e. 10th May 1949, these were considered to be due to a temporary breakdown which was immediately rectified and subsequent samples taken during the week following were all found to be in Grade I.

Food Poisoning.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS

During the year, 9 licences were issued for moveable dwellings making a total number of 49 licences in force at the end of the year.

Visits and inspections were made of all dwellings and sites to ensure maintenance in a sanitary condition.

HOP PICKERS ACCOMMODATION

Special attention was given during the year to this type of accommodation.

New hutments and ancillary accommodation were provided for 47 families and substantial repairs were carried out generally to the remainder of the accommodation.

Further improvements were promised for the forthcoming season.

The Council introduced a system of refuse collection from the encampments in cases where growers provided properly constructed ashpits. This scheme is being revised for the future and it is hoped that all growers will avail themselves of the facility.

There are in all 16 hop growers in 5 different parishes, providing 22 separate hutted encampments with in addition 7 tented encampments for travellers. These were all inspected both before and during occupation, involving a total of 164 camp visits.

BUILDING LICENSING

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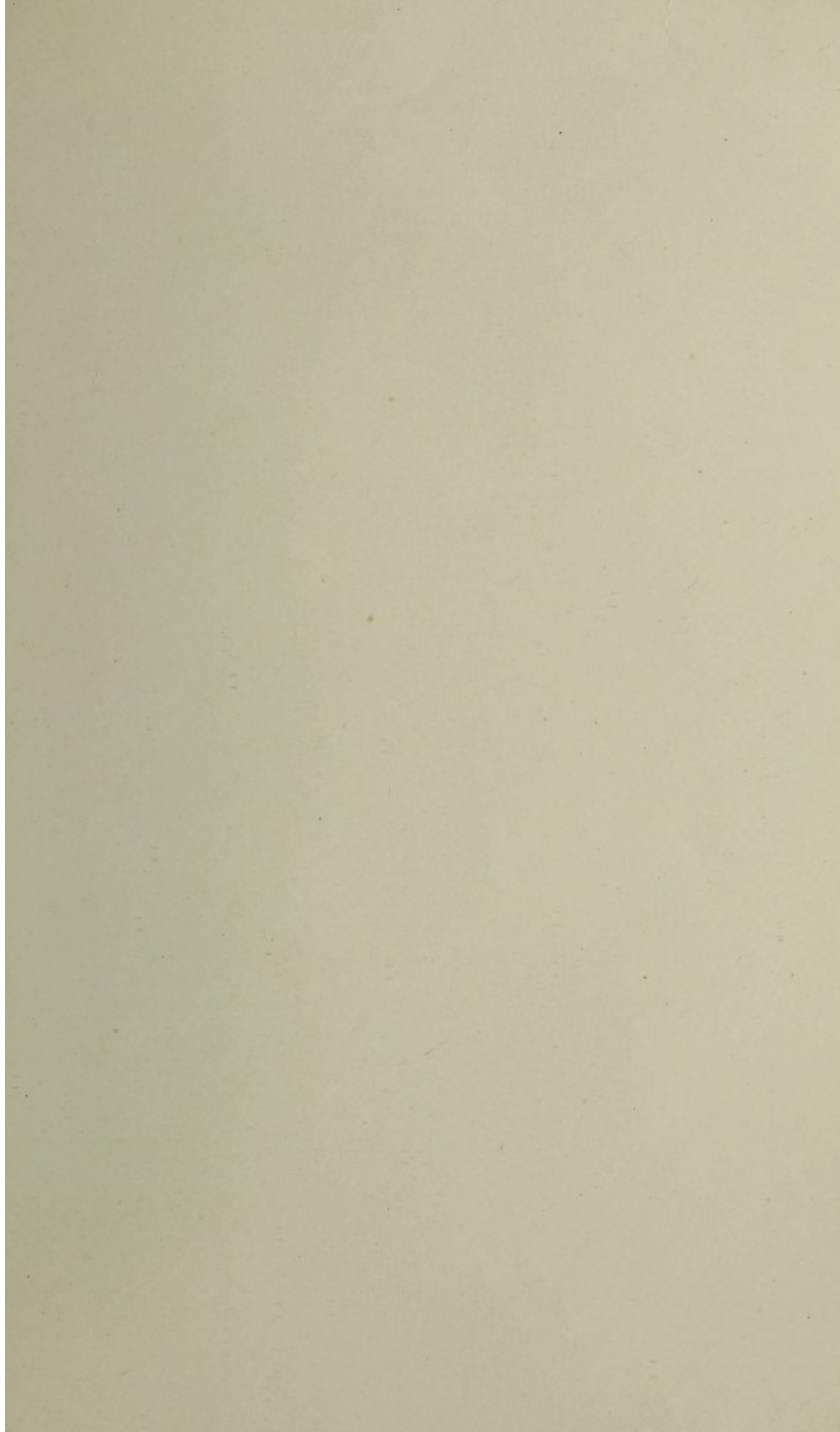
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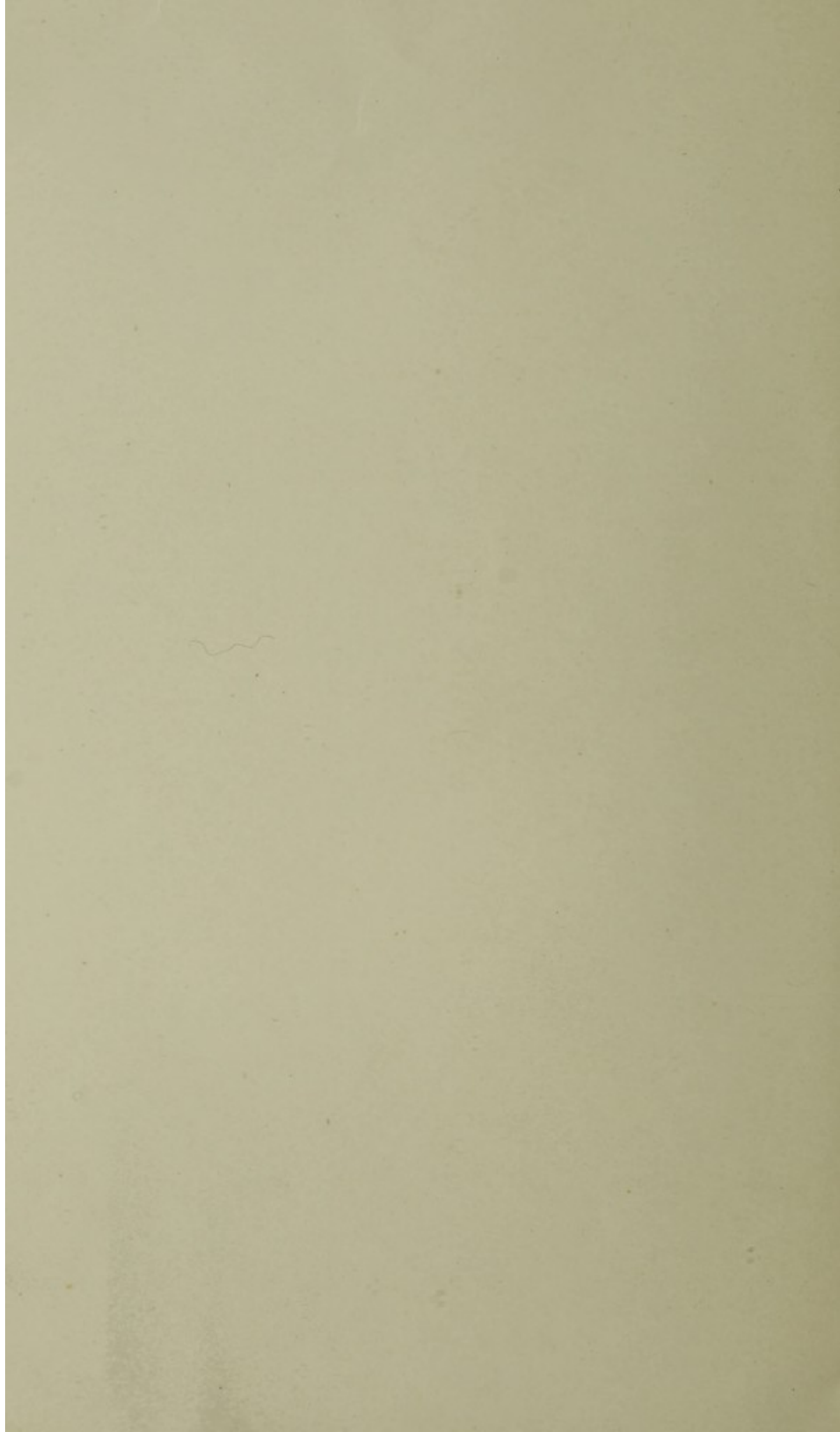
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
