To:- The Chairman and Members of the Alton Rural District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Report for 1970, prepared as directed by the Department of Health.

The health of the District has been good. Some cases of influenza were reported but no major outbreak. There was a small measles outbreak during the summer, a thing which occurred elsewhere in the country, though not universally. Infectious hepatitis was not a problem. There was an increase in cases of the sexually transmitted diseases which is in line with figures throughout the county.

The population was estimated at 29,040. This is an increase of 570 on 1969. The natural increase was 257. There is nothing remarkable in these figures but it may be noted that the Birth Rate is 19.7 per 1,000 compared with the National Rate of 16.

The sewerage scheme for Bentley, Binsted and Froyle progressed well. It is hoped that the sewage works and the sewers will be operative in August or September, 1971.

Work was well advanced on building of Old People's bungalows on land acquired from Alton Urban District Council in the town.

Plans were completed for the new developments at Bordon Village and the Erie Camp estate and work is expected to start soon.

The Local Authorities Social Services Act, 1970, authorised the establishment by County Councils of Social Services Departments. The effect is to combine the former Welfare and Children's Departments and to remove from Health the functions of Home Help Service, Mental Welfare and Child Minding.

In conclusion I must thank Lt.-Cdr. Saban and the Members of the Public Health and General Purposes Committee for their continued support and encouragement, and Mr. Johnson and my staff of the Public Health Department for their never-failing loyalty and assistance.

There is a remarkable drop in deaths from lung cancer - 4 compared with 13 last year.

Coronary heart disease is still by far the commonest cause.

There were 6 deaths of infants under one week and prematurity was a factor in 3. 2 deaths of older infants were due to illnesses.

The one maternal death was due to a complication arising after delivery.

COMMENTS ON INFECTIOUS DISEASES

MEASLES

There was a small outbreak in July-September. This has occurred in places all over England and may be due to the small epidemic of 1969 having left a low level of resistance in the population (which has not been raised by voluntary immunisation).

INFECTIVE HEPATITIS

Has dwindled as suddenly as it appeared but it is likely to remain with us.

DYSENTERY

Two of the cases, husband and wife, were taken severely ill within hours of returning home from India. The organism was Shigella Boydii. Both recovered after hospital treatment and no secondary cases occurred.

The third was Shigella sonnel contracted in Greece.

FOOD POISONING

Although no cases of illness were notified, it is known that both Salmonella typhimurium and Salmonella agona were found during investigations of sporadic gastro-enteritis in small children. No source of infection was found.

TUBERCULOSIS

One new case was notified - a man age 30.

There were 167 cases on the Register at the end of the year.

VENEREAL DISEASES

No cases of syphilis were reported.

There were two cases of gonorrhoea known and fourteen of other sexually transmitted diseases.

National figures continue to rise.

IMMUNISATION

Rubella - No clinics were held in schools before the 31st December, 1970. 8 children were immunised otherwise.

B.C.G. - There were no sessions during the year.

MEALS ON WHEELS

6,924 meals were served - 600 more than last year.

Normally, they were served on two days a week, but where need existed, three or four per week were served.

The average cost was 1/6d. (7½p) but with rising costs, this will have to go up to 10p in 1971.

The ever-increasing clientele and the distances in a rural district have meant a great deal of hard work by the Organiser and the Drivers, and I should like to thank Mrs. J. M. Keane and Mrs. N. E. Pugh and the Staff most sincerely for their efforts.

FAMILY PLANNING

I am indebted to Dr. Margaret Lloyd of the Alton Family Planning Association for the following notes:-

Although there is now a Clinic in Petersfield, Alton had over 1,000 patients during the year. They are mainly married women but young couples about to be married are encouraged to seek advice and a number of unmarried girls were also seen.

The pill is still the most popular method but the diaphragm is encouraged as an alternative in younger women. It is hoped to start a domiciliary service next year for certain categories of greatest need.

Sterilisation of the husband has been very successful in a number of cases but it is not possible to obtain it without payment except on strong medical grounds.

Over 200 cervical smears were taken, none of which proved positive.

There is a growing demand for advice on sub-fertility and marital problems.

ROAD ACCIDENTS

I am indebted to the Chief Constable of Hampshire for his analyses of road accidents, on which the following remarks are based.

The total number rose by almost 5% on the 1969 figure and although there were slightly fewer deaths, the number of serious accidents was over 11% up.

Over half the casualties were car drivers and passengers. One third were pedestrians.

The principal cause of accidents was "turning right carelessly" and the next, "losing control".

HEALTH EDUCATION

There was a renewed anti-smoking campaign following the second report of the Royal College of Physicians. The Health Education Council lent an experimental mobile exhibition to Hampshire and this was used on several sites.

Talks were again given on "Learning to Live" and on drug abuse.

ACCIDENTS IN THE HOME

I am indebted to the Secretary, Lord Mayor Treloar Hospital, Alton, for the following figures of home accidents sent to hospital:-

The total was 132 - 54 more than last year.

There were more falls - 57 in all, 29 being over 60, but only two serious injuries and more swallowings - 16 - including warfarin, metal polish and fertiliser - none fatal.

HOME HELP SERVICE (Alton Urban & Rural Districts)

The staff averaged 20 Home Helps and 13 Good Neighbours. 4 new Helps were engaged: 5 resigned.

152 cases received help, 136 aged or chronically ill, 3 emergency sickness, 5 convalescent, 7 maternity and 1 child care.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948.

Action was necessary in the case of one elderly lady, already in hospital with debilitating illness, who insisted that she would return to a very insanitary cottage. She eventually accepted accommodation in a County Home.

PROVISION OF GENERAL HEALTH SERVICES

AMBULANCE SERVICES

The Ambulance Service is conducted by Hampshire County Council who supply details of journeys to the Public Health and General Purposes Committee every half year.

Application for the use of ambulances should be made to the Central Ambulance Control at Winchester (Telephone Number is Winchester 61644 (6 lines)).

REPORT OF THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

WATER SUPPLIES

All built-up areas of the District have piped main water supplies, from the Mid-Southern Water Company.

There are a few isolated areas not supplied by mains for economic reasons, and there are still a number of properties in the western part of the District, i.e., Four Marks, Medstead and Ropley, relying on underground rainwater storage tanks but this, however, is slowly diminishing.

Mains supplies have been satisfactory, both in regard to quality and quantity. Samples are regularly taken for analysis by the water undertakers and copies of the analysts' reports are submitted to the Council.

The fluoride content of the water is 0.1 parts per million.

As aforesaid, there still remain isolated pockets of development which rely upon sources of water supply other than the mains and five routine samples from these supplies were taken during the year: all results were satisfactory.

Complaints were again received about discoloration of the mains water supply; again these were all passed to the Water Company concerned but despite appropriate action being taken by them, the complaints persisted.

No notifications of water disconnection were received during the year.

For the number of properties and approximate population served by main water see Table 1 in the Statistical Section of this report.

SEWERAGE

Areas of the District already sewered are as follows:-

Parish	Area and Treatment
Bentley	- Part, effluent treated by broad land irrigation.
Binsted	- Holt Pound area, with discharge into the sewers of the Farnham Urban District Council.
Grayshott	- The whole built-up area, with discharge into the Council's own treatment works at Lindford.
Headley	- Headley Down and Arford areas, with discharge into the Lindford treatment works.
Whitehill	- Lindford, Bordon and Whitehill areas, with discharge into the Lindford treatment works.
	- Greatham area, with discharge into the sewers of the Petersfield Rural District Council.
Selborne	- Main village area, with works at Selborne.

The Military Camp areas of Bordon and Longmoor, including approximately 610 quarters, are sewered and all dwellings connected. The Bordon Camp area discharges into the Council's own treatment works at Lindford but the Longmoor Camp area discharges into the War Department's own works.

The Council receives into its works at Lindford sewage from adjacent areas of the Haslemere Urban District Council and Hambledon Rural District Council.

Generally, the larger Council housing estates where sewers are not available are provided with their own treatment plants.

DOMESTIC DRAINAGE

During the year connections to the Council's sewers continued steadily as also did the provision of new septic tank systems in areas not provided with sewers.

Details of sewer connections are shown in Table 2 in the Statistical Section of this report.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

Food and Drug legislation divides enforcement provisions between District Councils and Food and Drugs Authorities. The Food and Drugs Authority for this District is the Hampshire County Council.

Generally speaking, the division is that the District Council is responsible for the provisions regarding purity of food, i.e., fitness for human consumption, whereas the Food and Drugs Authority is responsible for the provisions relating to adulteration, misrepresentation, labelling and the like. Sundry complaints regarding foreign bodies in food are immediately referred to the Food and Drugs Authority.

A report on the work of the Food and Drugs Authority appears later on in this section.

There are no slaughterhouses in the District.

Foodstuffs inspected in shops and stores and surrendered for condemnation were as shown in Table 3 in the Statistical Section of this report.

One complaint was made of food being unfit: this was dealt with informally.

FOOD HYGIENE REGULATIONS

These Regulations contain provisions in respect of the hygienic handling of food and the construction and maintenance of premises where food is handled.

Routine inspection of food premises continued during the year. Generally the standard was good but a few cases of minor infringements were dealt with by informal notice.

The following are details of food premises subject to these Regulations, grouped in categories of trade carried out in them:-

Butchers - 12; Fishmongers - 2; Dairies - 1; Off-licences - 4; General stores - 36; Grocers - 14; Greengrocers - 6; Warehouses - 1; Bakehouses - 1; Cafes and Restaurants - 15; Fried Fish Shops - 2 Public Houses - 41

FCCD HYGIENE (Markets, Stalls & Delivery Vehicles) REGULATIONS, 1966.

In two cases, informal action was necessary under these Regulations.

All milk retailed in the District has to be covered by one of the Special Designations - "Pasteurised", "Sterilised", "Ultra Heat Treated" and "Untreated",

Licences to use a Special Designation in relation to milk are issued by the Council under delegated powers from the Hampshire County Council.

Fifteen such licences have been issued.

MILK SAMPLING

No milk sampling was carried out by this authority during 1970.

ICE CREAM

There is one ice cream manufacturer registered in the District and there are premises which use a soft ice cream machine.

There are seventy-five premises registered for the storage and sale of pre-packed ice cream.

FOOD SAMPLING

I am indebted to Mr. J. S. Preston, M.I.W.M.A., Chief Inspector of Weights and Measures, Hampshire County Council, for the following information which he has kindly supplied:-

During the year ended the 31st December, 1970, 112 samples were procured under the Food and Drugs Act, 1955, within the area of the Alton Rural District Council.

Milk Samples

54 samples of milk, including 4 of "Channel Islands" were obtained, 2 were found to be unsatisfactory.

The two unsatisfactory samples were taken on different days from a farm bulk tank. Examination of the milking plant revealed that a depression in one of the pipe-lines was causing some of the water used for the cleaning-out process to be retained. This was brought to the attention of the producer, together with the fact that he should ensure that milk is entirely free from added water. Subsequent follow-up samples were satisfactory.

Miscellaneous Samples

58 samples of articles other than milk were taken, 5 of these being the subject of adverse reports. These were:-

1. Orange Honey Marmalade.

The sample contained an excess amount of sulphur dioxide used as preservative. This was taken up with the manufacturers.

2. Low Calorie Apple Squash.

This article was found to contain cyclamic acid, which was prohibited with effect from 1st January, 1970. Steps were taken to withdraw from sale any similar stock at the retailers but the position was somewhat complicated by the fact that the labels of soft drinks normally refer only to the presence of artificial sweetener. Prior to the change in the Regulations, no distinction was made between cyclamates and saccharin.

3. Spiced Pork.

The sample contained 71% of meat whereas the accepted minimum of meat content of such products should be 80%. The matter was brought to the notice of the packer, who immediately saw to the amendment of his recipe to bring the product up to the required standard.

4. Apple Pie - Consumer complaint.

The pie was submitted by the purchaser who removed the pie from the cardboard container some two hours after purchase and noticed signs of mould growth on the pie. Inquiries at the shop revealed that the pie had been sold well beyond its appropriate shelf-life. Legal proceedings were instituted and a fine of £15 with £14. 14. 0. costs was imposed.

5. Biscuit - Consumer complaint.

This sample consisted of a biscuit and part of the packet in which the biscuit was purchased. Traces of web and frass were found round the biscuit and also inside the packet but no traces of insect or insect larva could be detected. Inquiries are being continued in this case.

General

In addition to the samples taken under the Food and Drugs Act, the usual attention was given to the labels and descriptions of food and drugs under the provisions of the Labelling of Food Order and the Pharmacy and Medicines Act. No matters of consequence occurred.

RODENT CONTROL

Under the Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949, the primary obligation is upon the Council to ensure that, so far as it is practicable, its area is kept free from rats and mice. The Act does not relieve the owners or occupiers of premises of their responsibility for the actual destruction of rats and mice.

A free treatment service is given, upon request, to private houses, but a charge on an "ad hoc" basis is made to agricultural, industrial and commercial premises where treatment is carried out. Where regular treatment of such premises is found necessary, an attempt is made to persuade the occupiers to take up a permanent contract with a private company.

For details of general infestations and treatments see Table 4 in the Statistical Section of this report.

The tables relate only to the number of properties inspected and/or treated and not to the number of actual inspections or visits. Treatments always involve several visits during the work and follow-up visits subsequently to ensure total clearance of infestation.

The Council properties are visited regularly once a month and oftener if found necessary.

In addition to the service of rodent control, assistance was also given to the public in connection with other infestations as follows:-

Wasps' nests destroyed - 101
Swarms of bees destroyed - 2
Treatment for flies - 16
Treatment for fleas - 12
Fumigations - 4

In addition to the more normal work of the Pest Control Officer, the Department received requests to undertake the disinfestation of aircraft. This request was complied with and three aircraft were treated for Blatella Germanica (cockroaches).

SWIMMING POOLS

There are no public swimming pools in the District but there are six restricted use pools.

One, in Bordon Camp, is for the use of military personnel and families only, and is under constant supervision by the Army Hygiene Section.

Three others at primary schools in the District are for the use of the scholars only, under the supervision of the teaching staff. All have filtration and chlorination plants.

A fifth is at Lord Mayor Treloar College, Froyle, for the use of the pupils and staff.

A sixth is at Grayshott Hall Health Centre, Grayshott, for use by residents.

In addition to the above, there are a number of private pools in the District and the Department was called upon to give advice on the treatment of the water when the instructions given with the pools proved inadequate.

PET ANIMALS ACT, 1951.

Three premises are licensed under the Pet Animals Act, 1951.

Visits were made during the year without any cause for action being found.

ANIMAL BOARDING ESTABLISHMENTS ACT, 1963.

During the year twelve applications under the above Act were received: these varied from the largest - to board 100 dogs and 25 cats, to the smallest - to board 6 dogs. These premises were duly inspected and advice given where necessary. All were issued with the appropriate licence which has conditions attached to it requiring safeguards as to sanitation and the safety and health of dogs and cats boarded on the premises.

NOISE ABATEMENT ACT, 1960.

Various complaints were made under the provisions of this Act. All were dealt with informally.

PETROLEUM ACTS

In 1964 the licensing procedure for the storage of petroleum was amended so as to issue a licence for petroleum mixtures separate from petroleum spirit.

89 petroleum spirit storage licences and 13 petroleum mixtures storage licences were issued during the year.

No new tanks were installed during the year.

ACCOMMODATION FOR HOP-PICKERS

The number of huts in use and of pickers employed has declined enormously since the installation of hop-picking machines which are operated mainly by local labour, and there is now only one such hut in use.

The majority of seasonal labour is now employed in potato picking. These travellers use caravans for living accommodation and remain in the district for only a short period.

COMMON LODGING HOUSES

There are no such premises in the District.

RENT ACT, 1957.

There were no applications for certificates of disrepair received under the provisions of the above Act.

FACTORIES

Under the provisions of the Factories Acts, the District Council is the authority responsible for enforcing the provisions regarding sanitary accommodation all factories, and in all factories where mechanical power is not used, the provisions with respect to cleanliness, overcrowding, workroom temperature and ventilation, and floor drainage.

The particulars prescribed on the administration of the Acts are shown in Table 5 in the Statistical Section of this report.

THE OFFICES, SHOPS & RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963.

An annual statistical report is required to be submitted to the Department of Employment and Productivity in accordance with Section 60 of the Act, and Table 6 in the Statistical Section of this report gives the information submitted direct to the Minister.

It must be emphasised that the statistics refer only to premises registered with the Council.

Registration is only necessary where there are employees and the sum of hours normally worked each week by all employees exceeds 21. Registration is also not necessary where the only persons employed are close relatives of the employer.

During the year routine general inspections were made to 26 premises and notices for defects served in respect of 8, as follows:-

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS FOR HOUSING

The Housing Act, 1969, came into operation on the 25th August, 1969. The Act amended the law as to financial assistance for the improvement of houses.

The standard amenities for which grant is payable were amended by the addition of a sink and deletion of a food store.

The amount of grant payable was increased to £200 for the basic grant and the higher limit to £450.

Conditions relating to ownership of an improved property have been removed but a condition as to time taken to effect the improvements may be imposed.

Changes in the evaluation of rent for tenanted properties are also made.

There are now three types of grant - Improvement, Standard and Special.

The first is for the provision of dwellings by the conversion of houses or other buildings; the second for the improvement of dwellings; and the last for the improvement of houses in multiple occupation by the provision of standard amenities.

Improvement Grants (Discretionary)

The Council resumed consideration of Discretionary Improvement grants towards the end of the year.

Standard Grants

The response of the public to this system of grants has continued steadily as can be seen from the appropriate tables.

Tables 11, 12 and 13 in the Statistical Section of this report give various statistics.

Special Grants

It is not expected that this scheme will be operated in this District as to date there are, to my knowledge, no houses in multiple occupation in the District.

PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTORS' VISITS

The annual total of Public Health Inspectors' visits carried out during the year and listed under subjects, is shown in Table 14 in the Statistical Section of this report.

PUBLIC WORKS

All public cleansing work is carried out by the Council's own vehicles and staff and I am indebted to the Council's Engineer and Surveyor, Mr. G. S. Webb, Dip.T.P.(Birm)., C.Eng., M.I.Mun.E., A.M.T.P.I., Chartered Engineer, for the information relating to this subject.

Vehicle depots are maintained at Alton and Lindford. The Council's sewage works at Lindford (Whitehill Parish), receive and treat sewage from Whitehill, Bordon, Lindford, Bordon Military Camp, Headley, Grayshott and parts of adjoining areas of the Haslemere Urban District Council and Hambledon Rural District Council. There is a separate sewage works for Selborne.

A general scheme of full refuse collection operates throughout the District with weekly collections in all parishes and from the Married Quarters in the Bordon and Longmoor Military Camps.

Disposal of refuse is by means of controlled tipping at Headley and East Tisted, the latter being shared with the Alton Urban District Council.

Collections of nightsoil are made generally in areas where sewers are not available.

The Council also operate a cesspool emptying service for which, however, a charge is made.

Public conveniences are maintained at Bordon, Grayshott and Selborne.

Statistics relating to Public Works are to be found in Tables 15A and 15B in the Statistical Section of this report.
