REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1970

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for 1970, prepared as directed by the Minister of Health and Social Security.

The health of the town was good. Influenza was reported from time to time but there was no epidemic and very little infectious disease. Deaths from respiratory conditions were lower than previous years.

There were only six recorded cases of Venereal Diseases but the figures for the whole country and for the Wessex Hospital region continued to rise.

The population has increased to 11,120 - an increase of 260, which is a distinct slowing of the rate of growth. The natural increase (excess of births over deaths) is 107 which compares well with previous years and in view of the building activity in the North West of the town, it seems surprising that the overall increase is so slow.

The re-building of the Sewage Works is almost finished and partly in use with very satisfactory results.

Plans for the building of a Health Centre were being discussed between the County Medical Officer and local Doctors.

Mr. Hughes resigned his appointment as Additional Public Health Inspector and Mr. Gunn was appointed in his place.

I wish to thank the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their support and interest during the year and also Mr. Ling and the Department Staff for their ready assistance and continued loyalty.

There is nothing extraordinary in the General Causes of deaths. Coronary disease remains the principal cause and there was one case under 44 years of age.

The five still-births reflect a tendency, which is apparent in other areas, to premature deliveries.

Measles

As I reported last year, the figure of 101 cases was disappointing after the Immunisation Campaign of 1968. This year—a non-epidemic year—seems true to form but some neighbouring Districts which had a dramatic drop in 1969 experienced a sharp outbreak during the Summer. Such cases as Alton had occured mainly in September.

Tuberculosis

There was one new case - non-pulmonary.

Venereal Diseases

No cases of Syphilis were reported. There were six of other conditions, three of the patients being aged 17 or less.

Immunisation

The scheme introduced in 1968 remains in use.

No B.C.G. vaccination was done.

Rubella

This was introduced during the year for girls of 13 years old.

Health Education

Publicity for Measles vaccination was increased during the summer as supplies became plentiful again and the introduction of Rubella vaccine required advertisment.

The Venereal Disease posters of the Health Education Council were displayed and certainly attracted some public comment.

The usual Learning to Live and V.D. talks were given in the local school. This is now accepted as an annual committment.

Home Help Services

The figures for the combined Urban and Rural Districts are as follows:-

Meals On Wheels

The number of meals served was 2,274. About 27 people received them, on 2 days per week at a cost to them of 1/6 ($7\frac{1}{2}p$).

Public Provision of General Health Services

Hospital Services

Basingstoke District Hospital now provides most Specialist services for this area.

The Lord Mayor Treloar provides General services and a Minor Casualty department.

The Maternity Unit continues in Alton General Hospital.

Family Planning

I am indebted to Dr. Margaret Lloyd of the Alton Family Planning Clinic for the following notes:

Although there is now a Clinic in Petersfield, Alton again had over 1,000 patients during the year. They were mainly married women but young engaged couples and a number of single girls were also seen.

The pill is still the most popular method but the diaphragm is encouraged as an alternative in younger women.

Sterilisation of the husband has been very successful in some cases but is not available without payment except on strong medical grounds.

Over 200 cervical smears were taken, none of which proved positive.

Advice was given on sub-fertility and marital problems and the demand for this service is growing rapidly.

Accidents in the Home

There were 169 accidents in the home which needed hospital attention, which is far above the figures of recent years. The most common cause was falls - 69, of which 29 were children up to 6. Cuts and general injuries came next at 50 and then surprisingly, dog and cat bites and swallowed articles with 17 each. It seems that supervision of small children could be improved. One wonders if the animals are becoming fiercer.

Road Accidents

I am indebted to the Chief Constable of Hampshire for his analysis of road accidents on which the following is based.

The total numbers rose by almost 5% on the 1969 figures and although there were two fewer deaths, the number of serious accidents was over 11% up.

Over half the casualties were car drivers and passengers. One third were pedestrians.

The principal causes of accidents was "turning right carelessly" and the next "losing control".

National Assistance Act 1948

No action was required .

Social Services

Since the Social Services Act, of 1970, the Welfare Service has been re-organised.

The Social Services Department now covers the fields previously covered by Welfare and Childrens' Departments, such special sections as the Blind and Deaf and some former Health functions, notably Home Help, Child Minding and Mental Welfare.

The Area Director of Social Services for North-East Hampshire is Mr. C. B. Fisher, and his office is located at Hippodrome House, Birchett Road, Aldershot, Telephone Number: Aldershot 28312.

The Alton Urban and Rural Districts are covered by a Group based on the Social Services Office, Paper Mill Lane, Alton-Telephone Number: Alton 83966. The Group Organiser is Mr. W. C. Spencer. Office hours are from 9.0 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. Mondays to Fridays (daily). For emergencies outside these hours, telephone the Ambulance Control (Winchester 61644) for the name and number of the Social Worker on duty.

Annual Report of the Chief Public Health Inspector/Housing Manager for the year ended 31st December, 1970.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Report for the year 1970.

The full impact of the Housing Act, 1969, is, in my opinion, yet to be experienced, but nevertheless a great deal of extra work has been placed on the Department during the year by formal and informal requests for information, advice and action, only a small proportion of which reaches the Committee stage.

In July, Mr. G. Hughes, Additional Public Health Inspector, left the Council to join Farnborough U.D.C. in a similar capacity and Mr. E. Gunn was appointed in his stead.

For the past three years S/Sgt. N. Gibson of the R.A.M.C. has attended this Council for three days per week to gain experience in civilian procedure, prior to taking the Diploma Examination of the Public Health Inspectors Examination Board. I am pleased to report that he was successful on his first attempt, he has been promoted and now supervises the military establishments in the South and West.

Since S/Sgt. Gibson left us in July, a colleague of his, S/Sgt. Kelly, has attended at the Slaughterhouse in order to gain experience in meat inspection. He was successful in obtaining his Diploma just prior to the report going to press.

I wish to record my thanks to Dr. Morton and the staff of the Public Health Department for their support and ready assistance during the past year.

SECTION 1

Public Health Acts

Nuisance complaints under these Acts were again small in comparision to the size of the town. All were remedied by informal action, except for one. This was a complaint concerning an effluent discharge from a septic tank. The effluent was causing a nuisance and after several informal letters to the owner of the tank it was decided to take statutory action. Consequently a notice was served on the owner of the tank under Sect. 1 of the Public

Health (Recurring Nuisances) Act, 1970. This new Act enables a local authority to serve notice on any person causing a nuisance to abate such a nuisance and also to prohibit its recurrence. The difference between this Act and the old Public Health Act, 1936, is that the nuisance need not exist at the time of service of the notice. It is sufficient that a nuisance has, or is likely to become. In the case in question, at the expiration of the notice no works had been done to abate the nuisance and at the time of going to press, the case is now in the hands of the Council's solicitors.

Factories

The inspection of factories under the Factories Act, 1961, is split between the Council and H.M. Factories Inspectorate. The Council are responsible for the sanitary accommodation in all factories but where no mechanical power is used, the Council is also responsible for its cleanliness, overcrowding, ventilation, floor drainage and provision of a water supply. Where mechanical power is used - H.M. Factories Inspectorate are responsible for all except sanitary accommodation.

The administration and inspections done under the Act are as shown in Table I in the Appendix.

The Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act, 1963

The inspection of offices and shops in the district under this Act revealed that a high standard of working conditions prevails.

Quarterly and annual returns are required to be sent to the Department of Employment and Productivity under Section 60 of the Act., the statistics of which are set out in Appendix Table II.

Exemption is given to premises where the employees work less than 21 hours a week or if it is a family business employing close relatives of the employer.

All accidents reported were duly investigated but none warranted legal proceedings.

Pet Shops, Game Dealers, Scrap Metal Dealers

Any person carrying on the above trades in the district are required to be registered. Each premises is inspected before relicensing. No contraventions of the Act were noted.

SECTION II

Housing Circumstances

Housing Acts

Several complaints have been received over disrepair of

houses. All but two of these were dealt with informally.

The two properties concerned were in a very poor state of repair having such defects as rotten floors, extensively leaking roofs dangerous yard paving, etc. Requests from the Department to have these defects attended to were completely ignored by the landlord and finally a statutory notice was served under Section 9 (1A) of the Housing Act, 1969. This new section enables a local authority to require works to be done on a house which, although not unfit, has substantial disrepair. This differs from the old Section 9 where the house had to be unfit before any action could be taken. Another big difference in the two sections is that where previously a certificate of fitness had to be given on completion of the work specified, this does not apply under the new subsection.

Qualification Certificate applications under the Housing Act. 1969, have been coming in thick and fast since the act has become known. Although the procedure and inspection is complex we are dealing quite well with them. We have short-circuited the procedure somewhat to save the applicants time and also not to put undue work on the committees concerned. The normal procedure involves refusing an application which does not meet with the qualifying condition, i.e. no bath, wash hand basin, sink, hot and cold running water, W.C., or in a bad state of repair, having regard to its age, character and locality. Rather than recommending refusals to the committee, we now inspect the property and give the landlord a list of works which we consider necessary to enable a qualification certificate to be issued. On completion of these works, we take the application to the committee with a recommendation for approval. Although the system puts an increased workload on the department with inspections before and after works have been done, it nonetheless cuts the procedure time by half and also relieves the Committee of unnecessary business.

Details of qualification certificate applications are set out in Appendix Table IV.

Rent Acts

Fair rent applications are dealt with by the Rent Officer at Basingstoke. The Register of Approved Fair Rents is kept for inspection by the Public at the Health Department.

Moveable Dwellings

Only two small sites are available but requests have been received for overnight caravan parks recognised by the Caravan Club for use by its members.

Housing Management

The list of allocations and exchanges are set out in Appendix Table V.

Special Housing for the Elderly

The two Wardens areas in Queens Road (Mrs. V. Gardner) and Victoria Road East (Mrs. D. Castleman) continue to serve a worthwhile purpose to the local community.

SECTION III

Supervision of Food and Food Premises

Milk Suppliers

All milk retailers in the District sell only specially designated milk, i.e., Sterilised, Pasteurised, Ultra Heat Treated and Untreated. Licenses for milk purveyors are issued by the Council under powers delegated by Hampshire County Council.

No bacteriological sampling was done by the Department as the milk supplies originate from areas where routine sampling is carried out at source.

Milk Supplies - Brucella Abortus

No untreated milk is retailed in the area. No samples were submitted for analysis for the presence of Brucella Abortus.

Two samples of cream were submitted for analysis and found to be negative.

Ice Cream

No Ice Cream is manufactured in the district but 56 premises are registered for the storage and sale of ice cream. This of course does not include establishments where the main purpose is that of a catering business as these are exempt.

Meat Inspection

Alton Meats Ltd. a subsidary of E. Brown & Son, Southampton, continue to operate from the slaughterhouse at Kent Lane.

Tables showing incidence of disease and condemnations are set out in Appendix, Tables VI, VII, VIII and X.

Revenues from the slaughterhouse towards Meat Inspections totalled £826.39.

Poultry Inspection

The District continues to be free of poultry packing establishments.

Alton Market

The Food Stalls in the Market Square and on Messrs. Martin and Stratfords market continue to provide a good service and no infringements required statutory action.

Food offered for sale in the Auction Hall was routinely inspected and some rabbits and poultry were condemned (see Appendix Table IV).

Food and Drugs

The sampling of foods and drugs under Section 2 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1955, is done by the Weights and Measures Department of the Hampshire County Council. Briefly this Section states that it is an offence for any person to sell to the prejudice of the purchaser any food or drug which is not of the nature or substance or quality demanded.

I would like to express my thanks to Mr. J. S. Preston, M.I.W.M.A., Chief Sampling Officer of the Hampshire County Council for his report as follows::—

During the year ended 31st March, 1971, 28 samples were procurred under the Food and Drugs Act, 1955, within the Urban District of Alton U.D.C. Four samples were the subject of advance reports, as follows:—

Two samples of butter toffees were found to contain only 2.7 per cent and 2.9 per cent respectively of butter fat, whereas a minimum of 4 per cent is required for articles of sugar confectionery, which one claimed to contain butter. Inquiries to the manufacturers indicated a discrepancy in the ingredients used for the toffees and in view of the substantial proportionate deficiencies proceedings were taken. This resulted in the company responsible being fined £50 together with an order for the payment of £19.60 costs.

Following a complaint concerning discoloured matter in icecream, analysis revealed it to consist of a small piece of vegetable stalk. The case did not warrant serious action but it was taken up with the producer of the ice-cream with a view to any repetition being avoided.

A consumer complaint was received alleging that a fragment of tooth had been found in a doughnut whilst it was being eaten by a young child. Enquiries however revealed the fragment to be part of a human tooth which could conceivably have come from the mouth of the child. Consequently no action was taken.

A further consumer complaint related to alleged mould in a meat pie. The pie was not submitted for analysis as there appeared to be some doubt about the evidence of the time and place of purchase of the article. It was not, therefore, felt that the case could be pursued.

General

Together with routine sampling of food and drugs under the Food and Drugs Act, 1955, attention is also given to the labelling and description of foods and drugs under the Labelling of Foods Orders, Trades Descriptions Act and Pharmacy and Medicines Act. There were no serious complaints concerning this matter.

SECTION IV

Pest Control

Various accumulations and harbourages were cleared during the year but no statutory action was necessary under the Prevention of Damage by Pest Act, 1949.

The treatment for all pests, rats, mice, moles, wasps, fleas, etc., were about the same as last year. Numbers of rats increased a little but mice remain the most difficult to control.

Sewer manhole covers which require to be lifted increase every year with all the new building in the area but the regular 10 per cent treatment of the sewers was done showing very little activity.
