INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Scarlet Fever. 26 cases were notified during the year and were fairly evenly distributed over the whole of the district and during the year and the large majority call for no comment. There were however two deaths which is a very unusual thing in these days. They both had complications which were the cause of their deaths.

Diphtheria. 4 cases only were notified during the year and these were at considerable intervals both as regards time and locality and all recovered. It may be considered that the district was practically free from this disease during the year.

Pneumonia. 12 cases were notified and of these six were military cases and treated in their Hospitals, of those notified three died.

Puerperal Pyrexia. Three cases were notified and of these two were military cases treated in their Hospital and the other case was treated in our Hospital. All recovered.

Erysipelas. 3 cases were notified and two of them treated in the Isolation Hospital. All recovered.

In addition to the above two cases of whooping cough and one of Streptococcal Tonsilitis were admitted to the Isolation Hospital for treatment.

Cerebro-spinal Fever. No case was notified to me but two deaths are assigned to this district, one was in a soldier and the other was an inward transferable death from another district.

Tuberculosis. During the year, 6 Pulmonary and 4 non-pulmonary cases were notified and during the same period 7 Pulmonary cases died.

WATER SUPPLY.

Amesbury Parish. This supply continues to be very satisfactory. An extension of the London Road main has been made to supply the Council's new Housing Estate at Holders Road.

Chemical analysis has been done once and Bacteriological examination monthly during the year, a copy of the chemical analysis is below while bacteriological examination has on each occasion shown a complete absence of coliform bacilli.

Bulford and Durrington. These parishes are supplied by the joint scheme which was put into operation in November 1934. Samples of water were taken from various private wells at Durrington, and as a result of unsatisfactory analyses seven houses were connected to the mains. 29 cottages at Bulford, the property of the War Department were also connected to the mains during the year.

Cholderton Parish. This parish is supplied by the Cholderton Water Company which also supplies a part of the Andover Rural District. One sample was taken during the year and this proved very satisfactory chemically, and bacteriologically was sterile.

Shrewton Parish. The tender of Messrs. Wort and Way of Salisbury was accepted for this scheme, and I am pleased to report that by the end of the year under review the laying of the mains had been completed. The installation of the pumps was required to complete the scheme. At the time of writing water is being supplied to the inhabitants, analysis shows excellent chemical results and bacteriologically the water is sterile.

Tilshead Parish. The supply from the War Department supply at Tilshead is satisfactory. An extension of the pipe line has been made during the year to supply houses erected by the Council.

DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE.

Amesbury. This parish is the only one in the District which has the advantage of a main scheme of sewerage and sewage disposal. Samples of the effluent which is discharged into the river are taken by the County Council and these have proved satisfactory.

Various lengths of the old sewers in Amesbury are defective and the question of relaying these lengths should receive consideration. During the period December to March the disposal works were unable to deal with the greatly increased flow which is attributable to the sub-soil water finding its way into the defective sewers.

An extension of the sewer was made in Holders Road to serve the Council's new housing estate.

Durrington and Bulford. I regret to have to report that progress has been held up towards the provision of a main scheme of sewerage and sewage disposal for these parishes.

A Ministry of Health Inquiry has been held into the Council's application for a loan for the sewerage of Bulford and Durrington. A late request by the War Department to include Bulford Camp in the scheme has however further delayed the matter.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

No action has been found necessary under the provisions of the Rivers Pollution Prevention Acts.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

Practically the whole of the dwellings in Amesbury, with the exception of the Ministry of Agriculture's estate are connected to the main sewers. Only one conversion of an E.C. to W.C. was made in Amesbury during the year. With the exception of the Council's Housing Schemes at Amesbury the closet accommodation to Council houses is E.C.'s.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

The scheme of house refuse collection which came into operation on the 1st April, 1937, has proved satisfactory. The question of providing an incinerator capable of disposing of 8 tons of refuse per day of eight hours has received consideration. An Inquiry into the Council's application for a loan for $\pounds1,400$ for the purchase of an Incinerator and tin baling plant has been held and sanction to the loan given. The tender submitted by the New Destructor Company Limited of Pershore has been accepted and the work will be put in hand at an early date. Collection of night soil is still carried out once weekly in the parishes of Bulford and Durrington.

SHOPS AND OFFICES.

No action has been found necessary under the Shops Act, 1934.

CAMPING SITES.

There are no recognised camping sites in the district and no licences were issued under Sec. 269 of the Public Health Act, 1936.

SMOKE ABATEMENT.

There are no premises in the district which are likely to give rise to smoke nuisance, and no action has been found necessary.

SWIMMING BATHS.

There are no public or private swimming baths in the district to which the public have access.

ERADICATION OF BED BUGS.

I am pleased to report that no case of bug infestation was found during the year under review.

MILK SUPPLY.

The number of wholesale producers of milk registered at the end of the year was 69, of this number 20 persons hold licences to produce accredited milk and 3 persons hold licences to produce Tuberculin Tested Milk.

Regular inspections have been made of all cowsheds and dairies in the district and many defects have been remedied as a result of informal action by the Sanitary Inspector.

Inspection has also been made along with the County Sanitary Inspector of premises where milk which is supplied to schools is produced. As a result of these inspections one producer was called upon to remedy defects. Generally speaking the methods employed in the production of milk in the district are very satisfactory.
