CAUSES OF SICKNESS.

There was a slight outbreak of measles during June - All Schools in Andover were closed, which checked the epidemic.

In November a case of Diphtheria in the boys school (Church of England) occurred - swabs were taken of all boys in the class, & later owing to fresh cases occurring, the whole school was tested. All carriers & cases were sent to the Isolation Hospital & the school closed for one week. There was no further outbreak.

SANITARY ADMINISTRATION:

PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF:

Dr. L. E. A. B. Farr, Medical Officer of Health.

Mr. R. W. Knapp, Inspector of Nuisances.

The above are part time officers.

HOUSING.

Twenty-seven houses were erected during the year by private enterprise and plans passed for the erection of a further twenty-three. The prospect of help from Government Subsidy has greatly stimulated the desire to build.

WATER SUPPLY.

A short length of 3" main has been extended into Barlow's Lane to accommodate prospective builders, but the desirable main extension to Leigh Road is still pending. During the year 41 new services have been laid on from the Town's water mains. The method of supply to high levels is still by intermittent pressure pumping into the mains, and since installation of a sufficient standby engine, complaints of insufficient supply have become infrequent.

DRAINAGE &
SEWERAGE.

No new sewerage works have been undertaken this year, but active consideration is being given to the demand of residents in Leigh Road for an extension of a sewer thither. The old sewers in New Street and the North end of High Street (referred to in last year's report) have not given much trouble this year although their condition is known to be very defective

SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

The system of Septic treatment and subsequent Bacterial treatment and irrigation of the Town's sewage has continued successful, as evidenced by Analytical reports upon the final effluent.

THE RIVER ANTON.

The Council's efforts to prevent pollution of the River Anton continue to be attended with success. The most troublesome thing in this connexion at present is the solid rubbish thrown into the River by unknown persons, as a means of getting rid of it. It would be very useful if they could be prevented from doing so.

SCAVENGING.

The weekly kerb collection and disposal of house refuse, and special removals of Trade refuse is carefully carried out. Almost the only complaints received are against kerb collection, a system which has unfortunately enormous economy to recommend it, one horse and cart being able to scavenge the whole Town area in eight days.

FOOD.

Two lots of food, consisting of 168 lbs. of ribs and 101 lbs. of beef in too advanced stage of decomposition to be fit for human consumption, have been seized and dealt with, but no other food has been discovered exposed for sale unsound.

BATHS.

The private baths of Messrs Beale were again subsidised for use for the public during the summer months.

SLAUGHTER

The Humane Killor is now in general use in the five local slaughter-houses. (2 "licensed", 3 "registered")

12 cases of Infectious disease have this year been successfully isolated in the Andover Rural District Hospital by a contributory arrangement with that Council.
