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

#### GENERAL CHARACTER OF THE DISTRICT.

Outcrop of the chalk bed; springs issuing from this form the permanent source of the River Anton, which runs through the centre of the Town. Soil.

Loamy gravel overlying chalk, except in the river valley where alluvial soil overlies the river gravel and chalk.

#### LEVELS.

The District comprises numerous spurs from a land table, some 300-500 feet above mean sea level, into the Anton Valley. The level of the river at Andover is about 190 feet above sea level.

#### OCCUPATIONS.

These include Agriculture, Iron Foundries, Railways, Shop-keeping, Gas Works, Milling, Building, Watercress Growing, and Printing.

# GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

HOSPITALS PROVIDED OR SUBSIDISED BY THE LOCAL AUTHORITY OR COUNTY COUNCIL.

(A) (I) FEVER.—Arrangements have been made with the R.D.C. whereby patients suffering from infectious diseases are admitted to the Isolation Hospital at Weyhill. There are 21 beds.

The U.D.C. pay a retaining fee of £152 per annum to the R.D.C. and a further sum of Three Guineas per week so long as the patient is in hospital. This latter does not include extra nursing or special treatment.

- (2) SMALL-Pox.—No local Small-Pox Hospital, but the County Council have their own.
- (B) (I) TUBERCULOSIS.—No local Tuberculosis Hospital, the nearest being situated at Chandlers Ford, and subsidised by the County Council.
- (2) MATERNITY.—Three Wards, one with two and the other two with one bed each, at the War Memorial Hospital in Andover. In addition, infectious cases are admitted to the Royal County Hospital, Winchester.
- (3) CHILDREN.— There is a Children's Ward at the War Memorial Hospital, containing four beds.
- (4) The War Memorial Hospital is situated on the Charlton Road, about one mile from the centre of the Town, and contains accommodation for 37 cases (General Wards, 30; Private Wards, 4; Maternity Wards, 3).

Provision is made for both medical and surgical cases.

There is an operating theatre and X-Ray. Light Therapy is also provided.

During the year 549 in-patients were admitted, as against 535 in 1936 (32 maternity cases).

There were 3600 attendances in the out-patients' department, against 3152 in 1936; 281 photographs were taken in the X-Ray department.

The average cost of each in-patient per week was £2 9s., as against £2 10s. 9d. in 1935.

# (1) Water Supply.

  - (i.) Source of Supply and Extensions carried out.

The water has been derived exclusively from the borehole in the chalk at the Council's Smannell Road Waterworks, whence it is pumped to the covered reservoir of 500,000 gallons capacity at Bere Hill, the supply being continuous.

# (b) Cesspools.

The number of cesspools in the unsewered part of the District has been increased by eight.

# (c) Sewage Disposal Works.

A continuously good effluent has been produced throughout the year from the Corporation's Sewage Disposal Works, as shown by the systematic samples and analyses.

The revision and extension of the work is proceeding, and it is expected that completion will take place early in 1938, when the ever-increasing demands of a growing Borough will be satisfactorily dealt with.

#### (d) Surface Water.

Owing to flooding taking place in Bridge Street and at the lower end of the High Street, it would appear that the disposal of surface water in this part of the town will need serious consideration in the near future.

#### (e) Enham Village.

Loan sanction having been obtained from the Ministry of Health, the scheme to provide drainage facilities to this village and to Charlton was commenced in November, and it is expected that the work will be completed in the Autumn of 1938.

#### (3) Rivers and Streams.

Steps have been taken to check pollution of the River Anton, and the Council have carried out such works of cleansing as have appeared necessary.

Sewage effluent at point of discharge into river has samples taken monthly, and prove a continuous good effluent.

# (5) Public Cleansing.

No extension to the existing system has been carried out during the year, the existing arrangement being the weekly collection in the urban part of the area and a monthly collection of tins, etc., in the rural part of the area.

# (b) Refuse Disposal.

The disposal of house and trade refuse has been generally by controlled tipping at the Old Winton Road tip. Complaints regarding this site having ceased, the emergency tip outside the Borough was not brought into use at any period during the year.

# (c) Cleaning of Cesspools.

The Council has not yet undertaken this work.

# SMOKE ABATEMENT.

No general smoke nuisance has been experienced during the year, the only premises likely to require attention being laundries,

in respect of which it was found necessary to deal with one owner by the service of Statutory Notice, after which the nuisance was abated.

Recorded observations were carried out at regular intervals.

#### HOUSING.

A total of 79 new dwellings were erected during the year, comprising 69 houses, 6 bungalows, and 4 flats.

The Minister of Health caused an Inquiry to be held in relation to two Clearance Areas as follows:—

- 1. EASTFIELD BUILDINGS CLEARANCE AREA, comprising 16 houses and displacing 45 persons. The above Clearance Order was confirmed without modification.
- 2. Fourthorpes Yard Clearance Area, comprising 4 houses and displacing 16 persons. The above Clearance Order was not confirmed in consequence of an undertaking given by the owner at the Inquiry that the dwellings should not be used for human habitation. These houses were subsequently dealt with by Individual Orders, and the aforesaid undertaking accepted by the Council.

Resolutions were made in respect of five Clearance Areas, involving 25 houses and displacing 73 persons.

Considerable work has been carried out under Section II of the Housing Act, 1936, for the demolition or reconditioning of individual houses, and reference to page 15 par. (c) will give details of the action taken in this respect.

#### SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS.

The Open Air Swimming Pool was completed and opened to the public in June of this year.

The Scheme incorporates a pool 75ft. x 30ft., which contains 83,000 gallons of water, the depth varying from 3 feet at the shallow to 8ft. 6in. at the deepest point of the diving pit.

The latest type of plant has been installed to circulate, filter and sterilize the water at the rate of 13,800 gallons per hour, or 332,000 gallons per day, giving a complete change of water every 6 hours, which is in accordance with the requirements of the Ministry of Health. Frequent samples of water are taken and analysed by a Bacteriologist, and the reports are available for inspection by the public on request.

The supervision is under the direction of the Borough Surveyor. A fully qualified swimming instructor, nurse and attendant are in attendance throughout the swimming season.

The pool has been well patronised during the first season, bathing tickets issued totalling over 21,000.

The Council houses occupied by tenants moved from infested houses in Clearance Areas were reinspected at intervals, and found to be clear of bed bugs.

The Housing Department informs the Sanitary Inspector immediately a Council house becomes vacant, when an inspection is made and the house sprayed throughout with a liquid insecticide whether found verminous or not.

#### Methods Employed.

#### 1. Houses.

All work of disinfestation is carried out under the direct supervision of the Sanitary Inspector, who actually takes part in the work.

Spraying an insecticide by means of pressure sprayers has been used in all cases with success, all woodwork being eased off, a number of floorboards taken up, and partitions opened up.

Further disinfestation work is carried out after a lapse of 10 to 14 days, and should the walls be papered they are stripped beforehand, and distempered after the premises are found clear.

Houses that were infested are recorded, and visited at intervals, inquiries being made to ensure that the same are clear.

#### 2. Furniture and Effects.

All bedding is removed to a steam disinfector for disinfestation, but burning is resorted to in all cases where the tenant agrees.

#### VERMIN OTHER THAN BED BUGS.

Only two cases of nuisances from crickets were reported, these being dealt with by the use of powder insecticides.

#### SCHOOLS.

Periodical inspection of Sanitary Accommodation at Schools within the Borough is carried out.

# RATS AND MICE DESTRUCTION ACT, 1919.

The Council agreed to accept delegated powers from the County Council under the above Act, and it is hoped that these will be conferred at an early date. This will enable the Council to take Statutory Action if necessary in dealing with rat infested premises.

During the National Rat Week posters were exhibited on hoardings and in shop windows, and 500 circular letters giving advice and offering assistance and free issue of poison were delivered to occupiers of land and premises within the Borough. Twenty-five applications were received for free poison bait, which were issued in the form of red squill biscuits. Eleven applications were received for assistance in the destruction of rats, poison baits being laid in nine cases, the other two being dealt with by gassing. Fifty-one premises were visited and dealt with and four notices were served on persons accumulating refuse in such a manner as to attract or harbour rats.

All Council property is dealt with at regular intervals during the year.

#### NEW LEGISLATION AFFECTING PUBLIC HEALTH.

The Housing Act, 1936, came into force on the 1st of January.

The Public Health Act, 1936, came into force on the 1st October.

The above Acts are consolidating measures and will therefore simplify the work of Health Officials dealing with the enforcement.

#### SHOPS ACT, 1912-1936.

A large number of inspections were made during the year, covering the provisions of the above Acts as follows:—

Closing of Shops on the weekly half-holiday;

Evening Closing;

Assistants' weekly half-holidays and meal intervals;

Conditions of employment of young persons under 18 years of age;
