

WATER SUPPLY.

Water supply has been chlorinated since the War started and is satisfactory. The public supply covers most of the Borough.

SEWAGE.

The sewage works have been heavily overloaded since the evacuation and the problem has been solved by running it through the filters twice with the result of a satisfactory effluent.

HOUSING.

There is considerable overcrowding due to billetting and evacuation. Approximately 400 houses are either not worth repairing or will need very expansive repairs. No new houses have been built since the war and it is thought that another 400 will be needed as soon as possible.

GENERAL HEALTH.

The general health of the population has remained surprisingly good, due presumably to the supply of food being kept at a reasonable level. The provision of school meals seems to have kept up the health and nutrition of the school children.

SCABIES.

Most cases are treated by their own doctor, a few go to the Public Assistance Institution and some to the Isolation Hospital at Weyhill in cases where it is found inconvenient to treat them at home.

MEAT SUPPLY.

Slaughtering has been at the Co-operative Slaughterhouse distribution being to Andover Borough and Rural districts, and part of the Kingsclere and Whitchurch district. Inspection has been kept up to at least peace time standards but has involved a great deal of night work for the Inspector. Some of the meat has at times been rather poor quality, the amount of Tuberculosis has been about the same as pre-war; on the average 1 in 5 Carcases being infected.
