To the Chairman and Members of the Andover Rural District Council

Mr Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the health and sanitary circumstances of your district for the year 1968.

The Registrar General reported an estimated fall of population figures from 21,980 in 1967 to 21,060 in 1968. At the same time our birth rate rose and the death rate fell!

With the exception of measles there has been no significant outbreaks of infectious disease. Vaccination against measles began in May, but as supplies were short, it was limited to children under 7 years at first.

Infective hepatitis was made notifiable over the whole country in June. It is thought this disease is on the increase. Not a lot is known about its causation and mode of spread and it is hoped more will be learnt about it.


A new programme of immunisation of children was introduced during the year. Although under it, children will be older before they are completely protected, it is thought that the new scheme will give a more complete protection.

Live Birth Rate

The crude live birth rate per 1,000 of estimated population was 19.2. The corrected birth rate (using a comparability figure of 1.21) was 23.2. For the Administrative County of Hampshire it was 18.4 and for England and Wales 16.9.

Illegitimate Births

There were 24 illegitimate births compared with 34 in 1967, and 14 in 1966. The illegitimate live birth rate is expressed as the percentage of illegitimate births to total live births and for 1968 was 5.3. It was 8.9 in 1967, 3.9 in 1966, 4.2 in 1965 and 4.0 in 1964. In the Administrative County of Hampshire in 1968 the rate was 1.2.

Still-births

There were 5 still-births in 1968, giving a still-birth rate per 1,000 total live and still-births of 12.12 compared with a rate of 5.2 in 1967, 24.7 in 1966, 11.1 in 1965, and 25.1 in 1964. In the Administrative County of Hampshire the rate was 0.23 in 1968 and for England & Wales 14.0.

Infant Deaths

Twelve infants under 1 year died in 1968 in Andover Rural District. Of these 9 died in the first week of life, 2 more between 1 & 4 weeks and the other between 4 weeks and 1 year.

Infant Mortality Rate

The Infant Mortality Rate is the total infant deaths under 1 year per 1,000 live births. In 1968 it was 29.6 compared with 26.2 for 1967, 33.7 for 1966, 30.9 for 1965 and 27.8 for 1964. For England and Wales in 1968 it was 18.0 and for the Administrative County of Hampshire it was 16.3.

Legitimate Infant Mortality Rate

The number of deaths in legitimate infants under 1 year per 1,000 live legitimate births in 1968 for Andover Rural District was 28.8 compared with 28.6 in 1967, 32.3 in 1966 and 30.9 in 1965.

Illegitimate Infant Mortality Rate

This rate was 41.7 in 1968, compared with a rate of zero in 1967, 71.4 in 1966 and zero in 1965.

Neonatal Mortality Rate

The number of deaths of infants under 4 weeks per 1,000 live births in 1968 was 27.2. The rate was 15.7 in 1967, 22.5 in 1966, 16.9 in 1965 and 25.0 in 1964.

Early Neonatal Mortality Rate

The number of deaths of infants under one week per 1,000 live births was 22.2. In 1967 it was 15.7, 1966 it was 16.9, in 1965 it was 16.9 and in 1964 it was 25.0.

Perinatal Mortality Rate

This is the number of infant deaths under one week plus still-births per 1,000 combined live and still-births. In 1968 it was 34.1 compared with 20.8 in 1967, 41.4 in 1966, 27.8 in 1965 and 46.4 in 1964.

Maternal Mortality Rate

For the fourth year running there were no deaths due to pregnancy and childbirth in the District.

The total number of deaths due to all causes in the Andover Rural District in 1968 was 138.

Diseases of the heart accounted for 51 deaths or 36.9% of all deaths.

Ischaemic Heart Disease, with 33 deaths, caused 23.9% of all deaths.

If all deaths due to diseases of the heart and circulatory system (including cerebro-vascular lesions) are combined, a figure of 79 deaths is arrived at - this is 57.2% of all deaths.

Cancer caused 19 deaths, i.e. 13.8% of the total. Of these, 4 were caused by cancer of the lung and bronchus, i.e. 21.1% of deaths due to cancer were caused by cancer of the lung and bronchus.

IMMUNISATION AND VACCINATION

Poliomyelitis Vaccination

Vaccination against poliomyelitis was offered to all persons under 40 years of age. The vaccine generally used is the oral (Sabin) type vaccine which is easier to administer, especially to children. It is important to ensure that the highest possible acceptance rate, especially among young children, is maintained.

Measles Vaccination

In 1968 vaccination was introduced against measles and 289 children under 15 years were vaccinated.

An outbreak of measles was due last winter but it is interesting to compare the number of cases notified in the Rural District with the three previous years.

This same trend is apparent in the national figures. It was stated by the Department of Health and Social Security that there were perhaps 100,000 less cases in England and Wales in the last 3 months of 1968 than were expected. It seems likely that the disease could be wholly prevented and it is hoped that parents will seek immunisation for their children.

Diphtheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough Vaccination

The most frequently used agent is Triple Antigen, which contains antigens of diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus. This reduces the number of injections necessary, which are usually commenced when the infant is about three months old. The antigens, given combined in a single vaccine, produce a greater protection to each disease than they would if given separately.

A major part of the Housing Survey was completed during the year but only in isolated cases was it necessary to take action under Section 16 of the Housing Act, 1957. In several cases it was found that sewage disposal was difficult but this should be improved considerably if Ministry permission is obtained for the main drainage scheme in the western part of the District.

ROBUST CONTROL

NOISE ABATEMENT ACT, 1960

Very few complaints were received during the year and in the main these were of a minor nature from factories in the area. In each of the cases prompt action on the part of the owners of the factories resulted in the abatement of the nuisances.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

The general inspection of premises was carried out during the year. A few minor contraventions were found such as lack of requisite notices and unsuitable first aid equipment, these were rectified informally. New lighting standards were introduced during the year but as they fell much below the standard previously set in the District were found to be of little use.

PETROLEUM CONSOLIDATION ACT 1928

The petroleum installations were all inspected prior to licensing. A noticeable improvement in installations had taken place during the year and it was only necessary to send 18 informal letters for minor infringements of the Licensing Conditions. These infringements were mainly for warning notices and sand containers. Two new private installations were completed during the year and a garage in the district increased its capacity for storage with two new 5,000 gallon tanks. This brings the total licensed capacity for petroleum to 139,340 gallons.

RODENT CONTROL

During the year it was necessary to carry out treatment at 313 premises, twenty seven of which were agricultural premises. These figures showed an increase of 21 properties which was mainly due to improved survey. Premises with major infestations and known blackspots are now visited at least twice a year, usually April and November so that any re-infestations can be stamped out at an early stage.

The treatment of properties used 24 cwts of barley meal and approximately $1\frac{3}{4}$ cwts of warfarin. The Rodent Operator is also responsible for mole treatments involving trapping and the use of strychnine. 39 treatments were carried out and cost of works was recovered from the complainants on a time basis. Business premises are also required to pay for rodent control, but a free service is provided for all domestic properties.

SCRAP METAL DEALERS ACT 1964

The position with regard to scrap metal dealers remains unchanged from last year.

SLAUGHTERHOUSE AND MEAT INSPECTION

With the exception of sheep and calves the throughput at the Slaughterhouse has again shown an increase during the year. The abandonment of wiping cloths was implemented during the year which caused a certain amount of trouble due to the low water pressure at the Slaughterhouse which was insufficient to properly operate the sprays. A main water extension was carried out resulting in adequate pressure being obtained and suitable sprays have been installed and are in operation. The general standard of hygiene within the Slaughterhouse remains quite good and a more regular programme of maintenance work and decoration is being arranged by the Owner.

A 100% meat inspection was maintained throughout the year.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

A further 20 houses were connected to the main sewer in Hurstbourne Tarrant and Longparish making the total number of properties now connected 105.

A further 13 houses were connected in Abbots Ann and Upper Clatford, making the total number of properties now 140.

Plans and estimates for the main drainage scheme to cover the Parishes of Grateley, Amport, Monxton, Thruxton, Penton Grafton and Penton Mewsey have been forwarded to the Ministry of Housing and Local Government for their consideration. Details of this scheme have also been sent to the Hampshire County Council and the Hampshire River Authority.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

The regular weekly collection of refuse was maintained during the year. Refuse was disposed of by means of controlled tipping at West Down, Chilbolton. The possibility of extending the useful life of the tip by pulverising was investigated and plans are now in hand to install a pulveriser.

The cesspool and septic tank emptying service operated throughout the year, there being 856 cesspools and septic tanks emptied as compared with 850 in the previous year.
