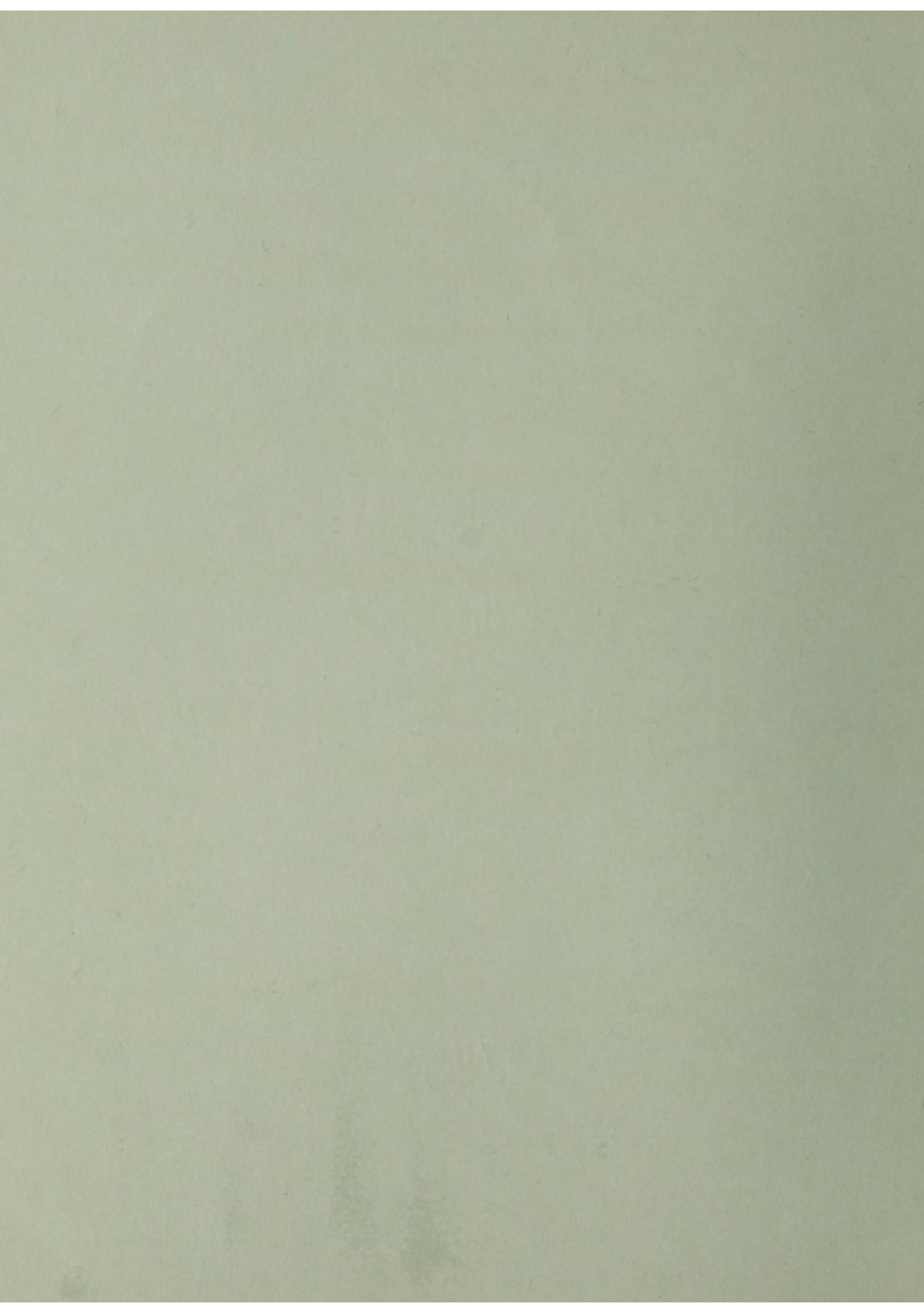

Mr Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the health and sanitary circumstances of your district for the year 1970.

The estimated mid-year population increased by 600, to 21,860. The natural increase of births over deaths was 276.

The majority of infectious diseases was due to measles. Unfortunately during the latter part of 1969 the vaccination campaign had to be curtailed because of reported cases of severe reactions from one manufacturers supply which was withdrawn. Supplies commenced in May 1970 and the vaccination campaign was recommenced.

Vaccinations against German Measles were commenced in the latter part of the year. Due to scarcity of vaccine, initially only girls in their 14th year were protected.

Close co-operation has been maintained with Social Workers in the district.

There were some staff changes in 1970. Mr B.H. Young, Senior Chief Public Health Inspector transferred to another district at the end of April and was replaced by Mr R.D. Prichard, who became Chief Public Health Inspector. At the same time Mr R. Shinton was appointed Deputy Chief Public Health Inspector. Mr C.P.C. Goucher became an Additional Public Health Inspector at the beginning of July. I should like to thank the Chief Public Health Inspector and the staff of his and my departments for their help in the compilation of this report.

Live Birth Rate

The crude live birth rate per 1,000 of estimated population was 19.0. The corrected birth rate (using a comparability figure of 1.21) was 23.0. For the Administrative County of Hampshire it was 15.5 and for England and Wales 16.0.

The ratio of the locally adjusted rate to the National Rate was 1.44 to 1.00.

Illegitimate Births

There were 27 illegitimate births and thus the illegitimate live birth rate expressed as a percentage of illegitimate births to total live births for 1970 was 7.0. In the Administrative County of Hampshire in 1970 the rate was 5.6 and for England & Wales, 8.0.

Still-births

There were 2 still births in 1970, all in legitimate infants, giving a still-birth rate per 1,000 total live and still-births of 5.0 compared with a rate of 10.0 in 1969, 12.1 in 1968, 5.2 in 1967, 24.7 in 1966, 11.1 in 1965 and 25.1 in 1964. In the Administrative County of Hampshire the rate was 10.0 in 1970 and for England & Wales 13.0.

Infant Deaths

Seven infants under 1 year died in 1970 in Andover Rural District. Of these 6 died in the first week of life, and the remaining one between one month and one year.

Infant Mortality Rate

The Infant Mortality Rate is the total infant deaths under 1 year per 1,000 live births, and for 1970 it was 17.0. For England and Wales in 1970 it was 18.0 and for the Administrative County of Hampshire it was 15.5.

Legitimate Infant Mortality Rate

The number of deaths in legitimate infants under 1 year per 1,000 live legitimate births in 1970 for Andover Rural District was 18.0 compared with 28.0 in 1969, 28.8 in 1968, 28.6 in 1967, 32.3 in 1966 and 30.9 in 1965. For England & Wales this figure was 17.0.

Illegitimate Infant Mortality Rate

This rate, the deaths of illegitimate infants under 1 year per 1,000 illegitimate live births, was zero in 1970, compared with a rate of 50.0 in 1969, 41.7 in 1968, zero in 1967, 71.4 in 1966 and zero in 1965. In England & Wales the rate was 26.0.

Neonatal Mortality Rate

The number of deaths of infants under 4 weeks per 1,000 live births in 1970 was 14.0. The rate was 21.0 in 1969, 27.2 in 1968, 15.7 in 1967, 22.5 in 1966, 16.9 in 1965 and 25.0 in 1964. In England & Wales it was 12.0.

Early Neonatal Mortality Rate

The number of deaths of infants under one week per 1,000 live births was 14.0. In 1969 it was 16.0, 1968 it was 22.2, 1967 15.7, 1966 16.9, 1965 16.9, and in 1964 25.0. In England & Wales it was 11.0.

Perinatal Mortality Rate

This is the number of infant deaths under one week plus still-births per 1,000 combined live and still-births. In 1970 it was 19.0, compared with 26.0 in 1969, 34.1 in 1968, 20.8 in 1967, 41.4 in 1966, 27.8 in 1965, and 46.4 in 1964. In England & Wales it was 23.0.

Maternal Mortality Rate

For the sixth year running there were no deaths due to pregnancy and childbirth in the District.

The total number of deaths due to all causes in the Andover Rural District in 1970 was 139.

Diseases of the heart accounted for 42 deaths or 30.2% of all deaths.

Ischaemic Heart Disease, with 27 deaths, caused 19.4% of all deaths.

If all deaths due to diseases of the heart and circulatory system (including cerebro-vascular lesions) are combined, a figure of 70 deaths is arrived at - this is 50.4% of all deaths.

Cancer caused 27 deaths, i.e. 19.4% of the total. Of these, 3 were caused by cancer of the lung and bronchus, i.e. 11.1% of deaths due to cancer were caused by cancer of the lung and bronchus.

There were 9 deaths due to accidents, three of these involving motor vehicles.

IMMUNISATION AND VACCINATION

Poliomyelitis Vaccination

Vaccination against poliomyelitis was offered to all persons under 40 years of age. The vaccine generally used is the oral (Sabin) type vaccine which is easier to administer, especially to children. It is important to ensure that the highest possible acceptance rate, especially among young children, is maintained.

Measles Vaccination

Vaccination against measles began in April 1968, and was confined to children under 7 years. In November 1968 this was extended to children up to 15 years of age.

Unfortunately in March 1969, owing to severe reactions occurring, all of one manufacturer's supply was withdrawn and the measles vaccination campaign was seriously curtailed. Supplies were short for the remainder of the year, and only improved in May 1970. Vaccination was recommenced and fewer cases are to be expected in future.

Diphtheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough Vaccination

The most frequently used agent is Triple Antigen, which contains antigens of diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus. This reduces the number of injections necessary, which are usually commenced when the infant is about three months old. The antigens, given combined in a single vaccine, produce a greater protection to each disease than they would if given separately.

ANIMAL BOARDING ESTABLISHMENTS ACT, 1963

No new premises have been licensed during the year. One has closed owing to the owner moving out of the district. The remaining four premises have been regularly inspected throughout the year and a very high standard of cleanliness and facilities has been found to exist in all cases. It has not, therefore, been necessary to take any action regarding these establishments.

CARAVAN SITES AND CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT ACT, 1960

The number of licensed sites within the area has remained the same during the year. Planning permission was given for an increase in the number of vans stationed on one site and the incorporation of part of the site for the accommodation for touring vans. This type of accommodation for touring vans appears to be a requirement within the district and full use has been made of the new site now in operation.

A reasonable standard has been obtained on all the sites within the district and minor infringements of the conditions have been satisfactorily dealt with without recourse to any legal action.

DOMESTIC WATER SUPPLY

During the year, 84 additional properties have been connected to the main supply.

50 samples have been taken throughout the year from the Reservoir of the Cholderton Water Co., and 6 samples from houses connected to this supply. All of these samples proved to be satisfactory. Cholderton Water Co., supplies domestic water to the western part of this District and to part of Amesbury R.D.C. Following the damage caused by vandals during the previous year the buildings and reservoirs have been kept locked to prevent a re-occurrence.

No. of samples taken from the Main Supply - 20.

During the year a complaint was received from one house-holder regarding a taste to the main water supply to his dwelling house. Samples taken were found to be satisfactory and investigations were carried out but it was unable to determine the cause of the taint. The supply seems to have been satisfactory since.

Regular samples taken of the main supply from various other points throughout the district all proved to be satisfactory.

The unsatisfactory samples were from private supplies within the district. In each case the cause was investigated and advice given on the cleansing of the wells and storage tanks. After the necessary works follow up samples were taken to check that the supplies were satisfactory.

Ice Cream Vending Stalls

Two additional registrations were granted during the year bringing the total number of premises registered for the sale of ice cream to 68. As in previous years only pre-packed proprietary brands are sold. All ice cream samples taken from various premises throughout the district received satisfactory results.

Food Contamination

The following food was voluntarily surrendered and disposed of by privatisation at the Council's Welfare Shop, West Town, Gillingham.

Food Samples

Five complaints regarding the condition of food were received during the year which are as follows:

180 samples of milk were collected from schools and roundsmen within the district and submitted for examination; of this number 23 did not comply with the Methylene Blue Reduction Test. Following a report to the Council regarding the sharp increase in the number of samples which failed to comply with the Methylene Blue Reduction Test, official samples have been taken from the various roundsmen delivering milk in the district. All these samples proved to be satisfactory, however, so it was not possible to take statutory action against the Dairies concerned.

Ice Cream Retail Premises

Two additional registrations were granted during the year bringing the total number of premises registered for the sale of ice cream to 68. As in previous years only pre-packed proprietary brands are sold.

All ice cream samples taken from various premises throughout the district received Provisional Grade 1.

Food Condemnation

The following food was voluntarily surrendered and disposed of by pulverisation at the Council's Refuse Tip, West Down, Chilbolton.

- (a) 1 x 15 oz can of Braised Beef
- (b) The contents of three deep freezers due to electrical faults.

Food Complaints

Five complaints regarding the condition of food were received during the year which are as follows:

- (a) Slug in a 1 pint Milk Bottle
- (b) Metal Bush in a Cornish Pasty
- (c) Mouldy Cheese Spread
- (d) Mouldy Beef and Mushroom Pie
- (e) Mouldy Raspberry Fresh Cream Dessert

The details of these complaints were reported to the Council who decided not to instigate legal proceedings.

Food Codings

Following up the investigations of the complaint regarding mould growth on the fresh cream Dessert where there appeared to be a discrepancy between the codings of the manufacturer and the retailer, the codings of a number of perishable products were checked at various shops throughout the district. The manufacturers were very co-operative in deciphering their codes and in one instance it was found that the product was being delivered to the retailer after the recommended shelf life of the product had expired. When the matter was brought to the attention of the manufacturer, rotation arrangements at the distributing warehouse were re-organised and the matter corrected. All the retail grocers in the District were advised to use their own system of coding for perishable foods and to take care that stock was properly rotated to obviate the sale of stale or unfit food.

Housing Act, 1969

During the year seven applications were received for Qualification Certificates under the Housing Act, 1969. All these applications had to be refused as defects were found on inspection of the properties concerned. As yet none of the owners has carried out the necessary repairs to bring the properties up to the required standard and submit further applications for Certificates.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

During the year one new premise was registered, this being a General Post Office which was re-classified as a Sub-Post Office, thus coming under this Department's jurisdiction.

All registered premises were inspected throughout the year, either in unison with visits under alternative legislation or as specific visits under the Act. Only a few contraventions were noticed but with owner co-operation being readily available these were rectified without the need for official action.

PETROLEUM (CONSOLIDATION) ACT 1928

All petroleum storage sites were visited during the year and 12 minor faults required attention. The licensed capacity rose by approximately 10,000 gallons to 138,320 gallons. Garages in the district are gradually changing over to blender pumps from single grade pumps and this usually brings a need for increased storage capacity. Plans have been passed for three further installations, approximately 10,000 gallons altogether, which should be installed during 1971.

There has been no increase in self-service pumps in this area but the two pumps already installed at main road garages have functioned without incident.

The Racing Circuit at Thruxton is still served by bowzers but it is hoped that should B.M.R.C.'s Planning Appeal be allowed by the Department of the Environment, a permanent installation will be possible in the Paddock Area.

RODENT CONTROL

The past year in the district has been relatively quiet regarding rat infestations. Although more than 200 extra properties were surveyed the level of infestation throughout the Rural District was quite low. Over the past three years the Rodent Operator has visited all known 'black spots' at least twice a year. This greatly reduced the level of infestation at these places although the number of infestations increased from 110 to 166. Notified outbreaks fell from 290 in 1969 to 259 this year. As can be seen from the chart below, a slight rise overall in the number of infestations treated took place but due to the above mentioned survey policy, the quantity of bait used fell by $7\frac{1}{2}$ cwt.

Mice infestations continue to rise; 53 treatments this year against 33 in 1969. These were all notified infestations and this could mean that the public are at least realizing that mice are equally as hazardous in the home as rats.

SCRAP METAL DEALERS ACT, 1964

No new applications have been received for Registration under this Act. The total number of dealers registered remains at 6.

SLAUGHTERHOUSE AND MEAT INSPECTION

There was a slight increase in the number of animals slaughtered at the Abattoir, Appleshaw, during the year and the amount of meat condemned remained approximately the same.

During the year further improvements were carried out to the Slaughterhouse.

THE MEAT (STERILIZATION) REGULATIONS, 1969

Regular inspections were carried out at the Knackers Yard, Appleshaw, and samples taken of the meat before and after sterilization. These proved to be satisfactory.

DISEASES OF ANIMALS (WASTE FOOD) ORDER, 1957

There are two premises in the District licensed under the above Order to sterilize swill for pigs. Regular inspections were carried out and the premises generally were kept in a satisfactory condition.

During the year at the larger of these premises, where approximately 1,800 tons of swill is processed each year, and some 1,800 pigs are kept, extensive alterations were commenced, including the change over to an oil fired boiler for steam raising. When completed these alterations should result in much better conditions at the premises.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The Inspector from The Department of the Environment held an enquiry into the Pillhill Sewerage Scheme designed to serve the Western Parishes and the Department's findings are now awaited.

A scheme is being designed to drain Goodworth Clatford, the sewage to be pumped to the Andover Borough Council's new Works. A further scheme is being designed to drain the village of Hatherden.

Improvements have been carried out to the Shipton Bellinger Sewage Works to combat the difficulties experienced in the treatment of the Laundry Effluent.

A small extension to the Abbots Ann Sewerage scheme in Cattle Lane is expected to be started in the early part of 1971.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

The regular weekly collection of refuse continued throughout the year. The Pulverisor was installed at West Down, Chilbolton and commenced operating in February.

The cesspool and septic tank emptying service operated throughout the year and 842 tanks were emptied as compared with 864 in the previous year.
