I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the health and sanitary circumstances of your district for the year 1971.

The estimated mid-year population decreased by 1940 to 19,920. The natural increase of births over deaths was 251.

There were no outbreaks of infectious diseases. In fact, notifiable infectious diseases only totalled 31.

Vaccinations against German Measles were continued and were offered to girls between eleven and fourteen years.

There were no staff changes during the year.

Live Birth Rate

The crude live birth rate per 1,000 of estimated population was 19.1. The corrected birth rate (using a comparability figure of 1.21) was 23.1. For the Administrative County of Hampshire it was 17.5 and for England and Wales 16.0.

The ratio of the locally adjusted rate to the National Rate was 1.44 to 1.00.

Illegitimate Births

There were 24 illegitimate births and thus the illegitimate live birth rate expressed as a percentage of illegitimate births to total live births for 1971 was 6.0. In the Administrative County of Hampshire in 1971 the rate was 6.0 and for England and Wales, 8.0.

Still-births

There were five stillbirths in 1971, all in legitimate infants, giving a still-birth rate per 1,000 total live and still-births of 13.0 compared with 5.0 in 1970, 10.0 in 1969, 12.1 in 1968, 5.2 in 1967, 24.7 in 1966 and in 1965, the rate was 11.1. In the Administrative County of Hampshire the rate was 12.0 in 1971 and for England and Wales, 12.0.

Infant Deaths

Fourteen infants under 1 year died in 1971 in Andover Rural District. Of these seven died in the first week of life, three between 1 week and 4 weeks and the remaining four before their first birthdays.

The Infant Mortality Rate is the total infant deaths under 1 year per 1,000 live births, and for 1971 it was 37.0. For England and Wales it was 18.0 and for the Administrative County of Hampshire for 1971, it was 15.0.

Legitimate Infant Mortality Rate

The number of deaths in legitimate infants under 1 year per 1,000 live legitimate births in 1971 for Andover Rural District was 34.0, compared with 18.0 in 1970, 28.0 in 1969, 28.8 in 1968, 28.6 in 1967 and 32.3 in 1966. For England and Wales this figure was 17.0.

Illegitimate Infant Mortality Rate

This rate, the deaths of illegitimate infants under 1 year per 1,000 illegitimate live births, was 83.0 in 1971, compared with a rate of zero in 1970, 50.0 in 1969, 41.7 in 1968, zero in 1967, 71.4 in 1966 and zero in 1965. In England and Wales the rate was 24.0.

Neonatal Mortality Rate

The number of deaths of infants under 4 weeks per 1,000 live births in 1971 was 26.0. The rate was 14.0 in 1970, 21.0 in 1969, 27.2 in 1968, 15.7 in 1967, 22.5 in 1966 and 16.9 in 1965. In England and Wales, it was 12.0.

Early Neonatal Mortality Rate

The number of deaths of infants under one week per 1,000 live births was 18.0. In 1970, it was 14.0, in 1969 16.0, 1968 22.2, 1967 15.7, 1966 16.9 and in 1965 16.9. In England and Wales, it was 10.0.

Perinatal Mortality Rate

This is the number of infant deaths under one week plus still-births per 1,000 combined live and still-births. In 1971, it was 31.0, compared with 19.0 in 1970, 26.0 in 1969, 34.1 in 1968, 20.8 in 1967, 41.4 in 1966 and 27.8 in 1965. In England and Wales in 1971 it was 22.0.

Maternal Mortality Rate

For the year 1971 there was one death due to pregnancy and child-birth in the District. The Maternal Mortality Rate is the ratio of maternal deaths associated with pregnancy and child bearing to the total number of births (live and still) expressed as a rate per 1,000 and was 2.6.

Where the numbers are small, all the above rates are apt to fluctuate.

Deaths from all Causes

The total number of deaths due to all causes in the Andover Rural District in 1971 was 130.

Diseases of the heart accounted for 40 deaths or 30.7% of all deaths.

Ischaemic Heart Disease, with 24 deaths, caused 18.5% of all deaths.

If all deaths due to diseases of the heart and circulatory system (including cerebro-vascular lesions) are combined, a figure of 61 deaths is arrived at - this is 46.9% of all deaths.

Cancer caused 26 deaths, i.e. 20% of the total. Of these, 6 were caused by cancer of the lung and bronchus, i.e. 23.1% of deaths due to cancer were caused by cancer of the lung and bronchus.

There were seven deaths due to accidents, three of these involving motor vehicles.

IMMUNISATION AND VACCINATION

Poliomyelitis Vaccination

Vaccination against poliomyelitis was offered to all persons under 40 years of age. The vaccine generally used is the oral (Sabin) type vaccine which is easier to administer, especially to children. It is important to ensure that the highest possible acceptance rate, especially among young children, is maintained.

Diphtheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough Vaccination

The most frequently used agent is Triple Antigen, which contains antigens of diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus. This reduces the number of injections necessary, which are usually commenced when the infant is about three months old. The antigens, given combined in a single vaccine, produce a greater protection to each disease than they would if given separately.

CARAVAN SITES AND CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT ACT, 1960

The number of licensed sites within the district has remained the same during the year. Regular inspections of the sites have caused a reasonable standard being maintained.

Some difficulties did arise at one site during the year concerning the condition of caravans used by the Hampshire County Council Social Services Department for the accommodation of Welfare families. A request was made to this department to restrict the sizes of families accommodated in these vans, and this co-operation has helped in improving the situation on the site.

Seventy-seven samples of milk were collected from schools and roundsmen within the district during the year and submitted for examination; of this number 2 did not comply with the Methylene Blue Test. One retailer changed his supplier during the year and at present this appears to have caused an improvement in the standard of the milk supplied by this dealer.

The assistance of the Department was requested by a dairy farmer who was having dirty churns delivered to his farm by the processing dairy. The matter was taken up with the dairy concerned who maintained that all the churns leaving their dairy were properly sterilized. The cause was eventually traced to the driver of the milk collection lorry who could not wait for all the churns to be cleansed and so made up his quota with dirty churns. Once the cause was found, the matter was very quickly put right and no further trouble has been experienced.

Ice Cream Retail Premises

Three additional registrations were granted during the year bringing the total number of premises registered for the sale of ice cream to 71. As in previous years only pre-packed proprietary brands were sold.

The 22 ice cream samples taken from various premises throughout the district received Provisional Grade 1.

Food Condemnation

The following food was voluntarily surrendered and disposed of by pulverisation at the Council's Refuse Tip, West Down, Chilbolton.

Food Complaints

Four complaints regarding the condition of food were received during the year which are as follows :-

- (a) Glass in a milk bottle
- (b) Traces of mineral oil in a loaf
- (c) Mouldy pilchards
- (d) Decomposing sausages

The details of these complaints were reported to the Council who decided not to instigate legal proceedings.

Watercress

Regular inspections are carried out at the many watercress beds in the District. It was found at one of these beds that a grower had opened up the bank of the adjacent river when water was low in his natural bore-holes. The trouble was quickly rectified when it was pointed out to the owner that one of the streams concerned originated from a pond frequently used by cattle for drinking and there was a serious risk of the watercress being infected with Liver Fluke. A suitable period was allowed to elapse before the watercress was cut so that the pure water had time to cleanse the beds.

Food Poisoning Outbreaks

There have been no confirmed cases of food poisoning outbreaks during the year.

Food Complaints

Four complaints regarding the condition of food were received during the year which are as follows :-

(a) Glass in a milk bottle

(b) Traces of mineral oil in a loaf

(c) Moldy almonds

(d) Decomposing bananas

The details of these complaints were reported to the Council who decided not to institute legal proceedings.

The Department took on the responsibility for improvement grants in September 1971.

Qualification Certificates

Two applications were received for Qualification Certificates; in both cases they had been refused in 1970 but as the necessary repairs had been carried out the Certificates were issued.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

All registered premises covered by the Act were inspected throughout the year; only very minor contraventions were noted and a verbal warning to the owners in question was sufficient for these discrepancies to be rectified.

PETROLEUM (CONSOLIDATION) ACT, 1928

All petroleum storage sites were visited and only minor infringements were found. One new storage tank was licensed for 500 gallons, bringing the licensed storage capacity up to 138,820 gallons. Planning permission had been granted at the end of the year for three further storage tanks.

A code of practice for the storage of liquified petroleum gas was issued in 1971. The code will be most useful in this area. Propane or butane is used quite extensively by farmers as an alternative to electrical power and, until now, very little control had been exercised on the siting of storage tanks.

No accidents concerning petroleum have been notified during the year, but one garage used its fire extinguishers to control a fire in a nearby dwelling.

RODENT CONTROL

The pattern of rodent infestation for the early months of 1971 followed the fairly quiet course of the previous two years. However, following the harvesting of cereal crops, it became apparent that the winter months were going to be particularly active. The Health Inspectors and Rodent Operator noticed many more rats on the move along hedgerows than normally seen in daylight hours, and the mild weather up until Christmas produced a steady stream of complaints. At the peak of infestations, 98 premises were at various stages of treatment. 27 major infestations of rats were treated during the year.

Mice infestations continue to rise but no problems have so far been encountered with Warfarin resistant mice. Farms and premises treated by private operators have been issued with notices warning of Warfarin resistant rats and asked to contact this Department should resistance be suspected. No queries have so far arisen.

Test baiting of sewers was carried out in the early part of the year. Forty-five manholes were baited but no takes were registered.

Insect Pests and Verminous Premises

The past year brought forth a bumper crop of wasps, over a hundred nests being treated by the Rodent Operator and Public Health Inspectors. Several cockroach infestations were treated successfully and during the autumn months complaints of cluster flies were fairly numerous.

Two unusual complaints were received, one of thrips, a small insect that lives in grass land, and the other was sepsids, or dung flies. Both these pests swarmed in July and caused considerable distress at the two properties infested.

One complaint of fleas was received when flea larvae were discovered in the complainant's bed. A badly infested dog was found to be the cause.

SCRAP METAL DEALERS ACT, 1964

No new applications have been received for Registration under this Act. The total number of Dealers registered remains at six.

SLAUGHTERHOUSE AND MEAT INSPECTION

The number of animals slaughtered at the abattoir has remained the same except for a slight rise in the number of sheep. The largest amount of condemnation is still attainable to Fasciola Hepatica (Liver Fluke) in cattle, Ascaris Lumbricoides (Milk Spot) in pigs, but there has been a marked increase in the number of cattle livers found to be affected by abscesses.

The slaughterhouse was further improved by the addition of extra hanging space and a cutting room. The owners were also pressed to carry out improvements to the drainage system which has become seriously overloaded.

THE MEAT (STERILIZATION) REGULATIONS, 1969

There is still only one plant operating within the district; this is at the Knackers Yard, Appleshaw. Regular inspections have been carried out and samples taken to ensure the efficient operation of the plant.

DISEASES OF ANIMALS (WASTE FOOD) ORDER, 1957

Regular inspections have been carried out at the two premises where swill is sterilized for pig food. Extensive alterations were completed at the larger of the two establishments and apart from several small troubles, which have been satisfactorily overcome, the plant is now working well.

PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936

Following the death of a young chemist who took cyanide poison, the Department was called in to cleanse a furnished flatlet in which the incident took place. Whilst the initial cleansing of the flat was quite straight forward there was a strong possibility of crystals being left behind in the furnishings. The difficulty was to ascertain the extent of contamination. It was decided to dispose of the bedding completely and this was taken to the Council's refuse tip. The remainder of the furniture, floor covering, etc., was treated with minute care with Ammonium Nickel Sulphate, a neutralizing agent, provided by the young man's previous employers, who assistance and advice was very much appreciated.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

Surveys have been carried out and a scheme designed to drain the Western Parishes and Goodworth Clatford into the Borough of Andover's new sewage works. This scheme will be ready for submission to the Department of the Environment about the middle of 1972.

A small extension to the sewers in Cattle Lane was completed during the year and the sewerage is pumped to the Abbots Ann sewage disposal works.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

The regular weekly collection of refuse continued throughout the year. All the refuse is now pulverised and the Council have been accepting and pulverising all the domestic refuse from the Andover Borough Council since October, 1971.

The cesspool and septic tank emptying service operated throughout the year and 944 tanks were emptied as compared with 842 in the previous year.
