General Provision of Health Services (Contd.)

Laboratory Service

Examinations are carried out for this Authority by the Public Health Laboratory at St. Mary's Hospital, Portsmouth. Two samples of water from the public mains supply were examined during the year.

Ambulances

The Local Health Authority (the West Sussex County Council) provides an ambulance service with ambulances operating from Littlehampton. The same Authority provides a hospital car service in the area.

Home Nursing and Midwifery

The West Sussex County Council provides nursing services.

All the nursing staff in the Arundel area are attached to General Practitioners.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES

Water Supply

Worthing Borough Council provides water to the Arundel Borough. The supply is from a borehole and well in Arundel situated off Mill Road near Swanbourne Lake. Water is pumped unfiltered to reservoirs in Arundel Park and Herons Wood, and is chlorinated at the Waterworks before distribution.

Every house in the Borough has a piped main water supply.

Two specimens of chlorinated water from consumers taps were submitted for bacteriological examination during the year and were found to be of satisfactory purity. No samples were submitted for chemical or mineral examination.

Drainage and Sewerage

The Council have two sewage disposal works - a small one in Fitzalan Road on the south side of the River Arun, and the main works in Ford Road on the north side. In addition, there are four small works installed by private estate developers which take drainage from 40 houses. The outfalls are to the River Arun which necessitates holding tanks as the River is tidal.

There are several other direct outfalls from the soil and surface water sewers to the River apart from those previously mentioned. The majority of these are penstock controlled, some manually and some automatic. Nearly all of these outfalls are in the old town section of the Borough.

The sewers are partially separated, some rain water is received into the sewage works and the remainder into separate sewers which discharge into the River Arun.

The main sewage works in Ford Road do no more than act as holding chambers before the untreated sewage is discharged into the River Arun.

No major works of alteration were carried out at either of the sewerage works during the year.

In order to deal with back flooding to dwellings in Fitzalan Road a 2" petrol driven pump was installed adjacent to the outfall. This enables the sewage to be lifted as required and disposed of at a higher level than the normal discharge. It is, however, evident that the amount of rain water getting into the sewers on this system is a contributing factor to the collection tank being unable to cope with the effluent during very high tides.

For some time flooding in the basin of the valley between Torton Hill and Canada Roads has taken place after heavy rain. This was

Drainage and Sewerage (Contd.)

caused by the existing small drain being unable to cope with the volume of rainfall run-off from the roads and houses in this area. By the laying of some 80 yards of 15" sewer, this valley has been by-passed and surface water now discharges into the main culvert in Ford Road. Back flooding of the soil and storm water sewers takes place in several parts of the Town. This is mainly due to high tides which occasionally lock various outfalls and so prevent discharges, and also to faulty penstocks. Two penstocks to the sewer outfalls were renewed during the year and a further four were reconditioned.

Thirty-seven premises have water carriage sanitation and either drain to cesspools, septic tanks or soakaways. All dwellings are situated in positions which make it impossible to connect to a sewer or where main drainage is not available.

No cesspool emptying is carried out by the Corporation.

Public Conveniences

The Corporation have two buildings housing public conveniences, one for both sexes on the Town Quay and the other in Mill Road for ladies only.

Both are satisfactorily maintained and all sections have facilities for the washing of hands.

Rivers and Streams

No action was necessary to check pollution of streams in the area.

A varying number of vessels are moored to wharves on the River Arun. These craft are mainly for Summer use and the number of moorings continues to increase.

Public Cleansing

The collection of household refuse in the Borough is carried out weekly by the Corporation, four men being fully engaged on this service. Trade refuse is also removed by agreement, and the whole collection service is carried out with a Dennis Paxit II rear loading freighter.

The partial collection of waste paper and scrap metals has continued and the following materials were disposed of :

Public Cleansing (Contd.)

The total weight of salvaged materials disposed of was 5 Tons 5 Cwts. more than in 1968, with an increase in revenue of £66. 9. 8d. This was largely due to the improved market for waste paper.

The filling of the lower ravine in Canada Road, adjacent to the old tip, has continued. A plentiful supply of soil has been available for this purpose, and following repeated bulldozing, a considerable area has now been levelled. The consideration shown by the Contractors using this tip has resulted in reasonably clean and tidy conditions being maintained.

Tipping has continued satisfactorily at the Chichester Road Quarry Tip - again largely due to the availability of adequate supplies of soil for covering. Owing to the large amount of refuse deposited during the year, the life of this tip is now very short.

The use of a second quarry close to the present site has been obtained for future use. Preparatory works including the clearance of shrubs and the provision of a roadway were in hand at the close of the year.

Every effort is made to carry out "controlled tipping" and one employee is engaged full-time on the tip for this purpose. To keep under control the potential menace of flies and rats, the tip is sprayed and regularly treated.

Under the Civic Amenities Act, 1966, local authorities are now responsible for the disposal of old cars, large unwanted furniture, etc. Whilst this service can be chargeable, it does create additional work and such bulky items have undoubtedly lessened the life of the tip.

The Corporation has continued the scavenging of County Roads as well as the emptying of street gullies in the District Roads.

Clean Air Act, 1956

No action has been necessary.

Eradication of Bed Bugs, Fleas, etc.

No complaints were received and no action was necessary

Tents, Vans and Sheds

Numerous enquiries are received, particularly in the Summer months, for sites for caravans and campers. Most of them find accommodation in the rural areas to the south of the Borough. Observation is, however, kept on the occasional caravan camper who is found parked on the roadside verge or some other similar spot.

There are no sites in the Borough licensed under the Public Health Act, 1936, or the Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960. Nor have the Corporation adopted Byelaws to control tents, vans and sheds.

Swimming Pools

The Corporation's open air swimming pool, opened in July, 1960, and known as the "Fitzalan Pool" is on land presented by the Duke of Norfolk and incorporates the main pool, a childrens' paddling pool, cafe and grass and sun bathing picnic areas.

Both pools are supplied with mains water which is circulated, filtered, chlorinated and aerated through cascades. During term time the pool was used by twelve local schools for instructional and recreational purposes.

Samples of the pool water taken for bacteriological examination were reported upon as being of the highest standard of purity.

Rats and Mice Destruction

Matters regarding rodent control are dealt with by the Council's part-time Rodent Operator. As a result of independant investigations, block control and complaints received, only a few minor infestations needed attention.

Council properties are regularly treated as a precautionary measure.

Schools

No alterations were carried out to the sanitary facilities at either of the Schools during the year.

Mortuary

The Corporation own and maintain a mortuary which is situated in Ford Road adjoining the Cemetery. The building is well equipped and kept in a satisfactory condition.

Petroleum Acts

Eleven licences for the storage of petroleum spirit were issued during 1969. Fifteen visits of inspection were made, and the storage arrangements of the applicants were found to be satisfactory. The premises licensed were as follows :

SECTION IV.

HOUSING

Rehousing:

Six families were rehoused by the Corporation during the year. All to fill casual vacancies occurring in existing dwellings.

Waiting List:

The waiting list was revised during 1969 and only applicants who reside or work in the Borough are now accepted.

At the close of the year the Council's list recorded 82 applicants for Council Houses.

Repairs and Maintenance:

Apart from specialists work, all repairs and maintenance to the Corporation properties are carried out by direct labour. Each dwelling contributes £17 per annum to the Housing Repairs Fund.

In addition to repairs and maintenance, the Council operates a free issue scheme for decorating materials as they do not undertake the internal decoration of houses.

New Council Houses:

No dwellings were erected in 1969. The Council have under consideration the provision of 16 dwellings for old people in 1970. A contract has been placed for the necessary road works to the site off Canada Road which should be commencing early in 1970.

Holmes Foundation:

With funds made available to the Corporation by the Late Mrs.L.Holmes six old peoples' dwellings were erected in 1964, and two further dwellings in 1968.

These eight dwellings are managed by the Corporation.

Almshouses:

Following the modernisation of their pre-war houses, the Council turned their attention to the almshouses under their control. A scheme for the modernisation and improvement of the four single persons dwellings in Mount Pleasant has been approved and in view of the lack of space available for modernisation, it has been decided to convert the four bungalows into two dwellings.

Following approval of the scheme by the Ministry of Housing and Local Government, an improvement grant was obtained and two dwellings have so far been converted into one unit.

Malthouse Cottages:

These seven old dwellings were acquired by the Corporation about 1930. Four of the dwellings then existed but three bungalows were

formed out of existing buildings.

As a result of the condition of these dwellings the Council decided upon a policy of gradual clearing and demolition with a view to redeveloping the site for housing purposes when clearance has been effected. Six of the tenants of these dwellings have now been rehoused and some demolition and site clearance has been started.

Garages:

The Corporation have 103 garages on their Housing Estates and have car parking space available on two other sites.

Private Housing

The year was again one of good progress towards better housing conditions, a large number of alterations, repairs and improvements having again taken place to the older houses.

Since 1946, the Corporation has acquired 20 sub-standard houses with the object of demolition. Of these, 19 have been demolished and the other reconditioned, improved and re-let.

The Corporation has endeavoured to continue an effective policy of demolition and closing of houses in such a condition as to be quite unfit for human habitation. During the past twenty years, 51 such houses have been demolished and a further 29 closed.

Wherever possible, however, the Council welcomes the submission of schemes for improvement and modernisation of such buildings. By this means, 35 demolition or closing orders have been revoked and good houses resulted. In addition, a number of 'border line' houses have been reconditioned by means of improvement grants.

The Corporation informed the Minister of Housing and Local Government in August 1955, that they proposed dealing with 40 sub-standard houses in the following five years. The Minister was further informed in 1960 that the Council intended during the next five years to deal with a

PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OF DISEASES

Fourteen notifications of infectious disease were received - Scarlet Fever (7); Measles (5); Infective Jaundice (1); Tuberculosis-nonrespiratory (1).

Cancer

Seven deaths (3 males, 4 females) were attributed to Cancer during the year (8 in 1968).

The Cancer Death Rate for 1969 per thousand of the estimated home population is 2.3 (2.6 in 1968). The corresponding rates for the Administrative County and the Urban and Rural Districts of West Sussex are 3.2., 3.2 and 3.1 respectively.
