#### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES

### Water Supply

The Borough is within the area supplied by the Worthing Corporation Water Undertaking.

The water supply to Arundel comes from a borehole and well situated off Mill Road near Swanbourne Lake. It is pumped unfiltered to reservoirs in Arundel Park and Herons Wood, and is chlorinated at the Waterworks before distribution.

Every house in the Borough has a piped main water supply.

### Drainage and Sewerage

The Council have two sewage disposal works - a small works in Fitzalan Road on the South side of the River Arun, and the main works in Ford Road on the North side. In addition, there are four small works installed by private estate developers which take drainage from 40 houses. The outfalls are to the River Arun necessitating holding tanks as the River is tidal.

There are several other direct outfalls from the soil and surface water sewers to the River apart from the outfalls previously mentioned. Nearly all these outfalls are in the old Town section of the Borough and the majority are penstock controlled, either manually or automatic.

The sewers are only partially separated, thus some rain water is received into the sewerage works, while the remainder runs into separate sewers which discharge to the River Arun.

The main sewage works in Ford Road do no more than act as holding chambers before the untreated sewage is discharged into the River Arun.

During the year works of repair were carried out to the walls of the holding tanks. Approximately 100 yards of 6" soil sewer were laid.

In order to deal with back flooding to dwellings in Fitzalan Road, an electric lift pump with automatic float controls was installed adjacent to the outfall. This enables the sewage to be lifted as required and disposed of at a higher level than the normal discharge. It is, however, evident that the amount of rain water getting into the sewers on this system is a contributing factor to the collection tank being unable to cope with the effluent during very high tides.

Back flooding of the soil and storm water sewers takes place in several parts of the Town. This is mainly due to high tides, which occasionally lock various outfalls and so prevent discharges, and also to faulty penstocks. Two penstocks were renewed during the year and a further three were reconditioned.

Thirty-eight other premises have water carriage sanitation and either drain to cesspools, septic tanks or soakaways. All these premises are situated in positions which make it impossible to connect to a sewer or where main drainage is not available.

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## Drainage and Sewerage (contd.)

No cesspool emptying is undertaken by the Corporation.

### Public Conveniences

The Corporation have two buildings housing public conveniences, one for both sexes on the Town Quay and the other in Mill Road for ladies only.

Both are satisfactorily maintained and all sections have hand-washing facilities provided. Repeated vandalism, however, makes this facility difficult to maintain.

### Rivers and Streams

No action was necessary to check pollution of streams in the area.

A varying number of vessels are moored to wharves on the River Arun and are mainly used during the Summer. The demand for moorings continues to increase.

## Public Cleansing

The collection of household refuse in the Borough is carried out by the Corporation weekly, four men being fully engaged on this service. Trade refuse is removed by agreement, and the whole service is carried out with a Dennis Paxit II rear loading freighter.

The partial salvaging of waste paper and scrap metals has continued and the following materials were sold during 1971 :

The total amount collected remained high, but the income from sales was considerably lower due to a fall in market prices.

The filling of the lower ravine in Canada Road adjacent to the old tip has continued. A plentiful supply of soil has remained available for this purpose, and following repeated bulldozing, a considerable area has now been roughly levelled. The consideration shown by the Contractors using this Tip has resulted in reasonably clean and tidy conditions being maintained.

Tipping continued satisfactorily at the new quarry at Scotland Barn until March when a severe fire commenced. Efforts to extinguish this fire by the Fire Brigade and by the bulldozing of earth on to the tipping

## Public Cleansing (contd.)

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area were unsuccessful resulting in the tip becoming unusable until September when, after bulldozing, it was re-opened.

During the period of the fire all refuse was taken to the Littlehampton Urban District Council's tip and the Borough were appreciative of the willing co-operation of their neighbouring local authority. A site for a reserve tip has now been obtained off Henley's Lane which is available in an emergency.

Every effort is made to carry out controlled tipping and one employee is engaged full-time on the tip. To keep under control the potential menace of flies and rats, the tip is sprayed and regularly treated.

Under the Civic Amenities Act 1966, local authorities are responsible for the disposal of old cars, large unwanted furniture, etc. Whilst this service can be chargeable, it does create additional work and such bulky items undoubtedly lessen the life of the tipping area.

The Corporation has continued the scavenging of County roads as well as the emptying of street gullies in the District roads.

Eradication of Bed Bugs, Fleas, etc.

One house was treated for an infestation of fleas.

#### Tents, Vans and Sheds

There are no sites licensed under the Public Health or Town Planning Acts in the Borough. Numerous enquiries are received particularly in the Summer months for sites for caravans and campers. Most of them find accommodation in the rural areas to the South of the Borough.

Observation is, however, kept on the occasional caravan camper who is found parked on the roadside verge or some other similar spot.

## Swimming Pool

The Corporation have an open air Swimming Pool known as the "Fitzalan Pool" on land presented by the Duke of Norfolk. It was opened in July 1960, and incorporates the main pool, a childrens' paddling pool, cafe and grass sun bathing and picnic areas. Both pools are supplied with mains water which is circulated, filtered, chlorinated and aerated through cascades.

During term time the Pool was used by twelve local schools for instructional and recreational purposes.

Samples of the Pool water were taken for bacteriological examination and were reported as being of the highest standard of purity.

### Rats and Mice Destruction

Matters regarding rodent control are dealt with by the Council's parttime Rodent Operator. As a result of independent investigations, block control and complaints received, only a few minor infestations were discovered to need attention.

Council properties are regularly treated as a precautionary measure.

### Schools

No alterations were made to the sanitary facilities at either of the two Schools during the year.

## Pet Animals Act, 1951

There are no such premises licenced within the Borough.

### Rag Flock and Other Filling Materials Act 1951

No premises in the district are registered under this Act.

### Water Cress

Visits of inspection were made to the watercress beds during the year. No complaints were received.

#### SECTION IV

#### HOUSING

### Council Re-housing:

Twenty-seven families were rehoused by the Corporation during the year.

#### Waiting List:

Only applicants who reside or work in the Borough are now accepted for registration. At the close of the year the Council's list recorded some 91 applicants.

### Repairs and Maintenance at Council Houses:

Apart from specialists work, all repairs and maintenance to the Corporation's properties are carried out by direct labour. Each dwelling contributes £17 per annum to the Housing Repairs Fund.

In addition to repairs and maintenance, the Council operates a free issue scheme for decoration materials as they do not undertake the internal decoration of houses.

#### New Council Houses:

Fourteen one bedroomed Old Peoples' flats were erected and occupied during the year.

#### Holmes Foundation:

Through funds made available to the Corporation by the Late Mrs. L.Holmes the Corporation erected six old peoples' dwellings in 1964. A further two were erected in 1968.

These eight dwellings are managed by the Corporation.

#### Almshouses:

Following the modernisation of their pre-war houses, the Council turned their attention to the almshouses under their control. A scheme for the modernisation and improvement of the four single person's dwellings in Mount Pleasant has been approved, and in view of the lack of space available, it has been decided to convert the four bungalows into two dwellings.

Two dwellings have so far been converted into one unit.

## Malthouse Cottages - Re-development Scheme:

The tenants of these seven dwellings have now all been rehoused and demolition of the old buildings commenced. Outline planning consent has been obtained to redevelop the site by the erection of ten new dwellings.

Ministerial approval to the ten units as the Council's 1972 building quota has been received and a scheme is now in preparation.

### Garages:

The Corporation have 106 garages on their Housing Estates, and have car parking space available on two sites.

### Private Housing

The year was again one of good progress towards better housing conditions, and a large number of alterations, repairs and improvements have again taken place to the older houses.

Since 1946, the Corporation have acquired 20 sub-standard houses with the object of demolition. Of these, 19 have been demolished and the other reconditioned, improved and re-let.

The Corporation has endeavoured to continue an effective policy of demolition and closing of houses in such a condition as to be quite unfit for human habitation. During the past 25 years, 58 such houses have been demolished and a further 21 closed. Wherever possible, however, the Council welcome the submission of schemes of improvements and modernisation of such buildings. By this means, 35 demolition or closing orders have been revoked and good houses resulted. In addition, a number of 'borderline' houses have been reconditioned by means of improvement grants.

The Corporation informed the Minister in August 1955, that they proposed to deal with 40 sub-standard houses in the following 5 years. The Minister was further informed in 1960 that the Council intended during the next 5 years to deal with a further 20 such premises. In fact, 69 dwellings have so far been dealt with as follows :

### Improvement Grants

The introduction of improvement grants first commenced under the House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959, and undoubtedly stimulated interest in the general improvement of older houses. After a period of inactivity, the Housing Act 1969, with its increased financial aid, once again aroused interest in the carrying out of works of improvement. This is evident from the number of enquiries and applications received for grants.
