Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report on the health and sanitary circumstances of the Urban District for the year ended 31st December, 1965.

The Registrar General's estimate of population for mid 1965 remains the same as last years, (5,700).

The figures for the number of births during the year is 73 that is 32 males and 41 females. This represents a decrease of 21 on the previous year's figures when 94 births (51 males and 43 females) were registered. The number of deaths registered during the year was 69 (28 Males, 41 Females), and this figure shows a decrease of (15) on that for the previous year. There were 2 still births during the year and out of only 73 Live Births, this gives a high rate of 26.66 per 1,000 as compared with the rate for England and Wales of only 15.7 per 1,000.

Deaths from cancer of all sites numbered 11 representing 15.94% of all deaths, and deaths from cancer of the lung and bronchus was classed as being responsible for 3 deaths

The Infant Mortality Rate of 19.0 per 1,000 Live Births in England and Wales was the lowest ever recorded in this country, our own Infant Mortality Rate of 13.69 per thousand is also extremely low.

A total of 9 notifications of infectious diseases were recorded (as against 3 notifications recorded during 1964), made up as follows :- Measles 4, Erysipelas 1, Tuberculosis Respiratory 2, Tuberculosis Other 2.

During 1965 I am again pleased to be able to report that we received no notifications of food poisoning cases in this district.

At the time of writing this report, Diphtheria has once again struck in Derbyshire. Unfortunately two children died in the very early stages and many contacts had to be followed up. This once again emphasises the only answer to this disease is, that immunisation of all children is a must for all parents.

I have once again to place on record my thanks to the Chairman and members of the Health Committee, to Dr. Morgan, the County Medical Officer, to the General Practitioners, the Clerk of the Council, and the Public Health Inspector and other Chief Officers, for their support and assistance, and to the staff of the Department for their untiring efforts during the year.

I have the honor to present to you my Annual Report on the health and sanitary circumstances of the Urban District for the year ended 31st December, 1924.

The Registrar General's estimate of population for 1925 remains the same as last year, (2,700).

The figures for the number of births during the year 1924 are 22 males and 21 females. This represents a decrease of 21 on the previous year's figures when 43 males and 43 females were registered. The number of deaths registered during the year was 20 males, 11 females, and 11 illegitimate. This figure shows a decrease of 12 on that for the previous year. There were 2 still births during the year and out of only 13 live births, but gives a high rate of 26.55 per 1,000 as compared with the rate for England and Wales of only 15.7 per 1,000.

B.C.G. Vaccination

The two schemes in operation, that is the scheme administered by the Chest Physicians on the one hand and the County Council Scheme on the other, continued to operate throughout the year. The Scheme administered by the Chest Physicians is limited to children who have been in contact with cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis and the County Council Scheme is for school children of the age of 13 years and upwards.

DIPHTHERIA AND DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION

No cases of Diphtheria has been notified in the district during the year under review.

I am indebted to Dr. J.B.S. Morgan, the County Medical Officer, who has kindly supplied the following details regarding Diphtheria Immunisations carried out during the year in this district.

Record cards received during the year in respect of children immunised during that year.

This gives a decrease of 25 primary immunisations and an increase of booster injections as compared with last year's figures.

The number of children receiving primary and booster injections for diphtheria immunisation is very disappointing. It is hoped that every effort will be made to persuade the parents to bring their children for these very necessary injections.

At the time of writing this report, Diphtheria has once more struck in Derbyshire. Unfortunately two children died in the very early stages and many contacts had to be followed up. This once again emphasizes, the only answer to this disease is, that immunisation of all children is a must for all parents.

POLIOMYELITIS AND POLIOMYELITIS VACCINATION

It gives me great pleasure once again to report that no confirmed case of poliomyelitis occurred in the district during the year, but freedom from infection can only be maintained if parents continue to bring their children for immunisation.

IMMUNISATION AGAINST WHOOPING COUGH AND TETANUS

Arrangements for immunisation against these two complaints is available through the Derbyshire County Council and the same arrangements remained in force throughout the year. Injections are given at the County Council Clinic, or by the General Practitioners and booster doses are given after the recommended interval has elapsed

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948 - SECTION 47
NATIONAL ASSISTANCE (AMENDMENT) ACT, 1951

These two Acts give authority to secure necessary care and attention for persons who :

- (a) are suffering from grave chronic diseases, or being aged and infirm or physically incapacitated are living in insanitary conditions, and
- (b) are unable to devote themselves, and are not receiving from other persons proper care and attention.

It was^{not} found necessary to take any formal action under these Acts during the year.

EXFOLIATIVE CYTOLOGY (COMMONLY CALLED SMEAR TESTS FOR CANCER OF THE NECK OF THE WOMB.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

The responsibility for the provision for Ambulance Service under Section 27 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, rests with the Derbyshire County Council, as the Local Authority.

The Ambulance Station at Ashbourne is situated in Park Avenue near the Fire Station and is manned from 8 a.m. to midnight. Whilst the period midnight to 8 a.m. is covered by personnel on stand-by duty, additional cover is afforded by the main station at Mickleover which is manned throughout the 24 hours. The establishment of the Ashbourne Ambulance Station is, 1 Superintendent, 1 Senior Driver, and 8 Driver/Attendants.

HOSPITAL SERVICES

Cases of infectious disease occurring in the district may be removed to the Derwent Hospital, Derby.

Cases of Tuberculosis requiring admission to hospital are referred to the Chest Physician, Chest Centre, Green Lane, Derby (Telephone Derby 47866), and may be admitted to the Derwent Hospital, Draycott Hospital or to Walton Sanatorium, Chesterfield.

All admission and discharge of cases of infectious disease, including Tuberculosis, are notified to the District Medical Officer of Health.

BACTERIOLOGICAL

All Bacteriological Examinations in connection with milk, water, food supplies and infectious disease are carried out at the Public Health Laboratory (Medical Research Council), 121a Osmaston Road, Derby (Telephone Derby 45597).

Specimens taken by Medical Practitioners are forwarded direct to the Laboratory and the results are not communicated to this department except when a positive result leads to notification under the Infectious Diseases Regulations.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my third Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1965.

The routine work of the Department was somewhat disrupted during the year with the survey of the Town Sewerage System. This entailed lengthy investigations in the tracing of old drains, and sewers and compiling a map and data.

A relief scheme has been formulated to deal with the excess surface water in the foul sewers and this is the subject of a separate report compiled in conjunction with the Engineer and Surveyor.

The Slum Clearance Programme practically came to a standstill during the year and because of this I can only reiterate my comments made in previous Annual Reports. The majority of persons remaining on the list are elderly and do not wish to move to Council Houses outside the town centre. A remedy could be "progressive slum clearance" action on the already partially closed Smith's Yard properties off Church Street and a redevelopment of the back-lands site with one and two persons dwellings.

I was pleased to see an increase of applications from owners of properties for Improvement Grants on tenanted houses. Although any improvement of sub-standard property whether tenanted or owner-occupied should be encouraged to the full.

The inspection of premises under the Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act, 1963 was commenced and it was necessary to serve, informal notices on the premises which were not complying with the complex regulations made under the Act.

Post mortem inspection of animals slaughtered in Ashbourne revealed no evidence of Bovine Tuberculosis although there was an increase in the Auran Type Tuberculosis Infections in pigs. These cases were duly notified to the Veterinary Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture who traced the sources of infection on the respective farms.

I have pleasure in thanking the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their support and the Clerk of the Council, Medical Officer of Health and the Engineer and Surveyor for their help and cooperation during the year.

FOOD SAMPLING

The Food and Drugs Authority is the Derbyshire County Council and the County Analyst J. Markland, Esq., B.Sc., F.R.I.C. has kindly supplied the following report on samples taken in the Urban District.

"114 samples were taken, including 85 Milks.

Two samples of T.T. Milk were reported against. One contained a small amount of added water and one was deficient in fat. The suppliers were cautioned. A sample of Channel Island Milk was slightly deficient in fat. A further sample from the same supplier was satisfactory.

A can of Fruit Salad contained a slightly excessive amount of tin. Four further cans from the same stock were satisfactory."

WATER SUPPLY

The South Derbyshire Water Board provide the water supply for the town, and I am indebted to Mr. I.G. Edwards, Engineer and General Manager, South Derbyshire Water Board for his observations which are given below :-

- (a) The water supply to the area has been adequate in quantity and generally satisfactory in quality.
- (b) Regular examination is made of both raw and treated water. A total of 52 bacteriological, 1 chemical and 59 partial chemical samples were taken during the year both at the works and from various points in the Urban District.

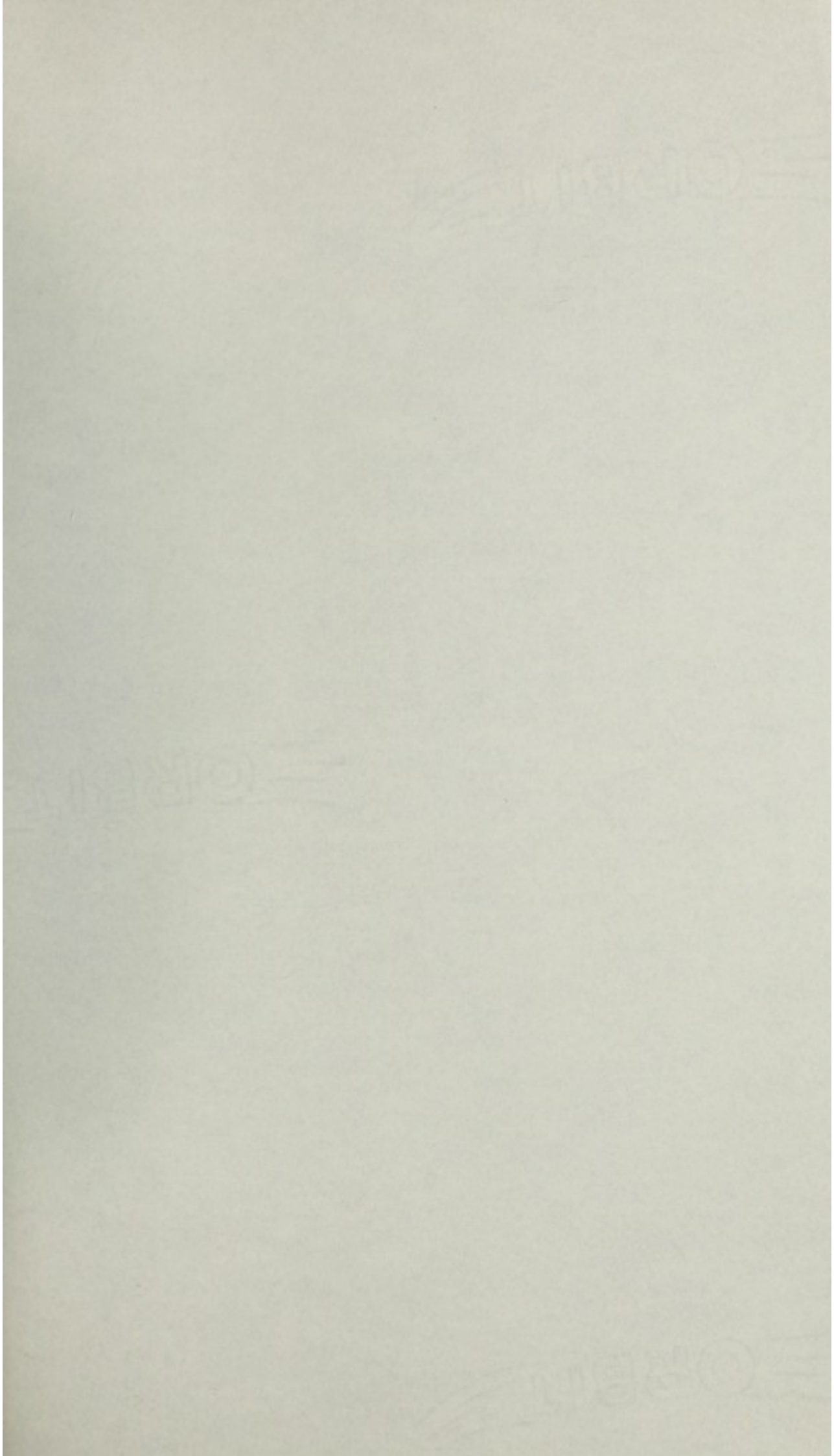
