MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT FOR 1904.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch,

April, 1905.

GENTLEMEN,

The following is my Report, as Medical Officer of Health, for the year ending December 31st last, together with the usual Tabular Statements giving the Births, Deaths and Cases of Infectious Sickness which occurred in the Urban District during that period. The total number of Births registered was 113, or a rate of 23.9 per thousand of the population, and the number of Deaths 99, or a rate of 20.2 per thousand, against 73 or a rate of 15.4 per thousand for the previous year. There were 19 deaths at the Union Workhouse and the Cottage Hospital of persons belonging to other Districts, so the number of deaths in the Urban District proper was 80, or a rate of 16.9 per thousand of the population, comparing with 13.5 for the previous year. Of the deaths due to Infectious Disease, 1 occurred from Diphtheria, 1 from Erysipelas, 1 from Puerperal Fever, and 10 from Consumption. The number of deaths among infants under 1 year of age was 21, or a rate of 185.8 per thousand births.

Reference to Table III. will show that there were 37 cases of Infectious Disease notified in the course of the year, namely: 2 Diphtheria, 7 Erysipelas, 5 Scarlet Fever, 5 Enteric Fever, I Puerperal Fever, and 17 Chicken Pox. The latter was made notifiable in the early part of the year, owing to Small-Pox having appeared in this and other Districts in the County. Of the 5 cases of Enteric, one was imported from another District and one occurred at the Union Workhouse, the other three cases occurred in houses which were badly ventilated. Influenza has now apparently become endemic, for it now appears as an epidemic year by year in the winter months, and 2 deaths were registered as having occurred from this disease. Consumption also accounts for no less than 10 deaths during the year, this is a large increase on previous years, and seems to have some relationship to the recurrent epidemics of Influenza, which renders those attacked in the badly ventilated cottages particularly prone to the disease. The subject of overcrowding and bad ventilation of Cottage property has been brought before the notice of the Council in the course of the year, and in one instance two rows of Cottages were condemned, with the result that they were dismantled, partially taken down, rebuilt and thoroughly ventilated. It is moreover the intention to proceed with this very necessary work of Sanitary improvement, and in the course of the year 1905 a considerable number of Cottages, which are in an unsatisfactory condition, will be treated in a like manner.

The various Lodging-houses in the town have been frequently inspected and reported upon. They are all antiquated, and until some better scheme for the accommodation of Lodgers is worked out by the Council, means have been taken to prevent as far as possible any overcrowding, and to secure for the inmates efficient ventilation.

The Dairies, Cow-sheds, and Slaughter-houses, Workshops, and Bake-houses, have been inspected from time to time, and were generally found satisfactory.
