Hospitals.

- A. (1) Fever:- Hospitals are provided by the Combined Leicestershire Hospitals Committee and are situated at Markfield, Hinckley, Blaby and Melton.
- (2) Smallpox:- Smallpox Hospitals are provided by the County Council at Syston (15 beds) and Snarestone (23 beds) Snarestone Smallpox Hospital is situated in your district.
- B. (1) Tuberculosis:- The County Sanatorium at Markfield is adequately equipped for the diagnosis and treatment of Tuberculosis.
- (2) Maternity:- The Maternity wing of the Ashby-de-la-Zouch Cottage Hospital is much used for midwifery cases from your district.
The Fairhaven Nursing Home, Shellbrook, Ashby-de-la-Zouch is also conveniently situated for midwifery cases from your district.
The Leicester and Leicestershire Maternity Hospital and the Leicester Royal Infirmary are available for cases requiring institutional treatment.
- (3) Children:- Children are admitted to Ashby Cottage Hospital and also to Leicester Royal Infirmary.
- (4) Other:- Delicate and illnourished children 3 to 5 years are admitted to the Children's Convalescent Home at Woodhouse Eaves.

Treatment Centres and Clinics.

There are none actually held in your district. An Infant Welfare Clinic is held weekly at the Baptist School Room, Ashby-de-la-Zouch. At the Health Centre, Bridge Road, Coalville an Antenatal Clinic and a Tuberculosis Dispensary are held regularly. A School and Dental Clinic is also conducted here. Venereal Diseases Clinic is held at Leicester Royal Infirmary.

Ambulance Facilities

Cases of Infectious Diseases are removed by Ambulances maintained for the purpose by the Combined Leicestershire Hospitals Committee.

Colliery Accidents are transported by ambulances provided and maintained for this purpose by the Leicestershire Coal Owners Association.

An ambulance provided by the St. John's Ambulance Association is available for Civilian Cases and is stationed at Coalville.

A van converted into an ambulance on loan to Ashby-de-la-Zouch Urban Council by Messrs Meredith & Drew Ltd., is available for Civilian Cases in the parishes adjacent to Ashby-de-la-Zouch Urban District.

Nursing in the Homes.

General District Nurses are provided in most of the parishes or combined parishes by local voluntary effort under the supervision of Leicestershire County Nursing Association. Many of the District Nurses undertake midwifery.

Infectious Diseases are not attended by District Nurses.

There is no provision for nursing such diseases as Measles or Whooping Cough in the homes.

Particulars of the quality of existing supplies:-

Piped supplies are of good quality. Wells in the agricultural parishes fairly good. No shortage occurred but a few wells on isolated farms went dry.

Three short extensions of the Public Water Supplies were made during 1944.

(1) To a farm. (2) To a Pipe Yard. (3) To a Colliery.

No action was taken to supplement water supply for emergency use.

The Public Water Supply is obtained from two sources:-

(1) Eastern Regional Waterworks where water is obtained from two Boreholes at Heather and piped to the following parishes:- Heather, Ravenstone, Swannington, Coleorton, Worthington and Osgathorpe.

(2) The Western Regional Waterworks obtains its water from a deep well at Acresford and supplies the parishes of Measham, Oakthorpe and Donisthorpe.

I wish to call the Council's attention to the need of piped water supplies to the parishes of Appleby Magna, Normanton-le-Heath and Packington.

Public Cleansing.

Public Cleansing is carried under control of the Sanitary Inspector. House refuse is removed by direct labour of the Councils' Workmen. The Council have three Karrier Bentam Refuse Collecting Vehicles, each with a 350 gallon night soil tank. Earth closets, ashpits and cesspools are emptied by the Councils' workmen. The dry refuse is removed to suitable tips and the wet refuse to agricultural land where it is ploughed in. Great difficulty was experienced during the year in the collection of house refuse caused chiefly by shortage of labour, illness amongst the employees and mechanical breakdowns in the vehicles. Collection of salvage has also thrown more strain on the sanitary services.

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The chief features with regard to Infectious Diseases during 1944 was the comparative lightness of the incidence.

Scarlet Fever:- During 1944 fifteen cases in all were notified. This disease continues to be very mild in type and no deaths occurred. Ravenstone with 8 cases and Coleorton with 4 cases were the parishes chiefly affected.

Diphtheria:- Two cases in all were notified throughout 1944. One occurred in a female aged 19 years at Newton Burgoland and the other in a schoolgirl aged 9 years who had previously been immunised. Both cases recovered.

During the year 1944- 483 children completed the immunisation treatment against diphtheria, of these 197 were under 5 years of age and 286 over 5 and under 15 years of age.

Whooping Cough:- Nine cases were notified during 1944. No deaths occurred.

Measles:- One case occurred during December 1944.

Erysipelas:- Four cases of erysipelas occurred throughout the year.

Acute Pneumonia:- Twenty-eight cases were notified. Two deaths occurred from pneumonia of all forms.
