To the Chairman and Members of the Ashby-de-la-Zouch Rural District Council.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to present my Annual Report for the year 1948.

It will be noted from the Registrar General's estimate that the population has fallen from 13,810 to 13,650.

The birth rate for your area in common with England and Wales is lower than in 1947.

The birth rate and death rate for the Ashby Rural area are almost identical with that for England and Wales.

The chief causes of death in 1948 were from diseases associated with elderly people.

Under the heading — "General Provision of Health Services in the Area" — a short resumé is given of the great changes that have taken place since July 5th, 1948.

The revised and corrected number of applicants for Council Houses at the end of the year was 641, and there were 215 new applicants during the year. The demand for housing accommodation appears to be as great as at any period since the termination of hostilities.

82 houses were completed during the year, 70 by the local authority and 12 privately.

Once again I am pleased to report that no case of diptheria was notified in 1948. On and after July 5th the responsibility for Immunisation against diptheria was taken over by the County Council.

27 cases of Scarlet Fever were notified at intervals, but never assumed epidemic proportions, mostly on one side of the rural district: Coleorton (10), Swannington (7), Heather (5), Ravenstone (2). All the cases were mild and 16 were removed to Hospital.

There were 118 cases of Whooping Cough with one death. Cases were notified from March to December. September (24) and October (33) showing the highest incidence, again mostly on one side of the district: Swannington (32), Coleorton (23), Ravenstone (16), Osgathorpe (6), Worthington (1) and Heather (1).

Measles was very prevalent, particularly during the first half of the year, 426 cases in all being notified without any deaths. Cases occurred in every parish except Bardon and Stretton-en-le-Field. In 1947 the east side of the district was only affected, the epidemic starting much later in the year and petered out in August. In 1948 it was not unexpected that the whole area should be affected, one case was notified in January from Worthington, then in February 16 cases from Worthington and 6 from Osgathorpe out of a total of 26 for the month. The epidemic starting from the east side soon spread all over the area reaching its peak in March with 160 cases, and April with 119 cases, then falling to 49 in May, 45 in June, 10 in July, 9 in August and only 7 from September to December. The majority of cases occurred in the following parishes: Measham (103), Oakthorpe and Donisthorpe (100), Appleby Magna (60), Coleorton (45), Ravenstone (39), Worthington (35), Swannington (12) and Osgathorpe (11). As with Whooping Cough, practically all the cases occurred in the under 10 Age Groups.

Although the number of cases on the Tuberculosis Register has dropped from 77 at the end of 1946 to 62 at the end of 1948, 12 fresh cases were notified in 1948, the highest number since 1944. Tuberculosis is a disease of overcrowding and associated conditions and in spite of the fact that three cases were reported from Council Houses, I would like to stress the need for more houses.

40 cases of Pneumonia were notified with only one death.

It is a pleasure to thank the Staff of the Public Health Department of the County Council for their willing help always so generously given.

Finally, I wish to express my appreciation to Mr. J. P. Cook, the Surveyor and Sanitary Inspector for his invaluable help during the year, and in the preparation of this report, and to you Ladies and Gentlemen for your kindness and co-operation.

SECTION B.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

General Provisions for Health Services up to July 4th were the same as in my previous Report for 1947, and the following embodies the changes that have taken place from July 5th to the end of the year.

Hospitals.

From July 5th all except some private Maternity and Nursing Homes such as Glencoe Nursing Home, Coalville and Fairhaven, Shellbrook were taken over by the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board. Those operating prior to July 5th are still mainly used, but other hospitals under the Board are available, and occasionally some outside the area of the Sheffield Region.

Treatment Centres and Clinics.

There are none actually held in your District. As formerly, Infant Welfare Clinics are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist School, Ashby, and every 2nd and 4th Thursday afternoon at the Centenary Methodist Church, Donisthorpe Road, Moira. The Clinic at Moira was started on October 14th, 1948. Venereal Disease Clinics are under the auspices of the Regional Hospital Board from 5th July, 1948. Cases of Scabies are treated at Swadlincote Urban District Council Treatment Centre. At the Health Centre, Bridge Road, Coalville, an Ante-natal Clinic and a Tuberculosis Dispensary are still available as formerly, the latter is under the auspices of the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

Ambulance Facilities.

From July 5th all ambulance services were provided by the County Council, the St. John Ambulance Brigade undertook the work as agents of the County Council, and in this area, the service is mainly provided by the St. John Ambulance Brigade at Coalville and partly from the County Ambulance Depot, Leicester. Colliery accidents are removed by ambulance provided by the National Coal Board stationed at the Central Ambulance Station, Nailstone Colliery, and at Moira.

Nursing in the Home.

All District Nursing and Midwifery in the Home is under the Leicestershire County Council as from the 5th July.

Health Visiting.

This work is provided as before by the Leicestershire County Council, and the work of Health Visitor, School Nurse and Tuberculosis Visitor, is combined in a single appointment. The work undertaken is very ably carried out in the area.

To the Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Councillors of the Rural District Council of Ashby-de-la-Zouch.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present this my Twenty-eighth Annual Report to the Council for the year ending December 31st, 1948, giving details of my work as Surveyor and Sanitary Inspector for the seventeen parishes under my supervision, viz.:—

> Appleby Magna, Bardon, Chilcote, Coleorton, Heather, Measham, Normanton-le-Heath, Oakthorpe and Donisthorpe, Osgathorpe, Packington, Ravenstone, Snarestone, Staunton Harold, Swannington, Swepstone, Stretton-enle-Field and Worthington.

The time has been fully occupied in making inspections in connection with complaints received and nuisances detected; inspection in connection with infectious diseases; rendering of houses fit for habitation; inspection of slaughter houses and knackers yard; water supplies; cowsheds and dairies; new buildings; ice cream and fish and chip premises; petroleum storage, etc.

My appointment as Manager of the Sewage Disposal Works and Public Cleansing Department have also entailed considerable work and supervision, also the work as Building Surveyor has increased during the year.

The Town and Country Planning Act, which came into force on July 1st, 1948, has also brought along considerable office work. This is in addition to the normal office routine which necessitates the expenditure of much time in keeping the necessary books, records of work and correspondence.

Six hundred and sixty-seven Informal Notices were served during the year and forty-five Statutory Notices.

TOWN PLANNING.

The new Town and Country Planning Act came into operation on July 1st, 1948.

The object of the Act is to secure that all land in the country is used to best advantage and broadly speaking the Act states:

- 1. No development shall take place without permission.
- 2. No compensation to be made where permission refused.
- 3. When development is sanctioned any increase in land value to be collected as a development tax by a Central Land Board which is to be set up.

In practice, district councils have been given the task of advising people who wish to develop land or property as to the necessary procedure, issuing the necessary forms, examination of plans, acknowledgement of same, ensuring that these are forwarded in quadruplicate to the County Planning Officer, informing the developer of the result of the application, etc., together with keeping all the necessary registers.

Everyone will agree that the object of the Act is admirable but it is extremely difficult to convince a person applying to my office for permission to erect a small building or make a slight alteration or extension to an existing house that it is necessary for him to submit four copies of plans, fill in numerous forms and then wait 8 to 10 weeks for a decision, or for a person purchasing a plot of land to willingly accept the fact that he must pay a development charge. There is little doubt that many working men who have saved their hard earned money in order to build a house in which to retire are badly hit by this charge, many of them being deterred from building or starting a small business. Whilst the Act states that land should be bought at agricultural value there is no doubt that in practice many people are still paying building value in order to get the piece of land they desire. Although the Act is in its infancy there can be no question that it will prove of immense value to the country with regard to the ordered development of the land in such a way that new buildings will be confined in compact areas rather than indiscriminately dotted over the countryside. This has in the past involved local authorities in very heavy expenditure in laying sewers, watermains and providing other services.

All sewage works have been kept in good working order throughout the year and effluents have been very satisfactory.

The nine inch sewer running down the fields on the south side of Oakthorpe, where outcrop coal is being worked, had to be diverted to allow the extraction of coal under the old sewer. This work was carried out to my approval and nine visits of inspection were made.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Work under this heading has generally been carried out very satisfactorily. In all areas a collection of night soil has been carried out promptly and at regular periods. The work of collecting the domestic refuse has occasionally been retarded by mechanical breakdowns of lorries and sickness of workmen.

A new tip is urgently required for the Swannington and Worthington areas.

COWSHEDS AND DAIRIES.

During the year inspection of cowsheds and dairies under the Milk and Dairies Order, 1926, have been carried out and I am pleased to say that all landlords and occupiers have carried out my instructions. Special mention must be made of the effort of milk producers to ensure that their milk has been wholesome and of a high standard of cleanliness. At the end of the year there were 60 producers of Accredited Milk and 13 of Tuberculin Tested Milk in the Ashby-de-la-Zouch Rural District. In connection with the scheduling of reconstruction work which must be carried out before the issue of a licence by the County Council, there has been co-operation between the County Council officials and myself.

COUNCIL HOUSES.

The 416 houses owned by the Council in the parishes of Appleby Magna (16), Coleorton (44), Heather (28), Measham (136), Oakthorpe and Donisthorpe (65), Osgathorpe (10), Ravenstone (33), Swannington (46), Worthington (32), and 6 Agricultural Workers' Cottages which are under my supervision have received my constant care and attention. In addition repairs at The Hollies, Ravenstone ; requisitioned house, Black Horse Hill, Appleby Magna and Shooting Box at Chilcote were supervised.

All repairs have been carried out as speedily as possible but there have been some unavoidable delays owing to shortage of labour and materials. Specifications, etc., have been prepared and estimates received for the replacement of 26 cooking ranges with new Cambridge Ranges and the installation of a hot water system at 26 houses in Leicester Road, Measham.

The 53 cases of overcrowding abated during the year were due to the Council rehousing overcrowded families in 53 new Council Houses at Measham, Ravenstone, Swannington and Heather.

In conclusion I wish to point out to the Council the invaluable work carried out by Mr. C. S. Curtis in connection with general inspections and by Miss J. E. Lilley in the typing, clerical and recording work so essential in my department.
