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



TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE
ASHBY-DE-LA-ZOUCH RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Report for the Year 1952.
According to the Registrar General's estimate the population remains about the same.

The birth rate (17.3) is higher than last year (16.3) and higher than that for England and Wales (15.3).

The death rate (11.1) is lower than last year (12.0) and slightly less than that for England and Wales (11.3).

The death rate of infants under 1 year of age (59.0) is higher than that for England and Wales (27.6). It has been higher than that for England and Wales for the past four years.

The chief causes of death were again mainly from diseases associated with elderly people.

All mains water supplies continue to be satisfactory, and adequate. There are still a number of well supplies which are unsatisfactory. Water mains have been laid and completed in the parishes of Packington and Appleby Magna. The Pumping Stations in connection with new boreholes at Acresford and Heather have been completed, and each pump is now in operation.

There are now 255 cesspools in the district and no post-war schemes of sewerage and sewage disposal have been carried out.

During the year 66 closets were converted to the water carriage system, and the number of houses with water closets continues to increase.

Towards the end of the year, some samples of milk showing evidence of infection with Brucella Abortus were being investigated, but no action had been taken up to the end of the year.

74 houses were completed during the year bringing the total of postwar houses to 377. After revision the total number of applicants for Council Houses at the end of the year was reduced to 531, as compared with 808 in 1951. However, 144 fresh applications were received between 1st October and 31st December, 1952.

171 cases of Infectious Disease were notified during the year, this included 114 cases of Measles; 29 cases of Pneumonia; and 21 cases of Whooping Cough. There were 4 deaths from Pneumonia. Measles was again prevalent for the sixth year in succession; cases were scattered during the year until the month of December, when numbers increased to epidemic proportions on both the east and the west side.

INFANT WELFARE CLINICS are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist School, Ashby-de-la-Zouch, and every 2nd and 4th Thursday afternoon at the Centenary Methodist Church, Donisthorpe Road, Moira. At the Health Centre, Bridge Road, Coalville, an Ante-Natal Clinic and Tuberculosis Centre are available, the latter is under the auspices of the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

The County Council is responsible for all ambulance facilities in the County. Colliery accidents are removed by Ambulances provided by the National Coal Board stationed at Nailstone Colliery and Moira Colliery.

FOR THE AREA

All the hospitals except some private institutions and mental hospitals are under the Statewide Hospital Board.

THE COUNTY HOMES for the aged and disabled are under the County Commissioners. Many of the towns have their own hospital boards.

HOSPITAL CLINICS AND CLINICAL CENTERS

There are some clinics paid by local Districts.

IMMUNIZATIONS CLINICS are being given Saturday afternoons at the Redfield School, and every Saturday morning at the General Hospital, Bismarck, Ondak, North Dakota. At the Hospital Center, Bismarck, Ondak, North Dakota, there is a mobile clinic and dispensary service to the county hospitals.

MEDICAL FACILITIES

The County Council is responsible for all immunizations. Community service units in the National Guard Board association provide mobile clinics and mobile clinics.

WORK IN THE HOME

All Districts maintain and furnish in the home if needed medical supplies and materials to the people in the county.

HOME VISITING

This work is being done by the Extension Service of the county. Some visitors are appointed, if possible, to make a survey appointment.

The Department of Health Visiting Service is the Dispersed Clinic. The Dispersion System includes first visits and visits to the homes.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

It gives me great pleasure to present to you this
my 32ND ANNUAL REPORT for the Year ending 31st December, 1952,
covering the parishes of :-

Appleby Magna, Bardon, Chilcote, Coleorton,
Heather, Measham, Normanton-le-Heath,
Oakthorpe and Donisthorpe, Osgathorpe,
Packington, Ravenstone, Snarestone, Staunton
Harold, Swannington, Swithland, Stretton-en-
le-Field, and Worthington.

The routine of housing inspections; inspection
of shops; water supplies; drainage work etc; has continued
throughout the year.

The Ravenstone Sewage Works continue to be
seriously overloaded, and urgently require reconstruction, and
the sludge lagoons at Measham are inadequate for the amount of
sludge which has to be dealt with. The Swannington Works are
already taking the maximum quantity of sewage with which they
can deal.

During the year Public Inquiries were held into
the proposed Sewage Schemes for Snarestone; Appleby Magna, and
part Measham; Heather; Worthington, Coleorton, and part
Swannington Schemes; but the Minister's decision has not yet
been received.

The collection of pail closets has continued to
be carried out at weekly intervals, and a routine of 10 to 11
days aimed at for the collection and emptying of dusthins,
although holidays and sickness has caused the interval to be
greater during certain parts of the year.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

If leaves me great pleasure to present to you this
2nd ANNUAL REPORT for the Year ending 31st December, 1922,
covering the stations of :-

Abbey Magna, Belgrave, Gifford, Goscote,
Hastings, Measham, Mowden-le-Hill,
Oakthorpe and Donisthorpe, Oadthorpe
Pocklington, Ravenstone, Susteads, Swanton
Hastings, Swannington, Swedecote, Stretton-on-
Te-Mere, and Wollington.

The routine of surveying inspections; inspection
of roads; water supplies; drainage work etc; was continuing
throughout the year.

The following scheme was continued to be
utilised for surveying roads; the measurement of
the surface area of each road was carried out by
strikings off the maximum width first
and then.

During the last half year were held two
broader surveys for estates; Abbey Magna, and
Buxton; Hastings; Measham; Mowden-le-Hill; Goscote, and Belgrave
Swannington; plus the Minister's description as far as
possible.

The collection of soil samples was continued to
be carried out at weekly intervals, and a longer
interval of 10 days was used to obtain the
greatest number of samples to describe
the soil conditions of the estate.

The ditch taking the effluent from the Osgathorpe Sewage Works to the brook has been piped in and has considerably improved the conditions existing there. In addition, repairs have been carried out to brickwork etc at these Works.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

This was the first year during which the Council employed their own Rodent Operator, one man being employed half-time on these duties and half-time assisting at the Sewage Works. He has carried out surveys of the parishes of Osgathorpe; Worthington (including Newbold and Griffydam); part Coleorton; Measham; Oakthorpe and Donisthorpe; and Appleby Magna; and also carried out the necessary treatments. This survey entailed the inspection of 2,211 premises and treatments at 203 premises.

The sewers were test baited during the year and were found to be free from infestation.

During the year a resident in the Rural District died from leptospirosis (Weil's Disease) which is carried by rats.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS AT TADA.

This was the first culture made by the Government in 1903. The two Rodent Officers, one man being employed half-time on pest control and half-time at the Sewage Works. He was scattered out among the various districts of the Government (including Newpoor and Giffilday); last collection; measures; ask for quote and District Offices; and Abbotsbury; and Messengers; to SSI for information of SSI treatment and experiments at 203 premises.

The sewerage works were soon put into full working order to meet the new demand for the waste water treatment.

During the year a teamster in the Rats District held the responsibility (Welli's Disease) which is carried by rats.




