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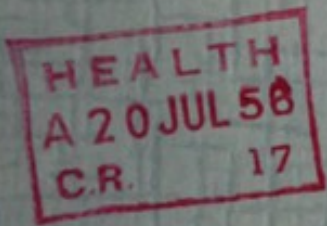

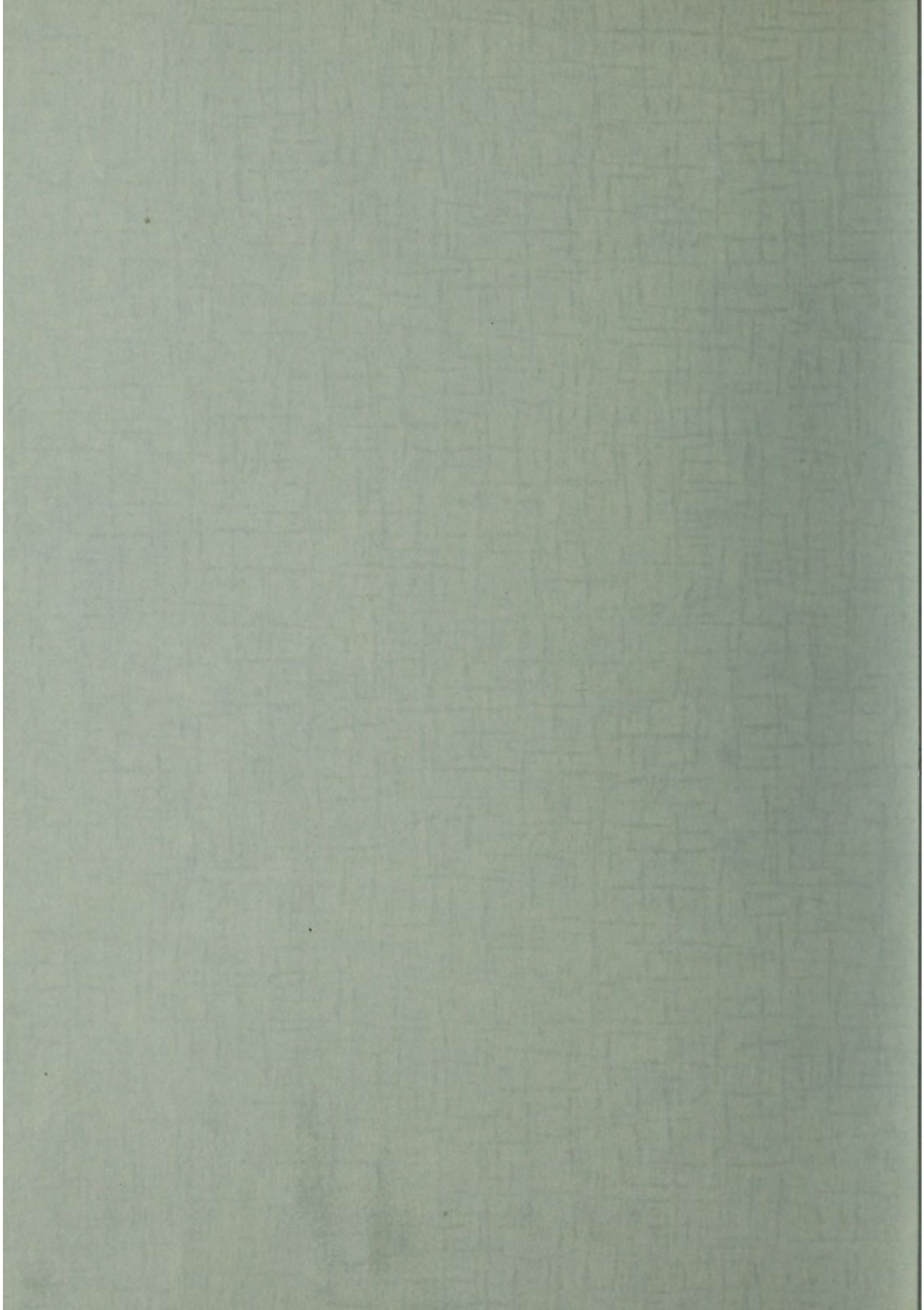

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE
ASHBY-DE-LA-ZOUCH RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Report for the Year 1955.

According to the Registrar General's estimate, the population has decreased slightly from 13,900 to 13,850.

The birth rate (13.0) is lower than last year (14.3) and lower than that for England and Wales, (15.0).

The death rate of infants under one year of age is 38.9., slightly higher than last year (30.1) and higher than that for England and Wales (24.9).

The chief causes of death has again been mainly from diseases associated with elderly people.

An outstanding event during the year was the taking over of Staunton Harold Hall to establish a Cheshire Home for the sick.

All water mains extensions have been completed with the exception of Lount Village, for which a scheme has been prepared.

Of the post war schemes of sewerage and sewage disposal, Appleby Magna and Worthington are in course of construction and approval has been given for a start on Osgathorpe. The scheme for Heather has been completed.

There are now 320 Cesspools in the district including 32 septic tanks constructed during the year.

89 closets were converted to the water carriage system during the year.

It will be noted that action was again necessary in connection with milk infected with Brucella Abortus but it was not necessary to serve notices stopping the sale of milk.

55 new houses were completed during the year making a total of 549 post war houses completed. The total number of applicants for Council Houses at the end of the year was 618, and the number of applications during the year 163.

240 cases of Infectious Diseases were notified during the year including 169 cases of Measles, 27 Whooping Cough, 17 Pneumonia, 11 Scarlet Fever, 8 Erysipelas and 1 case of Meningococcal Infection. There were 2 deaths from Pneumonia. Measles were notified at intervals during the whole year, but most cases occurred in the months of July, August and September.

In December, 7 cases of suspected Food Poisoning were notified. These proved to be cases of the Winter Vomiting Disease, which appeared to be very prevalent at that time.

I wish to report that there has been a slight decrease in the number of children being immunised against diphtheria, and there still remains a dangerously high percentage of children susceptible to diphtheria.

Only 2 new cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis were notified during the year. There were no deaths from Tuberculosis.

To the staff of the Public Health Department of the County Council, and to Doctor Mair, Director of the Public Health Laboratory, I wish to extend my thanks for their willing help and co-operation.

Finally I wish to thank Mr. C. S. Curtis, Surveyor and Sanitary Inspector, and to thank Mr. F.H. Wynne, for their invaluable help during the year and you, Ladies and Gentlemen, for your kindness and co-operation.

SECTION B.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

Hospitals.

All hospitals except some private Maternity and Nursing Homes are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

The County Homes for the aged and destitute are under the County Council. When the inmates take ill they become the responsibility of the Regional Hospital Board.

Cheshire Home for the Sick.

Group Captain Cheshire took over Staunton Harold Hall in March, 1955 in a practically derelict condition to establish a home for chronic sick patients.

One ward is now completed on the ground floor, and there are eight patients. This number will be increased when the first floor is completed. A lift is being installed and two bathrooms are being completed.

Treatment Centres and Clinics.

There are none actually held in your District.

Infant Welfare Clinics are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist School, Ashby-de-la-Zouch and every 2nd and 4th Thursday afternoon at the Centenary Methodist Church, Donisthorpe Road, Moira. At the Health Centre, Bridge Road, Coalville, an Ante-Natal Clinic is available. The Tuberculosis Clinic is held at Markfield Sanatorium under the auspices of the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

Ambulance Facilities.

The County Council is responsible for all facilities in the County. Colliery accidents are removed by Ambulances provided by the National Coal Board stationed at Nailstone Colliery and Moira Colliery.

Nursing in the Home.

All District Nursing and Midwifery in the home is under the Leicestershire County Council.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

Hospitals

All hospitals except those which are operated by the State and which are under the control of the Regional Hospital Board.

The County Board for the area and hospitals are under the County Council. When the County Council they become the responsibility of the Regional Hospital Board.

General Home for the Blind

Group Captain Cheah has been in charge of the Blind Home in Hong Kong in a hospital for the blind. The home is now completed on the ground floor and there are eight patients. This number will be increased when the first floor is completed. A lift is being installed and two bathrooms are being completed.

Treatment Centres and Clinics

There are some centres and clinics in the district. The Welfare Clinic are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist Church, Lady-de-la-Croix and every day and the Thursday afternoon at the General Hospital. The General Hospital, at the Health Centre, Bridge Road, Kowloon, an area which is available. The Physiotherapy Clinic is held at the General Hospital under the auspices of the Hospital Board.

Advanced Facilities

The County Council is responsible for all facilities in the County. Colliery assistance are provided by the Regional Council Board stationed at Kowloon Colliery and Kowloon Colliery.

Review in the Home

All District Boards and Committees in the home is under the latest review by County Council.

Health Visiting.

This work is provided by the Leicestershire County Council and the work of Health Visitor, School Nurse and Tuberculosis Visitor is combined in a single appointment.

The Diabetic Health Visitor attends the Diabetic Clinic at the Leicester Royal Infirmary and visits the patients in their homes.

An Outbreak of the Winter Vomiting Disease.

In December some 7 cases of suspected food poisoning were notified at Ravenstone.

Initial investigation pointed to winter vomiting although some features were suggestive of food poisoning. However, all bacteriological examinations were negative, and investigation of some 23 cases altogether established winter vomiting as the diagnosis, and it became evident that at this time there was a widespread epidemic of this complaint.

However, it involved immediate enquiry, and I am very grateful to Mr. Curtis and Mr. Wynne for the whole hearted way in which they threw themselves in to assist and to Doctor Mair of the Public Health Laboratory at Groby Road, Leicester, not only for his bacteriological examinations, but for much useful advice freely given.

The Ashby-de-la-Zouch Rural District is now in a Specified Area and no milk, other than designated milk, may be sold.

Refuse Collection.

Following a report on the refuse collection services, the Council decided to purchase a cesspool/pail emptying machine and to institute a bonus scheme in connection with the emptying of dustbins.

A 5 ton Bedford Chassis with Eagle body was purchased for use as a cesspool emptier and a night soil attachment was fixed to the rear. Cesspools are emptied on request and a charge is made of 30/- per load or part load.

The system has worked very well. It is interesting to note that cesspools which prior to the new scheme had never been emptied, are now being dealt with, and in certain cases where previously the old hand operated pump was used free of charge for the occupier (or owner), and where this person was most vociferous in requiring attention, there has now descended a sudden silence with no demand for the service. There is no doubt whatever, that if a free scheme is again given, additional staff would be required.

The scheme whereby the workmen receive a bonus, provided bins in the district allocated to them are emptied in the stipulated period, has so far worked very satisfactorily, although the scheme is still in its infancy.

A replacement refuse collection vehicle has been purchased and brought into use on the Northern side of the district.

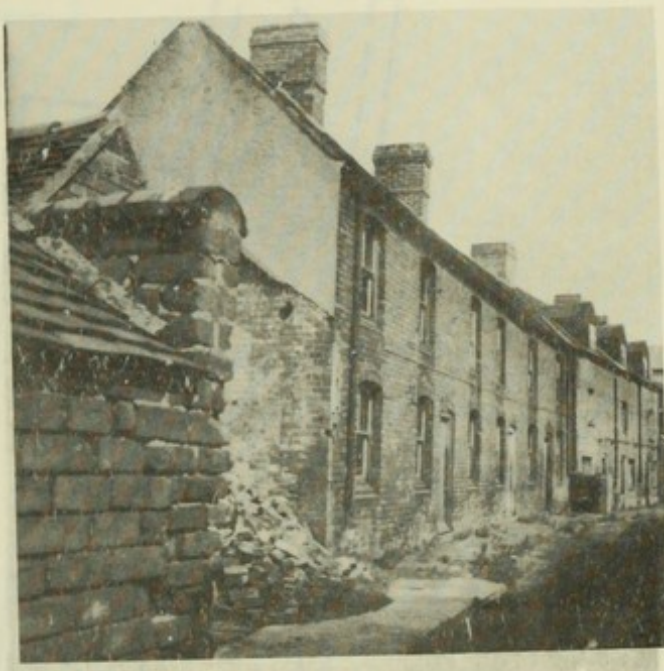

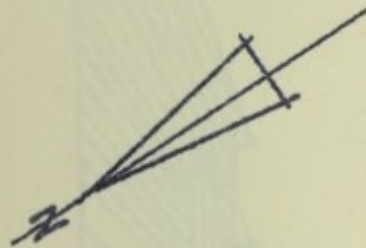

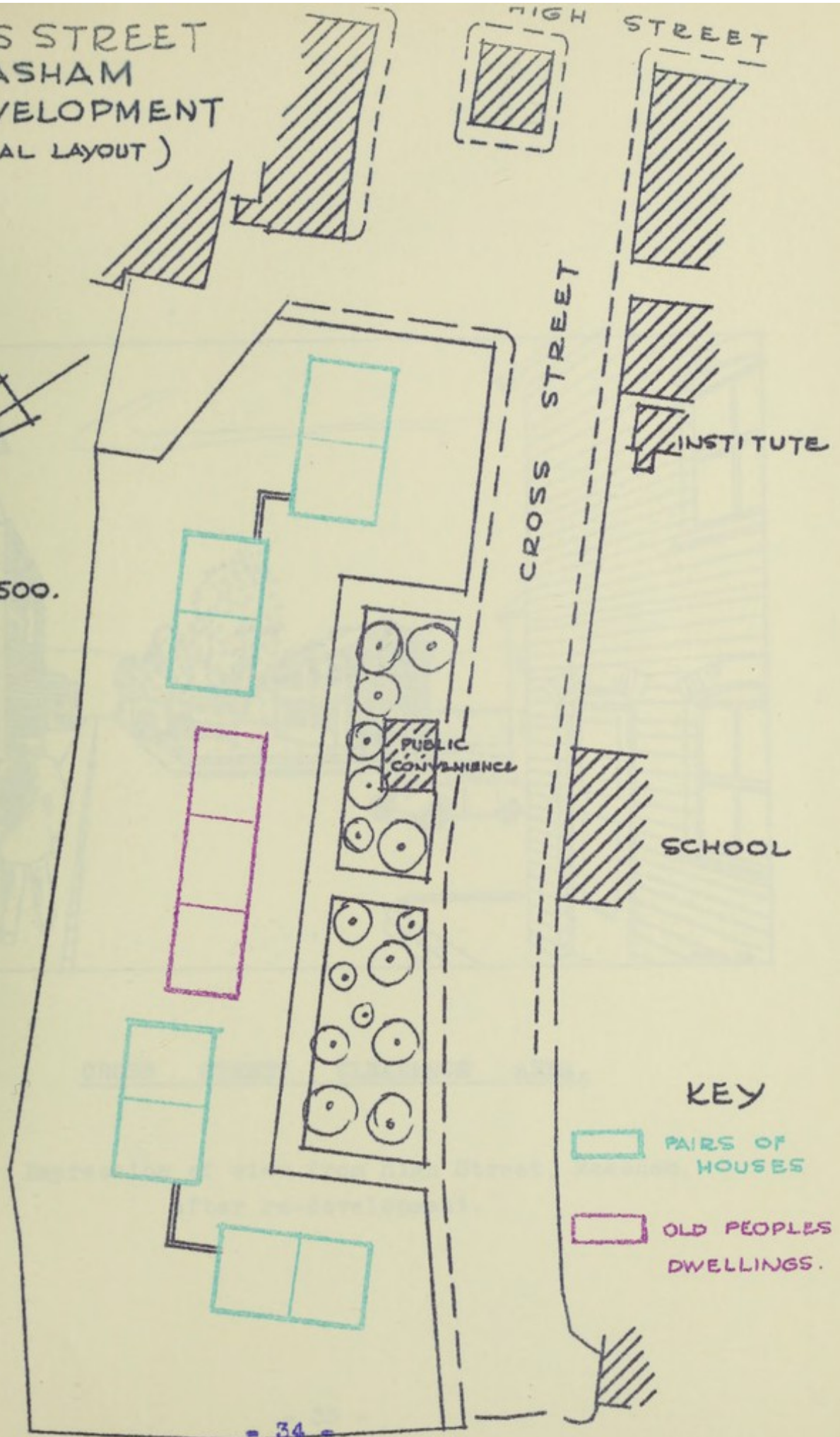

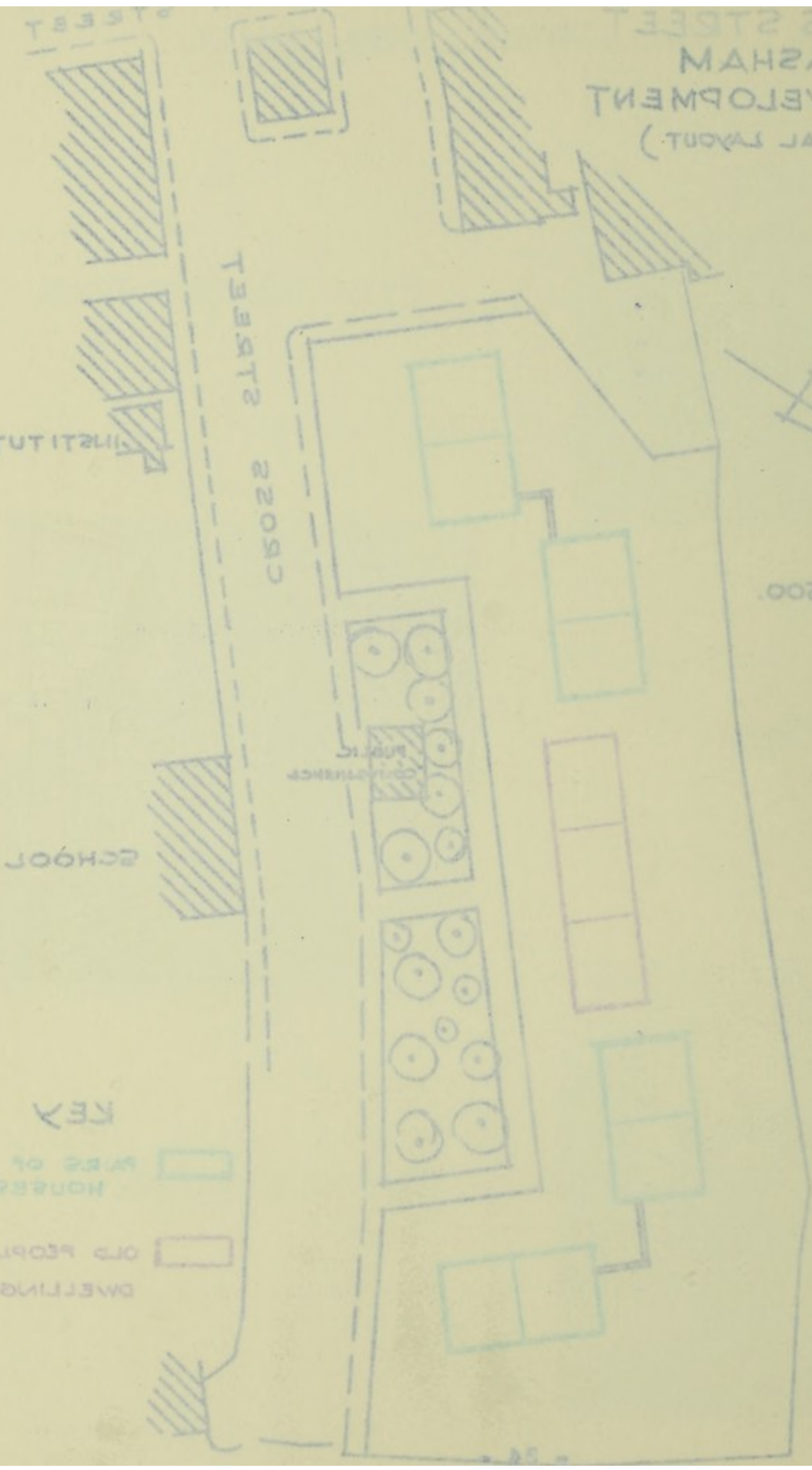

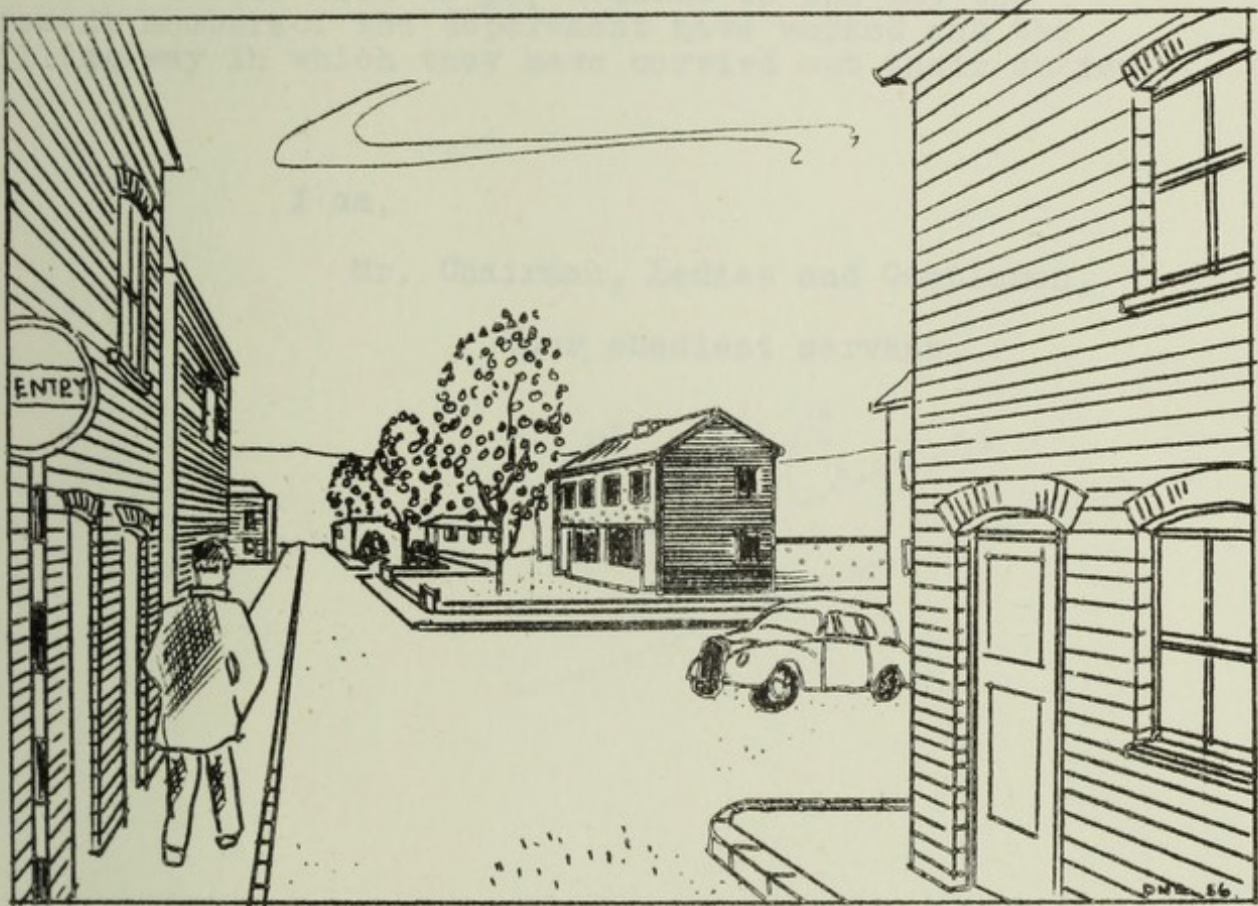
