Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Report for the Year 1956.

According to the Registrar General's estimate, the population remains stationary at 13,850.

The birth rate (14.2) is slightly higher than last year (13.0) and lower than that for England and Wales (15.7).

The death rate (11.3) is lower than last year (11.6) and lower than that for England and Wales (11.7). The death rate of infants under one year is 15.2 compared with 38.9 in 1955, and England and Wales (23.8)

Of the 153 deaths during 1956 there were 10 deaths from accidents and suicide. The chief causes of death, as has been the case for some years past, were from diseases associated with elderly people.

The Cheshire Home for the sick has been enlarged and is still continuing to expand.

It will be noted that all the parishes, with the exception of Bardon have a piped water supply.

Sewage works and laying of sewers were completed in Heather and Worthington. Appleby Magna, Osgathorpe and Snarestone sewerage and sewage disposal schemes are in progress. There are 374 cesspools in the district and 54 septic tanks were constructed during the year. 81 closets were converted to the water carriage system.

209 houses were completed during the year, making a total of 758 houses completed in the post-war period, of which 588 were completed by the local authority. The total number of applicants for council houses at the end of the year was 292 and the number of applications received 92.

My Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Report for the Year 1956.

According to the Registrar General's estimate, the
population remains stationary at 12,850.

The birth rate (14.2) is slightly higher than last
year (13.0) and lower than that for England and Wales (15.7).

The death rate (11.2) is lower than last year (11.4)
and lower than that for England and Wales (11.7). The
death rate of infants under one year is 15.2 compared with
16.2 in 1955, and England and Wales (15.5).

Of the 153 deaths during 1956 there were 10 deaths
from accidents and suicides. The chief causes of death,
as has been the case for some years past, were from diseases
associated with elderly people.

The Cheshire Home for the sick has been enlarged and
is still continuing to expand.

It will be noted that all the parishes, with the
exception of Bardon have a piped water supply.

Sanitary works and laying of sewers were completed in
Keston and Worthington. Atleby Works, Garschurp and
Garschurp sewage and sewage disposal schemes are in
progress. There are 274 cesspools in the district and 24
septic tanks were constructed during the year. 61 closets
were converted to the water carriage system.

203 houses were completed during the year, making a
total of 758 houses completed in the post-war period, of
which 588 were completed by the local authority. The
total number of applications for council houses at the end of
the year was 892 and the number of applications received
28.

82 cases of infectious diseases were notified, 27 Measles, 22 Whooping Cough, 19 Pneumonia, 6 Food Poisoning, 4 Scarlet Fever, 2 Erysipelas, 1 Dysentary and 1 Acute Encephalitis. 4 cases were admitted to hospital and there were 6 deaths, all from Pneumonia.

The outbreak of food poisoning was due to Salmonella Stanley, and it is thought it might have been acquired during a 'bus trip. One case was severe and was admitted to hospital, the others were mild.

I am pleased to report that the number of children being immunised against Diphtheria maintains the increase of last year.

Only 2 cases of Tuberculosis, both Pulmonary, were notified during the year and there was 1 death from Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

Evidence of Brucella Abortus infection was again found in milk, but no formal action was necessary.

To the staff of the Public Health Department of the County Council and to Doctor Mair, Director of the Public Health Laboratory, I wish to extend my thanks for their willing help and co-operation.

Finally, I wish to thank Mr. C. S. Curtis, Surveyor and Public Health Inspector, and to thank Mr. F. H. Wynne, Additional Public Health Inspector, for their invaluable help during the year and you, Ladies and Gentlemen, for your kindness and co-operation.

SECTION B

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

Hospitals.

All hospitals, except some private maternity and nursing homes, are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

The County Homes for the aged and destitute are under the County Council. When the inmates take ill they become the responsibility of the Regional Hospital Board.

Cheshire Home for the Sick.

The home is entirely voluntary and not under the Regional Hospital Board.

At the end of the year there were 21 patients, 12 women and 9 men, all chronic sick.

During the year, a third bathroom was added. Two womens wards have been completed and a womens sitting room has been opened.

Four wards are in process of being completed and a further bathroom is being constructed and central heating is being installed.

Treatment Centres and Clinics.

There are none actually in the district.

Infant welfare clinics are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist School, Ashby-de-la-Zouch and every 2nd and 4th Thursday afternoon at the Centenary Methodist Church, Donisthorpe Road, Moira. At the Health Centre, Bridge Road, Coalville, an Ante-Natal clinic is available. The tuberculosis clinic is held at Markfield Sanatorium under the auspices of the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICE FOR THE AREA.

Hospitals.

All hospitals, except some private maternity and nursing homes, are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

The County Homes for the aged and deaf-blind are under the County Council. When the inmates take ill they become the responsibility of the Regional Hospital Board.

Open-air Home for the Sick.

The home is entirely voluntary and not under the Regional Hospital Board.

At the end of the year there were 31 patients, 15 women and 2 men, all chronic sick.

During the year, a third bathroom was added. Two women wards have been completed and a women's sitting room has been opened.

Four wards are in process of being completed and a further bathroom is being constructed and central heating is being installed.

Treatment Centres and Clinics.

There are none actually in the district.

Infant welfare clinics are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist School, Ashby-de-la-Zouch and every Sat and Sun Thursday afternoon at the Wesleyan Methodist Church, Donisthorpe Road, Melton. At the Health Centre, Bridge Road, Coalville, an ante-natal clinic is available. The tuberculosis clinic is held at Northfield Sanatorium under the auspices of the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

Ambulance Facilities.

The County Council is responsible for all facilities in the County. Colliery accidents are removed by ambulances provided by the National Coal Board stationed at Nailstone Colliery and Moira Colliery.

Nursing in the Home.

All District Nursing and Midwifery in the home is under the Leicestershire County Council.

Health Visiting.

This work is provided by the Leicestershire County Council and the work of Health Visitor, School Nurse and Tuberculosis Visitor is combined in a single appointment.

The Diabetic Health Visitor attends the Diabetic Clinic at the Leicester Royal Infirmary and visits the patients in their homes.

Public Health Laboratory, Isolation Hospital, Groby Road, Leicester.

Work involved in the clearing and demolition of unfit houses continued and by the end of the year orders had been made in respect of 137 houses out of the Council's schedule of approximately 200 unfit houses to be dealt with in the five year programme.

Very good progress was made with new house building. Over 40 private houses were completed during the year - the greatest number in any one year since the war - and the Council's sites at Donisthorpe and Measham have been completed, apart from minor items.

The Council took a first step towards saving structurally sound properties from demolition in that, as an experiment they purchased five sub-standard properties (which the owners were not prepared to renovate) and carried out renovations themselves. It is hoped that this will lead to other similar purchases and improvements.

My Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

It gives me pleasure to present my third Annual

The year under review has seen progress made in

Work involved in the clearing and demolition of
unfit houses continued and by the end of the year
orders had been made in respect of 137 houses out of
the Council's schedule of approximately 200 unfit
houses to be dealt with in the five year programme.

Very good progress was made with new house
building. Over 40 private houses were completed
during the year - the greatest number in any one year
since the war - and the Council's rates at Dunstable
and Molesden have been completed, apart from minor items.

The Council took a first class award having
attractively sound properties from Council in that
as an experiment they purchased five sub-standard
properties (which the owners were not prepared to
renovate) and carried out renovations themselves.
It is hoped that this will lead to other similar
purchases and improvements.

It is regretted that owners of tenanted properties have still not taken advantage of the Improvement Grant provisions of the Housing Rents and Repairs Act, 1954. I feel sure they are still not appreciative of the fact that expenditure on improvements such as the provision of a bathroom, hot water system &c., can bring in a good financial return.

During the year the 500th post-war Council House was completed. This was a house on Wilkes Avenue, Measham and an official opening ceremony was performed by Mrs. J. Cronin, wife of Dr. John Cronin, F.R.C.S., Member of Parliament for the Loughborough Division.

The sewage works at Donisthorpe are now so overloaded that the sprinkler arms work continuously during the afternoons and there is, unfortunately, no doubt that the Council will shortly be faced with the expense of the extension of these works in addition to Measham and Ravenstone.

Unless Newbold Council Houses Works are connected to the Worthington sewer during the coming year, these works will have to be renovated.

Sewers in the district are now being affected seriously by mining subsidence, the sewer along the Ashby Road, Measham being particularly affected. At the present time every effort is being made to keep this (and other) sewers running with the expenditure of little money, but when the subsidence ceases, the cost of relaying is going to be high and it may be necessary to do certain work before the effect of subsidence has ceased.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

The bonus scheme for workmen continued during the year. Workmen are paid a bonus provided all the work in the district allocated to them is carried out. A five day week is worked. There are three teams, two consisting of four men, including the driver/loader, and the third team comprising 6 men including two driver/loaders. This latter team carries out cesspool emptying on two afternoons or each week. Pail closets, (approximately 1,200), are emptied at weekly intervals ; bins every seven working days, unless holidays intervene or men are absent for some reason, when the bonus scheme allows for a proportionate increase in the collecting period.

Cesspools are emptied on request and a charge of 30/- per load, or part load, is charged. A Bedford 5 ton 800 gallon capacity cesspool emptier is used. During the year under review 141 cesspools were emptied.

Dust bins have continued to be provided as a charge against the rates, 561 being issued. This number included 166 to new Council houses.

Visits made in connection with refuse collection was 170.

PETROLEUM.

One large property which had been let in flats was purchased by the Council and at the year end a tender for its demolition had been accepted, all the tenants having been rehoused. When this house is demolished the Council will have available for redevelopment an area of land of approximately 4,233 square yards. The land is, however, still liable to subsidence and it may be some few years before it can safely be developed.

During the year five sub-standard properties were purchased by the Council on the District Valuer's valuation. Plans and specifications were approved by the Ministry after some difficulties, and the work of renovating the properties put in hand. Work will include the provision of bathrooms, hot water systems, new fireplaces, damp proof courses, new floors &c.,. Ultimately five good houses will be provided at a cost of approximately £900. 0. 0. per house.
