Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Report for the year 1957.

According to the Registrar General's estimate, the
population has increased from 13,850 to 13,890.

The birth rate (15.6) is slightly higher than last year
(14.2) and lower than that for England and Wales (16.1).

The death rate (12.1) is higher than last year (11.3) and
higher than that for England and Wales (11.5). The death rate
of infants under one year is 13.8 compared with 15.2 in 1956,
and England and Wales 23.0, and the still birth rate is also
very low (4.6) compared with 22.4 for England and Wales.

Of the 151 deaths during the year there were 13 deaths from
accidents and suicide. The chief causes of death, as has been
the case for some years past, were from diseases associated with
elderly people.

The Cheshire Home for the sick has been enlarged and at the
end of the year there were 32 patients, 17 men and 15 women, all
chronic sick.

It will be noted that all the parishes, with the exception
of Barden have a piped water supply. Work of sinking the Bore-
hole at Acresford was completed during the year.

Sewerage schemes at Appleby Magna and Snarestone were near-
ing completion at the end of the year. The scheme for pumping
sewage from Osgatherpe to the Coalville Urban District Council's
works was also completed during the year. There are 378 cess-
pools in the district and 18 cesspools were constructed during
the year. 178 closets were converted to the water carriage
system.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Report for the year 1957.

According to the Registrar General's estimate, the
population has increased from 13,850 to 13,890.

The birth rate (17.6) is slightly higher than last year
(16.1) and lower than that for England and Wales (16.1).

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Of the 151 deaths during the year there were 13 deaths from
accidents and suicides. The chief causes of death, as has been
the case for some years past, were liver diseases associated with
elderly people.

The Gleaners Home for the sick has been enlarged and at the
end of the year there were 52 patients, 17 men and 13 women, all
chronic sick.

It will be noted that all the parishes, with the exception
of Bardon have a piped water supply. Work of sinking the Bardon
hole at Austerley was completed during the year.

Severage schemes at Appleby Magna and Bursastone were near-
ing completion at the end of the year. The scheme for pumping
sewage from Gargrave to the Civilian Urban District Council's
works was also completed during the year. There are 378 con-
crete pits in the district and 15 cesspits were constructed during
the year. 178 closets were converted to the water carriage

85 houses were completed during the year, making a total of 843 houses completed in the post-war period, of which 650 houses were completed by the local authority. The total number of applicants for council houses at the end of the year was 275 and the number of applications received during the year was 105.

Implementation of the Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955 proceeds satisfactorily and no formal action has been necessary.

481 cases of Infectious diseases were notified, of these 311 were measles, 156 whooping cough, 11 pneumonia and 3 erysipelas. There were 6 deaths all from pneumonia.

Again I am pleased to record an increase in the number of children being immunised against diphtheria.

Only two cases of tuberculosis, both males and Pulmonary, were notified during the year and there were no deaths from tuberculosis.

Evidence of Brucella Abertus infection was again found in milk, but no formal action was necessary.

To the staff of the Public Health Department of the County Council and to Dector Mair, Director of the Public Health Laboratory, I wish to extend my thanks for their willing help and co-operation.

Finally, I wish to thank Mr. C. S. Curtis, Surveyor and Public Health Inspector, and to thank Mr. F. H. Wynne, Additional Public Health Inspector, for their invaluable help during the year and you, Ladies and Gentlemen, for your kindness and co-operation.

SECTION B

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES
FOR THE AREA

Hospitals

All hospitals, except some private maternity and nursing homes, are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

The County Homes for the aged and destitute are under the County Council. When the inmates take ill they become the responsibility of the Regional Hospital Board.

Cheshire Home for the Sick

The home is entirely voluntary and not under the Regional Hospital Board.

At the end of the year there were 32 patients, 17 men and 15 women, all chronic sick.

During the year a further women's ward has been occupied. Three other wards are in process of being completed and a further bathroom is to be constructed.

Central heating has been installed in the major part of the house.

In 1957 a new small sewage disposal works was completed. The house has not yet been connected to the mains water supply.

Treatment Centres and Clinics

There are none actually in the district.

Infant welfare clinics are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist School, Ashby-de-la-Zeuch and every second and fourth Thursday afternoon at the Centenary Methodist Church, Denisthorpe Road, Meira. At the Health Centre, Bridge Road, Coalville, an Ante-Natal clinic is available. The tuberculosis clinic is held at Markfield Sanatorium under the auspices of the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

Ambulance Facilities.

SECTION C

The County Council is responsible for all facilities in the County. Colliery accidents are removed by ambulances provided by the National Coal Board stationed at Nailstone Colliery and Moira Colliery.

Nursing in the Home.

All district nursing and midwifery in the home is under the Leicestershire County Council.

Health Visiting.

This work is provided by the Leicestershire County Council and the work of Health Visitor, School Nurse and Tuberculosis Visitor is combined in a single appointment.

The Diabetic Health Visitor attends the Diabetic Clinic at the Leicester Royal Infirmary and visits the patients in their homes.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

During the year to which this Report relates, new legislation which was perhaps of greatest public health importance to local authorities was that dealing with housing. The very controversial Rent Act, 1957 came into force, as did regulations made thereunder. The Housing Act, 1957 also became law but this was to a great extent a consolidating Act.

Towards the year end we had a spate of applications for certificates of disrepair as a result of rent increase notices being served on tenants. Many of the houses concerned were affected by mining subsidence and in many cases it was not easy to draw a line between disrepair and mining subsidence damage.

Work in connection with the closing and demolition of unfit properties was pressed forward and at the year end a further 36 unfit houses had been formally represented making a total of 173 houses dealt with so far under the five year programme.

A surprising amount of difficulty was experienced in getting unfit properties cleared away after the tenants had been rehoused, not so much because of difficulty with the owners, but rather because the demolition contractors did not get on with the job once the order was placed with them.

New private house building slowed down very considerably, only half the number of private houses being completed during this year compared with 1956. I think there is no doubt that more houses would have been under construction at the year end but for the increases in the rate of interest on borrowed money.

The Council's large housing scheme at Worthington commenced early in the year was nearing completion at the year end. It seems a great pity that the housing programme has to be slowed down just at a time when real headway was being made into the clearance of slums and the rehusing of people from the "general need" waiting list. It is, however, fortunate that this Council have felt able to continue with the programme, as far as is necessary, to rehouse people from unfit properties.

Progress in connection with the finding of sites in the smaller villages for the erection of Council houses has not been satisfactory. Difficulty has been experienced either with purchasing suitable sites, overcoming planning objections or being able to make provision for the satisfactory drainage of the proposed houses.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT

The system whereby a part time rodent operator is employed has continued. The man works alternate weeks on these duties.

Free treatment is carried out for domestic premises and a charge made for treatment at business and agricultural premises. The Council's sewage works, refuse tips, sewers &c., are baited regularly.

A total of 1790 visits were made by the operator and 209 premises treated.

FOOD INSPECTION

Much work in connection with food handling has been carried out and efforts continued to ensure that all premises are made to comply with the Food and Drugs Act, 1955.

As in previous years, 100% meat inspection was carried out and it is pleasing to be able to comment and express satisfaction with the class of animal slaughtered for food purposes. Once again, reference can be made to the very small amount condemned as unfit for human consumption.

Routine inspections of distributing vehicles have again continued to be carried out.

During the year 53 samples of milk were taken for biological examination and 41 samples for bacteriological examination. In addition 76 "follow-up" samples were taken.

The Ashby-de-la-Zouch Rural District is in a specified area and no milk, other than designated milk may be sold.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

The bonus scheme whereby workmen are paid a bonus provided all the work allocated to them is carried out, has now been in operation for over two years. The system whereby two teams comprising 4 men each and the other team comprising 6 men has continued. The latter team has continued to spend two afternoons each week cesspool emptying; this team has the largest pail collection.

The pail closets have been emptied at weekly intervals and bins every 7 working days. (A five day week is worked).

During the year under review 161 cesspools were emptied.

Dustbins have continued to be provided as a charge against the rates, 383 being issued during the year. This number included 62 to new Council houses.

54 visits were made to properties in connection with refuse collection.

TENTS, VANS, AND SHEDS.

Licences have been issued in respect of 14 caravans. These continue to be spread throughout the district. A total of 24 inspections have been made.

The policy of applicants first being requested to make application under the Town and Country Planning Act, 1947 has again continued. If this is granted, an application for licencing under the Public Health Act, 1936 is then placed before the Council for their consideration.

NEW DRAINAGE AND CLOSET CONVERSIONS

Grants of not more than £10. 0. 0. per closet converted is given to encourage owners to convert to the water carriage system. Although this is some slight inducement where sewers are available, with present day prices, in very few cases indeed does this amount approach anything near half the cost of the work. It is no inducement at all in parishes where septic tanks have to be provided because of the absence of sewage schemes. Despite this, in the newly sewered parishes quite reasonable progress has been made.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL WORKS AND SCHEMES

At last permission has been obtained for a commencement of the Packington sewerage scheme. This parish is very rapidly developing; the fact that building land has been available and its proximity to Ashby-de-la-Zeuch has led to a considerable amount of new house building over the past few years and it has become essential that the sewerage scheme be carried out.

All the larger villages in the Rural District now have a sewerage scheme of sorts. Unfortunately, the older works are now becoming heavily overloaded and the situation becomes worse with each new house built.

I have previously drawn attention to the position at Ravenstone, Measham and Donisthorpe. Ravenstone works are completely submerged during heavy rainfall and for weeks on end the irrigation area has been a pond. The overloading at the Measham works will become more acute when the new pit head baths at Measham Main Colliery are brought into use. At Donisthorpe more land will have to be obtained for sludge drainings as an emergency measure.

Despite my forebodings about the Newbold works we managed to keep these functioning without the expenditure of any more money on repairs, but it would be a very good thing if the village of Newbold could be properly sewered.

The mining subsidence position so far as it affected sewers worsened rapidly during the year. One steel sewer at Donisthorpe became so badly blocked that an expenditure of approximately £300. 0. 0. was needed to clean out a length of approximately 1,100 feet. One length of sewer in the parish of Measham, one at Oaktherpe and two at Donisthorpe have to be emptied regularly by the Cesspool Emptying machine to keep the sewers flowing.

The one bright side to this rather gloomy picture (from the Council's point of view) was the passing of the Coal Mining (Subsidence) Act, 1957 which made the Coal Board responsible for paying compensation for damage caused to sewers after the 1st August, 1957.

WATER SUPPLY

The new borehole at Acresford was completed during the year and the pump installed. The Council are now in a happy position as far as pumping arrangements are concerned on both sides of the district.

The fact that chlorinating equipment has still not been installed at the two waterworks gives cause for some anxiety with the many breakages of mains which occurs in a district badly affected by subsidence. I think it vital that the installation of chlorinating equipment be speeded up.

Town and Country Planning Act, 1947

Administration in connection with development under the Act is carried out by the Council in conjunction with the Western Area Sub-Committee of the Leicestershire County Council.

During the year 167 applications were made in respect of permission to develop.

Loans for House Purchase

15 properties were inspected during the year as a result of requests for loans in connection with house purchase which is a decrease of 2 over 1956.

Construction of new Council Houses

Work at the Werthington site continued during the year. Work was at first held up due to weather conditions and to the petrol shortage which occurred due to the "Suez Crisis". However, work recommenced early in March and by the end of the year good progress had been made.

The average construction cost of these houses is expected to be £1484. 12. 4. per house. To this should be added £268. 9. 4. and £16. 3. 8. per house in respect of site works and land purchase respectively making a total average cost per house of £1769. 5. 4.

During the year the Council gave instructions for the preparation of plans &c., for the erection of three bedroomed houses and two bedroomed bungalows. These to be erected in the various parishes to rehouse people from slum clearance properties. This work was held up due to the fact that the Council's Clerk of Works resigned and Mr. Rosille had to spend 90% of his time during the last four months of the year at the Werthington Housing Site.

Improvement Grants.

The Council's policy of giving improvement grants has continued.

Every effort is made by your officers to encourage people to improve their property and where ever extensive repairs are to be carried out at a property the owner's attention is drawn to the fact that for the expenditure of a little more money he can often provide a bathroom and hot water system with grant aid from the Council.

Although the number of interviews taking place in connection with improvement grants has been as great as previous years, the number of persons actually taking advantage of the legislation has fallen, due no doubt, to the fact that money is becoming progressively "dearer".

Reconditioning of Unfit Property

Renovation and repair of the five sub-standard houses purchased by the Council during 1956 was completed.

These five houses were "border line" slum clearance property but were light and airy houses with sound walls and roof timbers and had plenty of space around them. Although not in the Council's present five year programme they would, undoubtedly have had to be dealt with within the next 7 or 8 years.

Each house comprised living kitchen, sitting room and three bedrooms.

Work carried out was as follows :

- (a) Replacement of the existing slate roof with concrete tiles on underfelt, together with new eaves gutters and downpipes.
- (b) New windows throughout.
- (c) Provision of a horizontal damp proof course.
- (d) Provision of new floors in the kitchen/living room and sitting room. Floors finished with Marley tiles.
- (e) Construction of small wash-houses at rear (also forming rear entrance).
- (f) Conversion of one bedroom into bathroom and boxroom together with hot water system.
- (g) Rayburn cookers substituted for existing dilapidated ranges.
- (h) External rendering to all walls - Derbyshire Spa finish.
- (i) Sundry repairs to pointing, doors, chimney stacks, coalstoves &c.

The five houses were purchased by agreement for the sum of £785. 0. 0.

The final cost figure for the repairs and improvements was £3,684. 12. 3. It will be seen, therefore, that the total cost per house to the Council was £894. 0. 0.

The scheme was carried out under Section 15 of the Housing Act, 1949 and the Ministry of Housing and Local Government are making an annual grant of £99. 15. 5. for 20 years.

At the end of this Report are shown photographs and sketches etc., indicating the property before and after renovation.

During the year a number of offers were made by owners to the Council of property for renovation. At the year end the Council had provisionally agreed to the purchase of a terrace row of 10 houses with a view to repair and provision of bathroom, hot water system etc., and had refused to purchase a row of 5 other houses.

The Council were also taking interest in a scheme for the conversion of a number of Alms Houses into 8 ground floor and 12 first floor flats.

I wish to again express my appreciation to you, Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen for your kindness and understanding during the year, to Doctor Segerdal for his help and consideration and to the Clerk of the Council and the Accountant for their ever ready co-operation.

Finally I would thank the members of the department for the cheerful and conscientious way they have carried out their duties.

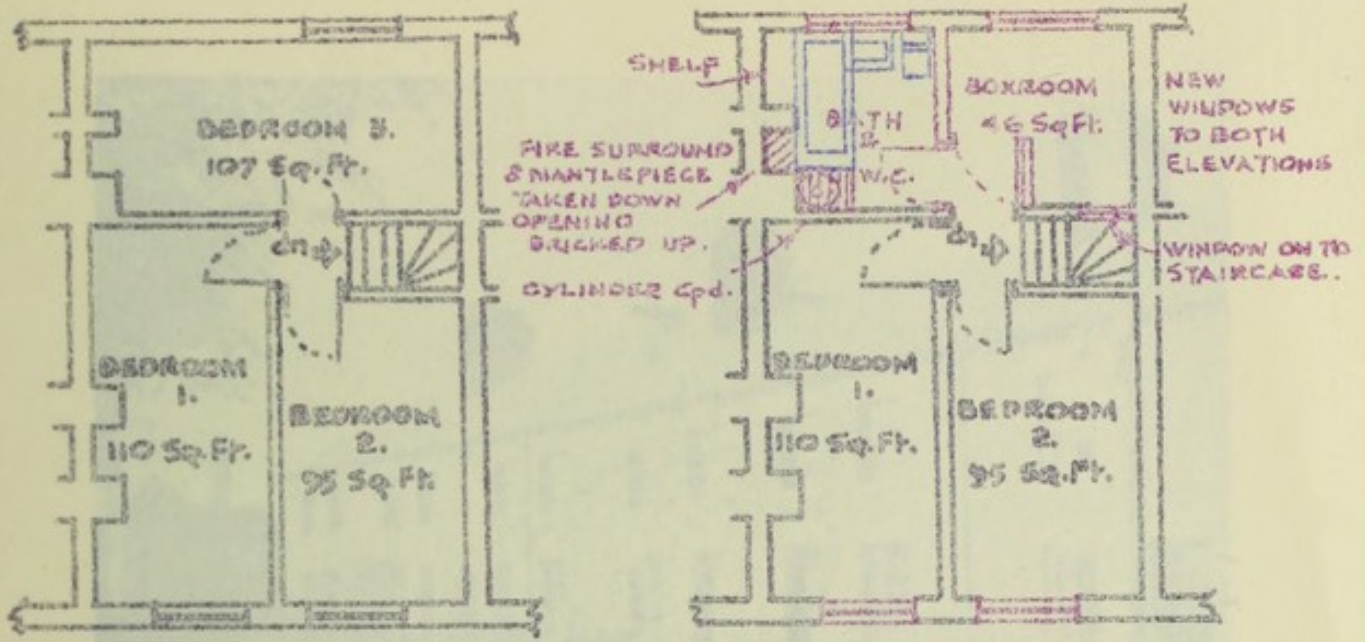

72 - 80 NEW STREET - DONISTHORPE.



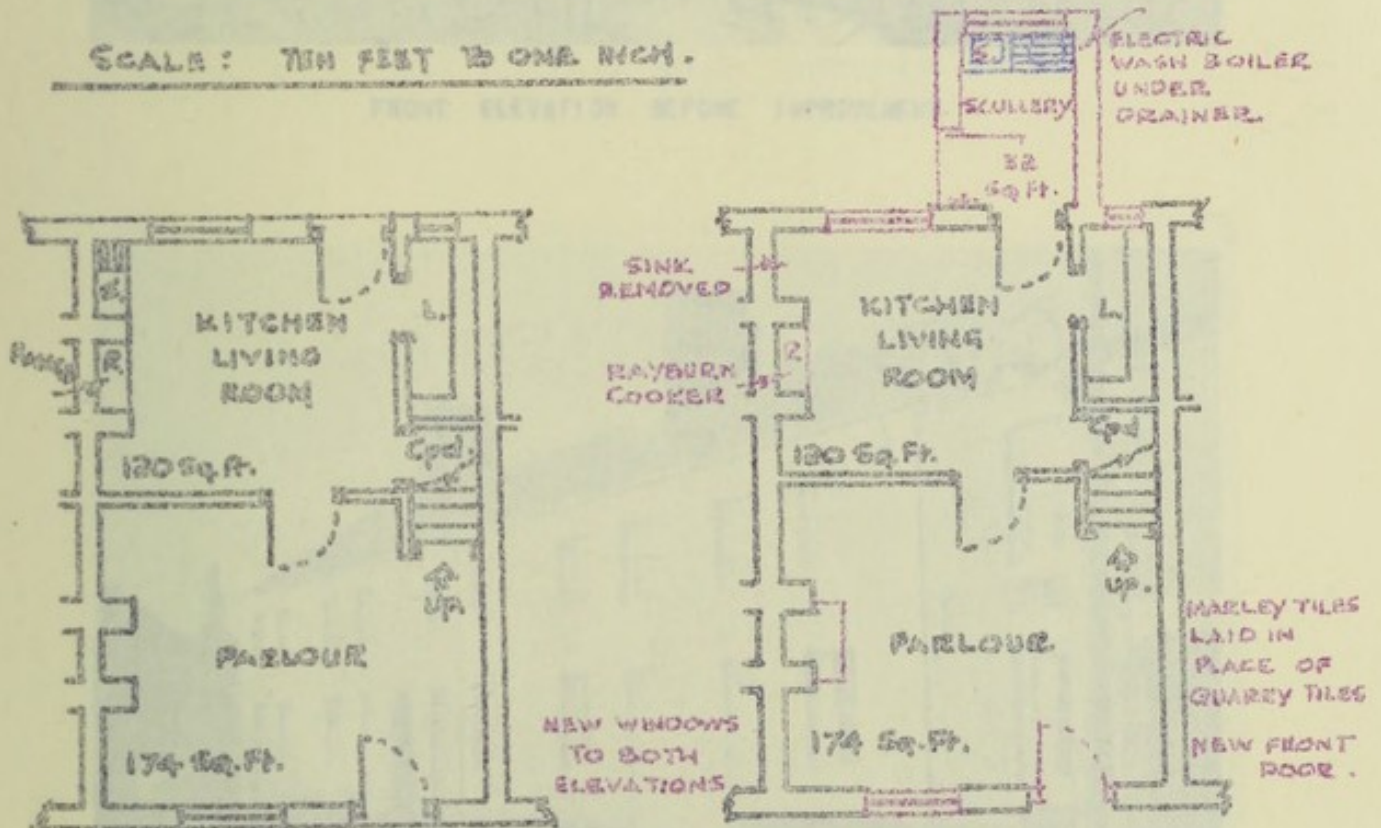
TYPICAL FIRST FLOOR PLAN

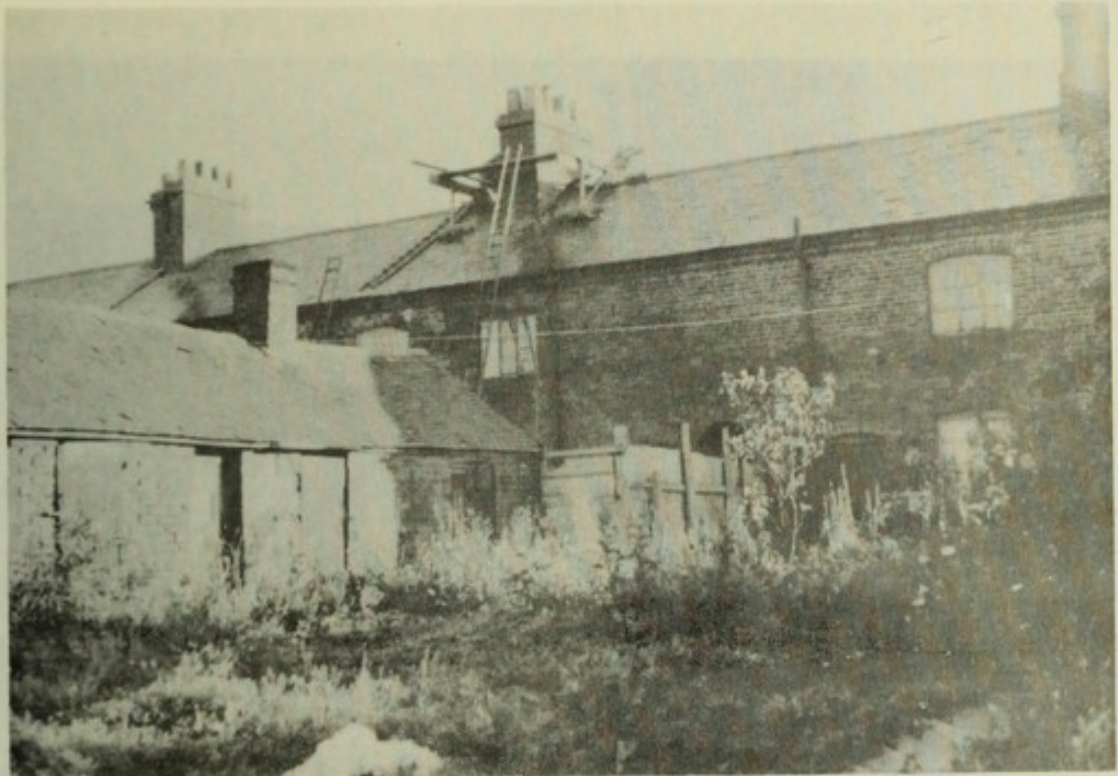


FRONT ELEVATION BEFORE IMPROVEMENT

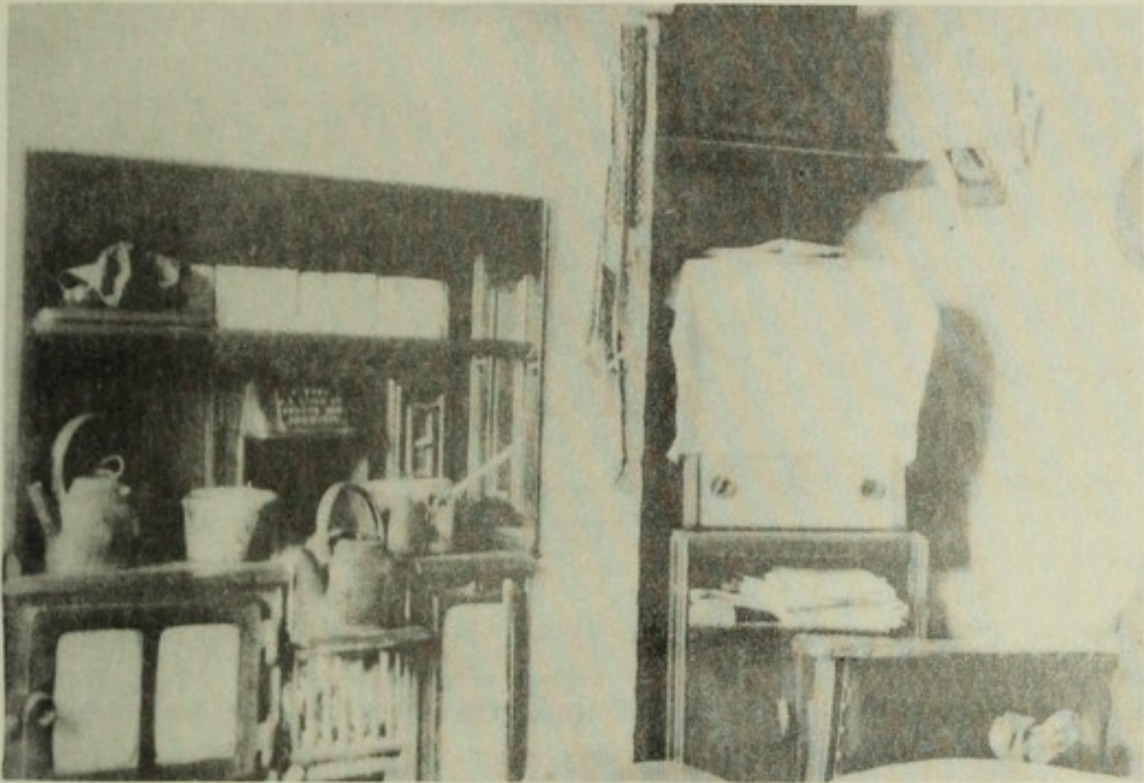


REAR ELEVATION BEFORE IMPROVEMENT

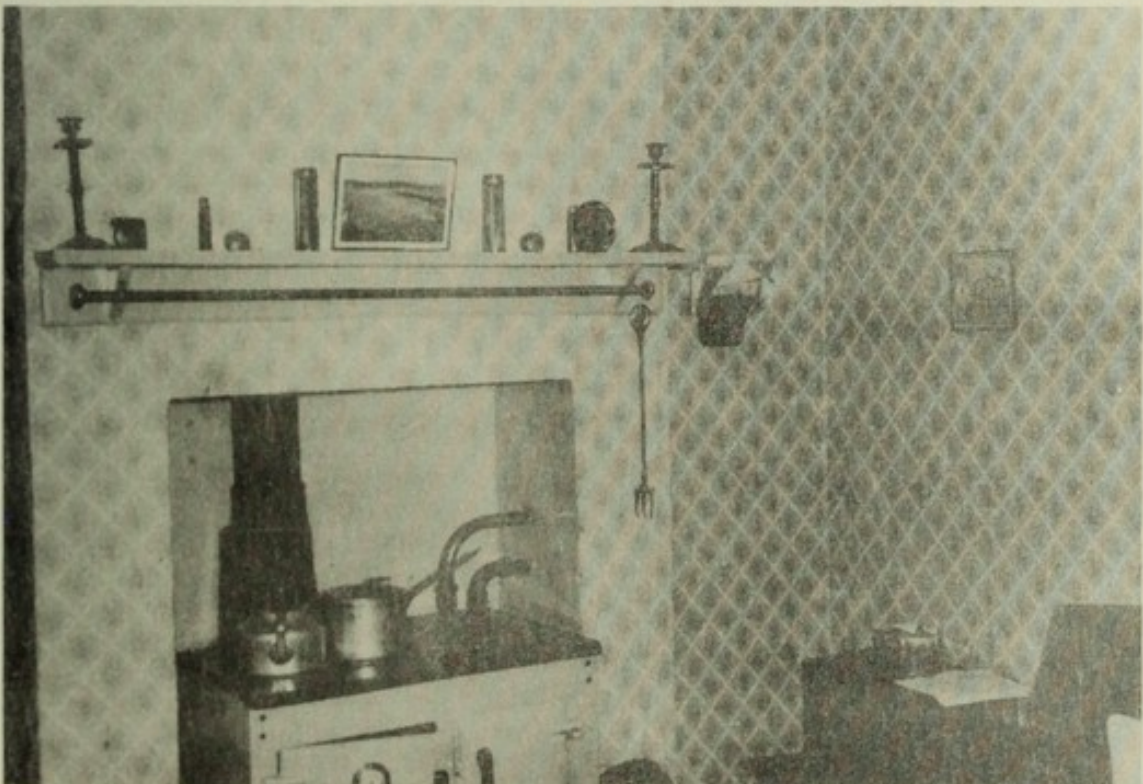


REAR ELEVATION AFTER IMPROVEMENT
