Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Report for the year 1958.

It will be noted that there is a different layout of the vital statistics. This is in accordance with the Minister's wishes so that comparisons can be made.

According to the Registrar General's estimate, the population has increased from 13,890 to 13,950.

The birth rate (15.1) is slightly lower than last year (15.6) and lower than that for England and Wales (16.4).

The death rate (11.7) is lower than last year (12.1) and the same as that for England and Wales (11.7). The death rate of infants under one year is 33.2 compared with 13.8 in 1957, and England and Wales 22.5, and the still birth rate is 36.5 compared with 21.6 for England and Wales.

Of the 149 deaths during the year there were 8 deaths from accidents and suicide. The chief causes of death, as has been the case for some years past, were from diseases associated with elderly people.

The Cheshire Home for the sick now contains 30 patients, 15 men and 15 women, all chronic sick. Alterations at the home are now in progress for the reception of further patients.

It will be noted that all the parishes, with the exception of Bardon, have a piped water supply. The extension at Staunton Harold was completed during the year. A scheme for the chlorination of the water supplies was in course of preparation at the year end.

I beg to present my report for the year 1958.

It will be noted that there is a different layout of the  
vital statistics. This is in accordance with the Minister's  
wishes so that comparisons can be made.

According to the Registrar General's estimate, the  
population has increased from 13,800 to 14,000.

The birth rate (15.1) is slightly lower than last year  
(15.6) and lower than that for England and Wales (16.4).

The death rate (11.7) is lower than last year (12.1)  
and the same as that for England and Wales (11.7). The death  
rate of infants under one year is 15.2 compared with 13.8  
in 1957, and England and Wales 20.2, and the still birth rate  
is 36.5 compared with 31.6 for England and Wales.

Of the 149 deaths during the year there were 8 deaths  
from accidents and suicides. The chief causes of death, as  
has been the case for some years past, were from diseases  
associated with elderly people.

The Chestnut House for the sick now contains 30 patients,  
15 men and 15 women, all chronic cases. Alterations at the  
house are now in progress for the reception of further patients.

It will be noted that all the parishes, with the  
exception of Harston, have a piped water supply. The extension  
at Stanton Harold was completed during the year. A scheme  
for the chlorination of the water supplies was in course of  
preparation at the year end.

Sewerage schemes at Appleby Magna and Snarestone were almost completed at the end of the year and the scheme for Packington was in progress. There are 379 cesspools in the district and 22 cesspools were constructed and 21 abolished during the year. 141 closets were converted to the water carriage system during the year.

58 houses were completed during the year, making a total of 901 houses completed in the post-war period, of which 678 houses were completed by the local authority. The total number of applicants for Council houses at the end of the year was 372 and the number of applications received during the year was 72.

Implementation of the Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955, proceeded satisfactorily and no formal action has been necessary.

111 cases of infectious diseases were notified, of these 71 were measles, 6 whooping cough, 15 pneumonia and 19 scarlet fever. There were 5 deaths all from pneumonia.

I am pleased to record a considerable increase in the number of children being immunised against diphtheria. This is probably due to the desire for protection against whooping cough at the same time, and the publicity associated with poliomyelitis protection. I am unable at present to give any figures of the number of persons immunised against poliomyelitis.

Only two cases of tuberculosis, one male and one female, non-pulmonary, were notified during the year and there was one death from tuberculosis, non-pulmonary.

To the staff of the Public Health Department of the County Council and to Doctor Mair, Director of the Public Health Laboratory, I wish to extend my thanks for their willing help and co-operation.

Finally I wish to thank Mr. C. S. Curtis, Surveyor and Public Health Inspector, and to thank Mr. F. H. Wynne, Additional Public Health Inspector, for their invaluable help during the year and you, Ladies and Gentlemen, for your kindness and co-operation.

The total number of applications for Council houses at the end of the year was 172 and the number of applications received during the year was 72.

111 cases of infectious diseases were notified, of these 11 were measles, 6 whooping cough, 15 pneumonia and 19 scarlet fever. There were 5 deaths all from pneumonia.

I am pleased to record a considerable increase in the number of children being immunised against diphtheria. This is probably due to the desire for protection against whooping cough at the same time, and the publicity associated with poliomyelitis protection. I am unable at present to give any figures of the number of persons immunised against poliomyelitis.

#### Hospitals

All hospitals, except some private maternity and nursing homes, are under the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

The County Homes for the aged and destitute are under the County Council. When the inmates take ill they become the responsibility of the Regional Hospital Board.

#### Cheshire Home for the Sick

The home is entirely voluntary and not under the Regional Hospital Board.

At the end of the year there were 30 patients, 15 men and 15 women, all chronic sick.

One ward has been converted for use for Physio/and Occupational Therapy, and alterations are in progress for the reception of further patients shortly.

#### Treatment Centres and Clinics

There are none actually in the district. Infant welfare clinics are held every Thursday afternoon at the Baptist School, Ashby-de-la-Zouch and every second and fourth Thursday afternoon at the Centenary Methodist Church, Donisthorpe Road, Moira. At the Health Centre, Bridge Road, Coalville, an Ante-Natal clinic is available. The tuberculosis clinic is held at Markfield Sanatorium under the auspices of the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

#### Ambulance Facilities

The County Council is responsible for all facilities in the County. Colliery accidents are removed by ambulances provided by the National Coal Board stationed at Nailstone Colliery and at Measham Road, Oakthorpe.

#### Nursing in the Home

All district nursing and midwifery in the home is under the Leicestershire County Council.

The tuberculosis clinic is held at Morningside Sanatorium under the auspices of the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board.

The County Council is responsible for all facilities in the County. Colliery accidents are removed by ambulances provided by the National Coal Board stationed at Kellistown Colliery and at Measham Road, Oakthorpe.

#### Nursing in the Home

All district nursing and midwifery in the home is under the Leicestershire County Council.

In fairness, it must be admitted that this is only natural where valuable farmland is concerned and particularly where the land is "home pasture".

The Council's Worthington housing scheme has been completed and a ceremony was held to mark the opening of the 1000th Council house erected in the district.

### SEWAGE DISPOSAL

At the year end good progress had been made with the Packington sewerage scheme, this scheme having proceeded much more speedily than any other post-war scheme in the Rural District. The long drawn out Appleby Magna sewage scheme was nearing completion together with the part of the scheme dealing with the parish of Snarestone, and the works are in use. There has been very great nuisance in these two villages in the past due to sewage gaining access to ditches and brookcourses, and it is a relief to know that these nuisances have been abated to all intents and purposes.

I must again draw your attention to the position of a number of older works, particularly Measham and Ravenstone where overloading is about 100%. The Newbold Council house works now consists of a ring of disintegrating brickwork, with sewage being discharged on to filter media on the centre of the brickwork.

Mining subsidence damage to sewers continued to give cause for concern. It is necessary to empty two sewers at weekly intervals in order to keep these running, and in addition, two others are emptied at two monthly intervals and one flushed to keep this operating. Ultimately there will have to be considerable expenditure to remedy these defects. The cesspool emptying machine has been invaluable; without it the sewers could not have been kept running.

One sewer at Oakthorpe, already badly affected, will be further affected by subsidence and at the year end a scheme was being prepared to minimise the effects of this.
