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

To the Chairman and Members of the Rural District Council of Ashby-de-la-Zouch.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present the Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year 1967, concerning the sanitary circumstances, administration and vital statistics of the district. It has been prepared according to instructions contained in the Ministry of Health Circular 1/68, dated 2nd January, 1968.

As you are aware, your Medical Officer of Health during the period in question was the late Dr. Segerdal, who had acted in that capacity for many years and whose death took place in April, 1968, a few weeks after the cessation of his appointment with you. Nearly all the statistics presented have been derived from records kept by him. I know it was his practice to give a short, but interesting and useful, account of the general health services in the area. I understand that no changes in these took place during 1967 so that the information contained in his last Annual Report still stands and it has not been thought necessary to repeat it here. One anticipates that, if opportunity offers, further comment will, in due course, be made on these matters.





ANNUAL REPORT

To the Chairman and Members of the Rural District Council of Ashby-de-la-Zouch.


It gives me great pleasure to present this, my 14th Annual Report, being the Report for the year 1967.

The routine work of the department continued, but again much time had to be given to remedying the effects of mining subsidence, the worst hit area during the year being the Ramscliff Avenue housing site - houses, drains, sewers and pumping station being badly affected.

Although the Slum Clearance programme, as such, is virtually ended, individual houses continued to be found which have gradually deteriorated, are unfit for human habitation, and cannot be made fit at reasonable expense. A total of 316 dwellings have been dealt with formally since we started the Slum Clearance campaign in addition to houses demolished informally.


Steady progress was made with house modernisation; with a few exceptions all owners in the district have now been written to and advised as to how they can obtain grants and loans for this purpose. Plans were forwarded to each of the owners showing various ways of modernising typical houses.

New legislation introduced during the year included the Civic Amenities Act, 1967, and the Meat Inspection (Amendment) Regulations. The Civic Amenities Act is intended to help to preserve areas of special architectural or historic value, and to improve amenities generally. The Meat Inspection (Amendment) Regulations enable Local Authorities to fix hours during which slaughtering can be carried out.



Efforts were made to improve the standard of hygiene in the various shops, cafes, etc. and it is pleasing to be able to say that there has been, over the years, a gradual and marked improvement.

A start was made on the erection of 181 Council houses at Measham. 150 of these are to be for displaced miners from the north and the remaining 31 for the general means of this district. A start was made on the erection of the boiler house for the district heating scheme.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

The position at the year end was as follows :

Appleby Magna.

Scheme completed for main part of village. Scheme for enlargement of pumping station deferred as this forms part of Snarestone Sewage Works extension scheme.

Acresford.

A scheme is badly needed to enable owners to modernise their houses and abolish pail closets situated immediately adjoining the back doors of the houses.

Bardon.

Scattered area - impossible to sewer.

Chilcote.

A scheme and estimates were ready for submission to the Council at the year end.

Colegaton.

Deferred indefinitely because of mining subsidence.

Donisthorpe.

Works over-loaded - work of reconstruction commenced. Threequarters of the work completed. This included the construction of new settling tanks, filters, humus tanks, sludge beds, drying areas, pumping main and pumping station. Severe mining subsidence being experienced here, and further subsidence expected. Possible that two additional pumping stations will have to be constructed in this Village to allow for this. Severe subsidence has affected Ramscliff Avenue with the result that sewers are flat and have backfall, and it will be necessary to construct a new pumping station to replace the present ejector station. Emergency works were commenced to relay some of the affected lengths of sewer. As an emergency measure an additional compressor and electrical equipment has been installed at this station.

Scheme completed some 10 years ago - a very strong effluent caused treat-ment difficulties and a recirculation scheme has been installed. A Village Plan is being prepared for this Village by the County Planning Department and will determine whether further enlargements are necessary.

Measham and Oakthorpe.

Works modernised and enlarged some 5 years ago, but very strong effluent led to a suspicion that the works were still over-loaded and investigations were carried out, confirming this suspicion. Work has started on the provision of additional sludge beds, balancing tank, etc. A new pumping station is under construction at Tamworth Road, together with a new pumping main.

Normanton-le-Heath.

A scheme was prepared and submitted to the Ministry and a public inquiry held.

Osgathorpe.

Scheme completed. The Pumping Station on Mill House Estate, Thringstone, (Osgathorpe Parish), was completed, septic tanks at these houses being abolished and the sewage pumped to Coalville Urban District Council's sewers.

Packington.

Scheme completed.

Ravenstone.

Works badly over-loaded - scheme for complete reconstruction prepared and a public inquiry held.

.

Snarestone.

These Works deal with effluent from Appleby Magna, Snarestone, Newton Burgoland and Swepstone, and are working to maximum capacity. A scheme for enlargement was submitted to the Ministry, but after a public inquiry the scheme was deferred. The effluent at these works improved very considerably during the year once farm effluent from Appleby Magna was taken out of the sewers.

Swannington.

Sewage pumped to Coalville Urban District Council's Works.

Swepstone and Newton Burgoland.

Scheme completed.


Worthington.

Appleby Magna Brook Course.

The scheme for cleaning out Appleby Magna Brook Course was completed. In all a total of 1 mile was deepened and widened, and about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile cleaned out. Five sleeper bridges were constructed to replace old arched bridges. The road along The Lakes is, however, very low in relation to the bed of the brook and flooding along this length will never be finally abated until the road is raised considerably.





ANIMAL BOARDING ESTABLISHMENT ACT, 1963.

Routine inspections of the three licenced establishments were maintained during the year, and the standards laid down by the Act were maintained.



CARAVAN SITES AND MOVEABLE DWELLINGS.

The caravan site has continued to be fully occupied. There is little or no movement from the site by residents, and the site has in fact become, in all but name, a small housing site.

Charges at the site are as follows :

Daily tenancy : 5/- per day.
Weekly tenancy : 25/- per week. Weekly tenancy
Electricity supply

by 2/- meter.

Difficulty was experienced during the year owing to the use of unauthorised sites, chiefly by people who travel the country carrying out jobs such as surfacing private drives and roads, Occupying fields or hard standings, with the owners consent and at considerable financial advantage to the owner who provides almost no facilities. One case was taken by the Council before the local Magistrates and the owner of the land was fined a total of £40.

A total of 105 visits were made to caravan sites.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

The Council's Rodent Operator was employed full time during the year - although part of his actual working time was spent in the Ashby-de-la-Zouch Urban District - an average of 8 hours per week.

The sewers throughout the district were also treated for infestation. A representative of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food was present when this was carried out.


OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963.

Routine inspections have been carried out during the year of the premises registered under the above Act, and, generally speaking, they were found to comply with the provisions laid down. The problem of obtaining and fitting guards to meat slicing machines has now been overcome, and, in some cases, new machines were purchased in order to comply.

On August 1st, Section 5 of the above Act, relating to room space, came into operation, and this made the standards laid down for new premises applicable to existing Offices, Shops, etc.

Two accidents were notified during the year from office premises. In the first case a female typist sustained a fractured fore-arm after tripping over a mat. These mats have since been removed. In the second case a female operator of an Off-set Printing machine trapped her fingers. Following an enquiry into this accident steps were taken to modify the machine and the firm in question were requested to see that the routine for cleaning and using this type of machine was strictly adhered to.

A scheme was prepared for renovation of the four prewar houses which the Council purchased, which included the provision of bathrooms, hot water systems, internal water closets, modernisation of kitchens, new floors, windows, doors, central heating system, etc. The total cost of this work was £6,824, and of this £4,861 was estimated to be eligible for Grant Aid. At the year end the scheme had been submitted to the Ministry, but the Ministry decision regarding Grant had not been received.

LOANS FOR HOUSE PURCHASE.


54 properties were inspected during the year as a result of requests for loans in connection with house purchase, and, in the majority of cases, loans were approved. 59 visits of inspection were made.



STANDARD GRANTS.

Standard grants are not discretionary, all local authorities must make a grant where the property has a life of not less than 15 years. The amounts which must be given are set out in the House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959, as amended by the Housing Act, 1961, and grant can only be given in order to provide certain amenities, i.e. (a) a fixed bath or shower in the bathroom; (b) a wash hand basin; (c) a hot water system; (d) a water closet in the dwelling; and (e) satisfactory facilities for the storage of food.





FOOD HYGIENE (MARKET STALLS AND DELIVERY VEHICLES) REGULATIONS, 1966.

The above legislation came into operation on January 1st, 1967, and is intended to raise the standard of Food Hygiene on market stalls, and vehicles which come under the heading of stalls, (e.g. mobile shops, etc.) and delivery vehicles.


Prior to the Act coming into operation letters were sent to all persons who retail food from vehicles, and by the end of the year most of the vehicles complied with the requirements of the Regulations.

THE MEAT INSPECTION (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS, 1966.


The above Regulations came into operation on September 30th, 1966, and the owners of both slaughterhouses in the district were consulted regarding the control of the hours of slaughter. The Council decided that slaughtering hours should be limited to 7.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m., Mondays to Fridays only. An appeal was made by one of the butchers to the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. The Ministry upheld the Council's decision.

MEAT INSPECTION - CARCASES INSPECTED AND CONDEMNED.

There has been a considerable reduction in the number of pigs slaughtered. This is due to one of the butchers having difficulty in getting staff during the early part of the year, and the outbreak of Foot and Mouth Disease was a contributory factor.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Tipping continued in the old cutting off Stoney Lane, Coleorton; in the Canal bed at Measham and off Measham Road, Donisthorpe.

Bins are emptied at intervals of $6\frac{1}{4}$ working days, but this period has to be extended for absence of workmen due to sickness, holidays, vehicle breakdown, etc.

Pans are emptied at weekly intervals.

The search for additional tipping space continued during the year. During the year, at the request of the Ministry, a meeting was held between this Authority and others to consider a joint scheme for burning refuse. The scheme was being promoted by the Swadlincote U.D.C. and Repton R.D.C. It was agreed by the Council that they would be a member of a Study Group to consider the scheme.

The Council instructed me to discuss with any interested, immediately adjoining, Authority the possibility of a joint disposal scheme.

An area of land suitable for tipping purposes was found in the Lount area, and at the year end the District Valuer had been asked to negotiate a purchase price with the owners and an application made for planning permission. If it is finally agreed that this purchase be completed, after negotiations have been completed, the scheme would be a joint one with the Ashby-de-la-Zouch U.D.C.

An order was placed for a Dennis Paxit IIIA Continuous Loader refuse collection vehicle following demonstrations by the manufacturers of four different types of machine to replace the Karrier Side Loader on the Measham side of the district.

The Council gave instructions for a scheme to be submitted to them setting out the implications and cost of providing a weekly refuse collection service.

PETROLEUM.

Visits were made in respect of all new installations; excavations for tanks inspection; the tanks, pipe lines, etc. inspected and tested before a license to use is issued.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES.

Routine inspections are made. There had been further minor damage throughout the year, especially during the darker evenings, but this cannot be considered to be excessive.

STREET LIGHTING.

Vandalism continued to be a source of nuisance and required the expenditure of £215 during the year.

During the year legislation required that lighting, other than footway lighting, should become the responsibility of the County Council. There was considerable argument as to what was meant by footway lighting and this had not been cleared up at the end of the year.

I again wish to thank you, Mr. Chairman and Members of the Council, for your courtesy and consideration during the year; express my appreciation for the ever ready co-operation of the Clerk of the Council, Accountant and the Housing Manager, and to thank the members of my own staff for their diligence and conscientiousness.

On behalf of all the members of my staff I wish to express regret at the loss of the late Dr. Segerdal, whose help and guidance was always so valuable and who was looked upon as a friend as well as a colleague.
